The Cisco Blood Drive Set For September 12

The Cisco Blood Drive has been set for Wednesday, September 12, at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. A team of laboratory technicians from Mary Meek Blood Bank of Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene will be present from 9 a.m.-3:30 p.m.

A joint organized program (the Lions

Club, Rotary Club, Cisco Civic League and the Cisco Service Club are sponsoring the blood drive on a rotating basis) the drive will be held every two months. Each Cisco citizen's effort is mandatory in order to make this a successful program.

In order to insure an adequate blood supply,

Cisco needs 40 pints of blood every two months. Cisco is, however, presently in debt to Mary Meek Blood Bank, 900 pints of blood. The Blood Drive Committee has therefore set its goal to collect 60 pints of blood, every two months to insure Cisco's adequate blood supply and replenish what we are already in debt for.

A blood insurance policy is available for those persons interested. For a pint of blood given, that donor's immediate family will be insured of having blood available to them for one full year. That donated pint of blood, however, will not count toward credit for Cisco. But for those persons interested in the insurance policy, perhaps at a later date, the donor can donate another pint of blood for credit for Cisco.

All types of blood are needed. There are no longer "paid" donors, except in the case of institutions using only the plasma from a pint of blood, so we must therefore depend on voluntary blood donations.

Blood donors should be aware of the following when preparing to give blood:

A) Age eligibility is from age 18-65.
B) No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood.
C) No medication, however, should be deleted without checking with the perspective donor's own doctor.
D) Any person who has been in Southeast Asia in the last three years should not donate blood.

dismissed at 2:30 p.m. each day. Kindergarten students will attend half-day sessions.

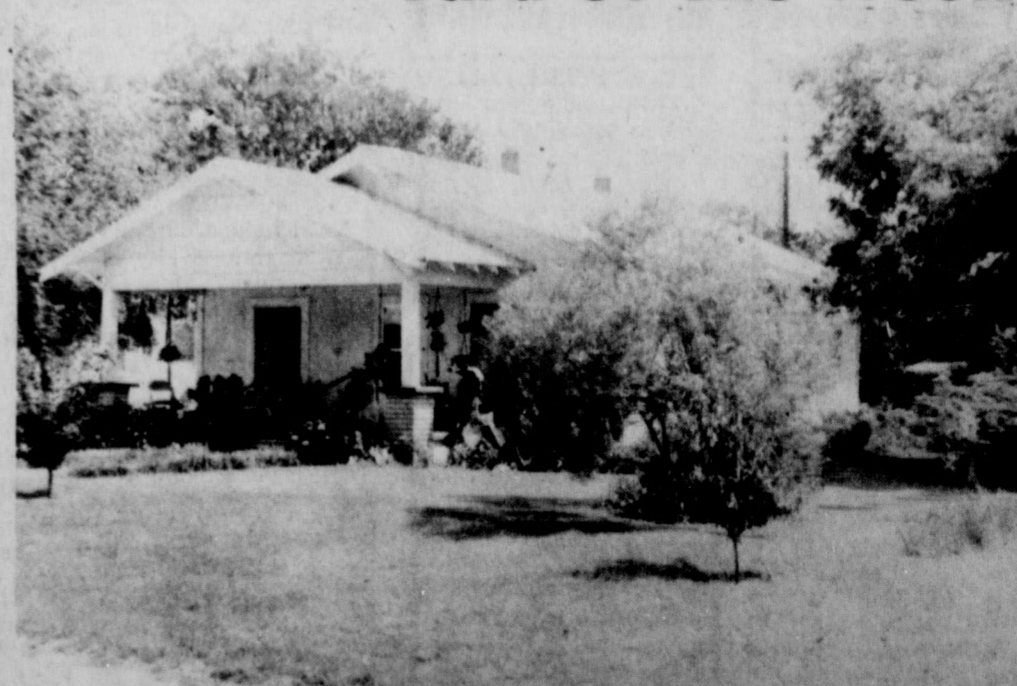

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Paul Ivie — Many Faceted Individual

In March of 1975 Paul Ivie carried a historical article he had written about the Reich School to the Cisco Press for consideration. He had attended this school, southwest of Cisco, as a child, and hated for its memory to fade away. Catherine Worthy, then Editor of the paper, found the article interesting, and published it.

This was the first of Paul Ivie's writing to be published, but other articles quickly followed. With favorable comments from people of the area to prod him on, he began work on another dream of his - to write articles about outdoor life for

publication in magazines, besides a lot of newspaper material.

Now, a little over four years later, he has had an article called "Bow and Arrow Turkey" published by the Texas Sportsman Magazine, and five other articles are pending with this magazine and The Texas Fisherman magazine. These cover the subjects of bow hunting, turkey calling, camouflage, campfire cooking, and how to save gasoline by using a motorcycle while hunting.

In all his writing Paul Ivie does not merely report, but seeks to interpret life, as he has seen it, with a sort of earthy wit and wisdom. Gems of



philosophical comment and penetrating description are scattered about. On his Grandfather, published in The Cisco Press: "Some people are born tired. Some people are born lazy. My old Granddaddy was born old." Or, about a favorite dog who saved Paul's brother in a fight with a rabid dog, and died later from catching disease: "To win is costly. You have to give of yourself to win any contest."

Until the time his first pieces came out, Paul had not spent a lot of time writing. He learned some technical details of the craft from a correspondence course he took while

recuperating from back surgery, but he had been too busy with work, hunting, and family and Church affairs to settle down to a typewriter. Paul's maternal Grandparents, named Frye, were pioneer settlers southwest of Cisco. Paul's father, W.R. Ivie, was also a native of the area. Of his Father, Paul comments in an article: "My father was a carpenter by trade and a newly ordained Minister (Baptist), neither of which was particularly noted for its rewards of richness..."

Paul was born in Strawn in 1916, but the family returned to a farm S.W. of Cisco when he was four years old. There

were six children in the Ivie family, and they helped with farm work while their father pastored rural Churches and did carpenter work. Paul has many memories of early days when two Uncles - Ray and Bill Frye-took him out to teach him about shooting, hunting, and campfire cooking.

"We were not shooting just for sport," he recalls, with a ready smile, and a twinkle in his blue eyes. "It was a necessity! We needed squirrel and rabbit to go with those red beans on the table."

"Uncle Bill Frye could cook the best campfire chicken I ever ate. He would swipe a chicken, clean it but leave on the feathers. Then he would cover it, inside and out, with wet clay, and let it cook slowly on the coals."

A few years later the family moved into Cisco, where Paul attended schools. There he liked football, track, and the Glee Club. During the worst of the Depression he dropped out of High School to work in a C.C.C. Camp in Wewoka, Oklahoma, for 18 months. When he returned to Cisco he was far behind in school, but Supt. O.L. Stamey permitted him to work in enough extra subjects to graduate with the class. He had the second highest grade of any boy in the class, and was given a track scholarship to a college in Oklahoma.

But he went to East Texas to work for the summer, and something happened which changed his plans. He met a pretty, dark-haired girl named Marie Smith, and decided that making a home for her was more important than anything else in the world. They were married in Kilgore, Texas in 1937.

Paul drove trucks in East Texas until World War II, then entered the Air Force. He served as an Aircraft mechanic at bases in Monroe, La., and Abilene. After the war he went to work as a Government hunter and trapper. He was stationed in Cottle County, Motley, County, and Scurry County, where he trapped coyotes and bobcats on ranches.

The family had children by this time, and Paul saw they would have to change schools too often if he stayed in this job. So he returned to Cisco in 1946, and went to work for Humble Pipe Line Co. Later he transferred into Production for the Company, where he found the work interesting. "But we still had to move some," he says. "We lived at Stamford, Avoca, Winters, Andrews, and Hobbs."

During these years they always spent vacation time outdoors, carrying along the four children when possible. They would set up camp in the Big Bend Central Texas, or the mountains of New Mexico or Colorado. Marie enjoyed these trips as much as Paul, and helped with the outdoor cooking. The couple learned to ride motorcycles, and used them for some of the trips.

When Paul started his 25th year with Humble (now Exxon), he had back surgery, and was advised to take early retirement. In 1971 he and Marie came back to Cisco. Eventually they located 80 acres N.E. of town, in a secluded, tree-rimmed area. The place had an old rock house needing remodeling, and Paul was equal to the job. He and Marie transformed it into an attractive, colorful home, with rustic touches from rock work, handcrafted items, and old wood. Two massive planks from old goat pens form an entranceway to the kitchen.

"Even with all the sanding and staining, for awhile we thought they still smelled like goats!" Marie laughs.

During this time the couple worked with their Church, the Eastside Baptist, where Paul taught a class and served as Assistant Supt. He drove a School Bus in Cisco for awhile, and now pumps an oil well and raises a flock of goats.

Several years ago Marie accepted a position as a cook for the Cisco Child Care Center. When the Center moved into a larger building on West 8th Street, Paul saw a lot of carpenter work and assorted jobs which needed doing. So he worked there, as a volunteer, for more than a year. When Exxon Company learned of his contributions in labor to the project, they matched it with a \$1,000 donation to the Center. Paul continues his interest

in the Center by serving on the Board of Directors, where he is Vice Chairman. He also gives some time to the local Writer's Group called "The Scribes and Scribblers". He served as Treasurer of this Club for several years, and at present is a nominee for Publicity Chairman. He says the biggest shock of his life came when he won second prize in the Poetry Category of a "Scribes and Scribblers" Contest! He took time out in 1978 for a night Course in Creative writing at Cisco Junior College, and plans to take a Course in Photography during this fall term.



Paul and Marie spend as much time with their children, five Grandchildren, and one Great-Grandchild as possible. Their daughter, Paula Marie of Dallas, is training in Southwestern Medical School for work with retarded children. Son Joe lives in Lubbock and works with refrigeration, and Marvin is a City Patrolman in Rising Star. The youngest son, Vaughn, is in the Navy and stationed in San Diego.

Paul has become extremely interested in bow hunting, an interest reflected in some of his articles. He says his greatest thrill was bringing down his first turkey with this challenging weapon. He uses an interesting bow of metal and fiberglass - an updated version of those used by the American Indian.

Cooking game is an important part of hunting, Paul says, and he comes up with aromatic concoctions such as Home Made Dutch Oven bisquits, cobblers, barbecue steaks on a gill, and special ways of fixing roasts and all kinds of game. He has unique recipe in which turkey is cut into thin strips and dipped in a batter of buttermilk and flour, and fried. This works well for other game, he adds.

Paul also has his own version of why he has been successful at writing.

"You see that College over there?" He points to Cisco Junior College, perched on a hill more than a mile S.W. of his home. "Well, that is southwest of me, and the prevailing winds here blow from the southwest. Some kind of 'smoarts' are blowing across me here, and I'm catching 'em as they come!"

His readers don't laugh it off as readily. They realize that he can express things others find hard to say. Take some portions from his piece called "Deer Hunting In The Guadalupe Mountains", in which he describes feelings when two large bucks appear:

"Eons of time faded...and I stood as my predecessors of hundreds of years earlier....I relived the struggles of all humanity there on that lonely mountain trail...."

After the deer got away, running down the mountain "like two meteorites falling from the sky", Paul's son Joe worked his way around and asked: "What was all that?"

Paul reports the ending of the scene. "That was the finale of a hunt through eternity," I solemnly answered.

This is a different drummer and a different beat for outdoor writing, but one which Editors and readers are certain to find engrossing. So Paul is bound to get more requests to cut his hunting and camping short, and Write about it.

Hints For The Aged & Handicapped

DEAR PAT--Many elderly persons have difficulty using keys because of lack of strength in their fingers so I would like to pass on several ideas to help them. Depending on which is the most suitable, a person

could: Have a piece of metal approximately 1/2 inch by 1 1/2 inch with rounded edges, riveted to the key. The metal is attached to the top part of the key, forming a "T" shape. By attaching this strip of

metal to the key, it greatly enhances a person's ability to "grasp" the key, and it also increases leverage (a person's ability to "turn" the key).

A piece of doweling through the hole in the key will also allow a person to grasp and turn the key easier.

Another method is to take two small square pieces of wood (approximately one-inch squares, and 1/8 inch thick). Place one on each side of the top part of the key and use a little screw to hold them together.

I think one of the ideas will also help individuals who are handicapped in some way and have only limited use or strength in the fingers or hands.--Ms. N.B., Indiana

DEAR PAT--Greyhound Bus Lines offers a wonderful program to the elderly and disabled called "Helping Hand". The company has a brochure giving detailed information about this

program which includes free transportation for an attendant (a medical certificate is required). There is no charge for guide dogs or wheelchairs.

Continental Trailways, which also requires a physician's letter for the individual who cannot travel without the aid of an attendant, has a Good Samaritan Plan similar to Greyhound's Helping Hand program.

Their fleet includes Silver Eagle Coaches that can transport motorized as well as manual wheelchairs. The company is also adapting and building terminals for easier access.

There are both wonderful aids in helping the elderly and handicapped travel either short or long distances. The only major drawback would be that the restrooms would be inaccessible to those who are more severely disabled so this
