Present Child Care Center A Few Blocks From Where Began

The spacious brick home of the Cisco Child Care Center, on West 8th Street, is only a few blocks from where the Center began. But behind the move to the new location lies a story of community service, dedicated Directors and Staff, and a town which cares about the quality of life for its people. This present facility, worth around \$50,000, was financed and is maintained by local funds. Many interested contributors attended an "Open House" for the building, held Feb. 10th of this year.

Gertrude Besselaar, who became Director of the Center in 1975, has seen the enrollment of children triple during her four years. She and her staff and 50 active, happy youngsters are enjoying the new building - and a visit to the place will explain why. From the front entrance past the huge playroom to the sunny dining area there are all sorts of things to invite, attract, and add to the pleasure of children. Furniture is scaled to small sizes, and there are bright pictures, books, toys, records, and outdoor playthings. There is a large yard area, which is securely fenced from the street.

"We are equipped and licensed to care for 68 children here," auburn-haired Mrs. Besselaar explains. "All the remodeling of this building and the equipment was made possible by work and contributions from Cisco people and organizations." She glances toward the carpet, with its vari-colored, muted stripes. "People of the town gave \$1800 to carpet the building, and a lot of it in \$5.00 contributions. So you can imagine how many people were involved in this."

Mrs. Besselaar describes her staff as "Remarkable people, devoted to the children." Her Staff consists of Fay Clack, Frances Hitt, Marie Ivie, Faye Jett, Georgia McCachern, Shirley Ritchie, Lorene Sublett, and Revis Gregg.

The Cisco Child Care Center began in 1969, when the First Baptist Church recognized a local need for a Day-Care facility. The Church obtained a Charter from the State to operate a Center, and located it in a small building beside the Church. The public was pleased with the type of care and training offered, and filled the Center to Capacity. By 1975 there was a waiting list for enrollment, and mounting expenses. The

policy of the Center was to charge parents according to ability to pay. The First Baptist Church invited other Churches and Clubs to be sustaining members of the project, and found a ready response. A new Charter was issued in 1975, with control vested in a Board of Directors appointed by each of the sustaining groups. At present there are nine sustaining organizations: The Cisco Lion's Club, Cisco Service Club, First Baptist Church, The Cisco Civic League, First Christian Church, First Presbyterian Church, First United Methodist Church, East Side Baptist Church and Redeemer Lutheran Church. Board members are C.B. Dill, Jack Kennedy, Pennie Fields, Joy Worley, Ann Boland, John Boland, Charlotte Speagle, Ronnie Ledbetter, Joyce Ferguson, Louise Cooper, Pat Isbell, Murl Strobel, Lee Roy Witzsche, Paul Ivie, Dean Toler, and Gertrude Besselaar. Lee Roy Witzsche is President, with Paul Ivie Vice President, Louise Cooper Secretary, and Pat Isbell, Treasurer.

By 1977 it was decided to find larger quarters for the Child Care Center, but it was late in the year before a final decision was reached on the Church of God building on West 8th. The First National Bank arranged financing, and work was begun. Various Churches and organizations were contacted for cash gifts and pledges, and the response was tremendous. Funds also came from individuals as memorials to loved ones and friends. The hours and hours of donated labor on remodeling was a heart-warming thing. "Whenever we had a problem," Gertrude Besselaar remembers, "There was always someone around to help solve it." She smiles. "One of our hardest to solve problems has been how to get nails or screws into hard plaster walls!"

Any place where 50 children spend the day needs a balanced program of learning and recreation. Mrs. Besselaar's job involves much more than record-keeping in her office, or buying supplies. She works with the others at anything needed. Small babies have a nursery at the Center, but older children spend most of the morning in pre-school activities directed by Faye Jett. They have arts, crafts, stories and instruction designed to prepare them for school work. As Mrs. Jett and others of the Staff move

among the children, loving them and caring for their needs, they reflect a secure, home-like atmosphere. Mrs. Besselaar mentions that a few more things could be used at the Center - more playground equipment, and high chairs. Children's books are always welcome, for they - like the playground equipment, are used constantly. Some volunteer painters are also needed to refinish a few walls. Mrs. Besselaar spent her own childhood far away from Cisco - in Holland. There she experienced war and the occupation of her country. In 1957 she emigrated to the United States with her husband, Bert, and her children.

Mrs. Besselaar's daughter, Maria, is married to Larry Duncan and lives near Eastland. The Duncans have one child - a baby boy. Mrs. Besselaar has made six trips back to Holland during her 22 years in the United States, with the last one in 1978. There is a joy in visiting relatives and old friends, but Gertrude Besselaar feels closely involved with life in Cisco. "This country has been good to me and my family," he states. "And my work with the Child Care Center - this has been especially rewarding. So many wonderful things happen. I'm sure I feel what the Churches and people here believe - that the proper care of these children is a good work. And the Lord has helped us - that is what keeps us going."

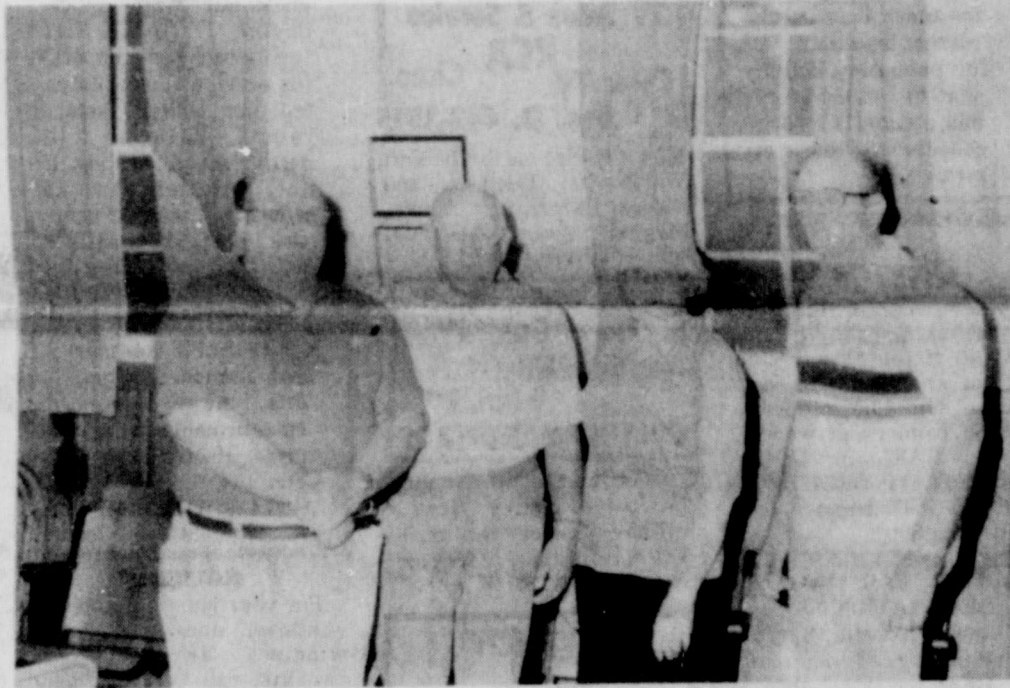

GORDON SPOT

Many people in Eastland County are experiencing large populations of fleas. Because of their abundance and wide distribution this year they are difficult to control.

The female flea lays several hundred eggs during her long life. The eggs are generally deposited in the dirt, bedding or nest of the host. However the eggs are often laid on the host where

they eventually fall off wherever the host may have been. The eggs hatch in two to twelve days into white, legless, eyeless larvae which usually live nine to fifteen days before they spin a cocoon in which to pupate. They may remain as a pupa from 7 days to 1 year. Most fleas require 35 to 75 days for complete life cycle.

To control fleas successfully the following places must be treated at the same time: inside the house in lawn area, and the pets. Treating only in one place such as the animal will almost lead to a reinfestation since fleas that occur outdoors or indoors will attack the animal and then be further distributed to other areas.

Prior to applying insecticides indoors, carpets, baseboards, and out of the way places such as under kitchen appliances, behind bookshelves, etc. must be thoroughly vacuumed. Close attention should be paid to areas where animal hair may have accumulated such as in and around the air conditioning filter. The vacuum sweeper bag should then be removed and disposed of off the premises. A course spray should be applied to floors, moldings, baseboards, under appliances, to a height of about one foot up on the walls. If the house is built off the ground, the crawl space underneath must also be treated. Sprays should be applied liberally in order that

the insecticide reaches the adult fleas and larva, particularly in deep pile or long shag carpeting. Retreatment indoors is often necessary to kill the fleas that are developing from eggs or pupa.

Chemicals that may be used indoors for flea control are malathion, pynethrin-piperonyl butoxide and several others.

Infested premises such as garages, porches, yards, and especially the bedding or loafing area of the pet should be thoroughly treated to prevent reinfestation. Pets and all other animals should be prevented from getting underneath the house. Rats and mice should be eliminated and a good flea control program should follow especially in areas most frequented by these vermin.

Insecticides that may be used to control fleas outdoors are malathion, Baygon, diazinon and carbaryl (Sevin).

Treatment of the pet is important since this is the primary source of infestation. There are a number of insecticides and formulations available for pet treatment. Dust formulations are often preferred over sprays for treating pets. The dust should be applied by shaker or be rubbed into the hair by

hand keeping the dust out of the animal's eyes, nostrils and mouth. Treatment should be particularly around the ears, between the legs and around the tail. Flea collars impregnated with Dichlorvos or Naled, and tags impregnated with Dichlorvos are rather recent developments that have questionable effectiveness for controlling fleas on pets. Always read the label, for many of the products have restrictions such as do not apply to animals under a certain age, or dogs and cats of a certain breed. Special formulation of insecticides available through your local veterinarian are recommended for flea control on puppies and kittens.

Sevin dust is commonly used to control fleas on pets although many other chemicals are also effective. In cases where you do not want to mix, apply or handle pesticides, or where flea populations and the area to be treated is large, contact a local commercial pest control operator. PCO's can be expected to supply a quick and effective service. You will be responsible for pet treatment, since PCO's do not involve themselves in this aspect of flea control.

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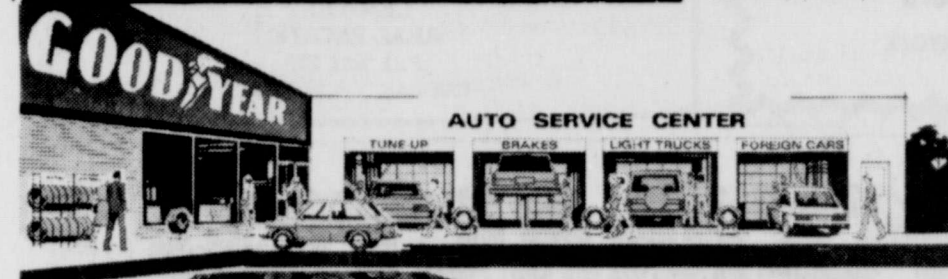
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30¢ Telephone Rate Hike

Despite continued rising inflation, local residence telephone service in Ranger, Cisco and Eastland will only cost 30 cents more per month than it did in 1976 if new rates proposed by Southwestern Bell are approved, according to Doug White, manager, for the company.

In January, 1977, the local one-party residence rate in Cisco was lowered from \$6.25 to the current rate of \$5. The local one-party business rate was lowered from \$13.75 to the current rate of \$10.50.

Southwestern Bell is proposing to increase the local one-party residence rate to \$6.55, or to only 30 cents a month more than it was in 1976. The two-party residence service rate would increase from the current rate of \$3.25 to \$4.60 per month.

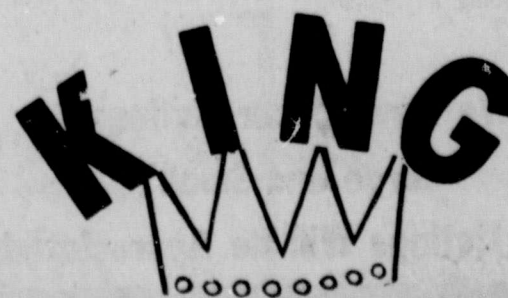

Half Cutting Mesquite For Quail

The mesquite, an often
cussed and discussed
invader-type brush species
can be turned into a
beneficial plant for quail
habitat. A modification

technique known as
"half-cutting" will improve
its value as a quail cover.
This modification consists of
cutting about half way
through the main stems of
the plant about 30 to 36
inches above ground height
and allowing the cut limbs to
fall to a horizontal position.
Half-cut mesquites in-
crease the amount of
overhead cover which
reduces trampling and
disturbance by livestock.
"Half-cutting" also provides
a protected seed source for
desirable plant species and
improves quail nesting
cover.

The best plants for "half-cutting" are second growth mesquite trees which have regrown with multiple stems averaging 2 to 3 inches in diameter. The taller the bushier the plant, the larger amount of cover it provides. Land such as abandoned cropland fields have regrowth mesquite as do pasture and rangeland that had some form of brush control such as chaining done in previous years. Areas adjoining cropland fields, pastures of Kleingrass, draws and odd areas are key areas for quail and can often benefit by having mesquite "half-cut" to provide cover adjacent to other food sources.

Five or six mesquite trees per acre in an irregular pat-
tern should be sufficient for quail habitat.
Older trees sometimes do not survive "half-cutting" but the second growth trees do well providing a living canopy for many years that will not decay and lose the cover value. Other species that this same procedure may be used on include yaupon, Texas persimmon and multi-stemmed oak.
"Half-cutting" mesquite is only one of a variety of wildlife conservation management practices. For more information on wildlife Management check with the Soil Conservation Service personnel located in room 311 of the Eastland National Bank Building or phone 629-1480.

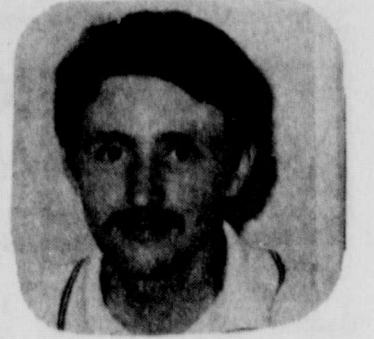

Last year Sheriff White tried to bring a writ of mandamus against the Eastland County Commissioners for the above named items. He had this case filed in the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals and it was rejected by the judges of this court since it should have been tried in a lower court and since they did not have any jurisdiction over this case.

I think Sheriff White should leave his office on July 9 since he has not made a very good sheriff and he has not been at all conservative or shown any cooperation among any of the county officials.

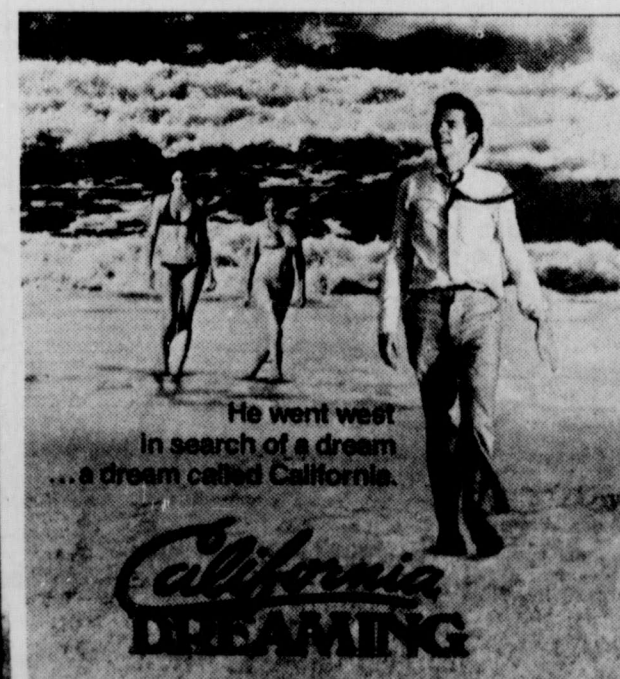

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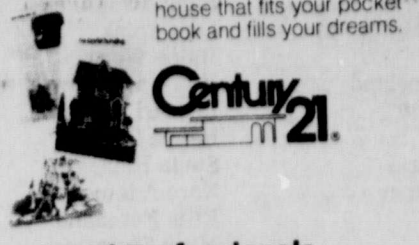

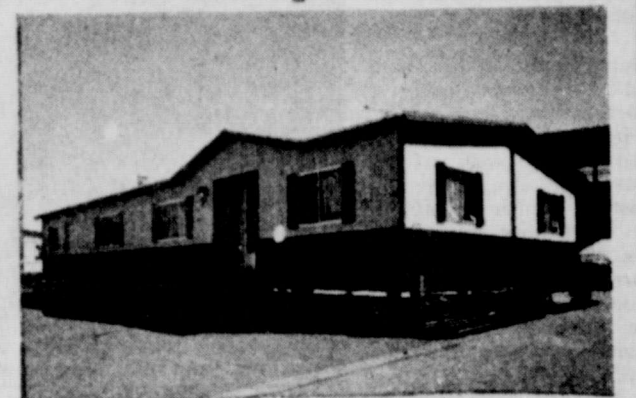
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**Cities Share \$218 Million
In Sales Tax**

AUSTIN.-Texas cities shared \$218 million in rebates from the one-percent optional city sales tax during the first six months of this year. State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday in announcing the city's June tax allocations. This figure compares to \$196.4 million that cities received during the same six months during 1978. Bullock said that June allocations for the more than 900 Texas cities will be \$67.7 million, compared to a 1978 statewide allocation of \$60.9 million for the month. MTA taxes are collected along with city and states sales tax by merchants and other permit holders in Houston and San Antonio and are rebated monthly by the Comptroller's office along with the optional city sales tax. Cisco received \$16,148.88 in this month (June), bringing its total for the year to date up to \$49,552.02. Eastland received \$16,523.45 in this month, bringing its total for the year to date up to \$54,073.37. Gorman received \$4,184.76 in this past month, bringing its total for the year to date up to \$10,083.09. Ranger received \$11,043.99 in this past month, bringing its total for the year up to \$35,601.20. Rising Star received \$2,556.69 in this past month, bringing its total for the year up to \$7,986.57.

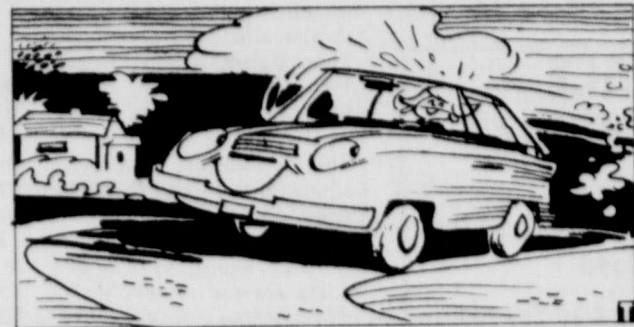
PAVING THE WAY TO SMOOTHER ROADS

Potholes—those cracks and craters that cost thousands of tax dollars and add to the expense and frustration of weary motorists—may someday be almost wholly gone.

To find out why, look beneath the surface of the roads.

Maryland drivers may be wondering where the potholes went on one of their major highways which has been reinforced with a new engineering fabric—a non-woven polyester called Bidim (short for bi-dimensional).

Manufactured by Monsanto Company, it helps prevent road cracks and subsequent potholes by providing a strong, impermeable layer of material between highway asphalt and the underlying layer of subsoil or old asphalt. It also reduces "heaving" that occurs during freeze-thaw cycles. The fabric, made from the



A new chemical "fabric" may make a material difference in the amount you have to pay for damage to your car and damage to the roads from potholes.

same chemical raw material used in permanent press clothing, has completed four years of a test on Maryland roads. Result: only one, small five-inch-long crack. The section of road built without the Bidim had over 200 linear feet of cracks, some more than 1/4-inch wide.

Tests show this material maintains its strength in temperatures ranging from subzero to over 350° F. It's rot-resistant, immune to acids and alkalis found in water and also unharmed by gasoline, motor oil or hot asphalt.

Protecting The Forest From Nature

Surprisingly, nature constantly threatens the life of a forest.

Fire is the danger most associated with forest destruction, and it remains a constant danger to any forest. Lightning can cause fires. Through cooperative protection by timber companies, state and Forest Service foresters, fires are kept down.

Millions of trees are killed or damaged each year by such dangers as insects and disease. The loss is appalling. Some can be controlled by insecticides and biologically. For others there is no real answer yet.

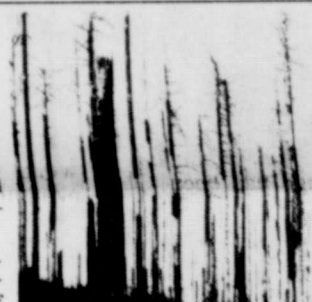
A few of the insects afflicting various trees are spruce budworm, gypsy moth, hemlock looper, pine butterfly, larch casebearer, pipe ips, pine sawfly, Bruce spanworm, mountain pine beetle, Douglas fir beetle, needle miner, European pine shoot moth, California flatheaded borer, lacebug,

cankerworm and many others. Diseases add their toll: such things as root decay fungi, blight, darker, rusts, cankers, drought and more. Strong winds can spell disaster for some trees, and downed trees can create insect infestations.

Raising trees is a science. Not managing a forest properly can produce a mess of stunted, slow-growing and unusable trees. Preparing for and destroying insect attackers is a full-time job demanding great exper-

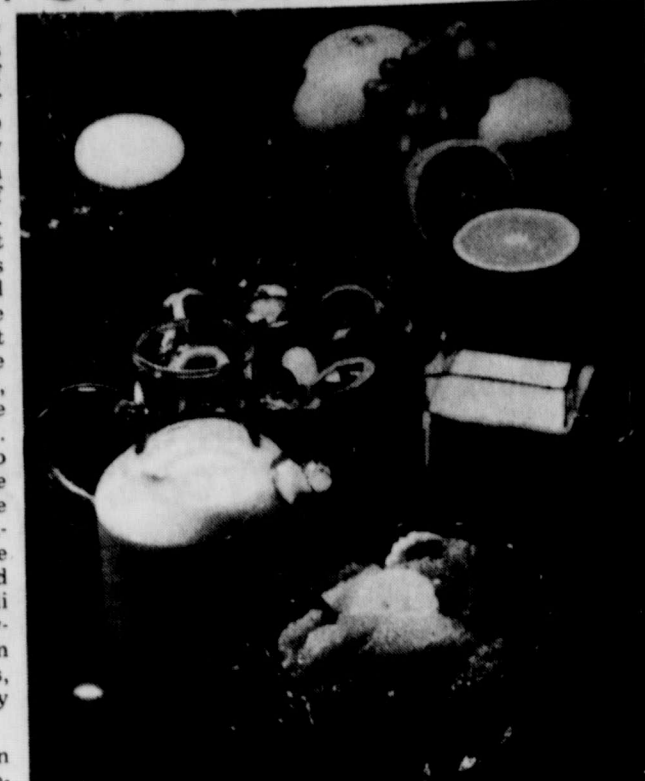

SALADS FOR ALL SEASONS

Fresh fruit and vegetable salads can be low in calories and offer rich sources of vitamins A and C and fiber any time of year. A crisp salad of fresh greens or raw vegetables adds variety to a meal. 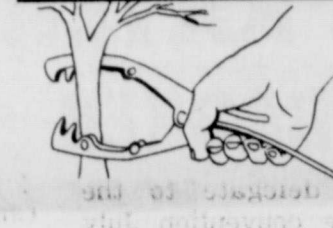

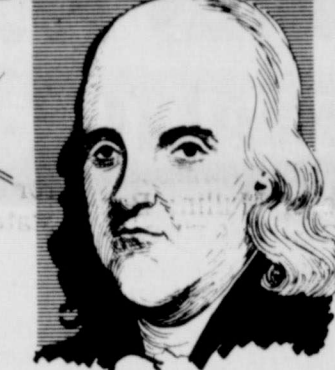

DISCOVERING PETRA, LOST CITY OF THE NABATAEANS

Imagine a lost city carved entirely out of living rock, hidden away for centuries within an encircling mountain fastness. Imagine yourself rediscovering, as a 19th century Swiss explorer once did, the haunting monumental remains of a world 2,000 years old.

Imagine Petra, Jordan's most tantalizing antiquity. Called by Julian Huxley "one of the starred attractions in the world museum of civilization," Petra was once the capital of the Nabataeans, an ancient Arab people who mysteriously emerged from the eastern deserts sometime during the fourth century B.C. They entrenched themselves in this remote valley, high in the mountains of southern Jordan, and remained there for five centuries.

As enterprising "protectors" of all caravans moving through their lands, the Nabataeans reigned over a powerful kingdom that extended from the Red Sea to Damascus. They were shrewd businessmen who attained great wealth and proceeded to develop a culture of refinement, with its own language and script, its own code of laws and monetary system. They were, also, skilled agricultural engineers, digging wells, building cisterns, and terracing the arid land to produce grain, fruit and vegetables for their people.

Most remarkable of all, however, was the city the Nabataeans created, painstakingly cutting multi-storied dwellings, huge temples, stately courts and tombs directly into the perpendicular sandstone cliffs that surrounded them. Well protected by the Siq, a narrow, winding defile that was (and still is) the only entrance into Petra, the Nabataeans reigned proud, prosperous and unafraid.



PETRA, Jordan—THE PERFECTLY PRESERVED "KHAZNEH" OR TREASURY is the crowning stronghold in the south Jordan mountains. The ancient city, which had been rock-cut by its Nabataean founders into the tombs and monuments of a death cult, was re-sculpted by the Romans into a marvel of classical architecture. Most ornate of all was the Treasury, so called because its finial dome is believed to contain a Pharaoh's hidden gold.

Then Roman rulers. In 106 A.D., the Romans finally succeeded in conquering the city (though only by cutting off its water supply from outside) and in breaking up the Nabataean kingdom. With Rome came its architecture that added many buildings during that period, including an amphitheater, a colonnaded street, an arch of triumph, and a temple which is the only free-standing building in the city today. The facades of existing Nabataean monuments, too, were quickly embellished with classical Roman ornamentation—Corinthian columns, angular pediments, niches filled with statues, elaborate finials, arches and windows.

Today, rugged as the everlasting hills themselves, the temples and tombs retain their grandeur, glowing in splendor with Petra's famous rose-red light. In his book, *The Antiquities of Jordan*, archaeologist Lankester Harding remarks that "Petra is everything that the travel agencies write about. . . I know nothing to equal the first sight of this huge rock-cut facade (the Khazneh) glowing in brilliant sunlight after one emerges from the darkness of the great cleft which leads into the city. I have visited Petra very many times now, but always that first, breath-taking vision remains in my mind; nor does familiarity breed contempt here, for at every visit one has to rein up the horse or stop in one's tracks and gaze astonished, as if seeing it again for the first time, at the sharpness and purity of line of the carving and the glowing brilliance of the rock."

Petra is three hours by car from Amman down the main desert highway, and then a half-hour further on horseback through the fabulous Siq. Petra can also be reached in six to eight hours over the scenic road that winds through the mountains of Moab. Many travelers find this route well worth the extra time, since it includes the opportunity to see the famous Byzantine mosaics in Madaba, Mt. Nebo where Moses died, and the majestic Crusader fortresses at Kerak and Shoubak.

Jordan is easily reached via the Arab Mideast's only scheduled air service from the United States. Operated jointly by ALIA, The Royal Jordanian Airline, and Syrianair, direct non-stop 747 flights depart New York's Kennedy International Airport for Amman, Jordan's capital, twice a week.

Homeowners In Cisco ISD Have Until July 16 To File For New Exemption

Homeowners in the Cisco ISD have until July 16 to take advantage of new exemptions passed recently by the state legislature. All homeowners, regardless of age, are eligible for an exemption of \$5,000 from the full market value of their home.

In addition, all persons who are 65 years old or older, or under a disability for purposes of payment of disability benefits under Federal Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance are also en-

titled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 from the market value of their residence homesteads for the purpose of school taxes.

To qualify for these exemptions for 1979, an application must be filed with the school district tax office on or before July 16, 1979. The exemptions cannot be granted for 1979 if filed after this date. The school tax office is located at 610 Avenue D. If you have any questions about the exemptions contact this office before deadline.

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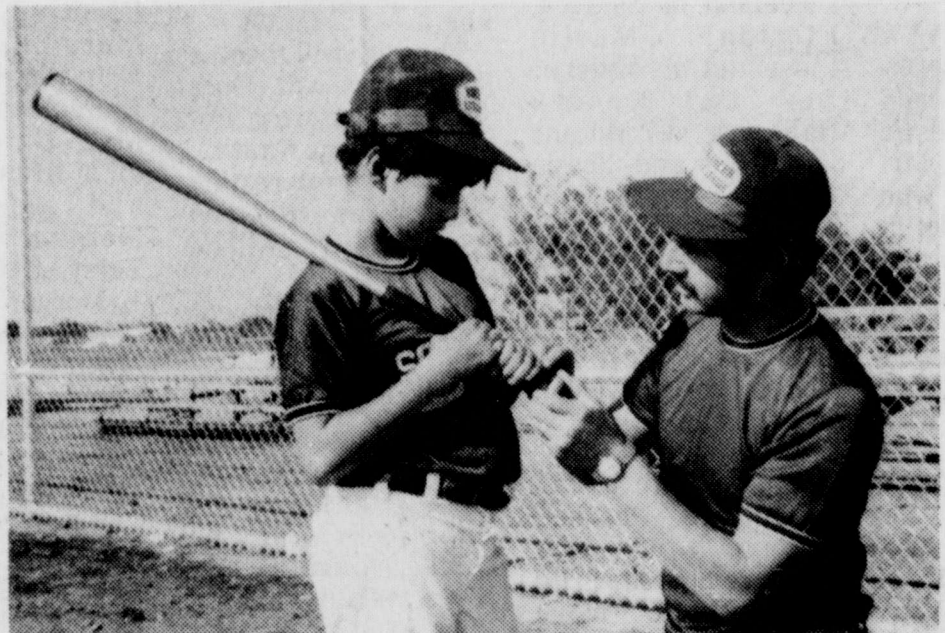
