**James Cotton  
Speaker At Lion  
Club Meet**

James Cotton, local photography studio owner, told members of the Cisco Lions Club that virtually all pictures made by amateur as well as professional photographers are with color film. He was the guest speaker at the weekly luncheon last Wednesday noon.

Mr. Cotton said that it is becoming pretty rare for someone to bring a roll of black and white film to his shop for developing. He traced the progress in photography from the 1903 model Kodak cameras to the present electronic camera. The film size has been reduced some 50 times from about 3 and one-half by 5 and one-half film to rolls that are a half inch wide with a depth of three fourths of an inch.

The most notable progress over the years has probably been made in film and in processing procedures, Mr. Cotton said. He showed Lions several cameras, including a 1902 model Kodak.

PA System**

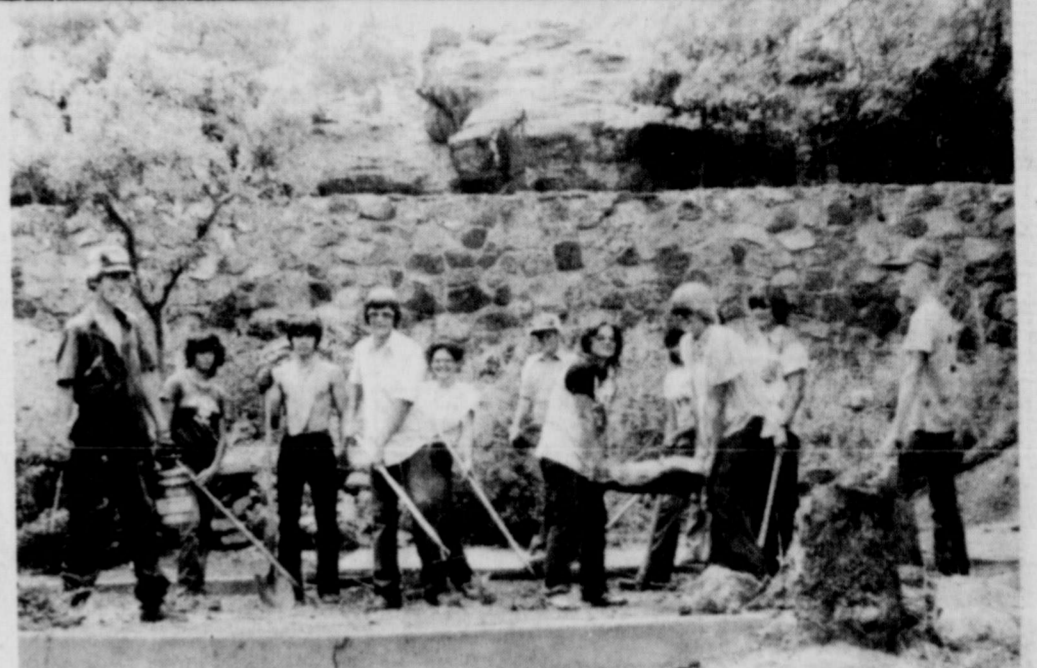

**Lone Star Requests New City Gate Rate**

Texas Railroad Commission Wednesday seeking to increase its authorized city gate rate to \$2.21 per Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas—a 15 percent increase in the city gate rate in effect December 1978.

If the request is granted, the company would realize an additional \$40.9 million in revenue annually.

"The increase is necessary," says Douglas W. Williams, senior vice president of Lone Star, "because of the sharply higher costs of buying gas in the field and the increase in the general costs associated

with operating any business." The city gate rate is the amount Lone Star Transmission Division charges the company's Distribution Division for gas delivered to residential and commercial customers and for distribution company-used and unaccounted-for gas. Transmission is the segment of the company that buys, cleans, stores and delivers gas to the cities.

The increase, based on the city gate rate in effect last December, is 29 cents per Mcf. The average residential customer's bill would increase approximately \$28

per year.

Lone Star's current city gate rate, established by the Railroad Commission in 1977 and based on a test year ending December 1975, allows Lone Star to recover only 85 percent of the increase in gas costs above \$1.1802.

As part of the application filed Wednesday, Lone Star is again requesting a 100 percent flow-through of gas purchase expense consistent with the rule-making request presently pending before the Railroad Commission. "As a result of the 85 percent flow-through restriction, Lone Star absorbed approximately \$13 million in gas

costs in 1978 alone," Williams says.

The proposed rate increase will only affect

residential and commercial customers.

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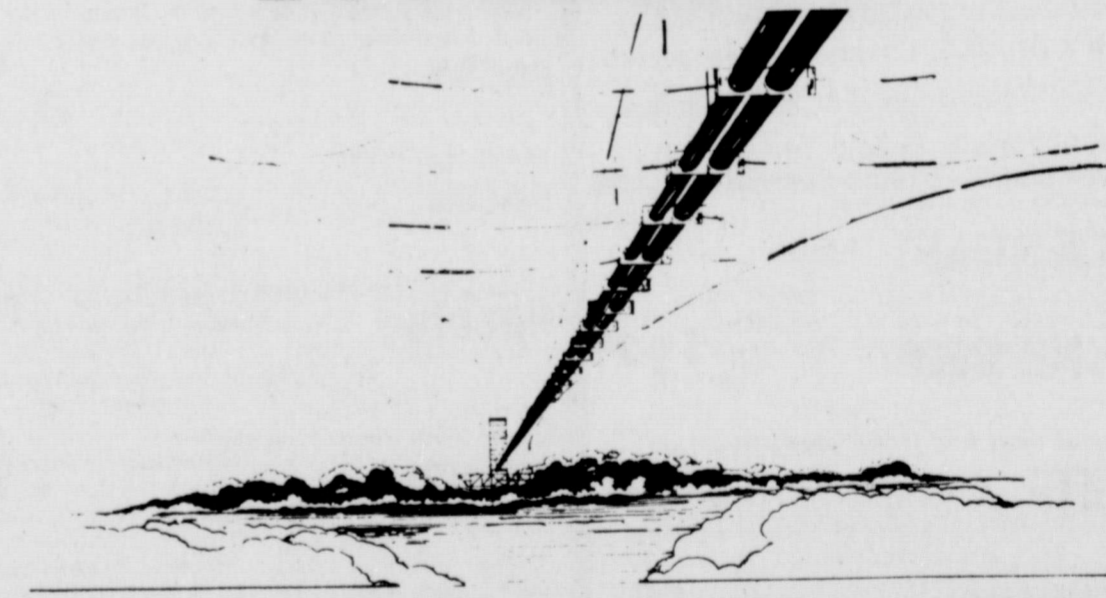

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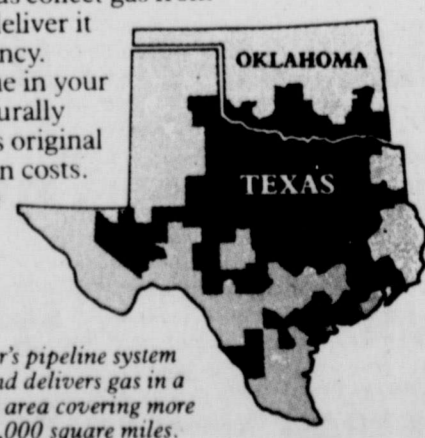

## R for your child's safety

Electricity is the lifeblood of many modern household appliances which can make a mother's job a little bit easier.

But, according to Dr. Albert H. Domm, child safety specialist and former medical director of the Prudential Insurance Co., that same electric current

can cause serious injury or even death for a curious toddler if precaution is not taken.

He urges all parents to inspect their homes for electrical danger spots and

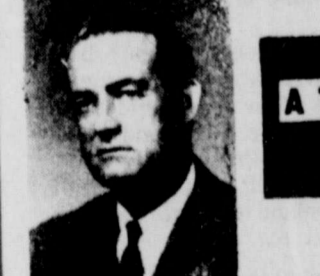
take prompt corrective action if any exist.

Dr. Domm suggests these safeguards: (1) Keep all electric outlets covered when not in use. Curious children can stick conductive objects into uncovered sockets. (2) Be sure you have no worn extension cords. (3) Place all electrical machinery and appliances out of the reach of toddlers. (4) Light switches, electrical appliances, or outlets should not be within reach of the bathtub.

"The bathtub requires special attention from parents since many electrical accidents take place there," he said. "Wet hands and feet increase the possibility of shock."

If such a mishap occurs, shut the current off immediately and remove the victim from the contact using a stick or gloves, but not bare-handed. Call an ambulance or doctor and administer artificial respiration until help arrives.

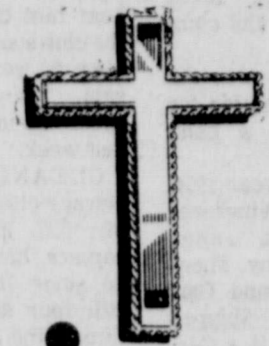

They wrote back, saying they needed one thing: A place for their 17-year-old son to attend college.

They said the Israelis had closed area colleges until they could have the history books revised.

So there was a flurry of letters between Texans and Arabs. . . .

Texas: "If you'll get him as far as New York City, we'll take care of the rest."

Arabs: "Please realize our son never has been more than 15 miles away from home. We have no fear of sending him to live with you, but we fear for his life while he's in New York City changing planes."

Texas: "Have no fear—we have friends in New York who will meet his plane and send him on to Texas."

"So," says Maples, "they sent the boy to live with us for two years. He commuted to Cisco and went to Cisco Junior College."

Early in his stay, he confided to the Mapleses the three things his father told him before leaving home:

"No. 1, when I get my education, I am to come back home; No. 2, don't marry an American girl; No. 3, don't come home

walking and talking like a cowboy."

The young man had a distant relative in Houston, so he went there for his junior year. He worked part time and saved enough money for a month-long trip home.

His own country delayed his entrance for two weeks of that month. His grandmother had a girl picked for him to marry, and he quarreled with her over that. He looked for a job and couldn't find one that paid as much as he made part time in Houston.

So he came back to Texas. And what of those three points his father made?

"The last time he came to see us," says Maples, "he was not going back home, he was becoming an American citizen. He had married an American girl. And he was wearing cowboy boots."

Sgt. Mathews

Since coming to Eastland ten years ago, Sergeant Jerry Mathews - with the State Department of Public Safety - has seen a lot of changes in the community. He saw the Freeway completed in Dec. 1971, giving a new dimension to travel in the area. Soon his Department will be working with changes in State Traffic Laws affecting the right-of-way on the Off and On ramps of that Freeway. Sgt. Mathews is concerned about the safety of local people in this transition period - until they grow accustomed to yielding the right-of-way to all those ramps.

"For one thing," he says, "On-coming traffic on the two-way service roads beside the Freeway will have to yield the right-of-way to cars making a left turn to enter the ramps. This is such a drastic change from the existing local laws that drivers are going to have to watch it carefully. I know this has been done a long time in the Metro-Plex and other large places, and the new law is designed to make regulations uniform all over the State. So it will probably be a good thing - when we get used to it."

"Of course we'll have new signs up by August 27th, when the law goes into effect."

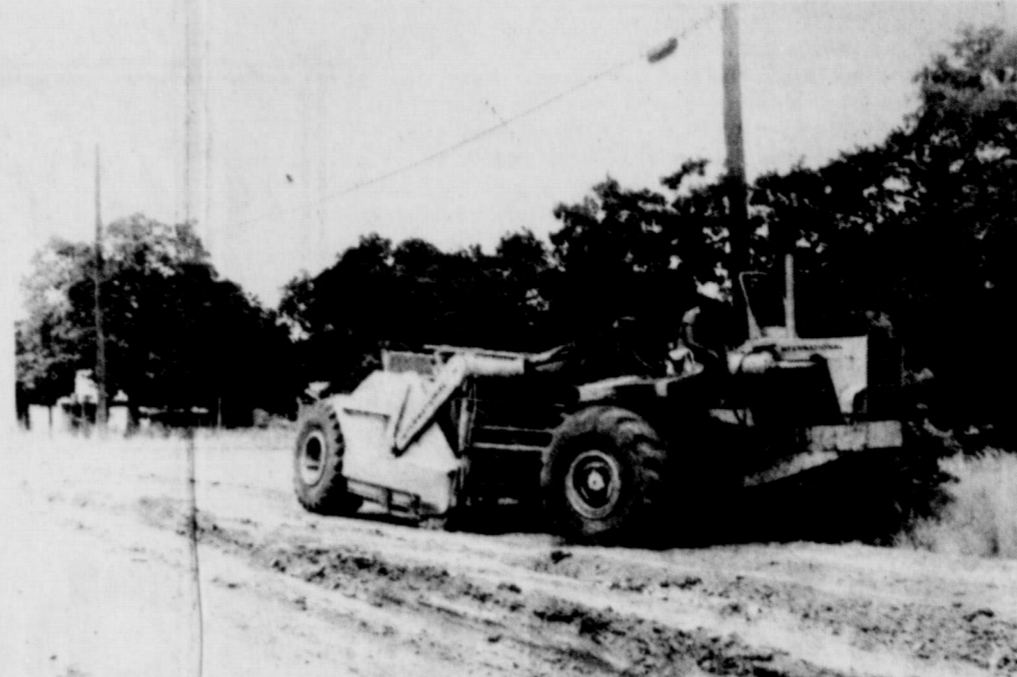
Sgt. Mathews, a clean-cut, personable individual, directs Traffic Law Enforcement in a territory including Eastland and Callahan Counties, with twelve Highway Patrolmen working under his jurisdiction.

"I have some of the finest men anywhere," he states. "They make my work much easier."

The Highway Patrolmen are primarily concerned with enforcing Traffic Laws in rural areas, although they have the authority to arrest a law-breaker anywhere in the State. The Freeway, with its fast-moving through traffic, occupies much of their time in this district. The D.P.S. is also in charge of the issuance of Driver's Licenses, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection, and Safety Education. Mathews feels that the Safety Education phase is extremely important.

"Any accident which can be prevented," he says, "Means less trouble, expense and tragedy for everyone. Nothing would please the D.P.S. more than to eliminate all of them! In Eastland County, most accidents are caused by speed and D.W.I. (Driving while intoxicated). In almost every accident there is a traffic violation involved. So when we stop someone on a violation before they are involved in an accident, there is a good chance we spared someone a bad situation."

## Josephine Cleveland And Carolyn Knippers Return From Trip Aboard

Mrs. C.M. Cleveland and Mrs. John Knippers (Carolyn Cleveland) returned August 1 from an extensive trip aboard. They were members of the team of 224 American and 15 Canadians who accompanied Evangelist Nora Sung Lam, better known in the Far East as Sung Neng-erh. The group led by Ms. Lam was the largest group of Americans since the severance of diplomatic relations between the U.S. and the ROC since January 1.

The team met in San Francisco and traveled via Honolulu, Tokyo, Okinawa to Taipei, Taiwan. They were welcomed by the mayor of Taipei and other government officials. A press conference was held and government officials expressed, "Our hearts are even closer to you now ever since last December 15 when President Carter announced the switch of diplomatic recognition from Taipei to Peking."

The team preceded to Kaohsiung, an eight hour bus ride to the southern part of the Island. Here they were met by Yun-Yung Wang, Mayor of Kaohsiung City and other officials. Escorted to the government headquarters for a welcoming ceremony, they later held a press conference.

In the large city of Kaohsiung, Evangelistic Nora Lam assisted by team members conducted two afternoon children's crusades at the Kaohsiung Municipal Stadium. Over 8,000 children and local pastors attended these children meetings. Tammy Harris, 12 year old recording artist from Ohio, was the featured soloist. Besides Ms. Lam's ministry to the children, the son and daughter of CBS President Pat Robinson, assisted in the presentation of a puppet show well received by the Taiwanese children. Hundreds of children responded to the Gospel message. Team members ministered among them and all present were presented a story book of the Bible by team members.

Rev. Nora Lam lead the group for the three nightly crusades in Kaohsiung. Attendance averaged over 12,000 nightly.

Chico Holiday, TV personality from Las Vegas, was the featured singer for the evening crusades.

All the services were nationally televised to the 17 million people in the Republic of China.

The team returned to Taipei then on to Tokyo, Hong Kong and Manila with final destination Honolulu. Services were conducted throughout the trip.

In Manila two nightly crusades were conducted with several thousand Filipinos in attendance.

While in Taipei Ms. Lam was given an interview with Vice-Premier Sun who now runs the day-to-day affairs of the government, assisted by a cabinet of mostly American educated Taiwanese.

Profiles of some of the members of the team are:

Rev. S.K. Sung, formerly an international businessman. For many years he was international director of the Full Gospel Businessmen's Fellowship and personally sponsored many evangelistic crusades in Hong Kong. He now travels and works full time with his wife in the evangelistic ministry.

Rev. Nora Lam fled from mainland China nine years after Communistic takeover, after having experienced cruel persecution under the regime. She is now President of the Nora Lam Ministries headquartered in San Jose, California. She is a frequent guest on many national television programs in the U.S. where she speaks out against the cruelty of communism. She conducts annual Gospel crusades in the Republic of China, has monthly Gospel telecasts entitled, "God's Power Today," a daily radio broadcast, a ministry of free Bible distribution and orphan care in the Republic of China. She is the author of FOR THOSE TEARS.

Dr. Ralph Wilkerson, another team member founded the Melodyland Christian Center in Anaheim, California, in 1960. He currently ministers to a Sunday attendance of over 12,000. Among the ministries of Melodyland School of Theology of which Dr. Wilkerson is Chancellor is Melodyland High School, Melodyland Drug Prevention Center and a Psychiatric Center. Dr. Wilkerson is also a well known television personality, author of several books, one the best-seller, BEYOND AND BACK. His recent travels have taken him to the Middle East where he met with Israel's Prime Minister Begin, Anwar Sedat of Egypt and King Hussein of Jordan.

Mr. Herb Ellinwood, also a team member, is presently Governor Reagan's campaign manager. A devout Christian he joined the team as a part of the evangelistic effort. He was educated at Yale University and later received a law degree from Stanford University. Mr. Ellinwood formerly visited the Republic of China in April 1979 and met with former President C.K. Yen, and Vice-Premier Y.S. Sun. He has become a spokesman in the U.S. on behalf of the Republic of China.

Mrs. Cleveland commented on the trip, "The main purpose and emphasis was to give out the Gospel to the peoples of the Far East. It was a privilege to be a part of the Gospel team. I saw by His Spirit that God is performing what man has called impossible.

The principal concern of people in the Republic of China was whether the U.S. would accede to the three conditions laid down by the Chinese Communists as the price of "normalization" of relations—derecognition of the Republic of China, abrogation of the 1954 mutual defense treaty, and withdrawal of U.S. forces from Taiwan. President Carter accepted these terms this past December.

Taipei newspapers follow avidly every rumor and signal reported from Washington. The people are naturally concerned, but so far there has been no sign of flight of either capital or talent from the island.

The government takes the position it will never negotiate with any communist regime. Because of bitter experiences of negotiating with the Chinese Communists four times in the past 55 years, it rejects any idea of negotiating with them a fifth time.

The Republic of China is under siege, a David facing a Goliath across the Taiwan Straits. What will happen in the future? No one knows, but as President Chiang told the Asian edition of the "Readers' Digest" in June 1978: "As to the question of our survival, I have always said our interests and those of America cannot be divided. If we stick together, both will benefit. If we go separate ways, both will suffer. In any case the Republic of China will persist."

What does harmony between far-away nations mean to us? How does it affect our lives? Mrs. Cleveland noted the CBS President recently asked such a question. Mrs. Cleveland feels that we could ask it, too.

"In all these critical world situations, Mrs. Cleveland stated, "First, I am filled with joy, because we see the return of our Lord Jesus Christ that much nearer, as critical world events line up with end-time prophecy.

Second, we see a tremendous opportunity before us to take part in the plan of the ages. Never before in history has the time been so ripe for mass evangelism, for cutting across national boundaries with the Gospel. God's timing is perfect—and He wants us to move forward."

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
