An election to determine whether the City of Muleshoe shall be governed by a three man commission or a six man aldermanic form of government is scheduled for the coming

The City Commission called the election after receiving

petitions gned by the proper number of voters.

The nove to change the form of city government grew out of the failure of a group of local people to enjoin permanently the city council from installing parking meters in the downtown district.

Under the aldermanic form of government, the city council would be formed of five aldermen, with the mayor having a vote only in case of a tie, which would obtain only if four aldermen were present at a city council meeting.

District Judge E. A. Bills gave a temporary injunction to those seeking a restraining order against the city commission in the matter of the parking meters. He dissolved the temporary injunction after a hearing last month.

It is strictly up to the individual voter as to whether the form of city government will be changed. Hitherto, in Muleshoe, we have had the "city commission" form of government, with two commissioners and the mayor; under the aldermanic form of government, we would have five aldermen and the mayor on the city council.

The Journal takes no sides in the local controversy. The editor and the entire staff of The Journal have personal friends on both sides. We have nothing in mind except the growth and progress of Muleshoe and vicinity.

Individual members of the staff will possibly vote in direct opposition to each other. It is none of the publisher's business, how employees of The Journal vote in Saturday's

There is one thing certain, The person who refrains from voting is surely not helping to solve community problems. Let us all register our sentiments, whatever they are, the coming Saturday.

And whatever the results, The Journal reiterates that we are for Muleshoe, regardless of who is in office, regardless of any other circumstance. We just want to see Muleshoe advance and progress. Vote Saturday for your convictions and vote for the good of Muleshoe.

In the outset, Rev. Blaine inquired: "What is the real issue the world conflict today?"

He said there are some who say that world trade and world survival is the cause of the antagonism. on passes. However, Ed Nickels is He does not believe this to be the quite a passer himself and the real issue. The real issue he believes is opposing ideologies. Ideologies are of two kinds, he

said, political and religious.

The world at present is divided into two camps, Communist and their ideas of government not only the world. To enforce these ideas of government it is necessary to enslave the people, and to enslave their minds as well. Russia has thus developed a slave mentality in their peoples and in the peoples they have been able to over-

What is the primary difference between the communist and democratic theories of government, he asked. Peoples of a democratic country believe in voluntary cooperation and that the rule of the majority brings about the best form of government. He asserted that he believes unalterably in the free enterprise

"We in the democratic countries would of course like to see the whole world democratic, but we do not wish to force other peoples to adopt our system," Rev. Blaine

Does the Bible teach communism? Rev. Blaine declared that the present system of communism certainly is not a scriptural communism. "Communism is a religion A. V. McCarty which leaves out God, while we in the democratic countries believe in Christianity, bringing God into our

Where is this conflict in religious and political ideologies going to lead? Rev. Blaine believes the issue must be resolved. We may have difficult times, atom bombs may fall, but the issue must someday be settled.

We will never force our way on others, but we must maintain our way of life. It therefore behooves all of us, he believes, to live democracy in our communities and in our nation, he said, and we ought all to do our best and give our best in order not only to maintain the way of life we love, but to make it so attractive that other



nent Station. During 1949, Texas land prices ncreased an average of about seven and one-half per cent, from an average of \$41.36 to \$44.44 per acre. This increase is in contrast to the slight decrease which occurred during 1948. Last year marks the third straight year that land prices have stayed at a record high level, far above the high

prices which existed in 1926. Although the price increased in 1949, the number of acres sold was 25 per cent less than was sold in 1948. The average size of the tracts of land sold was smaller than had been the case for sevveral years, and the number of sales dropped 11 per cent.

The rise in prices occurred in 12 of the 18 type-of-farming areas in Texas, the largest increase being or wheat farming land of the High Plains. The average price of land in this area jumped from \$32.01 per acre to \$50.00, an increase of 65 per cent. Very large increases also occurred in the grazing area of the High Plains and in the Trans-Pecos and Lower Rio Grande Valley

The average price of land was 18.7 per cent lower in the High Plains cotton area and in the Roling Plains area than during 1948 And a drop of 15.2 per cent occurred during 1949 in the Grand Prairie. A considerable drop also curred in the number of sale and the number of acres sold in changing hands varying from one ifth to one-third less than in 1948. 

the desired one.

For all ordinary driving, the fully automatic or "high range" consists of the converter, intermediate and high gear. All starts are made in intermediate gear and the shift into direct drive occurs between 17 miles per hour, with light throt-tle, up to 64 miles per hour, under full throttle conditions. Low heavy pulling and for the more severe down hill braking require-

Several chassis and engine changes have been made to provide for the new transmission. One of these divorces the choke from the carburetor by mounting t on the intake manifold. Thru this arrangement, the choke operation is dependent on engine emperature rather than air temperature, thus eliminating the posibility of the carburetor coming back on to high idle with a warn

The clutch pedal is eliminated and a wider brake pedal used. The Merc-O-Matic uses a total of 24 aluminum die castings, three of which are major parts, weighing approximately 15 pounds. A novel feature is the construction of the torque converter which utilizes a die cast impeller cover into which are recessed stamped steel blades. The starter is of die cast construction. The third element, the turbine, is of full sheet netal construction. No welding copper brazing is used to seure blades to the main shell stampings or casting. Instead they are securely held in place by tabs

which are rolled in assembly. mission under all the operating onditions is accomplished by circulation of air through the housing enclosing the torque converter. Fins on the outer surface of the aluminum converter shell induce air circulation and provide additional surface for transfer of heat to the air stream. This means of cooling is simple, effective and does not place an additional load on the engine cooling system.
