The old clock was completely removed by Wednesday afternoon and the new one was working and in place by Thursday afternoon.

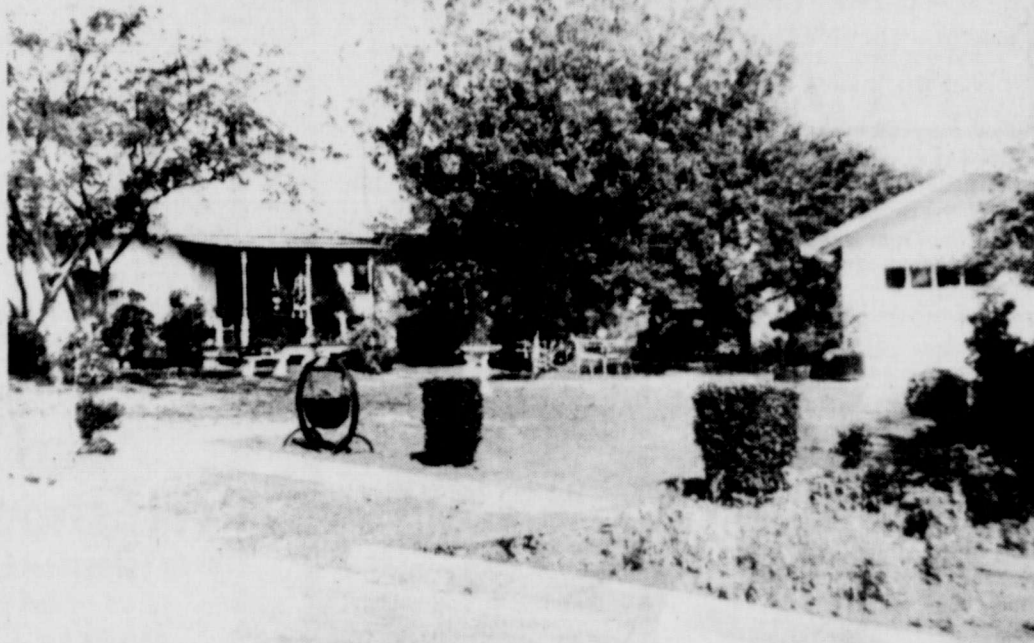
The new clock, pictured elsewhere in today's edition of The Cisco Press, has a digital display which shows the time and temperature with each being displayed for a few seconds before changing.

A pictorial review of Cisco's past is being put together by Wesley Valek's CJC history classes.

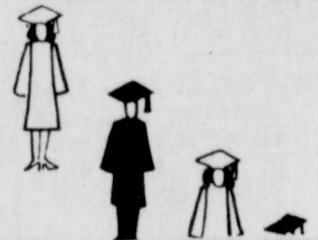
A complete history of Cisco's three railroads is being written by another CJC professor, J.L. McDaniel.

## Yolanda Walters Summer Missionary Capital City which opened September 15th.

Yolanda Walters has been accepted as a summer missionary by Teen Missions International, a missionary organization based in Merritt Island, Florida.

She will travel to Cap-Haitien, Haiti, with a team of 33 teens plus four adult leaders. There they will construct a home for the caretaker of the Providence Orphanage a few miles from the city of Cap-Haitien. They will work eight hours a day, five and one half days a week.

Yolanda is leaving June 4 for two weeks of training at "The Lord's Boot Camp" in Merritt Island. Boot Camp is a very primitive training facility in which Teen Missions teaches carpentry basics, block laying, steel tying, personal evangelism, and language training, among other things.

The Cap-Haitien team will leave for Haiti June 23. They will land in Port-au-Prince and will ride across the country to Cap-Haitien in small Haitian cameos (colorfully decorated buses). They will return to the United States August 17th.

Doll Magazine. She also teaches writing courses at the Abilene Cultural Center.

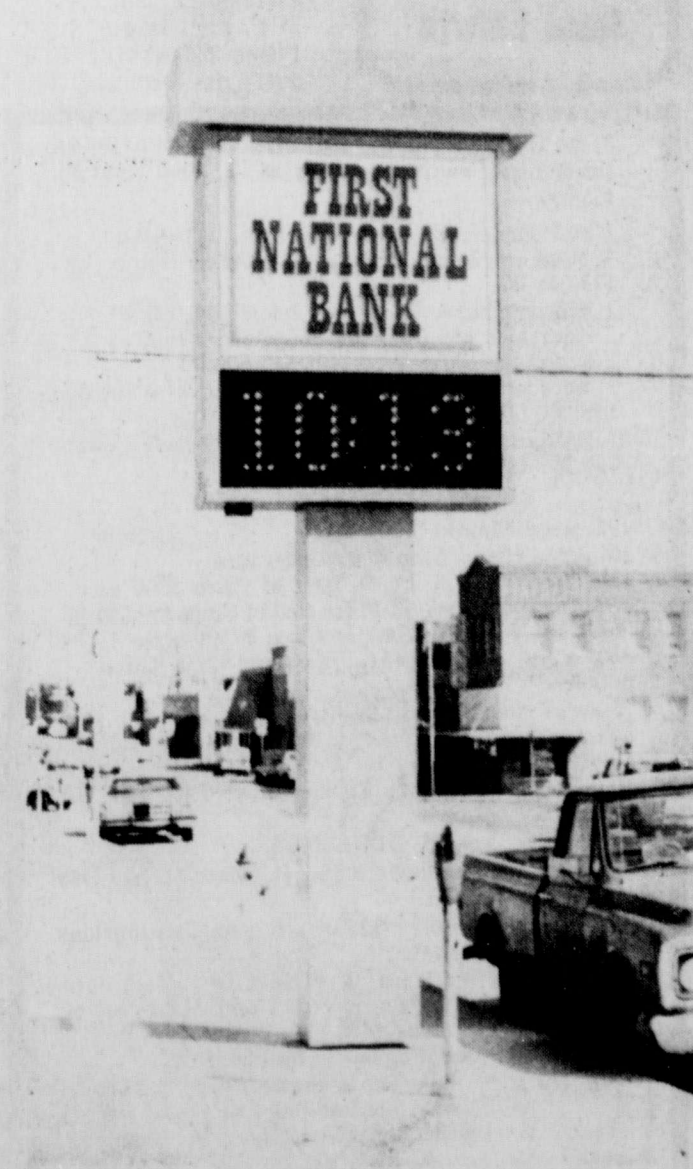
Dr. Ken Hammes, head of the English department and English professor at Cisco Junior College, will speak on "Getting Started."

from Wheeling, West Virginia, who later became his wife. She was a R.N. at Tule Lake Base Hospital.

From California he came back to Pueblo a short while before moving to Grand Coolie Dam, Washington, for an eight year assignment.

Mr. Johnston retired February of 1960 but continued to live in California until May, 1975, when he and his wife moved to Cisco.

Mr. Johnston has a son living in San Angelo and a daughter in Murfreesboro, Tennessee. Another son was killed in France during World War I.

This tall, erect Senior Citizen, commanding in appearance, agile in movement, does not look his years. When asked if he had a formula for longevity, he said, "I quit smoking several years ago and I exercise daily as I did when I was in service."

And what does this man do in his years of retirement? He continues to serve. He is a member of Special Projects Council and a volunteer in the Senior Citizen Nutrition Program and a member of the First Baptist Church.

**THOUGHT FOR FOOD** By GOULD CROOK

**Yankee Pot Roast**

- 4 pounds boneless brisket, chuck or round
- 2 peppercorns, crushed
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/4 teaspoon thyme
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/4 cup shortening
- 2 cups tomatoes, peeled and mashed
- 2 tablespoons tomato paste
- 1 cup beef bouillon
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup dry red wine
- 1 clove garlic, crushed

Make a marinade of the wine, lemon juice, peppercorns, bay leaf, garlic and thyme, and let the meat stand in this overnight in the refrigerator. Turn it a time or two.

Next day, sear the meat in a large pot in the hot shortening, turning it to brown both sides. Remove meat from pot and put in the marinade along with tomatoes, which you've mashed, the tomato paste and the bouillon. Mix and bring to a boil. Put the meat back in the pot, add the salt, cover and reduce the heat so the sauce simmers. Cook it for about three hours, adding more liquid if necessary.

This serves six to eight and is a fine dish for company. Accompany this delicious roast with cooked small whole potatoes, carrots and peas. Sprinkle parsley over the meat and vegetables and serve hard rolls, or crusty French bread.

- April 27, 1937 — The first Social Security payment is made in accordance with the provisions of the Social Security Act of 1935.

According to an AP-NBC poll released recently, 28 per cent of the nation's employed people plan to continue working past 65. In 1977, a survey released by the American Council of Life Insurance revealed that only 19 per cent were planning on staying in the job market.

**Auto Service Tips**

There is an easy way to determine if a manifold heat-control valve is working properly. Check the counterweight (see diagram) beneath the exhaust manifold, when the engine is cold. Counterweight becomes hot as engine warms, so be sure to do your checking after car has been sitting idle for some time.

If the counterweight doesn't move freely, the valve is stuck. You may be able to free it by lubricating the valve shaft with manifold heat-control valve lubricant and then tapping lightly on the counterweight with a hammer.

If this doesn't prove successful, either the valve or manifold containing it must be replaced.

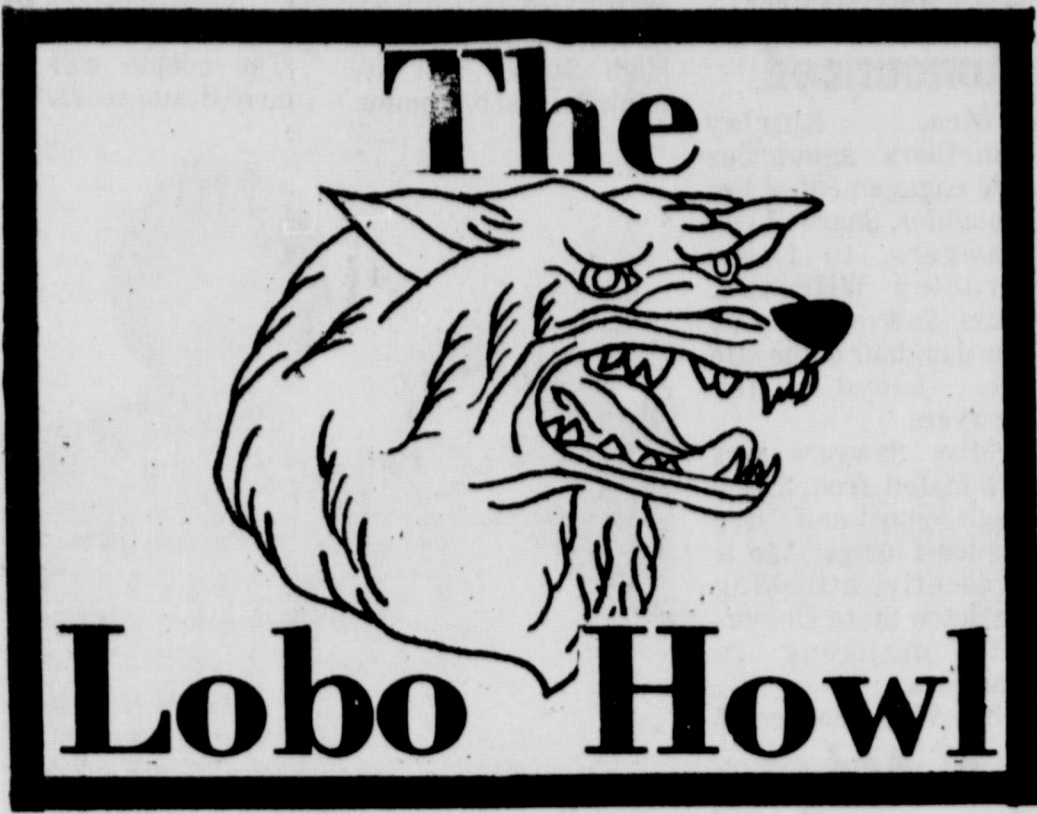

# Law Event Cited

Victor Cornelius was named Citizen of the Year and Sgt. Jerry Mathews, Lawman of the Year, at the Seventh Annual Eastland County Law Enforcement Association Banquet, where a large crowd also heard Congressman, Charles Stenholm report on Capitol Hill.

The banquet is held annually to recognize the importance of lawmen and citizen cooperation.

Jay Staggs was master of ceremonies at the Siebert Elementary event, and the Rev. Wilburn Jones, pastor N. Seaman Baptist Church, gave the invocation. Association President Kenneth Rose extended the official welcome, and led the pledge to the flag.

County Judge Scott Bailey read a framed copy of "The House Beside the Road" which was presented with an appropriate plaque to Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius, in recognition of their continued support and assistance to good projects in this county.

Sgt. Mathews, a 20-year veteran with the Department of Public Safety, received the Eastland County Newspaper Co. Lawmen of the Year award, and in accepting, asked that recognition be given to the patrolmen who are assigned here, and that lawmen need the prayers of the public. "I believe," he said, "that good law-enforcement and God will make an unbeatable combination."

Special entertainment was provided by the Eastland High School Singers under the direction of Mrs. Bill B. (Gay) Hart.

Accompanying Mr. Stenholm to Eastland was his Field Representative Dale King.

Touching on a number of subjects, and speaking from notes, Cong. Stenholm

brought enthusiastic response and a number of rounds of applause in stating his positions on a number of subjects.

He stated by recognizing that he's now "one of those," that he (and the rest of us) usually refer to as "those guys in Washington."

He saluted the lawmen, and said that it's time to start worrying about the rights of the crime victims and loss about the rights of the criminals.

Going to the energy problem, he said that the gasoline crises in California stems mainly from an over-reaction, and an increase in usage of at least ten per cent over last year.

Cong. Stenholm made an urgent plea for conservation asking that we all "walk at least one trip" a day.

He admitted that he voted against President Carter's emergency rationing proposal, giving as his reason: "If given the right, I believe we'd had rationing within 90 days, and I think it could be fatal for us to go into that right now."

"We've got to get back to production. Yes, I'm for de-regulation, and if there are so-called wind-fall profits then so be it, if it'll get us independent of the OPEC nations. And if there are to be such vast profits, I'm convinced that it wouldn't be too long until someone comes along with a better product to try to earn a part of those profits. That's the free enterprise system."

Solar power will come, he believes, and certainly we're going to have to have nuclear power. True, it may be dangerous, but as yet there hasn't been one fatality in the industry. All energy production is dangerous--many are killed yearly in the oil business.

Even Thomas Edison predicted that there would be many killed annually if electricity were ever to be made available into homes. He was right, of course, but we've got to depend on nuclear power until other sources relieve us from our dependence.

He also spoke in favor of Paul Harvey's "bushel for a barrel" idea in which the United States would take advantage of its food production capacity to secure the fuel (at a reasonable

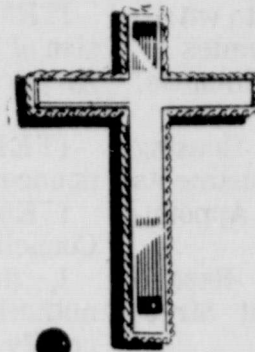

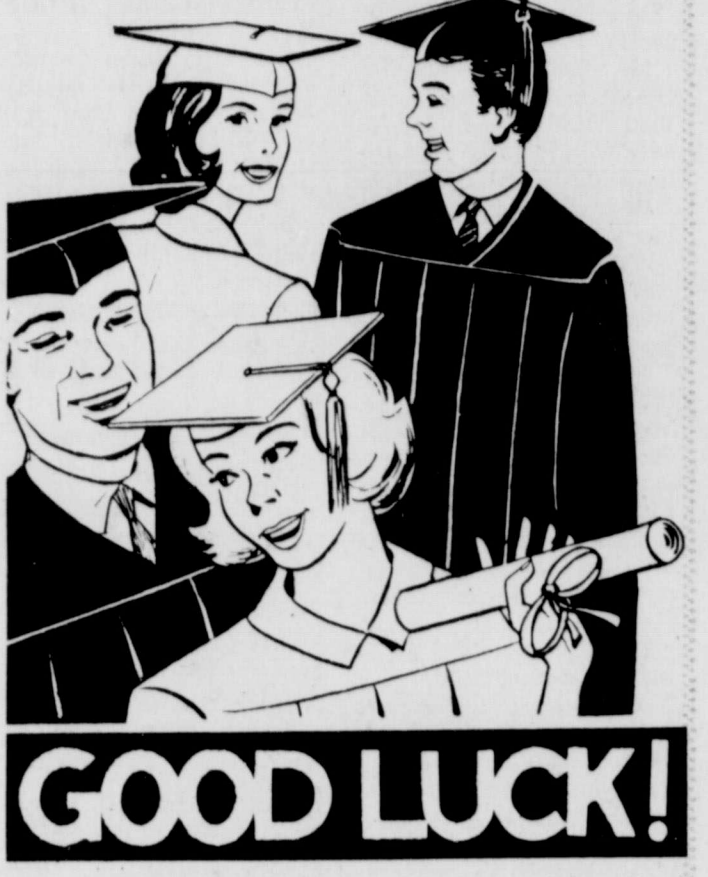

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# STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—After the Senate said this week it would like to spend more than the House on state appropriations in 1980-81, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Speaker Bill Clayton each named five legislators to a conference committee.

While those five House members and five senators are bargaining over a state budget, another 10 legislators will be meeting in the second conference committee named this week to settle differences over tax relief amendment legislation.

It didn't take the Senate but a day to knock out its version of a general appropriations bill. The House had worked on its plan for almost a full week. The Senate bill would cost taxpayers \$20.8 billion, while the House plan would spend \$20.3 billion.

A real point of contention in the two budgets is salaries. The Senate would raise state employees' salaries by 5.1 percent, including teachers. Gov. Bill Clements says he can live with such a raise. The House bumped salaries by seven percent, including teachers.

While lawmakers are arguing over what to pay state employees, they will also be

figuring out how much tax relief Texans will be getting.

### Greedy vs Needy

The Senate passed its version of the Tax Relief Amendment on a 30-1 vote. Dallas Sen. Oscar Mauzy cast the one dissenting vote and said the bill would "benefit the greedy, not the needy." Mauzy argued that "timber barons and land speculators" would get "the big breaks" while the average homeowner, for whom the bill was supposedly designed, would get little tax relief.

The Senate bill would lower taxes for the elderly, the disabled, homeowners, farmers and timber raisers. The legislation exempts \$5,000 in school property taxes for all homeowners, includes a \$10,000 exemption for the elderly and disabled and farmers, ranchers and timber growers would get huge breaks, the costliest of all the exemptions, by computing the value of land according to its productivity rather than market value.

The Senate Finance Committee had added an income limit for those eligible for exemptions, but the full Senate knocked off that provision and Sen. Grant Jones of

Abilene warned his colleagues that they might be placing an intolerable tax burden on those counties with many elderly and disabled persons.

While Jones and Sen. Carl Parker of Port Arthur were at odds over the income limitation, they teamed up to remove a provision exempting two cars or light trucks from state property taxes.

Jones and Parker said tax-assessor collectors could foresee an "administrative nightmare" developing if they had to figure out which cars were exempt and which weren't. The Jones-Parker amendment leaves it up to local taxing entities to decide whether or not they want to exempt vehicles from property taxes.

To reimburse school districts for revenues lost because of the Tax Relief Amendment, the House put aside over \$400 million. The Senate wants to take care of the matter in a school finance bill.

### In The House

Almost three weeks ago, it appeared certain no legislation would be passed this session raising the state usury limit on home loans. Capitol observers had predicted before the session began that the usury law would be under attack but an announcement by Gov. Clements that he would veto any such bills stopped proposed legislation in its tracks.

Then along came Fannie Mae—the Federal National Mortgage Association—the prime buyer of VA and FHA

home loans. Fannie Mae said it was backing off on accepting the low-interest VA and FHA loans in Texas because some lenders might be violating the usury law by charging "points." Just before Fannie Mae's announcement, the Department of Housing and Urban Development said it was hiking the interest rate on VA and FHA loans to 10 percent. That meant lenders in Texas that had been charging points on VA and FHA loans to get the interest rates up to present money market levels might be in violation of the usury law.

Clements had said he would re-evaluate his position on legislation raising the interest rate ceiling if developments warranted such a move on his part. Fannie Mae's announcement—meaning a tight money market would probably be getting tighter—moved Clements to reverse himself, and when the governor did, he called in Sen. Bill Meier and Rep. Jerry Donaldson to discuss their bills raising the legal interest rate allowed by law.

The House this week passed Donaldson's bill with provisions that Clements said he could accept. Meanwhile, there was still some question whether or not VA and FHA loans are exempted from the state usury laws. "Vagueness" over the law had been one of Fannie Mae's prime reasons for backing away from taking VA and FHA loans in Texas. And an investigation into whether there had been "collusion" between Fannie Mae and lenders was also underway. Sen. Bill Patman and Texas AFL-CIO President Harry Hubbard had leveled that charge after Fannie Mae's announcement followed so closely on the heels of Gov. Clements' revelation that he would veto bills hiking the interest rate unless something changed

his mind.

It took the House six hours to make up its mind about Donaldson's bill raising the interest rate ceiling to 12 percent. However, the legislation includes a "floating" ceiling, meaning that rates cannot exceed the interest rates paid on Treasury notes by more than 2 percent.

Another alteration to Donaldson's bill is a "self-destruct" provision, meaning the law will expire in 1981. Lenders won't be able to charge points (one percent of the amount borrowed) to sellers but they will to buyers under the House bill. Also, home buyers would be able to refinance (should interest rates decline drastically) without paying penalties.

### The Governor

Two entirely different types of states with two entirely different kinds of governors were in the headlines this week—Texas and California. Clements and Gov. Jerry Brown. As different as they might be, the two states and the two governors were talking about similar issues.

Brown, ordered last week that counties in California could begin restricting gasoline sales with odd-numbered license plates giving the driver the right to fill up one day and even-numbered the next. Lines of cars wrapped around city blocks has become a common sight in certain parts of gas-starved California.

Clements said he didn't expect to see such sights in Texas but that he was in process of developing a gasoline allocation plan. "Allocation" is the important word here. Clements was careful to say that "rationing" was the federal government's responsibility and any plans he was working on were to handle distribution problems and not "restrictions" on supplies.

### Drugs And Driving

Drivers who are sleepy, dizzy or have blurred vision pose a threat not only to themselves but also to others on the road.

Everyone knows that drinking and driving don't mix, says Carla Shearer, a health education specialist. But, what many do not realize is that some drugs

taken every day can also interfere with a person's ability to drive, she cautions.

Ms. Shearer is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

#### OVER-THE-COUNTER DRUGS

Although most people are very careful when and how

they take prescription drugs, they may be less careful about activities done after taking some over-the-counter medicine, she points out.

Medications such as cough and cold remedies contain such ingredients as antihistamines, codeine and sometimes varying amounts of alcohol.

These drugs can make a

person drowsy, making it inadvisable to drive, operate machinery or do activities which require a person to be especially alert.

Although advertising for many popular cough and cold remedies does not usually include the fact that they cause drowsiness, read the label carefully on this and other medications for any warnings of such a pro-

blem, Ms. Shearer advises consumers.

Some daytime sedatives are sold over the counter to help a person overcome "simple nervous tension." This class of drug will also cause drowsiness and should be taken with caution.

#### PRESCRIPTION DRUGS

Some prescription drugs that may cause dizziness, drowsiness and visual disturbances are some of the powerful pain killers and drugs taken for ulcers.

Tranquilizers, too, make a person drowsy, increasing the risk of accident if a person drives after taking this type of drug, the specialist continues.

Sedatives, of course, cause drowsiness. People usually recognize this and do not attempt to drive immediately after taking a sedative.

However, in some types of sedatives there is a long-lasting effect. Barbituates, for example, can impair efficiency for as long as 14 hours.

Other prescription drugs

which require precautions in this area are anti-depressant drugs, drugs for controlling weight and anti-hypertensive drugs.

**ALCOHOL**  
Alcohol, which is the leading cause of highway accidents, can become even more dangerous if mixed with certain drugs because it can alter their effect on the body's system.

If the medication will make you sleepy, combining it with alcohol is dangerous, and some combinations are lethal, Ms. Shearer warns.

#### AVOID PROBLEMS

To avoid these problems, take some precautions:

- 1) When the doctor prescribes a drug, pay close attention to instructions about taking it.
- 2) If you have any questions about a prescribed drug, check with the doctor or pharmacist.
- 3) Always read the label of any over-the-counter medicine bought.
- 4) Avoid alcohol when taking medication—prescription or over-the-counter.

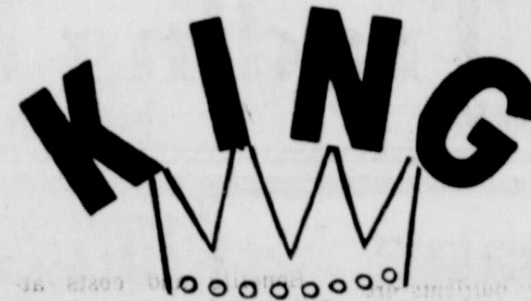

## Questions For The Doctor

### TEACHING CHILDREN TO AVOID CHILD MOLESTERS

The sick, sad subject of sexual abuse of children often is ignored because it is so unpleasant. Yet parents need to tell their children more than "don't take candy from strangers" in order to protect them adequately, the Texas Medical Association (TMA) says.

Since a child molester can be almost any age and often knows the child, the stereotype of the dirty old man in a raincoat in the park often does not apply. One survey showed that most females molested were related to the molester by blood or marriage. Most males molested knew the molester but were not related. Other surveys said molesters often were between ages 18-67 (with concentrations in the teens, 30s and 50), had varied educational backgrounds and often had good jobs. About the only thing surveyors all agreed on was that most molesters were male with only rare examples of female molesters occurring.

Protecting a child from such a shadowy cloud of suspects can be difficult without making the child afraid of all adults. TMA offers these suggestions drawn from sources ranging from Lady's Circle magazine to a handbook by the county prosecutor's office in Minneapolis.

When talking with a child, parents should be open, unembarrassed and willing to discuss sensitive subjects. Honestly answering questions on a child's level of understanding can help keep the atmosphere clear of fear or guilt. Since a child may be too young to understand molestation, parents' attitudes can shape the child's understanding of the subject. Parental hysteria has a greater chance of emotionally harming the child than a calm explanation that some situations and acts should be avoided just like hot stoves or other common hazards.

If the child is too young to understand what sexual perversion is, he or she can be told to avoid situations or actions for common sense reasons. For instance, a parent can say that some body parts should be touched only by specified people such as parents or medical personnel because the parts otherwise may become infected.

Accepting rides, gifts or jobs without telling parents

should be avoided, even if the child is acquainted with the person who offers. Parents can tell the child to avoid playing in public restrooms or deserted areas alone because of unsanitary conditions or because no one could help the child if he or she were injured while alone.

Checking to see that the child gets home from school safely and knows to go home or to a neighbor's house if followed are two other points to remember. Such precautions can become habits for young children and as they grow older parents can reinforce the advice by explaining that some people should be avoided because of their sexual maladjustments.

### Fertilizer Facts By Wayne Parker

Sixteen chemical elements are known to be required for plant growth.

These sixteen elements are divided into two main two-groups, non-mineral and mineral.

The non-mineral elements are carbon, hydrogen, and oxygen. The carbon and oxygen is found in the air we breathe as carbon dioxide. Additional oxygen and hydrogen is found in water.

The three non-mineral elements are used in photosynthesis. The process through which plants make their own food. This process combines carbon dioxide and water, in the presence of sunlight, to form carbohydrates.

To better understand the importance of carbohydrates; they are the source for proteins, fats, starch, and sugar in plants.

The 13 mineral elements essential for plant growth are nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium called primary nutrients; calcium, magnesium, sulfur called secondary nutrients; and boron, chlorine, copper, iron, manganese, molybdenum, and zinc called micronutrients.

The primary nutrients are usually the first to become deficient in the soil because they are used in large amounts by plants.

The secondary nutrients and micronutrients are deficient less often. Smaller amounts are used.

Secondary and micronutrients may be used in small amounts by plants, but proportionately they are as important as the primary nutrients.

## Study Shows Benefits Costs Of Industrialization

When a new industry locates in a rural community, there are both benefits and costs.

The usual case is that community leaders tend to overestimate industrial benefits while underestimating additional public expenditures needed to serve the industry and its employees. This is the conclusion of three economists who researched the impact of industrialization and rural communities in Texas.

Dr. Lynn Reinschmidt of Mississippi State University, Dr. Lonnie L. Jones, a Texas Agricultural Experiment Station research economist, and Dr. Richard Floyd, a Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist in real estate, conducted the study.

The economists pointed out that industrialization has been tabbed by proponents as a means of improving employment and income as well as a means of reducing a community's tax burden by broadening the local tax base. However, net community benefits may be lower than expected because some of the payroll leaves the community through commuters, residents tend to consume outside the community, local government is unable to concert economic growth into tax revenues, and local government may give too many concessions to new industry. The researchers concluded that industrialization's effect on reducing taxes is minimal.

Nine plants in six rural Texas communities were investigated in 1975 and 1976 to evaluate their net economic impact. Four of the communities were in East Texas and two in South Central Texas. All communities were at one time predominantly dependent upon agriculture or natural resource based economies. Their populations ranged from 1,260 to 10,646, based on 1973 census estimates. Annual employment of the plants ranged from 20 to 152 employees, and annual payrolls ranged from \$144,000 to \$1,050,000.

Benefits and costs attributed to new industry were estimated and reported for private, municipal government and school district sectors. Direct, indirect and induced effects were also estimated, with both benefits and costs to determine net economic impact.

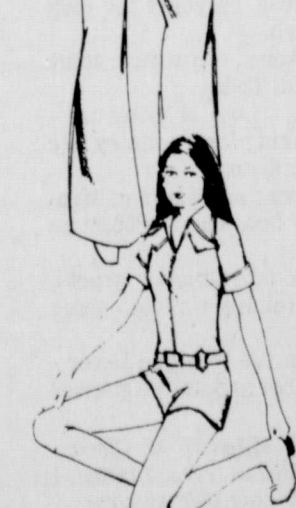

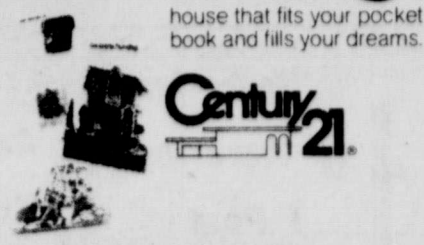

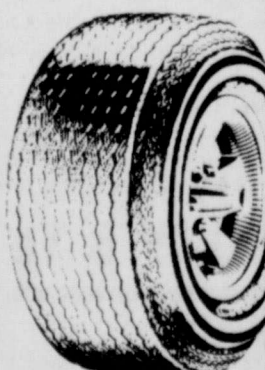

# Hints For The Aged & Handicapped

DEAR PAT- I have been meaning to write in to your column for many months and pass on some excellent ways I have found to cope with elderly parents and two other elderly relatives that I feel a responsibility for.

A decision had to be made several years ago on sending my mother-in-law to a nursing home or helping her in ways to become independent enough to remain in her own home.

I know a decision like this is as traumatic for other families as it was for ours because she did not want to leave the home she had lived in for 40 years nor did we like the idea of uprooting her.

Meals and kitchen chores was one of our biggest problems. She had a microwave oven but had never really used it. It is now used constantly every day but she still does very little cooking with it.

Elderly people usually develop very bad eating habits because they are unable to prepare meals or because they lose the desire to do so.

By purchasing a variety of frozen meats that have already been cooked such as fish sticks, shrimp, chicken, etc., all she has to do is take out one or two pieces of chicken, put in on a paper plate and add some frozen french fries. This is put in the micro to thaw, and then heat along with a variety of other food stuffs she might like. Rolls, hush puppies, and many other breads come out buttered and piping hot along with her other foods.

She gets good, hot, nourishing food and a well balanced diet. There is never much more clean up mess than a fork and glass.

For better economy, always purchase the family size packs of pre-cooked meats, fish, potatoes, breads, and vegetables. Items like this are frozen in separate pieces so it is easy to just take what you want from the package and leave the rest untouched.

The large packages in most every thing saves money as well as time in not having to return to the store quite so often.

Canned meats of all kinds, as well as vegetables can be

used and just place the rest in the refrigerator.

We are afraid for her to use the cook stove because she doesn't see well and has a great deal of difficulty getting around. We taped large numbers on the glass part of her microwave so she can regulate her cooking time.

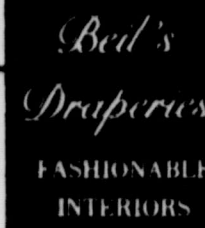
I'm sure others could cope independently in their own homes if relatives would help them learn to cope.

### FERTILIZER FACTS (Part 2)

By Wayne Parker  
-Nitrogen is used in large amounts by plants.

-Ten tons of Coastal Bermudagrass would contain about 500 Lb. of actual nitrogen.

-Nitrogen fertilizer directly increases protein content in plants.

-Adequate amounts of phosphorous and potash actually increases the plants efficiency in using nitrogen to get more true protein.

-Nitrogen increases the chlorophyll concentrations in leaves which produces a dark green color. The dark green color in chlorophyll absorbs light energy that is used to manufacture "plant food".

-Nitrogen increases plant efficiency in using water. A good fertilizer program may be worth several inches of rain over the course of a growing season.

-Fertilizer encourages deeper root growth to reach subsoil moisture.

-The deeper and thicker the root system, the more nutrients and moisture used by plants.

-Fertilizer thickens plant cover which reduces evaporation.

-Good vegetative cover slows runoff and allows the soil to soak up water.

-Fertilizer helps plants to grow fast and shade out moisture-robbing weeds.
