


Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

Church Of Christ Invitation To Be Local Evangelist

Jim F. Reaves, preacher for the Church of Christ in Benbrook, Texas, a Fort Worth suburb, has accepted an invitation from the elders of the Cisco Church of Christ to be their new local evangelist. Reaves will replace J.B. Hudson, who has recently announced his retirement from the ministry. Mr. Reaves and his family will be moving to Cisco on Monday, October 8th. His first Sunday with the congregation will be October 7th. Reaves is married to the former Ruth Hocker of Fort Worth. There are two sons in the family-Dan, age 13, and Paul, age 9. Mr. Reaves was born in Gilmer, Texas, and he grew up and graduated from high school in Mt. Pleasant, Texas. In the second quarter, Cisco fielded a punt on the 50 yard line setting up their first scoring drive. An incomplete pass and a quarterback sack in the first two plays had Cisco in a bad situation: third down and 18 Early proceeded, on yards to go. A lateral pass from quarterback Barton Philpott to Forrest Starr who then pitched the ball to Donnie Worley got the first down and moved the ball to Early's 37 yard line. A pitchback to Worley got three yards and a pass to Ronnie Eudy moved the ball to Early's 21 yard line. A handoff to Worley for nine yards followed by a pass to Starr moved the ball to the 10 yard line. A handoff to

Starr netted five more yards. Another pass, this time to Cannistraci, moved the ball to Early's 35 yard line as the third quarter ended. On the next play Philpott was sacked for a nine yard loss, but he came back with a pass to Cannistraci for the touchdown. Cisco's Starr took the PAT snap from the center and threw a pass to Eudy in the end zone for two extra points making the score 21 to 15 with 11:01 left in the game.

With less than five minutes left, Cisco got possession of the ball at its own 20 yard line and made a final threat in the game. Handoffs to Worley and Gary Speegle, as well as passes to Eudy, Cannistraci and Starr, combined with three penalties against Early, moved the ball downfield in 14 plays with six first downs to Early's four yard line. Philpott handed off to Speegle for no gain. He then threw two incomplete passes and handed off to Worley on fourth down, but Early forced him out of bounds ending Cisco's threat three yards short of the goal with 1:30 left in the game. MR. E.D. (Andy) Anderson, oil man who lives up at 1011 West 14th Street, spent some 20 years with Lone Star Gas Company before becoming an independent oil operator. And he was in on a pioneering project as his last big job as Lone Star's production superintendent for the entire system with headquarters in Dallas

In 1970, Lone Star drilled what was then the deepest hole in the world in exploring for oil and gas up in Oklahoma, And Mr. Anderson was in charge of the operation. The well went below 31,000 feet. He spent a good deal of time at the drill site after the hole got below the usual producing formations - below 10,000 feet.

At the end, the drill bit was in molten sulphur, Mr. Anderson recalls. There was no oil or gas shows at great depth. The company plugged back and made a gas well in a formation, so the project was not a total loss. It was an expensive project but
