## Area Complimented On Rabies Campaign

Cisco received compliments on efforts to combat rabies in a talk by Dr. Catherine Tull, veterinary for Region 4, Texas Health Department, with headquarters at Abilene, in a talk at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club last Wednesday noon.

Dr. Tull, who was introduced by Dr. Chief Brown, Cisco mayor and Lions program chairman for the day, suggested that Cisco and Eastland County's program of "preventing maintenance" was a good course of action. This program was launched in July after a rabid bat bit a high school girl here.

Dr. Tull reported that Eastland County has had nine cases of rabies this year -- one dog, one bat, one fox and four skunks. She

noted that attention to bats should be given at this time of the year as they are migrating to Mexico in September and October.

While in Cisco, Dr. Tull inspected the city dog pound and told city officials that it was a good one when compared with those in other cities. By adding some wiring and an outer perimeter fence, the Cisco pound would be outstanding, she added.

President Archie Chamness reported that Lions of area cities were endeavoring to complete the preparation of a program for the annual football game they are sponsoring in September between Cisco and Ranger teams at Breckenridge. Proceeds from the game benefit projects of the sponsoring cities.

In observing high school football over the past few years I have concluded that today's player might be a bit more dedicated than some of us who strapped on our gear in the 50's. Of course, we did have dedicated players in the 50's, too, but there were a lot of us who banged heads on Friday nights to impress the girls.

From what high school coaches tell me, girls nowadays are not so impressed with sweaty jerseys and cleats, so there is not as large a percentage of boys going out for football.

To tell the truth, I never really minded Friday nights — it was those days of preparation on the practice field, without fanfare, that boggled my mind. Still, if you had to be a football hero to get along with the beautiful girls, well... no matter how lean and fragile you were it was necessary to just gut it out.

**Congressional Comment**

**WASHINGTON, D.C.** — American lawmakers rule by the consent of the governed, and are limited in their power by what the people are willing to accept. The Congress can pass laws but unless the majority of citizens are willing to obey them, they will not be effective.

With this in mind, four months ago I voted against a gas rationing plan. At that time, the vast majority of Americans did not believe there was an energy shortage. Without the support of the people, it is my belief that the plan would not have worked. It is also my view that had we approved that plan we would now be under a rationing program.

The situation has changed drastically. The reduction in imports from Iran and the sagging domestic production, together with large price increases by OPEC, has caused many Americans to reevaluate our energy position. The ruler of Libya has threatened to shut off exports of oil. And Nigeria could use the oil weapon against us if they object to our African foreign policy, particularly in regard to the lifting of economic sanctions in Rhodesia. Some OPEC countries such as Algeria, Iraq, and Oman are radically anti-American and could cut off exports at any time. The political situation in the more moderate Arab states is potentially volatile. One of my colleagues in Congress recently said that "a couple of well aimed bullets in less stable oil-producing countries could radically change their now favorable posture towards the United States."


Since the Arab oil embargo of 1973, our situation has become increasingly vulnerable. Six years ago we imported 30 percent of our oil needs, now the figure is near 50 percent. If we have another embargo, there could be a tremendous fuel shortage. Our domestic production capacity would be unable to react in the short term and we would be faced with the choice of tremendous price increases or rationing.

In light of the current circumstances, I believe that a standby gas rationing plan is now advisable. There will always be a major debate on how to distribute gas equitably should rationing become necessary. We proved that in 22 hours on the House floor. Whatever plan is finally approved, it will be expensive and inefficient. Therefore a gas rationing plan should go into effect only when there is truly a national emergency. We have an effective trigger mechanism in the House-passed version. Congressman Phil Gramm of Texas was successful in including a provision which would require that the President find a 20 percent shortfall for 30 days or more, or evidence that such a shortfall is imminent. We only experienced a 7 percent shortage in our recent experience with the gasoline situation. Rationing then could be used only during a catastrophic shortage where our Nation has no viable alternatives.

Sometimes we must prepare for the worst in order that major disruptions in our society will not occur. Gas rationing at its best will have major defects. But in view of our highly vulnerable situation, we should have a plan available in case circumstances conspire to our disadvantage and our national defense is threatened.

## Whitewing Hunters - Know Your Doves

**Protected Birds** — (Which We See & Hunt)

**Legal Game Birds** — (Check Current Regulations)

**White-fronted Dove**  
 Slightly larger than white-winged dove with cinnamon-colored wing linings, rounded tail. Size and shape is similar to white-winged dove. Found in the Rio Grande Valley in only place in the United States where the mourning dove can be found. Common adjacent to brush areas and citrus groves. Generally found in single birds in flight flying low to ground (less than 10 feet off ground). Does not like to fly. Hunters should be very cautious in taking speck aim while hunting near brush areas and especially citrus groves.

**White-winged Dove**  
 Larger than a mourning dove with cinnamon-colored wing linings and a long, moderately rounded tail. Found in the Rio Grande Valley in only place in the United States where the mourning dove can be found. Common adjacent to brush areas and citrus groves. Scattered numbers may be found throughout Valley.

**Rock Dove**  
 Better known as the domestic pigeon which is common in cities and around houses. Large in size and varies in color from gray, brown, to all white. All have white wing patch. They generally fly in flocks and do not readily mix with other wild birds. It is an introduced species and is often raised by individuals as a hobby variety of racing and fancy pigeons.

**Red-billed Pigeon**  
 Similar in size to the domestic pigeon. Bluish gray to purple in color. Bill is reddish. Occasional in Rio Grande Valley but can be found occasionally near larger brush tracts adjacent to Rio Grande. Will fly with whitewings.

**Inca Dove and Ground Dove**  
 Small birds, approximately half the size of a mourning dove. Both are gray and fly close to the ground with rapid wingbeats. The inca has a waxy appearance with a long tail that has white margins. Ground dove has a short, round tail. Both are common throughout the Rio Grande Valley.

**Mourning Dove**  
 Slightly smaller than white-winged dove with long pointed tail. Generally seen in flights of one or two birds. May mix with flights of white-wings but can be easily distinguished by its more rapid wing beat. Flight path and general tail. Common throughout Valley with larger concentrations in brush areas and citrus groves.

**Remember, all birds except starlings, English sparrows, grackles, ravens, red-winged blackbirds, cowbirds and crows are protected under state law and the fine for shooting a protected bird can be from \$10 to \$200 per bird. Check federal laws for additional regulations.**





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# Red Cross Has 'Lamb' Image Here

There are countless untold stories among the residents of the Nursing Homes of this area - residents who have contributed much to community life. One of these is Mrs. Carl (Kathleen) Lamb, of Eastland Manor, who was

Executive Secretary of the Eastland County Red Cross Chapter from 1961 to 1975. Actually Mrs. Lamb had worked for a volunteer for the Red Cross long before this time, rolling bandages and doing assorted tasks during World War I and the Korean conflict. Her work

during the 1960's continued to be heavily involved with Military personnel, and she received and made phone calls from all over the country. "Out of the United States we had to use wireless," she recalls. Although the Red Cross has

had a mixed image in some places, it has always been highly regarded in Eastland County. This is partly because this area has been favored with fine Directors and volunteers, and support from local business people. But undoubtedly the support for charitable projects in

Eastland County actually begins with a religious concept of the brotherhood of man, an idea which reaches out of the Churches into all worthwhile organizations. The local Red Cross Chapter receives contributions through the annual United Fund Drive. The present Director of the Red Cross is Roy Cartee, Cisco, and the Officers include Grover Hallmark of Eastland as Treasurer. All the present officers work for no salary, on a volunteer basis.

The Red Cross idea was brought to America in 1881 by Clara Barton, who added the beginnings of an organized volunteer disaster relief program. And the organization has been helping victims of disaster and displacements since, beginning with the Michigan Forest Fires of 1881 to the recent accident at Three Mile Island. In 1978 the area Chapters assisted with flood relief in Albany and Graham. In April of this year workers rushed to Wichita Falls after the destructive tornado.

tary personnel. There was bandage rolling, kitting, and volunteers for hospitals and other needs. Since Doctors were in short supply, many people took First-Aid courses in order to cope with emergencies.

"There were so many Eastland County volunteers," one person remarks. "That you really can't name them all. They worked on a seven-day-per-week basis when needed. It was a sad time, yet in a way it was happy time. For our country was really united in the war effort - not divided like we are sometimes now."

During this time Kathleen Lamb, a Grade School teacher in the Cisco schools, began donating spare time to the local Chapter. She and her husband, Carl, had moved to Cisco from Hamlin, where they had met. They worked in Cisco with the First Christian Church, and were involved in community affairs. Later Carl became a County Commissioner in Eastland County.

The Red Cross work continued to involve much of Mrs. Lamb's time. Then came the Korean War, with its reproduction of peril, bravery, and suffering.

In 1961 Mrs. Kenneth Jameson, Executive Secretary, retired from the County Chapter, and Mrs. Lamb began her direction of the work. The early '60's began in a rather routine fashion. Mrs. Lamb spent half-days in the Red Cross Office in the County Courthouse, where she cared for business. But there were other phones in her home in Cisco, so she could be contacted while out of the office. After the war began in Viet Nam, they rang at all hours - day and night. For it was just as possible to get killed or wounded in an undeclared war as a declared one.

tions involving soldiers from Eastland County, and to arrange for special leaves at times. A death or illness in the family led to special requests.

"Of course these kids wanted to come home," Mrs. Lamb smiles, her brown eyes gentle with thought. "I always checked out every request - helped all of them I could."

I really cared for my work, but there was one thing which upset me. That was the hard part - having to locate families to tell them their sons had been killed or wounded in battle. Some of the families, especially in the country, didn't have phones or a means to be reached quickly by telegraph. If the Military was in doubt about it, they called me, and went out by car. It was a hard message to take."

As the war in Viet Nam ended, the work for the Military lessened. Mrs. Lamb closed the office in the courthouse, and operated from her home. Then the death of her husband and her own health made it advisable for her to give up the Red Cross position. She was thankful that an experienced person, Roy Cartee of Cisco, could take the post.

Mrs. Lamb had no children of her own to serve in the wars during which she worked for the Red Cross. Perhaps, in a way, these young people whom she helped partially took the place of the sons she never had. Now she thinks of them the young, eager, dedicated, and sometimes frightened and sorrowful boys who passed through her life. There is a lot of time to remember, there on long afternoons in the Nursing Home. She sums it all up:

"I miss my work - being able to help people. But I hope there will never be any more wars - no more need for some of the things. I did."

It was Mrs. Lamb's job to verify all emergency situa-

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

## OBSERVATIONS FROM... The River Road

Just before 3:00 p.m. on July 31st of this year unusually dark skies settled over Silver City, New Mexico. The residents of Silver City—an attractive town perched between mountains and dry rangeland to the south—supposed they were in for a typical mountain shower. But suddenly a large tornado began twisting and dropping from the overcast about three miles south.

After that an incredible story unfolded, as relayed to me by a sister who lives near the town. Her account was enhanced by clippings from the local newspaper. It seems that the police and the Grant County Sheriff's office were quickly beset by ringing phones and plenty of work. For the police had to investigate a "fender bender" on Ridge Road, where heavy traffic caused a minor traffic jam. But were the people trying to run from the tornado, as many people did in Wichita Falls this April? No, indeed. The people of Silver City were trying to run to the tornado! For most of the 10,000 residents of this town had never seen a tornado before, and wanted a better look at it!

A man at a golf course had just finished playing fifteen holes when he and his partners spotted the tornado coming their way. They forgot about the last three holes! Elsewhere, a Mrs. Boyd was taking a nap when her husband called her from work in Silver City. She dashed outside and spotted the twister nearby their home.

"The stupid thing went right over my head, and you wouldn't believe the pictures I missed!" she reported. The camera was at the repair shop, and I was so mad I wasn't even afraid."

While three other dogs dashed under the mobile home for cover, Mrs. Boyd watched the show while holding her toy poodle.

"It looked like white fire at first," she said. "It looked like fire on the tip of the tail."

Another resident of southern Silver City described what he saw and heard. "When I looked (after the tornado was gone) there wasn't anything where it hit," he said. "It took all the grass and juniper trees. It just sucked everything up."

"The funnel was nearly over me, but the stinger was across the canyon. It made a loud sound like a 'screaming jet', but the air around me was dead still."

The stinger was on the ground only about ten minutes, but the funnel lasted for over half an hour, until it receded as a small white tail.

In the meanwhile a vacationing family from Fort Worth—the T.D. Hortons—were driving up the road from Deming. They knew full well what a tornado looked like, and what one could

do. "Yes, we were astonished!" Mrs. Horton said. "There was nothing on the radio about it, yet there it was—right in front of us. We were alarmed more than anyone else."

They sought shelter in the Grant County Courthouse, shocked that Silver City residents just "stood and looked at it like it was a rainbow."

"We told people at the bank—'There's a tornado outside! But people were just wandering around, like it was a beautiful day.'"

After the tornado receded, the Hortons called the local newspaper for a weather forecast before continuing their trip to Albuquerque.

If ever there was a story which made a point for enlightenment, this would have to be it! The people of Silver City were not informed about tornadoes, for they had never experienced them. Scientists have lengthy explanations as to why tornadoes cannot form in this mountainous area. So people had not bothered to learn about them.

But life is not like that. It does not abide by the rules men lay down. Tornadoes do appear where they are not supposed to. So do floods, and various other uninvited guests. And people are not robots under our control. Sometimes they react in unaccountable ways.

So it pays to be informed not only about matters which we think will touch our lives, but a whole host of things affecting other people. Most importantly, we need to be spiritually enlightened, so we will not rush to every new and exciting and deadly thing which appears on the horizon.

# Cisco Blood Drive Set September 12

The Cisco Blood Drive has been set for **Wednesday, September 12**, at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. A team of laboratory technicians from Mary Meek Blood Bank of Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene will be present from 9 a.m.-3:30 p.m.

A joint organized program (the Lions Club, Rotary Club, Cisco Civic League and the Cisco Service Club are sponsoring the blood drive on a rotating basis) the drive will be held every two months. Each Cisco citizen's effort is mandatory in order to make this a successful program.

In order to insure an adequate blood supply,

Cisco needs 40 pints of blood every two months. Cisco is, however, presently in debt to Mary Meek Blood Bank, 900 pints of blood. The Blood Drive Committee has therefore set its goal to collect 60 pints of blood, every two months to insure Cisco's adequate blood supply and replenish what we are already in debt for.

A blood insurance policy is available for those persons interested. For a pint of blood given, that donor's immediate family will be insured of having blood available to them for one full year. That donated pint of blood, however, will not count toward credit for Cisco. But for those persons interested in the insurance policy, perhaps at a later date, the donor can donate another pint of blood for credit for Cisco.

All types of blood are needed. There are no longer "paid" donors, except in the case of institutions using only the plasma from a pint of blood, so we must therefore depend on voluntary blood donations.

Blood donors should be aware of the following when preparing to give blood:

- A) Age eligibility is from age 18-65.
- B) No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood.
- C) No medication, however, should be deleted without checking with the perspective donor's own doctor.
- D) Any person who has been in Southeast Asia in the last three years

should not donate blood.

E) A woman who has menstruated in the last three or four days prior to donating blood, or six weeks after pregnancy, should not donate blood.

F) Any person who has been sick or has had a cold within the last seven days prior to donating blood should not donate blood.

G) Persons can donate blood every two or three months with no foreseen problems; although, it is hopeful to not have to call on the same donors nearly this often.

Pledge cards are available throughout the community through club members, at businesses and industries, The Cisco Press, Cisco Junior College, churches and Cisco individuals.

Pledge cards should be filled out and left at that same location to be picked up before the blood drive.

A telephone committee will call prospective donors to verify their pledge. Appointments will be made afterwards, for donors, so that they should not have to wait any longer than necessary. Drop-in donors will also be welcomed.


