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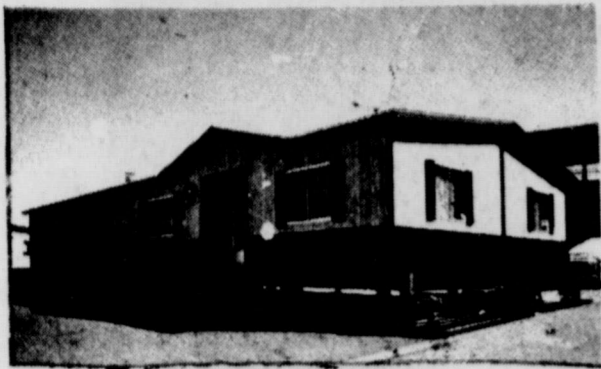

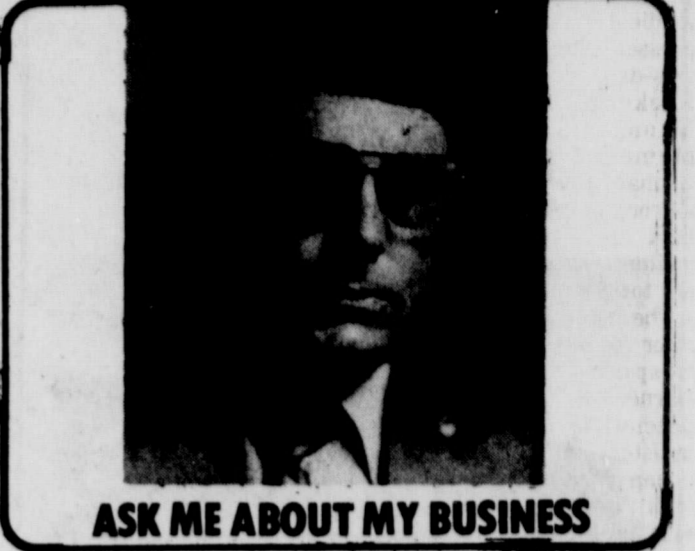

A-1 Answering Service Announces 'Auto-Dial'

A-1 Answering Service of Eastland, through an ad in Eastland, Ranger and Cisco papers, has announced a new

service to its customers in the Eastland County area. F. James Dabney, owner of the firm, stated Sunday that

persons subscribing to the service will soon be able to be in touch with their office by means of a small paging unit, about the size of a package of cigarettes and carried on the person's belt, or in the shirt pocket. Range on the pager will be

approximately 60 miles. Dabney said, by the use of towers and antennae already in use in Abilene, Weatherford, Fort Worth, Dallas, Mineral Wells and Stephenville. The Eastland antenna will be located on top of Ball Oilfield Service's tower near

Morton Valley, and will interconnect with other towers and antennae within a sixty-mile range by a relay system. In order to do this, Dabney said, "you merely dial A-1 Answering Service's number and give the pager number to

the operator. The dispatcher will then log the call and relay your message by means of a tone encoder to the person carrying the pager. The subscriber then calls the answering service in Eastland for the message." There will be several types

of pagers available -- some with beeper tones only, and others with tone and voice, Dabney said. The system will be operational within 10 days, as soon as engineers complete the antenna instal-

lation at Ball's tower according to Dabney.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would: —Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and —Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years. A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

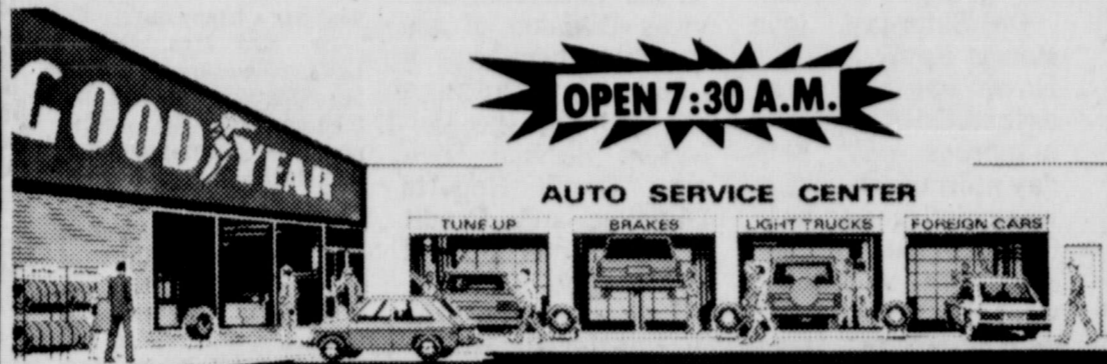
the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

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OBSERVATIONS FROM

The River Road

While writing the article on alcoholism last week I read a number of booklets on the care and treatment of persons who are victims of alcohol. Most of these impressed me as being excellent, with only a few cutting against any ingrained common sense I may have. God knows we have a number of experts on various subjects these days, and a fair share of them make public appearances in the southwest. The problem I have found with experts is that sometimes they become a bit patronizing, especially if their knowledge is academic rather than experiential.

I did object to a part of one booklet which presumed that some parents might want their children to drink, so should teach them how to drink "properly." But my greatest challenge came while reading remarks buried along in one book which was telling the family of an alcoholic how to deal with him. An alcoholic, according to the author, sometimes behaves like a "little god." The author continues: "The wife has every moral right and responsibility to refuse to act as if her husband were God Almighty, whose every wish and commandment she must obey."

I understand the point the author is trying to make. But the manner in which he refers to God is a sickening portrayal. This concept, of the arbitrary, the thunder-and-lightening Old Man In The Sky God is very common. Doesn't television usually picture him that way - huge, and ancient, booming remarks through the atmosphere? An unreasonable Old Man, too. Expects to hand down rules from the Olympian Heights and humans to obey them just because He says so. And if they don't toe the mark, he will punish them.

This is an interesting concept, and a very old one. The first recording of it - if we are to believe the Bible at all - was found in a Place at the center of the Universe. There a rebellious Being, burning with spite and

jealously, began to question the government of God. Unfair, he said. God was forcing all His creatures to obey His rules, without giving them any choice. He, Lucifer, could run things a lot better!

Obviously Lucifer was given freedom to choose the way he wanted to go. Does God give man this same freedom of choice? One look at the world in which we live provides a quick answer. God not only gives man freedom of choice, but He does so even when He knows this will be very costly. But to do any less would turn man into a mechanical being.

So the utilization of Mind Control - that's the tool of another force, not the method of God. And the really sad thing about alcohol and drugs is that they unseat the will of person who uses them, so he is no longer capable of a rational choice.

So what is God like? Who can totally fathom that mystery? But we have wonderful glimpses: the Good Shepherd, out searching for the one lost sheep. The sorrowful father, watching for the prodigal son. A Parent, interested in the daily bread of His offspring. A Father, providing a garment of righteousness for His needy children. A dying Christ, whose ideas of peace, love, mercy, faith and truth were far ahead of their time on this earth. They still are, but we can lay hold of bits and pieces of them, even in our weakness. For higher than the highest human thought can reach is God's plan for His children. This is for them to be restored in His own image, of their own free choice, so they can demonstrate his love and mercy to a world which needs these qualities very, very much.

God laws and rules? They are given for the protection of His children, as an extension of love. They can be followed only by the principle of love. For there can be no more selfish, rebellious beings inhabiting a Universe where all is planned to be peace and joy.

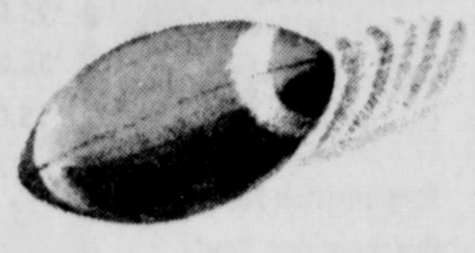

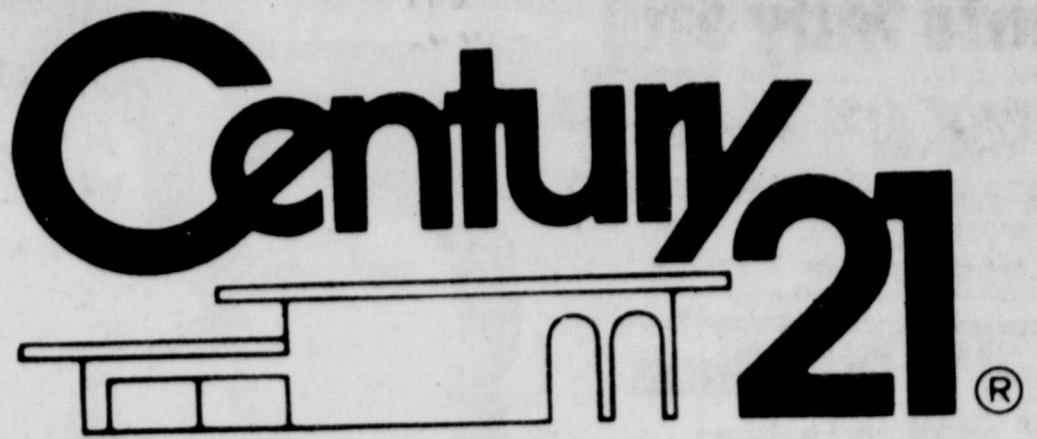

Texas Cracks Down On 55 MPH and Truck Weight Violations

State agencies responsible for enforcement of truck weight laws and the 55 mile-per-hour speed limit in Texas have announced a crackdown on violators. The stepped up enforcement efforts are in response to warnings from Federal Highway Administrator Karl Bowers that Texas could lose some \$50 million in federal highway funds. Bowers advised Governor Bill Clements that "marginal" enforcement of truck weight laws may prompt the feds to withhold \$42 million in highway funds...and that "inadequate" enforcement of the 55 mile-per-hour speed limit might cost the state another \$8 million in highway funds.

The tough enforcement campaign against violators of the state's truck weight limits was announced by Railroad Commission member Jim Nugent. Nugent said the joint effort would include the Railroad Commission, Texas Department of Public Safety, and Attorney General's Office. Nugent indicated primary targets would be overloaded sand and gravel trucks and pits where trucks are loaded. Nugent cited cancellation of permits by the Railroad Commission, injunctions and suits against truckers and pit operators by the Attorney General's Office, and tickets issued by DPS among the "enforcement tools." Policies already in effect by the State Board of Control and State Department of

Highways and Public Transportation preclude payment for any load of highway construction material in excess of the 80,000-pound maximum weight limit. Last year, DPS officers wrote 51,066 tickets for overweight or oversized trucks. DPS has 156 troopers assigned to enforcement of truck weights, with 30 additional troopers authorized by the legislature. The DPS troopers have 133 portable scales and four permanent scales located at Victoria, Falfurrias, and Spring just north of Houston. Governor Clements also called on the DPS to step up efforts to enforce the 55 mile-per-hour speed limit.

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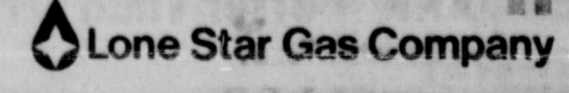
