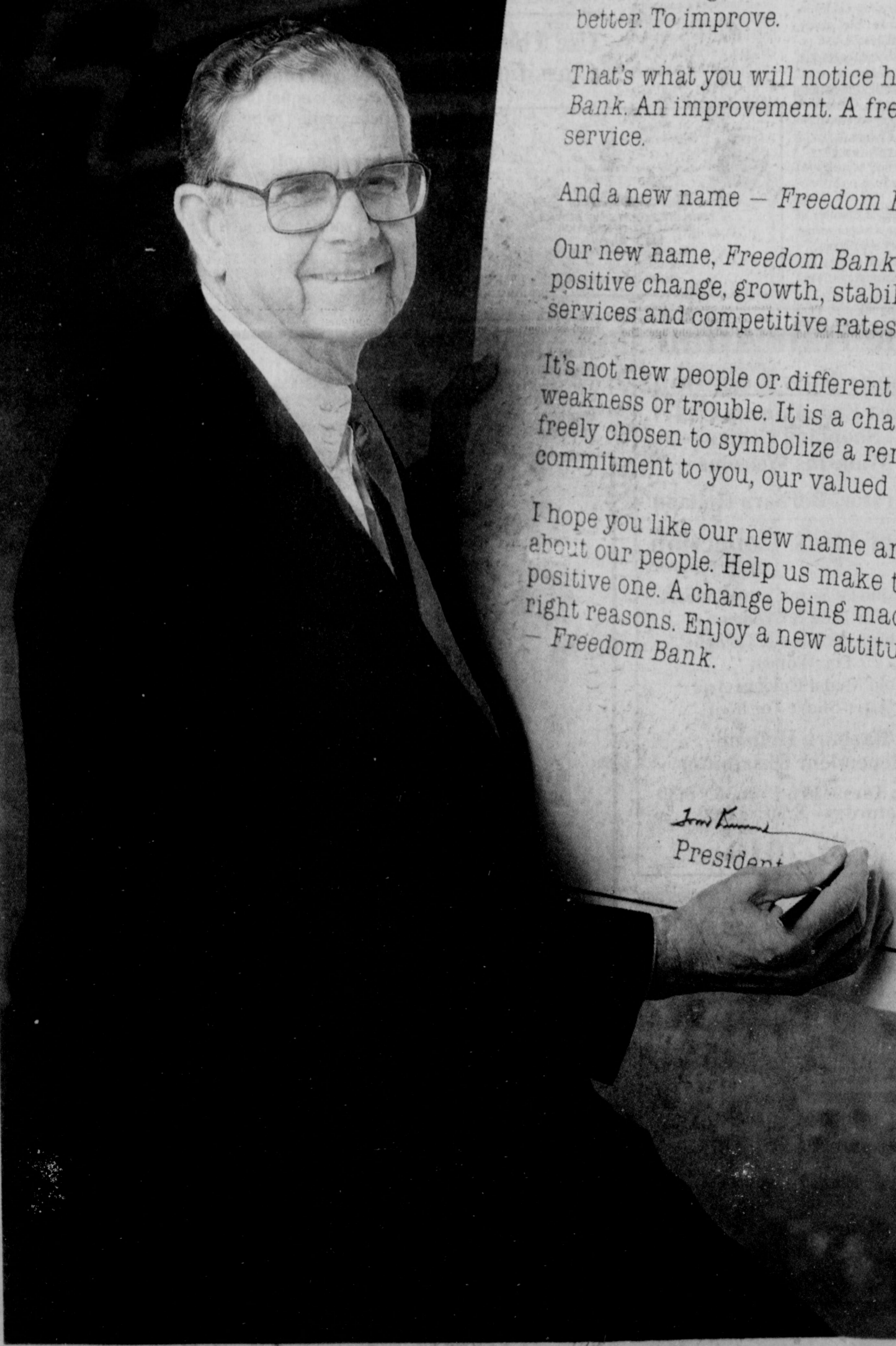

### RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

#### CRANBERRY FRUIT BREAD

2 cups sifted flour  
1 cup sugar  
1 1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
add juice and grated rind of 1 orange  
2 tablespoons melted shortening  
about 2 tablespoons boiling water

1 egg, well beaten  
1/2 cup chopped nuts  
1 1/2 cups cranberries, coarsely chopped

Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder, soda, and salt. Pour orange juice into measuring cup. Add grated orange rind, melted shortening and enough boiling water to make 3/4 cup. Combine orange juice mixture and well beaten egg. Stir liquid into dry ingredients only until dampened. Fold in nuts and cranberries. Pour into greased and floured loaf pan. Let stand 20 minutes. Bake at 350 degrees for 45-60 minutes.

## Report On Court Cases

Several Cases were settled last Monday, November 20 in 91st District Court in Eastland. His Court appointed attorney was Randy Wilson of Abilene.

Smoking directly affects cholesterol levels, says the American Health Foundation. Tests indicate that each cigarette per day raises total cholesterol by half a point; quitting brings it down again.

People who take aspirin and non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs in arthritis-fighting doses are more likely to be hospitalized for ulcers, the British Medical Journal reports. (The Food and Drug Administration now requires warning of this on labels.)

Instead of surgery to remove gallstones, doctors at Mayo Clinic have been injecting ether into the gallbladder to dissolve the stones.

Combination of medications seems to slow the progress of diabetic kidney failure and may even prevent it. Reported in the British Medical Journal, the treatment uses captopril, an antihypertension drug, and a thiazide diuretic. United States tests are starting.

Liquid dosages of acetaminophen should not be used interchangeably. Drops for babies have 500 mg. per teaspoon, children's elixir only 160 mg.

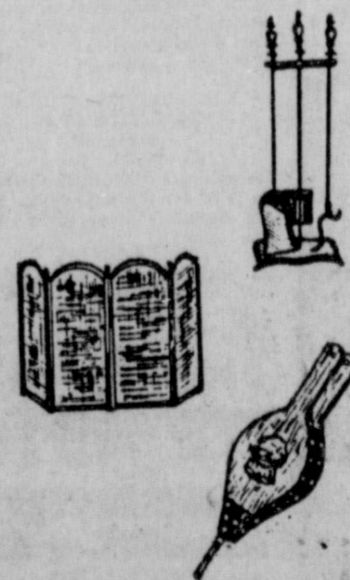

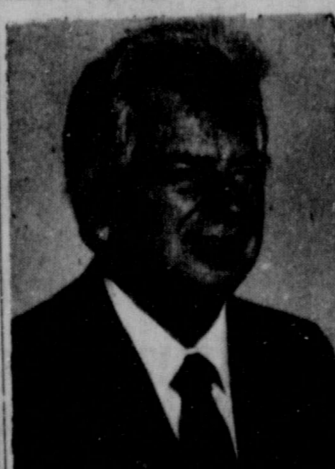
## Rescue Line

  - 2.They discover traits of strong, resourceful people and learn from them when it is not possible to plan ahead.
  - 3.They do not habitually complain.
  - 4.They often have inspirational role models from childhood or adult life and draw strength, wisdom, or insight from their example.
  - 5.They have a desire to learn and grow. They manage to learn what they need to know.
  - 6.They accept the responsibility for making their own lives livable and rewarding. Blaming others is not a way of life. They work to overcome their environment or background.
  - 7.They often develop a coping strategy.
  - 8.They become anchored in a belief in God or belief system outside themselves.
  - 9.They are optimists who maintain a positive attitude in the aftermath of the most difficult of human circumstances.
  - 10.They can enjoy life at times, even while hurting. There is the ability to see humor in a situation or laugh at themselves.
  - 11.They find a way to gain from misfortune something of benefit to themselves and others.
  - 12.They have determination, lots of it, and they work hard on behalf of their own recovery.
  - 13.They learn to be flexible and adaptable in order to work out their own happy endings.
  - 14.They are not faint-hearted; they find the energy and courage to fight for a comeback.

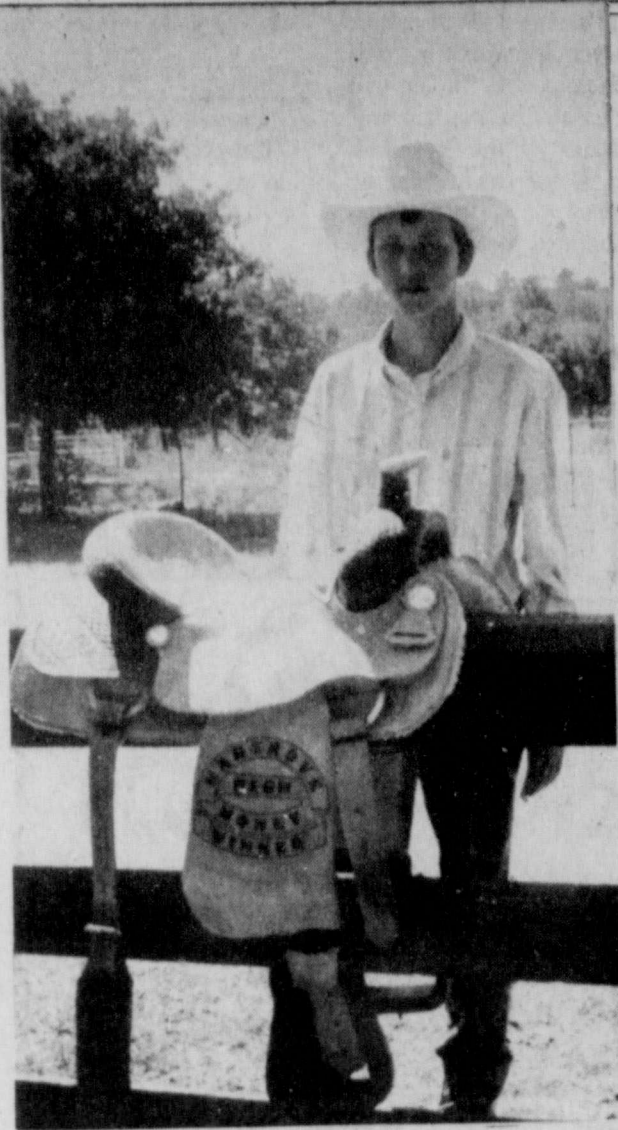

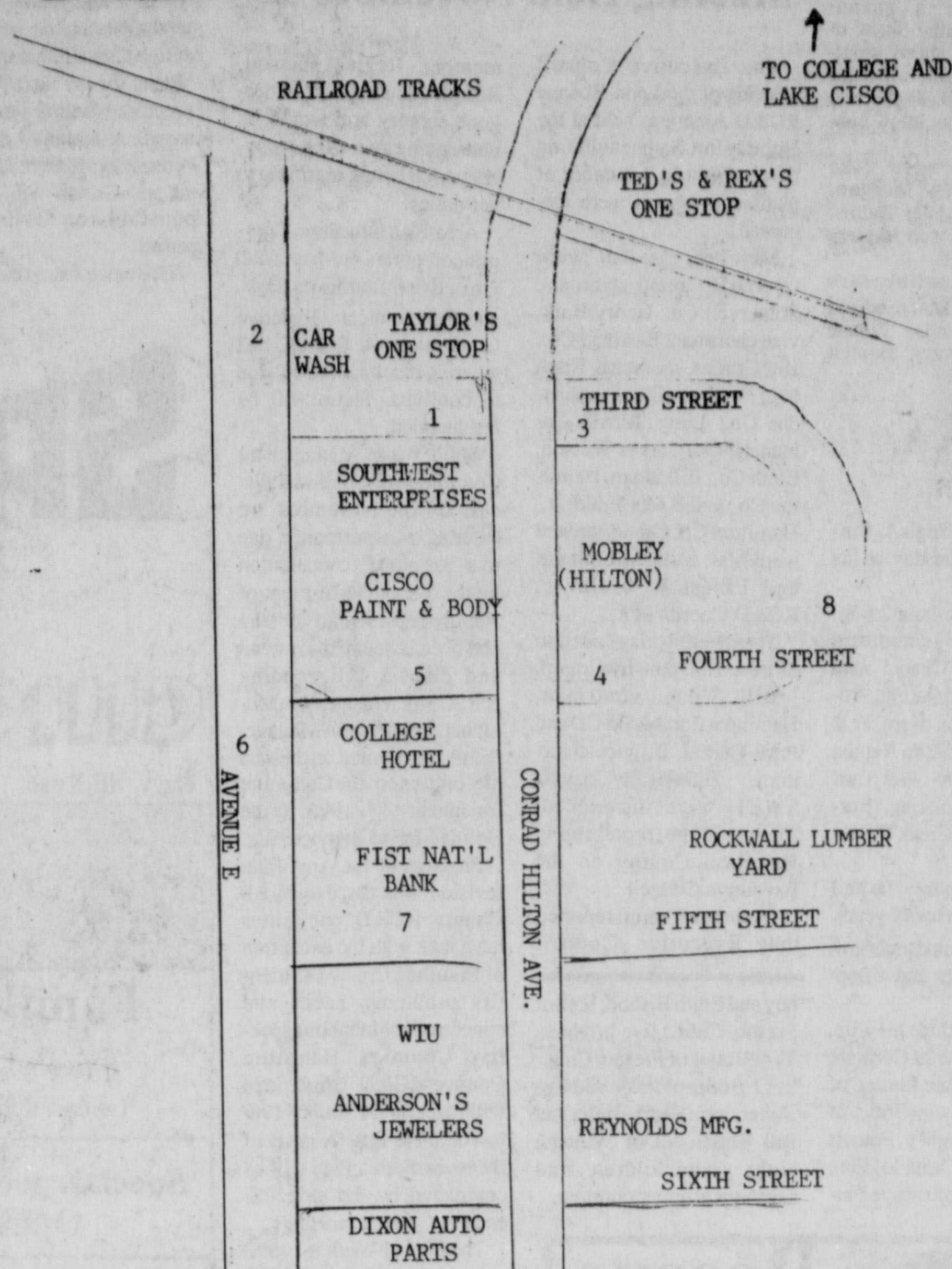
