We received several nice comments about our Christmas column which was reprinted from "Lone Star Christmas, Seasonal Editorials of Frank Grimes." So we would like to share the following story with you. It was written by Mr. Grimes on December 26, 1952, and was entitled "The Week In Between."

"Exactly one week after Christmas comes New Year's Day, and the period in between is shot through with cleaning up after one celebration to make way for the next.

"The post-Christmas let-down in the stores isn't as noticeable as you might think, after the frantic weeks of the Christmas shopping season. There is always a big mess to clean up, customers with gifts to exchange, and a general rearrangement and overhaul of stock to take care of - with your feet absolutely killing you from the long and rushing hours preceding Christmas.

"Everybody somehow manages to get through the week lying between Christmas and New Year's, but it is always a strange, unreal sort of time in everyone's life, unlike any other week of the year.

"In most households the Christmas decorations are allowed to stay up, for want of sufficient energy to take them down. After all, why not? If you have done your work well with them, they

stay pretty a long time, and you might as well get the enjoyment of them as long as possible.

"If there are children in the household, you might as well resign yourself to a period of dodging toys on the floor, putting aside your customary reading to read from childish books, separating combatants who fall to blows over the possession of some plaything, dosing yourself for the ills of over-eating and perhaps over-drinking, and otherwise making yourself useful if not ornamental.

"Try as you will, you cannot quite shut out the fact that 1953 is approaching with all its problems of tax-paying, auto licensing, and a thousand and one other problems a switch in years entails.

"If you have bought overgenerously and excessively of Christmas presents, there are bills to consider, corners to cut, postponing to be arranged and deals to be engineered.

"But you try to put these distressing matters out of your mind in the week between the two great holidays, and cultivate the processes of recovery from the most strenuous of them, the so-called Yuletide.

Chances are your feet hurt, perhaps your head aches, certainly you have butterflies in your stomach from overindulging. But cheer up. It's 364 days to Christmas.

Lake Leon Waters Claim Lives Of Two EHS Youths

What started out as a quiet duck hunt, turned into tragedy for three Eastland teenagers this week at Lake Leon.

Aaron Bowles, Brad Nicholson and Brian Mannke were duck hunting on Lake Leon Wednesday evening when their boat apparently began to take on water.

The youths crys for help were heard by several people on shore as they jumped into the lake.

Mannke swam for shore first and hollered back to the other two as he approached land. They shouted back that they were okay. They were around 25 ft. from shore at the time.

According to Mannke, they grabbed the life jackets as they jumped in the water, but didn't actually put them on.

Due to the icy conditions

of the weekend before, boats on the lake and shoreline were still iced in.

By the time rescuers got to the lake, the boys had disappeared in the calm, black water. Rescue workers continued to search until Midnight Wednesday night and resumed around dawn on Thursday.

The accident occurred around the Lone Cedar Country Club section of the lake. Around noon Thursday, the boat was found in about 25 feet of water and the boy's caps, lifejackets and duck decoy were found in the same vicinity.

Mannke was taken to Eastland Memorial Hospital and was discharged Thursday afternoon. The body of Aaron Bowles was found around 3:10 p.m. Thursday

by rescue workers.

Rescue workers continued their search for Brad Nicholson and his body was discovered around 4:15 p.m. Both were declared dead by Justice of the Peace Alfred Bush then transported back to town.

Bowles, 16, was a sophomore at Eastland High School and was the backup quarterback for the Maverick varsity team. Nicholson, 17, a junior at Eastland High played split end on the junior varsity squad.

Aaron Bowles body was taken to Edwards Funeral Home and the body of Brad Nicholson was taken to Bakker Funeral Home.

This was the second drowning accident in the last two years at Lake Leon.

Burial for both youth will be in Merriman Cemetery.

Edwards Funeral Home was in charge of Bowles service arrangements and Bakker Funeral Home was in charge of Nicholson service arrangements.

The two lost their lives this week in a drowning incident in the unrelenting waters of Lake Leon.

Brad is the son of Lynn and Beverly Nicholson.

Local Hospital To Perform Health Testing

The Cisco Hospital District will provide health services for the residents of the hospital district. VOTERS: 'Be Patient, Cards are in the Mail'


That's the official word from Eastland County Tax Assessor-Collector Nancy Trout who is also the County Voter Registration Official.

GIVE TO GOODFELLOWS

Many Veterans Are Unaware They Can Get Benefits

Over \$32 BILLION was paid out in veterans benefits last year. Billions more went unclaimed in the past few years. Every year eligibility for benefits and the array of available benefits are changed. Very few veterans or their survivors keep up with latest rules. Because of this, and changes in their circumstances, many veterans, their families and survivors are now entitled to money and other benefits from the government even though they were not eligible in the past.

and, if they have spouse in need of care, they can receive an allowance to pay someone to provide that care.

Few knew that (unemployed veterans) 65 or older are considered, permanently and totally disabled and, those with limited income and savings, can collect as much as \$11,000 per year.

Other benefits the consumer found that were little known are:

A veteran (or dependent) can receive up to \$837 (40 percent in advance) if he or she will aid VA in a workstudy program while in an educational program.

Federal agencies are required to set up affirmative action plans to aid employment and advancement of veterans with any degree of disability. Some job classifications must be filled by eligible vets.

Families of veterans buried or mentioned on commemorated on Tablets of the Missing overseas are eligible for free passports to visit these sites.

In addition the book includes a complete list of VA facilities and help to secure the information needed with VA applications.

non-profit groups have estimated that only half of the elderly poor who are eligible for SSI benefits are receiving them.

SSI payments can be made to people 65 and over, disabled, or blind who have little income and own few resources.

Current figures from the Social Security Administration show that 7 percent of Social Security beneficiaries age 65 and older receive SSI payments and three-quarters of these SSI recipients are women. The Administration does not know why some SSI eligibles do not apply, nor why efforts to reach them have had only modest success, Hammons said.

The SSI program provides a base of financial support for the elderly, the blind, and the disabled population who have limited incomes and few resources. People who receive SSI are eligible for Medicaid and other free social services.

For information about SSI, people can call 1-800-234-5772, Hammons said. The Abilene Social Security office is located at 142 S. Pioneer. The office is open 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Sodium-fluoride toothpastes help adults, too. In a new study of adults from 54 to 93, those who used fluorides had 67 percent less decay at the roots, and 41 percent less decay on tooth crowns.

Soviet Reflections: Hope

 "YOU SHALL KNOW THE TRUTH AND THE TRUTH WILL MAKE YOU FREE."

For the Soviet Union and all people, I hope and believe this will happen. We sensed in the Soviet people whom we got to know during our stay in the country, an awareness of their deprivation of the full Truth and a hunger and searching for it.

I believe the hope for the Soviet Union rests in the younger generation, as it does everywhere, and these are the ones in whom I especially noticed the curiosity and thirst for knowledge about life and

knowledge outside the Soviet Union.

One young Soviet citizen thought this Biblical passage was beautiful and was ready to use it, until told that it was words spoken by Jesus Christ found in the Bible. It is amazing that the students are taught virtually all of the famous literature of the world except the Bible. Why? They are taught atheism from the cradle up, but are never exposed to what they are being taught as being untrue, the Bible. I believe they (the leaders) are afraid of the TRUTH, and that many would accept it as such even if presented as only literature.

I do not believe that some of the intelligent Soviets,

guides and otherwise, we observed, are true atheists in spite of their teachings. One could detect this in their explanation of their history depicted in Biblical paintings, etc., done before their Revolution in the churches turned museums, etc. Most of the interest we detected seems to be gendered through contact with people of the "Free World" who visit the S. U. The tourists are really the only face-to-face contact they have with the outside world because they are not allowed to take enough rebels to travel out of the country.

Perhaps the S. U.'s educational system is backfiring upon the "cause." An intelligent youth, aware of their nation's history, the famous literature of the ages, etc., cannot help but be aware of that which a nation tries to hide from them also.

We were warned not to bring literature concerning moral values into the country. Ironically, however, when we asked how they try to rehabilitate their criminals, a moral program was pointed out as one of the means. So the term "moral" for each society could be interpreted differently. One example: a political offender is not considered a common criminal but since he poses the greatest threat to the "cause," he is almost always executed.

Therefore, being "confused" exactly what they meant by "moral" literature, we took it upon ourselves (since we were to be ambassadors of goodwill and to lead governments) to take booklets of goodwill from our local church to distribute as discreetly as possible. Of course, these were printed in English—anything printed in Russian is confiscated immediately. So we were exchanging chewing gum, ballpoint pens and these booklets for Russian pins. Several were left in subway stations, trains, buses, etc. But always in such a place as to where they could not trace who had left them, so as not to jeopardize the remainder of our stay in the S. U. for the group.

Leaving our own personal Bible in the Soviet Union with a very intelligent Soviet (English speaking) citizen, was truly our opportunity of a lifetime!

The new Soviet friend had expressed interest in one of the booklets of Bible verses which I was reading on the plane. The friend was very nervous on this flight—perhaps because of having learned of a bad airline (Soviet) crash in Leningrad a few weeks prior which the Soviet news did not release. I was reading verses from the booklet "Let Not Your Heart Be Troubled." I offered to let the person read this with the option to keep or return it. I asked if citizens were really allowed to have Bibles in the S. U. and the reply was "yes." The door was open to tell about the Bible which we had brought for our own use but that we would be thrilled to give it away if the person would like to read it. Of course the answer was "yes."

Here was a citizen in the "higher ranks" of Soviet society, an intellectual, familiar with all the great works of literature of the world, including American, who told us

point blank that he or she had never read one word of the Bible but was very anxious to do so. We felt the TRUTH might reach further through a person such as this rather than a person on the street who could speak or read no English. At least, we are hoping!

We have given a lot of thought to what has caused the Soviet Union and Russia to have the type of government and philosophy they do today.

Of course, one can read, and we were shown in our visits to historical places, how misused power of evil czars and rulers brought about the revolution. Starving peasants revolted against the gilded grandeur and "unheard of" luxury the rulers of the State and Church enjoyed.

This separated Church and State and presented a perfect opportunity for equally wicked leaders such as Lenin and Marx to come forth with their philosophies of the "Cause" and within it, atheism.

Therefore, churches are virtually non-existent except as museums. The people who do attend church and put their faith to work in the S. U. suffer for it. They sacrifice their goals professionally and economically.

We believe power-hungry men capitalized on the Revolution, trying to show the people how equal and fortunate they were.

The people generally do not seem happy, as they are depicted by the government. You are placed in a school or job according to your aptitude and ability, they told us. The scale of pay, regardless of what you do, seemed very low. Apartments, the primary housing, are issued by the state with rent fixed by the same.

Highest priorities, outside technological, scientific and industrial, seem to be given to historical and cultural education.

Bibles can bring up to \$150 each in Russia.

Children are generally left to the state to raise since both parents usually must work.

Women "enjoy" the same rights as men but at the same time they may do the same work. We saw many women on scaffolds doing construction work, brick laying or jobs as equally physically hard.

Of all the places we visited, the Soviet Union takes the cake. It was not the most



The Gun That Was Made For Texas

The term "Colt .45" is one of the most recognized terms in the world of fire arms. This .45 caliber six-shooter is legendary in its achievements on the early western frontier. This gun, once known as the "Peacemaker," was the cornerstone of U.S. Military achievements throughout the latter half of the 1800's. This success, however, did not come easy for Samuel Colt. Were it not for the help of the Texas Rangers, a different name would have been on every gunfighter's hip. Samuel Colt, to some degree, owes his business success to a Texas Ranger named Samuel Walker.

In 1842, Samuel Colt was left with a bitter taste in his mouth as the Patent Arms Manufacturing Company, owner of the patents to Colt's pistols, went out of business. This failure was mainly due to bad management and poor economic conditions. Back then, a fire arms company thrived in wartime, but floundered at the onset of peace. Unfortunately, the U.S. was basically a peaceful place in the 1830's. Disgusted with this turn of events, Samuel Colt even sold his own personal guns. These early guns, known as Paterson Colts, were very effective weapons, and had become standard equipment for the Texas Rangers.

As luck would have it, a new war broke out as Texas moved for annexation to the U.S. A group of Texas Rangers joined the ranks of U.S. Army General Zachary Taylor as he fought against Mexico. In the opening rounds of the war, General Taylor noticed that the Rangers had incredible fire power, and were able to tear apart the Mexican front lines with their Paterson Colt repeaters. The General, determined to have his whole army outfitted with these weapons, sent Ranger Samuel Walker to find Samuel Colt, and purchase one thousand of Colt's revolvers. Samuel Walker was well educated in the use of a Colt revolver, and had new ideas for an upgraded model.

In the fall of 1846, Walker contacted Colt. Samuel Colt was thrilled to hear of the

New Year's Resolution: Quit Smoking In 1990's

It's that time of year again. Time to make another New Year's resolution. This year, the American Lung Association of Texas hopes the more than five million Texans who smoke will resolve to quit. Start the new year and new decade smoke-free.

"Smoking is the major contributing factor in lung cancer, which is the leading cancer killer in the U.S.," explained Edward Carter, managing director of the American Lung Association of Texas. "If that isn't enough to scare you, then consider this - the nineties are going to be tough on smokers."

An overwhelming majority (95 percent) of adult Americans believe cigarette smoking is harmful to health and two out of three agree that smokers are addicted, according to a new Gallup Organization survey commissioned by the American Lung Association. Public sentiment is also strong about the consequences of second-hand or passive smoking. More than 82 percent agree that smokers should refrain from lighting up in the presence of nonsmokers.

"Clearly our stop-smoking messages are being heard," noted Carter, referring to the survey's finding on public attitudes towards smoking in public places.

This national sample of over 1,000 Americans, 18 years of age or older, reveals that two out of three people surveyed agree with the new law extending the current airline flights of two hours or less to include all scheduled flights. A similar percentage of those polled supports designated smoking areas in the workplace, in hotels and motels, and in restaurants, while 85 percent say smoking should be either restricted to special areas or totally banned on trains and buses. The recent House-Senate Department of Transportation Committee approval to ban smoking on almost all airline flights demonstrates the power of public opinion and represents a victory for health-conscious Americans.

Today, 43 states, including Texas, and the District of Columbia have laws regulating smoking in public places; 14 states restrict smoking in private workplaces, and 33 states

restrict smoking in the public workplace. Numerous companies prohibit smoking in public areas or have banned it all together.

The American Lung Association - The Christmas Seal People - is the oldest voluntary health organization in the United States. Originally founded to combat tuberculosis, today the Association is dedicated to the prevention, control, and cure of all lung disease and the promotion of lung health.
