After seven years as the local preacher for the Church of Christ in Cisco, Brother J.B. Hudson is retiring from full time pulpit duties. When he and his wife, Bea, moved to Cisco from Pecos in 1972 it was their intention to one day retire to Pecos, Texas. The Church of Christ in Roscoe intended then to provide a "permanent home" for the Hudsons upon their retirement and to keep them busy on a limited basis in several phases of the Lord's work. Their new home has now been completed; J.B. and Bea are, in a sense, going back home!

Even though they are to be replaced in Cisco by a lovely family (see article elsewhere in this newspaper), the Hudsons are going to be sorely missed. They have endeared themselves to every segment and every age group in the local congregation. Their love for the Truth and firmness in standing for their convictions have earned for them the highest respect of all who know them. Love, care and concern have always characterized J.B.'s preaching. This has caused him to be used extensively in preaching in gospel meetings and in personal counselling throughout all of his years of labor. The quietness and gentleness of "the big man with the white hair and big hands" have drawn people, young and old, to him

Lobos Defeated By Early Longhorns In 21-15 Battle

The Lobos of Cisco High School were defeated here Friday night by the Early Longhorns in a 21-15 non-conference battle. Cisco's record drops to 1-3, while Early is now 1-1-1.

Cisco will have an open date this coming Friday and will begin district play on October 12 against the Bulldogs in Clyde.

The Longhorns got on the scoreboard first in Friday night's game and were leading at half-time 13 to 7. They added to their lead in the third quarter but were unable to score any points in the final quarter.

The Lobos made their points in the second and fourth quarters being unable

to score in the first or third. In the final quarter they drove to Early's four yard line but failed to make a touchdown.

Cisco took the opening kick-off, but had to punt to Early on fourth down after gaining only six yards against the Longhorn defense. Cisco's Chuck Cannistraci got a good kick to Early's 20 yard line where Longhorn James Adams ran it back to the 32 before being tackled.

Early proceeded, on their first possession of the night, to move the ball downfield for a touchdown. Early quarterback Donnie Johnson utilized the yard-gaining abilities of Taylor Duffer and Adams to make four

first downs and a touchdown in 18 plays. Johnson scored on a one-yard run with 3:13 left in the first quarter to put Early on the scoreboard. The PAT kick by Bart Powell was good making the score 7 to 0.

In the second quarter, Cisco fielded a punt on the 50 yard line setting up their first scoring drive. An incomplete pass and a quarterback sack in the first two plays had Cisco in a bad situation: third down and 18 yards to go. A lateral pass from quarterback Barton Philpott to Forrest Starr who then pitched the ball to Donnie Worley got three yards and a pass to Ronnie Eudy moved the ball to Early's 21 yard line. A handoff to Worley for nine yards followed by a pass to Starr moved the ball to the 10 yard line. A handoff to Worley lost two yards, but on the next play a 12 yard pass to Cannistraci gave Cisco its first points of the game. The PAT kick by Jimmy Elrod was good tying the score at 7 to 7 with 4:23 left in the first half.

With less than a minute and a half to play in the second quarter, Early recovered a Philpott fumble at Cisco's 28 yard line. Early quarterback Johnson moved the ball downfield with runs by Duffer and Adams in four plays setting the ball on Cisco's 11 yard line. A Johnson pass to Mike Ledson got the touchdown with 19 seconds left in the half. The PAT kick bounced off the goal-post crossbar making the score 13 to 7 at half-time.

In the third quarter Early got their final score of the night when Cisco was forced to punt from deep in their own territory. Early started their drive from Cisco's 30 yard line. Adams and Duffer moved the ball downfield to Cisco's one yard line. A handoff from Johnson to Duffer got the touchdown and a two-point conversion pass to Adams made the score 21 to 7 with 7:01 left in the third quarter.

Late in the third quarter, Cisco began its final scoring drive from its own 28 yard line. A Philpott pass to Eudy moved the ball to mid-field. A pass to

Starr netted five more yards. Another pass, this time to Cannistraci, moved the ball to Early's 35 yard line as the third quarter ended. On the next play Philpott was sacked for a nine yard loss, but he came back with a pass to Cannistraci for the touchdown. Cisco's Starr took the PAT snap from the center and threw a pass to Eudy in the end zone for two extra points making the score 21 to 15 with 11:01 left in the game.

With less than five minutes left, Cisco got possession of the ball at its own 20 yard line and made a final threat in the game. Handoffs to Worley and Gary Speegle, as well as passes to Eudy, Cannistraci and Starr, combined with three penalties against Early, moved the ball downfield in 14 plays with six first downs to Early's four yard line. Philpott handed off to Speegle for no gain. He then threw two incomplete passes and handed off to Worley on fourth down, but Early forced him out of bounds ending Cisco's threat three yards short of the goal with 1:30 left in the game.

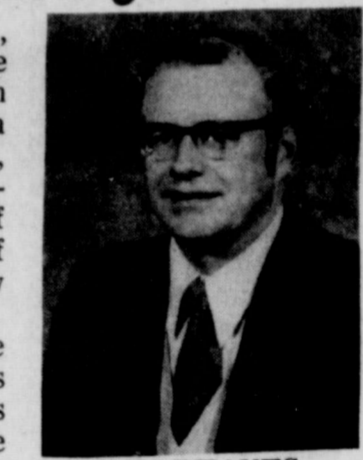

Arms symbolise strength and security



Extract from the Letters Patent granting Arms to the Sussex Police Authority.
By virtue of the terms of the Sussex Police (Amalgamation) Order 1967, made upon January 19, 1967 by His Majesty's Secretary of State for Home Affairs under and by virtue of the Police Act 1966, the police area consisting of the administrative County of East and West Sussex and the County Boroughs of Brighton, Eastbourne, and Hastings were on January 1, 1968 amalgamated for police purposes and constituted a combined Police Area and by the same constituent Authorities and the Order a combined Police Authority was established for the said Body Corporate by the name of the Sussex Police Authority.
On September 30, 1968, the late Duke of Norfolk, who at that time was Chairman of the Sussex Police Authority, and by virtue of his office as Earl Marshal of England signed a warrant authorizing the grant of Arms to the Sussex Police Authority.
The Arms were designed and depicted by the College of Arms as "A shield divided between five quarters, the upper quarters being blue and the lower quarters being white, the shield being encircled by a wreath of oak leaves and the shield being surmounted by a crown." The Arms were taken from the Arms of West Sussex granted in 1892 because the Arms attributed to the Sussex Kingdom of Sussex had a blue shield.



England Constable Presents Emory Walton With Shield Of Chief Of Sussex Police

At a meeting of the Eastland County Law Enforcement Officer's Association Deputy Constable Peter Patching of Sussex County, England, and Paul Thaxter of Surrey County, England were special guests of Judge M.D. Underwood from Ranger. Constable Patching is visiting the United States as an exchange law enforcement officer and he and Mr. Thaxter are visiting in the

home of Jack Veal of Ranger whom they had met in England while Mr. Veal was there on assignment with his company. Constable Patching brought with him and hand painted shield of the crest of the Chief Constable of Sussex Police which he stated he wanted to present to the "top cop" of the county and presented it to Criminal District Attorney, Emory C. Walton, who accepted it on Constable Patching explained that a county in England is equivalent in government statute to a state here in America and that the Chief Constable is appointed by the Queen.

Mr Thaxter commented they were really over here to check on the colonies but when shown a copy of the Declaration of Independence

dated July 4, 1776, he stated, "Oh yes, that's the day we gave it back to them". Both men commented on the hospitality shown to them by all the officials and citizens in Eastland County with whom they had come in contact with.

A special tribute and recognition was given to Mrs. L.E. (Lefty) Sublett and Jim Sublett who was the wife and son of the late Sheriff Lefty Sublett. President Kenneth Rose presided at the meeting.

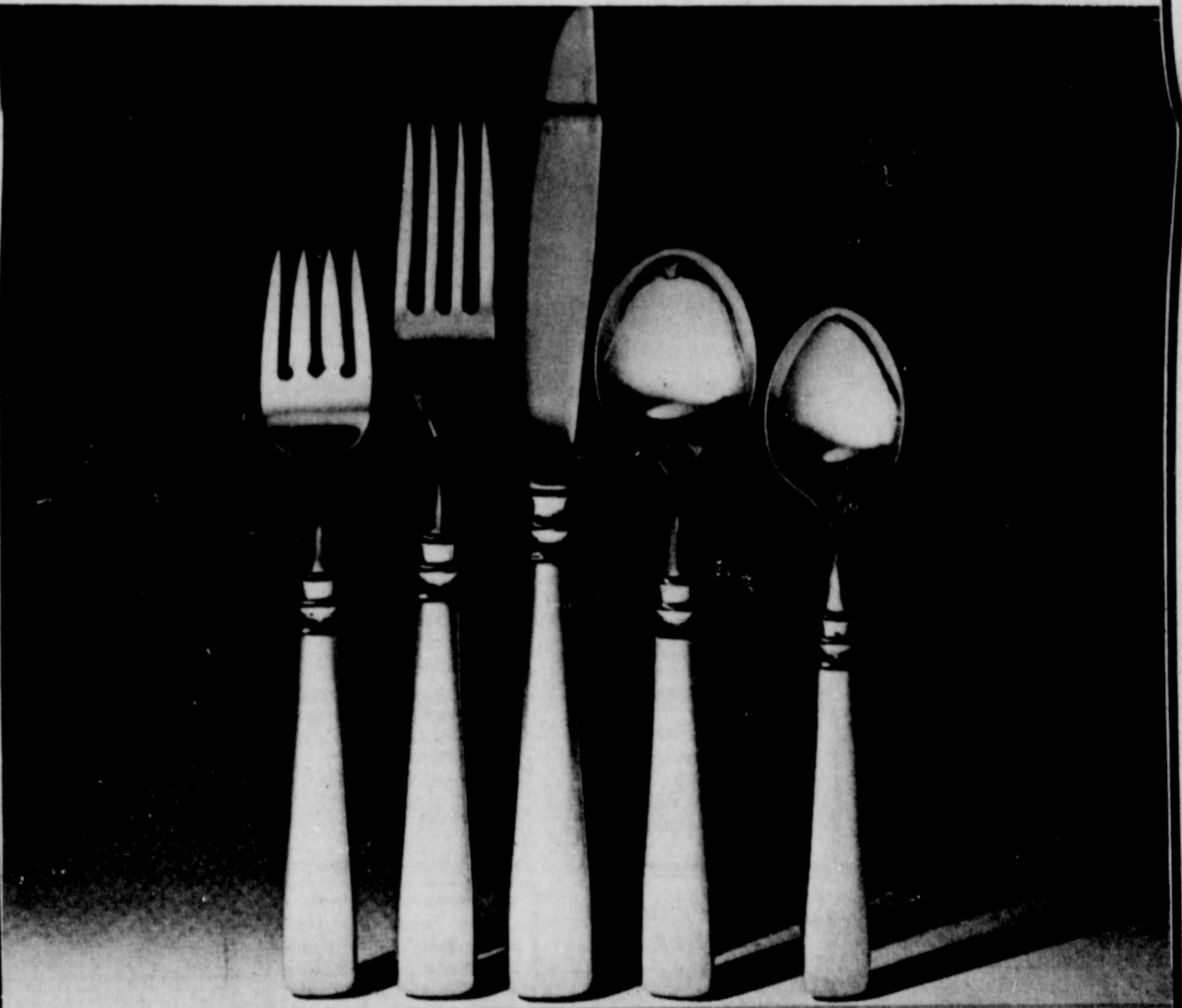

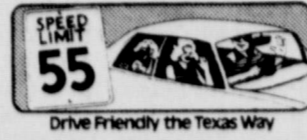


