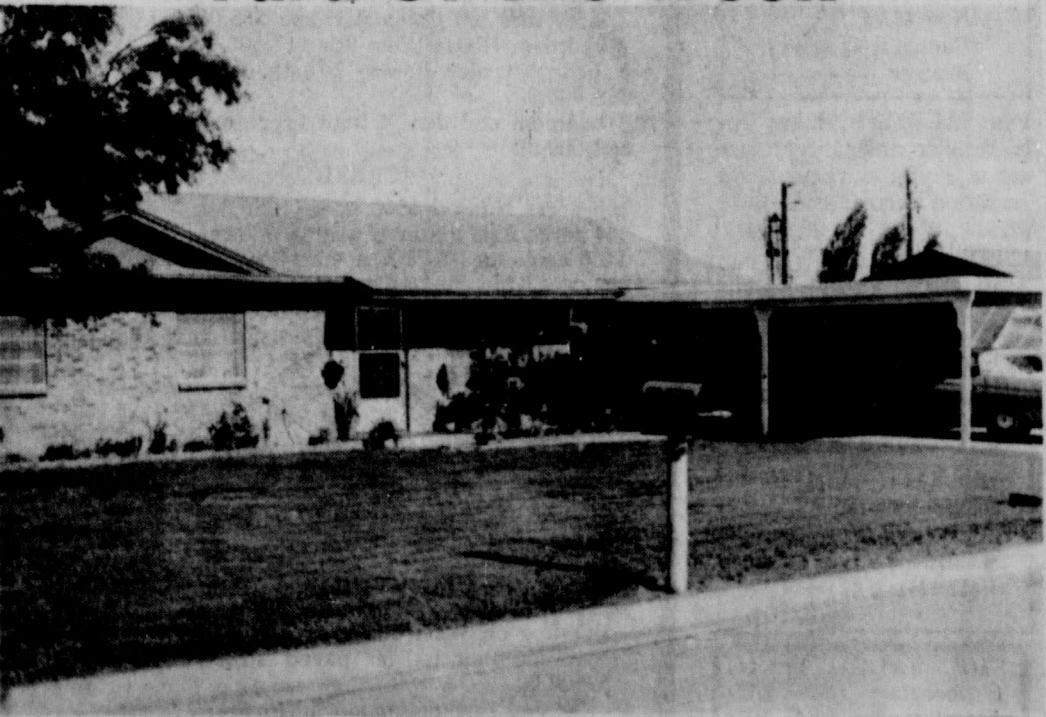

Kimberly Harris Wins Scholarship

Kimberly J. Harris of Rt. 2, Box 148-B, Rising Star, has been named the winner of a North Texas State University Merit Scholarship, it was announced today by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) of Evanston, Illinois. She joins a total of more than 4,200 Merit Scholars in the 24th annual competition.

Valedictorian of her graduating class at Rising Star High School, Miss Harris plans to major in physics in college. She was a University Interscholastic League State qualifier in speech, and alternate in science; a Soil and Water Conservation essay winner; was named to the All-American Band Hall of Fame; and is chapter president of Future Homemakers of America. She was also finalist and test winner in "Miss Teenage" Abilene contest.

Miss Harris's a four year scholarship is sponsored by North Texas State University in Denton 38 miles north of Dallas and Fort Worth. With over 17,000 students, it has Colleges of Arts and Sciences, Business Administration and Education; and Schools of Music, Home Economics, Community Ser-

vice, Library and Information, and the graduate school. The Music School is the second largest in the United States.

College-sponsored four year Merit Scholarships are generally worth between \$1,000 and \$6,000 over the four years of college undergraduate study. The amount of the winner's scholarship stipended is not revealed since it is related to confidential family financial information.

'Turn-About...'

After writing articles about the many interesting people in Eastland County, I realize it is difficult to condense the experiences of a lifetime into a few pages.

For it is people, emotions, ideas and places which shape a life. I believe the early years are the most formative ones, and mine began right at a village called "Cuthbert", in N. W. Mitchell County, in 1920.

One of my grandfathers established the town and ran the first post office. I'm sorry that the P.O. was discontinued in 1959.

My father, B. L. Autry, served in the 5th Division in France in World War I. Although he attended a Business College in Houston, he turned away from the city to rural living. He had a special reverence for the land and all it contained, and he took good care of any land he handled.

When I was very young he and my mother, Susan, moved west of Mountainair, New Mexico, then on to a homestead in Rio Arriba County. There our closest neighbors were Apache Indians and Spanish ranchers, and they were very good ones.

After several years-and many experiences-my fam-

ly came back to West Texas to Grandfather Jacob Autry's "Home Place" northwest of Cuthbert, on Willow Creek.

During the next 35 years, until his death, my father made only one try at living anywhere else. That was a disastrous two-year stint, during the worst of the depression, on stockfarms around Stanton.

Coming back to Willow Creek was like reaching the Promised Land-and I realized I would never care for a flat, treeless country.

At least, on Willow Creek, we had mesquite-with willows and hackberry and a few pecan trees.

There were five children in our family, and my father spent a lot of time with us. He taught us plain living, and a code of ethics which becomes more remarkable to me each year of my life. He was a strong character-one who would battle the whole community for something he thought was right. He had lingering skirmishes with a local school system, which had consolidated our County Line School during the years he lived near Stanton.

My father was a great story-teller-he could hold us spellbound with vivid descriptions and marvelous plots. From him I first learned the value of a story, and how to handle one.

My Mother was an outwardly gentle and inwardly courageous person, and she had been brought up with all the refinements of the Old South. If she was discouraged over her battles in the pioneer-like environment in which we lived, no one ever knew about it. I am amazed that I grew up without hearing one harsh word in that home. The word "poor" was never mentioned-only thankfulness over what we had. It took me years to realize that we County Line people were all considered "Underprivileged" characters!

My Father was Baptist and my Mother Presbyterian. Neither seemed too closely tied to the organization of their churches, but we grew up on Bible quotations.

The Bible-and a large Dictionary-were the most important books in my home, and I read them over many times. I still feel that this is a basic education a writer should not neglect.

I will always believe that human beings inherit a sort of genetic memory. How else can I account for my desire to play the violin? My father played the guitar and my Mother sang well, but I had heard no one of consequence play the violin when I-at age ten-decided that I must play.

Later I learned that some of my ancestors had been Concert violinists.

But my first "playing" was done with two cottonstalks, which I rubbed together. Finally we ordered a violin, which had a dreadful tone.

When I was eleven years old I visited Mountainair, New Mexico, where I heard the legendary Bert Kayser play. I was amazed at his tone, which I can only describe as celestial. This incredible person lived on a ranch near the Manzano mountains with his wife and small children, but he occasionally played in different parts of the Southwest. At one time he had lived with the Spanish people on the Manzano Grant, where he learned many of their folk-tunes.

I knew that I must go back and hear Bert Kayser play, but it was four years before the chance came. In the meanwhile I studied the violin with a young man named John Edwards, a T.C.U. graduate who not lives in Ft. Worth. My Father bought a better violin for me from a local fiddle-player who had migrated up from Comanche County.

Ira School-in spite of my Dad's consternation-had a fine English teacher Margaret Pilcher, who gave me a thorough foundation in writing. She also encouraged me to win some Essay Contests. I did not take my writing seriously, but during those years I was absorbing the flavor of that "Below-The-Caprock" country, which would later appear in my book "Scurry County Style".

When I was fifteen years old the simmering feud between my Father and the school erupted over the sub-

ject of time spent on Athletics Vs Academic work.

He announced that his children would go to a better High School! I used that lever to make a break for Mountainair, New Mexico.

There the scenery was beautiful, the relatives agreeable, and music was a way of life among the Anglo ranchers as well as the Spanish people. I remember that all the people of that area had a great capacity for enjoying life-more, somehow, than the people I had known in western Texas.

It was a routine thing for me to play the violin most of the night at a party had stagger onto the schoolbus for another round of books. I am surprised that I managed to Edify the High School paper, and play in an Orchestra there. But there were

several great teachers at the school, including Laura and Paul Masters. Paul Masters, Biologist, later became an author and authority on Southwestern Indian life.

Bert Kayser had a fascinating French-Cajun guitar player named Art who accompanied him. Art had arrived from Louisiana under mysterious circumstances, and all the girls were duly warned about his charm.

Between bouts of ranching, Bert and Art played on station K. O. B. Albuquerque, called themselves the "Southwestern Serenaders". I was slated to play with the Serenaders, but circumstances intervened. I graduated from School, and you might say that I got serenaded home!

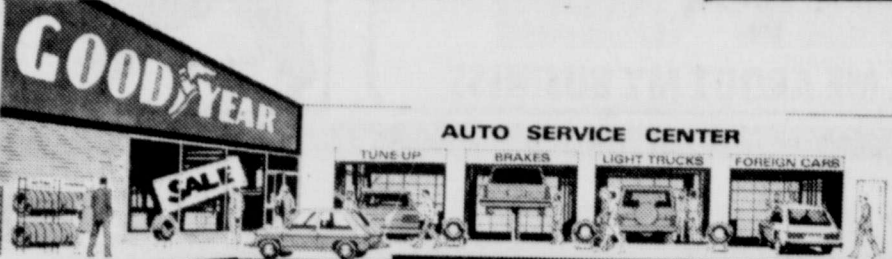

GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis Gordon

The weather has been unbelievable this year in Eastland County. Most areas of the county have been very fortunate, receiving light but frequent rains. A few small areas have had hail damage and some have had wind damage. For the most part the County has escaped floods, hail and tornado damage that have been disastrous to many counties in Texas this spring.

No two spots have had the same amount of rain this year, but according to James Dabney, Eastland Weather observer, Eastland has had 13.56 inches of rain from January 1 through May 31. This is only 2 inches above normal but 6.5 inches more than corresponding months last year.

The amount of rainfall does not really tell us much

about available soil moisture. Some years we have had a 3 to 5 inch rain in the spring and then maybe 30 days without rain. This year we have had a small rain almost every week. The soil has been able to absorb most of the rainfall and at the same time all lakes and ponds are full.

The pasture and range grasses, fruit crops and vegetable gardens have never been better. The soil temperatures is low for this time of year. The cool has slowed the growth of some forage crops and may delay crop for several weeks. Shade trees are making

maximum growth because of good soil moisture. Some homeowners have been calling to ask about fertilizing shade trees now that the moisture conditions are so good.

Shade trees in lawn areas where a good lawn maintenance is practiced seldom need extra fertilizer. In areas where the tree roots are confined due to street and curb conditions as well as other structural features, extra fertilizer is sometimes necessary. Tree fertilization is seldom needed more than once every three years except in extremely sandy soils as over fertilization can

force excessive top growth making the tree vulnerable to storm damage.

The recommendations usually made are based on trunk diameter and make no allowance for the fact that the root zone may be confined to a limited area. If these recommendations were followed, it could result in over fertilization and damage to some trees.

The safest method of computing the amount of fertilizer to use is to base it on the number of square feet included in the branch spread would cover approximately 1,000 square feet. It would require 24 pounds of a com-

plete fertilizer with an analysis of 8-8-8 to supply the two pounds of actual nitrogen required. A fertilizer analysis of 16-20-0 would require 12 pounds of the material to supply the needed nitrogen. The same complete fertilizer recommended for lawn use will be satisfactory for fertilizing trees in a given region.

If the root zone of the tree described above is confined for example, to an area of 12 feet by 20 feet due to buildings, curbs, walks, or streets, the fertilizer application should be computed on the basis of actual root zone—in this case 240

square feet, rather than the 1,000 square feet; in this case 240 square feet, rather than the 1,000 sq. feet; therefore, use only one-fourth as much fertilizer.

To compensate for the reduced root area, a second application should be made in late fall with the first application being made in late winter or early spring.

The fertilizer should be spread evenly beneath the branch spread of the tree and watered thoroughly.

Christian Scientists Mark 100th Year - 'Interest Grows'

Christian Scientists marked the centennial year of their denomination June 4 acknowledging increased public interest in Christian healing.

Harvey W. Wood, Chairman of The Christian Science Board of Directors, speaking to an overflow audience of members of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, said "growing interest in Christian healing by people of many different faiths" reflected "a reaching out to learn more of man's relationship to God, and the spiritual basis of true health and wholeness."

"These couranging signs of awakening are clear indication," said Mr. Wood, "of an awareness that quality of life hinges more on improvement of thought than on accumulation of things."

The Church of Christ, Scientist was founded in 1879 in Boston by religious leader May Baker Eddy who, in 1866, discovered Christian Science.

"In the course of the 100 years since the founding of our Church," said Mr. Wood, "we've learned there are no easy shortcuts to spiritual growth. It does not come about with the roar of a rocket engine, the dazzling light and 'beat' of the disco, or the soft or hard 'sell' of a TV commercial."

"Spiritual progress," said Mr. Wood, "requires quiet inner listening and obedience to the 'still small voice' and willingness to put off the stridency and harshness of human ways and means."

Members were told of a slight increase in the number of members seeking accreditation as full-time Christian Science practitioners and of new interest in Church membership in Africa and Latin America. The church was reported free of indebtedness and well-supported by membership contributions.

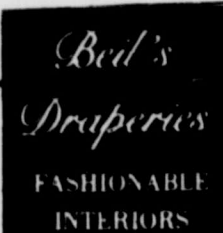

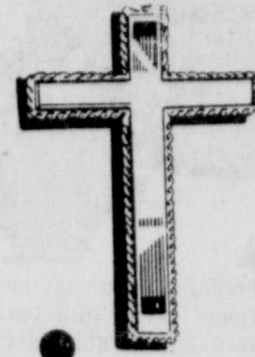
