From a train window I watched the New Mexico mountains fade like blue ghosts. I was gripped by a feeling of loss, yet I knew I could not go back. But west Texas, I groaned, would be so terribly dull after life in the shadow of those mountains! For one thing, I had made the strange discovery that my mind worked more like that of a Spanish person than an Anglo, and I identified with those people. But -I told myself - I wouldn't be around west Texas long. Just for the summer - long enough to get some new clothes packed and get away to college. Oh yes - and I would need some money. Why was it that I always needed money? I couldn't stand dull, practical, or scheming people - the kind who always seemed to hold the purse-strings of the world. Yet I needed some coin of the realm - right now! Talk about the Bible story of Christ being crucified: I had decided that musicians, writers and artists, if they worked at their art, had their own Golgothas. But it was worth the pain, for beauty was the only thing that really mattered in this world.

And somehow, in the way organized religion had been presented to me, I hadn't found much beauty in it. And God - although I believed in the existance of some Mastermind for Force, seemed impersonal, remote, and at times cruel. I kept asking some terrible questions: How could God be good and still be responsible for a world like this, where pain and suffering and death existed? Furthermore, how could He place anyone who disobyed Him during their brief years on this earth into an everburning Hell - the most cruel torture imaginable?

If I ever found a Church which could answer these questions, I mused, I might join it. But I never expected

relieved to see me headed east on the train. After the death of Bert Kayser's wife a few months before, they had been afraid I would develop an insane notion to take her place. I had tried to explain that any bond between the violin-player and I lay totally in the realm of the spiritual. And I had accused some of the local population of being

The economy of the dryland cotton farmers had always depended on how much they could borrow from the bank each year. They paid this back in the fall, when they sold the crop. After Christmas they were broke, and had to start borrowing again. My father was not only financing crops - he was paying out land. In the local vernacular - he was

'land poor' And I suddenly hated all the land around me. What would Mitchell County land ever be worth - not to mention that drouthy stuff across the river in Scurry? People were more valuable than land! My old school friend over on Sharon Ridge and Bull Creek - they were having to struggle to pay for land just like we were.

My parents counseled me to be patient, and something would surely come up for me. For awhile my mood was black and rebellious, but I found it impossible to live in constant gloom. I had to admit that I did enjoy roaming the creek and hills and river - it always cheered me to be in close contact with

natural things. Could I get a job in one of the Couty-seat towns - as

horrid as all of them seed? As I mused over that, my Mother explained in her gentle voice that I must be careful what sort of job I applied for, since some jobs were not proper for young girls to have. It was the family name again, for she reminded: "A good name is rather to be chosen than great riches"

I gave a bitter, hollow laugh, sacked up my violin, and headed for the pecan trees on the creek. At least I could charm the squirrels.

At that time a lovely young woman arrived in one of the towns to teach violin. My relatives in town were very anxious for me to study with her, but I didn't ever get to hear the girl play. My Dad had a totally different idea - I must study with Leon Jenkins, who ran a Barber Shop in town. No simpering around and playing for tea parties for him!

I wasn't surprised about a violin player having to earn his living with a Barber Shop, but I was surprised at the strength and vigor of his playing, and his real love for the Classics. Mr. Jenkins had graduated from a Conservatory of Music in Wisconsin, and his knowledge of technique was invaluable.

No person, especially a young person, likes to live in a social vacuum. For awhile I did that, going out only to violin lessons or to County Line Union Sunday School, which I considered extremely dull. We were getting an influx of speakers who said they were called to preach, but I never knew what had called some of them! It didn't help any when my Dad said he had "graduated" from Sunday School - he couldn't stand it any more! My Mother resolutely kept on teaching the Youth Class, trying to the best for the community that she could. And she was great at fixing meals for hungry people. Her chocolate or lemon pies were enough to make a believer out of an infidel. They almost converted even



Lions Hear About April 10th Storm At Wichita Falls

The tornado that caused death and destruction at Wichita Falls last April 10th was the subject of a picture slide presentation and talk by Ben McKinnis

of Breckenridge at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club last Wednesday noon at the Laguna Hotel.

Mr. McKinnis, who is an official of Texas Electric Service Co. at Breckenridge, reported that the TESC had to perform the amount of work that would be required to build the entire electric systems in the Cities of Burkburnett and Iowa Park to repair the storm damages.

The company called in private contractors and borrowed service personnel from numerous places in their efforts to restore service, Mr. McKinnis

said. The tornado left 45 dead, 600 injuries, 20,000 homeless and damages estimated in excess of \$250,000,000 in its wake. The storm swept through Wichita Falls with a path some eight miles long and up to two miles wide.

The slides showed numerous churches, schools, shopping centers, and many homes in ruins. Mobile homes were destroyed in several villages, trailer trucks were overturned, railway boxcars were upended, trees were unrooted and utility lines were tangled and downed.

Lion S. Lopez was in charge of the program. Mr. McKinnis, a member of the Lions

Club in Breckenridge, reported that plans were being made for Lions of this region to sponsor a Benefit Bowl meeting of Cisco and Ranger Junior College again this year on Saturday night, Sept. 29. Details will be announced soon.

AUSTIN-If the new product you just bought comes with an impressive and official-looking warranty you may feel that you have also bought complete protection should problems develop.

But that warranty could be essentially worthless, according to our Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division attorneys.

For instance, a consumer who buys a hair dryer with a lot of plastic parts might discover when trying to have it serviced under warranty that plastic parts are excluded from coverage.

While consumers have certain rights regarding warranties under both federal and state laws, our attorneys point out that it's always far better to avoid potential problems by knowing exactly what kind of coverage you'll

covered; that the buyer must return the product to the original seller for service; that there are charges for postage and handling; or that the owners other than the original one are not covered.

Of course, a product may have a combination of full warranty on some parts, a limited one on others.

Then there's the "implied" warranty consumers get with every product, whether or not it's stated in writing. This type of warranty means that the item purchased must do the job it's purchased for--an example would be that a stove

It's a bumper crop of wheat being harvest in Eastland County this year. Yields of 35 to 40 bushels per acre are being reported, and the price has improved too.

The wheat growers are long over due for a good year. Both yields and prices have been low for several years. For example in 1978 there were 8,000 acres of wheat planted in Eastland County, but only 600 acres harvested. The average yield was 13.3 bushels per acre.

This could be a great year for all agricultural products in Eastland County. Prices for cattle and hogs have been tops. Grass has been abundant throughout the spring. Good hay crops are being made now

The fruit trees have large crops and the pecan trees could produce a record crop this year. I don't think we have ever seen as many pecans on the trees this time of year as we are seeing now.

It's much too early to know what the peanut crop will do.

Planting was delayed because of wet weather, but most of the peanuts are

planted now. Now for the bad news - production cost continues to increase at a rapid rate, especially fuel and energy costs.

Eastland County producers and commercial pesticide applicators are reminded that certain pesticide products now on the market are restricted and available for use only by or under the supervision of certified applicators. The Texas Pesticide Con-

trol Act requires certification of commercial pesticide applicators but not of private applicators. However, the act authorizes the Commissioner of Agriculture to establish a program to certify private applicators on a voluntary basis who wish to use or supervise the use of restricted-use pesticides in compliance with federal law (FIFRA).

The term "private applicator" means a person

who uses or supervises the use of any restricted-use pesticide or state-limiteduse pesticide for purposes of producing any agriculture commodity on property owned or rented by him or his employer or, if applied without compensation other than the trading of personal service between producers of agricultural commodities, on the property of another person. The program established by the Texas

Department of Agricutture (TDA) enables a private applicator to become eligible for certification by completing an approved training program conducted by a qualified institution or training group or by home study including submitting a completed questionnaire to TDA following review of self-

study material. Private applicators may qualify through home study using self-study materials available at the County Extension office.

Commercialnoncommercial applicator requirements for certification include written examinations administered by the appropriate certifying agency. The term "commercial applicator"

means a person who owns or

manages a pesticide applicator business engaged in applying restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides to another's land. The term

"noncommercial applicator" means a person or government agency or department which wants to use restricted-use or statelimited-use pesticides and does not qualify as a private applicator and is not required to have a commercial applicator's license. Commercial-

noncommercial applicator training is provided by District Pesticide Applicator Training Committees located at Texas A&M University Research and Extension Centers. Training is provided through workshops and by previous appointment through an system autotutorial available at each location.

Persons anticipating the need to use restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticide products are encouraged to take advantage of these Extension training programs. Information regarding the private applicator program is available through the County Extension Office. Persons interested in commercial-noncommercial applicator training may ob-



Apply By July 15 For Tax Relief

The Eastland County Farm Bureau has asked taxing jurisdictions in this county to help ut the new tax relief law into effect in 1979. In a letter to elected officials

of all taxing units, Roy Johnson of Desdemona, president of the local county farm organization, reminded them that this law provides for limiting tax valuation on agricultural land if the owner applies by July 15, 1979.

Mr. Johnson reminded the tax officials that the Act states: "The Legislature believes that implementation of Articles 1 and 2 of this Act is both feasible and desirable and hereby expresses its intent that all taxing units in this state implement those articles for taxes imposed for the 1979 tax year unless it is impossible to do so."

The Farm Bureau officer told each of the tax officials: We believe that your tax office has the competence to follow this new law in 1979.

"The letter added: "If there is to be a proposed resolution or ordinance to deny this tax treatment in 1979, please let us know so that we can attend the hearing and present our views.

School district authorities were also reminded that any school districts which deny this valuation in 1979 will receive less state money.

A tax manual will be furnished by the School Tax Assessment Practices Board in late June. A training session will be offered in Austin at the University of Texas Special Events Center on June 25.

The local farm leader said that his organization was helping notify farmers and ranchers that they should apply with all their local tax offices between July 1-15. The county Farm Bureau office will have a supply of sample application forms for use in preparing the information for the official form.




