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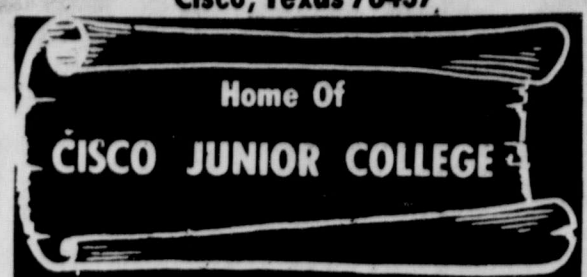

Postal Service Implements New Size Standards July 15

Effective July 15, 1979, the Postal Service will implement new size standards for envelopes, cards and other letter-size pieces of mail. Certain lightweight oversized mail deposited after the July 15 deadline will be charged a 7-cent nonstandard surcharge.

The new size standards were recommended by the Postal Rate Commission in April 1976 and approved by the Postal Board of Governors shortly thereafter. At that time, the Postal Service announced it would establish a two-year grace period to

give customers time to prepare for the change and exhaust their existing supplies of non-confirming envelopes and cards. Final action by the Postal Board of Governors in April 1979 moved the effective date to July 1979.

For the past three years, the Postal Service has worked closely with companies and associations involved in manufacturing envelopes, cards and forms and preparing large mailings to ensure that the public and industry are provided with standard-size envelopes and cards. In

addition, newspapers and trade publications across the country have published numerous articles prompted by Postal Service news releases on the impending letter size standards.

Therefore, as a practical matter, there should be few undersized envelopes in circulation. In addition, many greeting card publishers have begun to print the legend "Extra Postage Required" on oversized envelopes. This, too, should help reduce any problems.

There are two basic reasons for implementing the new standards. Nonstandard envelopes cannot be processed by letter sorting machines and require more expensive hand sorting. The surcharge on nonstandard pieces will reflect the extra costs incurred in handling such pieces. The prohibition on smaller envelopes and flimsy cards is based on the fact that they can become trapped in other mail and jam automatic mail processing equipment, resulting in delays in mail processing and possible damage to other mail pieces.

Under the new size standards, pieces will be non-mailable if they are less than three and one-half inches high, five inches long, seven thousandths (.007) of an inch thick or are not rectangular in shape. Also not mailable are odd-shaped pieces such as heart shaped cards, parallelograms, non-rectangular and oval shaped items.

Pieces subject to the 7-cent nonstandard surcharge are First-Class Mail weighing one ounce or less and single piece rate Third-Class Mail of two ounces or less that measure more than six and one-eighth inches high; 11 and one-half inches long, or one-fourth inch thick. Also subject to the surcharge are pieces outside the range of acceptable aspect ratios, i.e., too square or too long relative to the height. The length of a mail piece must be between 1.3 times and 2.5 times the height to avoid the nonstandard surcharge.

All post offices will enforce the new dimensional size criteria. Pieces not meeting

the minimum size standards will be identified during processing and sorting and returned to sender. Nonstandard pieces mailed without the surcharge will also be returned to the sender for the additional postage.

There are some exceptions to the minimum-size prohibition. If a piece is more than one-fourth of an inch thick it may measure less than three and one-half by five inches. However, it may be subject to the nonstandard surcharge depending on its class and weight. Thicker pieces, such as film mailers, can be mechanically separated from other letter mail which is processed by automatic facing and cancelling equipment. Exempted from all but the minimum thickness standard are keys, identification cards and tags.

Implementation of the size standards will offer benefits both for the mailing public and the Postal Service. For the mailer, the letter size restrictions will help speed mail processing, reduce damage, and will help the Postal Service hold rates at reasonable levels. Cost savings to the Postal Service will amount to about \$30 million per year.

Imposition of letter size standards in the United States is in keeping with recommendations of the Universal Postal Union and parallels similar restrictions imposed by several foreign countries in recent years. In Japan, for instance, items below three and one-half inches by five and one-half inches but imposes a 5.5 cent surcharge in addition to the standard rate of 22.3 cents. The Netherlands, France and Germany do not accept items below three and one-half inches by five and one-half inches, and Germany charges 52 cents to mail a letter that exceeds its maximum standards.

Commenting on results, Robert B. Kamon, vice president of International Royalty, said, "We are pleased with a 16 percent increase in royalty income for the first six months, up to \$98,413 from \$85,136 a year ago. This improvement confirms

our purchase of good income producing royalty interests in Texas and Kansas."

International Royalty and Oil Co., Inc., headquartered in Cisco, Texas, owns overriding royalty interests in both producing and nonproducing properties in the United States and other countries. The Company currently owns 13,918 net producing royalty acres under 91,647 surface acres in Texas, Kansas and Canada. 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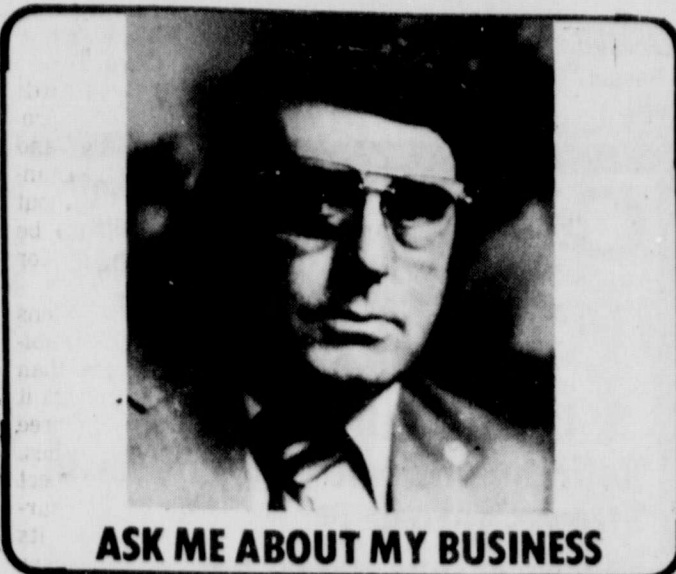

So many people have asked about my eyes that I will try to explain. I have bilateral pars plaitis-an infection of the back of my eyes-the retinas. It affected my left eye during the winter and spring, so that was the eye that had surgeries. The doctor said it is like a volcano explodes and erupts infection. He does surgery

with a frozen needle and freezes each spot to 60 degrees below zero-lets them thaw, then immediately repeats the process. Thank goodness, I am asleep. I get to come home for three or four weeks, then he checks to see how much good has been done. In April he was pleased that my left eye has good vision and the infection is dead. (Its like ashes at the bottom of my eye.) He does not expect the infection to erupt in that eye again but he will monitor it for years. The bad news in April was that the infection had erupted in my right eye so as soon as school was out, surgery has been started on it. Sometimes it takes four surgeries to kill all the infection!

I am so very thankful and feel fortunate that I had one 'good' eye so I could finish high school. Now, my aim is to get good vision so I can begin college in the fall.

I am thankful to all our friends who have given money. Some of the worry lines have eased on my parents faces. The funds will be used wisely. I promise, and if it were possible, I would hug each of you.

While traveling over the County we have seen some very good hay crops. The hybrid forage sorghums have made excellent growth the last two or three weeks and should make quality hay.

The coastal bermudagrass began slowly because of low soil temperature but is now growing well and making good hay.

The key to harvesting top

quality hay is to cut grass when the greatest amount of digestible nutrients per acre may be obtained. This usually is at a stage of growth just before plants begin maturing or producing seedheads. Delaying harvest may provide a slightly greater increase in yield, but this increase consists primarily of stems, stalks and other low-quality parts. The sudan hybrid types should be cut in

the early boot stage. The coastal bermudagrass should be cut when it reaches a height of 14 to 16 inches and no more than 4 weeks of growth.

Once grass is cut, it must be dried to 12-18 percent moisture for safe baling and storage. Rapid curing and baling conserves leaves, nutrients, color, palatability and other quality factors, and this can be enhanced with the use of hay conditioner. For greater effectiveness, use a hay conditioner within 15 minutes after cutting grass.

Producers should take a close look at hay made from

each cutting to determine its quality. This can be done visually as well as having a sample chemically analyzed. Visual inspection should be made by checking the knife edge of the bale. Check for stage of maturity, texture, leafiness, foreign material and color. Top quality hay has mostly small stems that are pliable and flexible, has a high proportion of leaves, has few seedheads and is generally void of such foreign matter as weeds, manure and mold, and is a bright, dark green color.

Chemical analysis of hay determines its nutrient

value. The most common chemical determination is crude protein percentage, from which the amount of digestible protein can be calculated. Information on submitting hay samples for chemical analysis is available at the County Extension office.

Fertilizer is another factor that is important in producing good quality hay. Cattle prices are up, which means that a good supply of hay will pay dividends this fall and winter.

Chances of rainfall remain good during June before the hot summer sets in. So fertilizer should be applied as

soon as possible to take advantage of any moisture that comes, of course, waiting on rain before fertilizing will not help much. If rain doesn't come, all is not lost. Most of the fertilizer usually remains for rain that will come sooner or later. Not nearly as much of the fertilizer is lost as is commonly thought by many producers.

As producers get involved in hay production they should keep the Eastland County Hay Show in mind. This year's show will be September 28.

Several people have asked if the forage sampler has been returned. Unfortunately,

ly, the answer is no. During our first hay show several producers donated money to purchase a forage sampler. This is a stainless steel tube with a shank on one end to fit into an electric drill. The other end of the 18 inch tube is equipped with saw like teeth. This was used to take samples of hay entered in the hay show and was also intended to loan to hay producers to use in taking hay sample.

Several months ago we mentioned in this column that the sampler had not been returned. The last per-

son who borrowed it from the Extension Office was on his way to return the sampler when he met another person who asked to borrow it. No one knows who the second person was. At any rate the sampler has not been returned and there are others who would like to borrow it now.

Since the sampler cost about \$40 it is not practical for each producer to own one. At the present we have no funds to purchase another sampler. So, if anyone knows where it is we would like to have it returned.

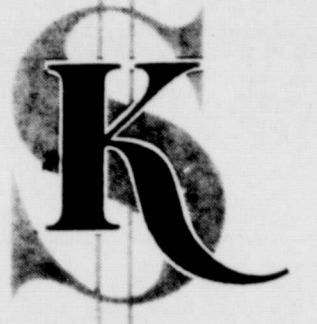

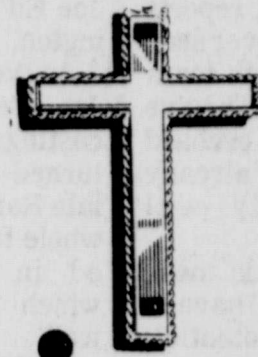
