East Cisco Baptist **Church Youth Hold Fellowship Friday**

The youth of East Cisco Baptist Church had a fellowship last Friday night at the fellowship hall. A ping pong tournament was held, along with popcorn and punch being served.

The first place trophy in the single match for the Senior Division went to Joey Worley, while the trophy for doubles went to Joey Worley and Gary Speegle. The winners for the Junior Division was Eric Zarate in the singles, and James Hogan and Eric Zarate winning

the doubles.

They are credited with saving the lives of scores of Jews, by hiding them in a secret room in their home, and by arranging safe passage out of the country. For their effort, they were arrested in a surprise raid, and sent to prison. Corrie was sent to Ravensbruck Concentration Camp, and is the lone survivor of the immediate family.

Corrie's story has been shared with millions around the world through the book and motion picture, THE HIDING PLACE. A 1975 World Wide Pictures release, THE HIDING PLACE has been dubbed into several foreign languages, and has been well received in England, Holland, and West Germany, as well as throughout the Far

CORRIE: THE LIVES SHE'S TOUCH-ED, is hosted by Cliff Barrows of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Team, and features a number of surprise guests from Corrie's past, including her nephew, Peter van Woerden, who, as a youth, was also involved in the work of the Underground, and Diet Ehrlick, who was in the concentration camp with Corrie.

Other guests on the program included Jeannette Clift, the actress who portrayed Corrie in THE HIDING PLACE, and Tom Claus, an American Indian Chief who inducted Corrie into his tribe as an honorary member.

Music is featured throughout the onehour program by Evie Tornquist, George Beverly Shea, the Bill Gaither Trio, and by Tedd Smith, pianist and composer of the film score for THE HIDING PLACE.

According to the Reverend Armo Bentley, pastor of the East Cisco Baptist Church, the showing is free and open to the public.

FOR THE PAST several days the skies have been cloudy in this area, but only a small amount of rain has fallen in Cisco. So far this year Cisco has received a generous amount of rainfall and most area gardens are doing extremely well. Everyone's yards are

also pretty and green. THIS WEEK HAS been very humid, making the 80 degree weather seem hotter.

WITH VACATION time getting near, a lot of people may be considering going camping somewhere and building campfires for cooking. With this in mind I would like to share some facts on forest fires with you.

1) In 1977, 158,850 wildfires burned over 2,898,485 acres in the United States. This was 69,500 more fires than occurred in 1975. 90 percent of those fires were caused by people: unattended brush fires, arson, camp fires, flicked cigarette butts, debris burning, playing with matches, and accidents. What else causes forest fires other than man? Only

2) Forest fires cost the American people an estimated \$350 million last year, in directcosts alone. Destruction of property, environmental damage, recreation values lost, and wasted forest resources surely encreased the toll to half

a billion dollars.

lightning.

3) Fighting forest fires requires massive support activities such as radio communications, logistics, air and ground transportation and other physical aids. A large fire may require 3,000 to 5,000 firefighters over 2 or 3 days. More important yet is the prompt rehabilitation work required to protect firedamaged against soil erosion, so they will regreen as

soon as possible.

4) There is some misunderstanding about "prescribed" burning. It is true that in some instances carefullythese monitored fires do have a place in shaping desirable ecological successions. Prescribed burning can be useful in conversion of brush lands to seeded grass, developing breeding grounds for wildlife species, and fuel reduction projects, such as slash burning. But this is decided by forest managers. No one else should ever deliberately set fire to the forest. That constitutes arson.

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

Congressional Comment

Washington, D.C.-Every Great Britain with a pledge to political movement since the beginning of time has had the seeds of its own destruction located within - often from the onset. During the sixties and early seventies we became acquainted with such movements as the New Frontier, Great Society, and the social-welfare state. In this period our Country seemed to have unlimited resources. We could conduct a war on poverty at home and a fighting war in Vietnam half way around the world. The government began a policy of intense regulation of the economy and spent billions trying to cure such unemployment and poverty. The phenomenon of government expansion was world wide as we began to see the nationalization of many important industries in Western

Europe and around the globe. The idealism of the sixties finally collapsed when it was programs did not cure poverty or promote efficiency in the marketplace. Massive amounts of foreign aid did very little to enhance world prosperity and military intervention overseas often did not stabilize pro-Western regimes or make friends for the United States.

Now we are in the process of examining our past errors. The issues people seem most concerned about are too much government spending and regulation, inflation, and our eroding national defense. These concerns are not confined to America but are worldwide. A Conservative tional capital. government recently won in

reduce inflation and government spending but at the same time to maintain a strong national defense. A similar situation happened in Canada with the election of the Progressive-Conservative party. The Prime Minister-elect, Joe Clark, ran on a platform of reducing inflation from 9.8% to 5%, using incentives to increase the economic growth rate, and to use financial incentives, not government regulations, to encourage production and conservation of energy. Certainly these are policies I support in this Country. In 1976 a Socialist government was problems as structural defeated in Sweden after 44 years in power. There are many problems that the government cannot solve and must be lived with. Hopefully we are finally entering a time of reevaluating our own limitations and a realization that most problems are the responsibility of each individual to solve and not for a paternalistic bureaucracy located in a na-

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

Kidney Stones Strike Thousands Annually

> Every year, one out of every 1000 American adults is hospitalized from a painful disorder of the urinary tract caused by kidney stones.

Calcium, an important element in our diet, is the main ingredient of most kidney stones. Easily joining with other substances to form crystals on the rough, inside wall of the kidney, these calcium stones can grow from microscopic to bean size

When these stones break loose and begin to float through the urinary tract, they sometimes lodge along the way, causing partial or complete blockage. An immediate, severe pain in the kidney area usually follows, although pain in the lower back, groin, or lower ribs also is common. Muscle spasms in the abdomen, nausea, and vomiting can occur, as well as chills, fever, and the passing of blood in the urine.

The body normally prevents these stones from forming, but

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urinary tract infections, abnormalities in the body's chemistry, and digestive disorders can alter these defenses. Yet, in one-fourth of all patients suffering from kidney stones, no physical disorder can be found.

Treatment for this problem varies according to the type and size of the stone. Merely increasing the patient's fluid intake sometimes is all that is necessary, since many smaller stones eventually pass without extensive treatment. In more severe cases, surgery may be required. Usually the patient suffers no permanent damage, but in rare instances, the complete loss of a kidney can occur. Continued problems with kidney stones

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

By Lyndell Williams TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN - Besides approving a multitude of other bills on the very last day of the 66th session, the Texas Legislature also finally agreed on a state budget, a school finance plan and tax relief legislation.

Hurriedly pumping out minor bills and putting the finishing touches on major legislation on the 140th and final day of the session is the traditional way of doing things for the Texas Legislature.

The 66th session was no

different. On the way to the last 24 hours of lawmaking, legislators had been sidetracked by such nagging matters as a presidential primary, alterations to the consumer protection act and a change in the usury ceiling.

But with the presidential primary effectively killed by the flight of the "Killer Bees" in the Senate, and with changes in the consumer protection act already passed, and with the usury ceiling upped to a maximum of 12 percent, lawmakers spent the final day of the session working on the budget, agreeing on the final details of how public schools would be financed and approving legislation to implement the tax relief amendment passed by voters last November.

The state budget for 1980-81 passed by both Houses after some expected haggling over different provisions of the plan would cost \$20.7 billion. That's a 19 percent increase over the last two-year spending plan the Legislature drew up in 1977 during the 65th session.

When you consider that inflation, it appears lawmakers succeeded in keeping spending levels as low as was humanly possible.

But, the \$20.7 budget passed on to Gov. Bill Clements for his signature is \$1 billion higher than what he suggested to the Legislature in his budget message earlier in the session. Clements wanted to return an additional \$1 billion to tax-

Indications are that Clements will approve the spending plan, although some Capitol observers warn that the governor might end up approving one year of the biennial spending draft and then call lawmakers back for a special session to write another one-year budget for the last year of the biennium

But the special session the governor has said he will call will probably deal with another of his legislative goals-initiative and referendum. The House came close to passing "indirect" initiative and referendum rights for voters, and Clements, addressing the House on the final night of the session, warned lawmakers that he would be seeing them again sometime in the next two years in a special

session on the subject. Included in the state budget were 5.1 percent pay raises for state employees and a boost of 8.3 percent for Department of Public Safety troopers.

Teachers also got a 5.1 percent pay raise on top of automatic step increases. bringing their pay hikes to 7-10 percent.

Last session. Sen. Oscar Mauzy of Dallas, chairman of the Senate Education Committee, found the school finance plan so objectionable he talked until the clock had run out, leaving lawmakers without a plan.

This time. Mauzy said he felt the Legislature had done a better job of "getting equalization aid to the poorer districts."

In the past. Mauzy claimed that the rich school districts were simply getting richer while the poorer ones were getting poorer.

"This is not a perfect bill," Mauzy told his fellow senators. "but it's a good bill that I wholeheartedly recommend to you in good

faith." The school finance package contains \$334 million new money for teacher pay, \$152 million for equalization to school districts and almost \$100 million in additional funds for the operation and maintenance of public schools.

Inseparable from the question of school finance is the matter of tax relief legislation. House Bill 1060, the measure to implement the constitutional amendment approved by voters, is expected to cost local school districts across the state almost \$384 million.

Homestead exemptions will be granted under the tax relief legislation for the elderly and the disabled. Family cars and household goods are also exempted. And farm and ranch land will be taxed on its productivity rather than its market value. What legislators had to

agree on was a plan to reimburse local school districts for the tax dollars they would be losing. House Bill 1060 contained \$200 million for reimbursement and the school finance plan ended

up containing \$184 million for the same purpose.

But how that \$384 million set aside for reimbursement would be parceled out was another question. Lobbyist for the large metropolitan school districts - in most cases the richer districtspushed for a minimum 45cents per dollar reimbursement plan and got it. But, to use another example.

Austin would be reimbursed 67-cents for every dollar lost because of mandated tax breaks.

Austin Sen. Lloyd Doggett said that the increased payments to the large school districts would mean a decrease in longevity pay for state employees.

And Sen. Bill Moore of Bryan labelled HB 1060 as 'a fraud and a sham" because of the compromises made after heavy pressure was applied by lobbyists from Dallas and Houston.

But a representative of the Dallas school district was quick to point out that even with the reimbursement plan plus other state aid. DISD would fall \$4.5 million shy of its revenue needs.

And Dallas may not be the only school district that will be facing that same the 28th annual problem after tax relief legislation is put into effect.

That means of course that some programs will have to be cut back or new taxes will have to levied. That led one Dallas school represen-- from Ranger. Chamtative to say that he thought any new taxes that might have to be collected should be called the "Briscoe Tax," after former Gov. Dolph Briscoe who called a special session last summer to draw

up tax relief legislation.

Critics charge that HB 1060 is not a tax relief measure but merely a shifting of the tax burden from local school districts to the state.

And those same critics point out that the average homeowner will probably only save \$40-\$50 in taxes in each of the next two

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
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

Waffles For Mom

On Mothers' day to stay in bed, how about mixing up some waffles for breakfast. By the way, they make a good supper dish too.

A couple secrets of success for waffles - Be sure to have the iron hot enough or the waffles will stick. Batter should be thin enough to pour easily, so add a little more liquid if necessary.

3 teaspoons

baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt

2 eggs 1-1/2 cups milk 4 tablespoons

melted shortening

Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Beat eggs until light and blend with milk. Stir this liquid into the dry mixture and add the melted shortening. Pour onto hot waffle iron and cook until brown and crisp. Makes about six average sized waffles.

Plain waffles are good but for variation you can sprinkle chopped bacon, partially cooked over hot iron just before adding batter. Or place bacon strips over top of batter just before putting top of iron down. WAF-FLES AND BACON-ALL IN ONE.



the existence or aid of God.' In the Encyclopedia unc'er Humanitarian said to see li. it of Humanitarians, Socia Works and Reformers. Under Humanitarianism it said see Sociology. Here we see that Sociology is connected with Humanism. In the 1800's a man by the name of Auguste Comete started the relgiion of Humanity. He set up a plan where Humanism could one day

control the world. He also

developed a new science to

help promote his plan, called Social Science or sociology. In 1933 the master planners wrote the Humanist manifests I. In 1973 the Humanist Manifests II was written. On page 15 it says 'Humanism traces it toots from Ancient China, Classical Greece and Rome through the Renaissance and the Enlightment to the Scien-

tific revolution of the

modern world." Page 17 it says "The controlled use and social sciences since the Renaissance must be extended further in the solution of human problems.'

In these manifestos the Humanist also say "As nonthiest, we begin with humans, not God, nature, not deity." - "No deity will save we must save us: oursleves." - "We affirm that moral values derive their source from human experience. Ethics autonomous and situational. We strive for the good life here and now. Humanity to survive, requires bold and daring measures. Only a shared world and global measures will suffice.'

They also believe in euthanasia and right to suicide and world control of resources (page 19, 21, 22)

The International Womens Year and the ERA connection: The IWY is working hard for the ratification of the ERA. The Equal Rights Handbook, now on news stands shows that humanist connection. Quotes "One of our most important prioroties has to be a fundamental change in our system of values. The patriarchal myths, must be replaced by humanistic ones." - "Sexual democracy is the only foundation upon which a humanistic world can be built."
