Mini-Marathon Scheduled Oct. 16

The second Cisco Mini-Marathon is scheduled for Tuesday, October 16. Registration begins at 5:30 p.m. with the walkers getting underway at six o'clock.

A short course beginning at the point where Country Club Road leaves the highway has been added. All entrants under eight will use this course, following Country Club Road to the Zoo Road, down through the zoo to the finish line in Lake Cisco Park.

Any adult who wish to may also compete on the shorter marathon route, but recognition for first place among adults on the course will only be awarded to Senior Citizens.

For those who like the challenge of a longer marathon, a 2.75 mile course will begin at the north entrance to CJC, following the highway to Country Club Road and finishing at the bottom of the Zoo Road in Lake Cisco Park.

The fastest male and female joggers and walkers will be recognized in the following divisions: under eight; third and fourth grade; fifth and sixth grades; Junior High; High School; College; Adult; Senior Citizens, short course; Senior Citizens, long course; families having all family members entered.

CJC Loses To RJC 31-0

Wranglers To Take On TCU-JV Friday At 2

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers, now 3-2 for the season following their loss to Ranger Junior College Saturday night, will be traveling to Fort Worth on Friday of this week to take on Texas Christian University's JV. The game is scheduled to begin at 2 p.m.

The Wranglers lost to the No. 1 ranked

team in the country, RJC's Rangers, Saturday night in the annual Lions Club Benefit Bowl football game in Breckenridge by the score of 31 to 0. Wade Stanford, a Breckenridge native, led the Cisco team in rushing with 32 yards on five carries.

In that game, RJC, now 4-0 for the season, looked impressive in

their win over Cisco and showed very well why they were ranked No. 1 in all three JC polls this past week. The NJCAA have ranked Ranger No. 1 since pre-season, but now they are on top in all three polls.

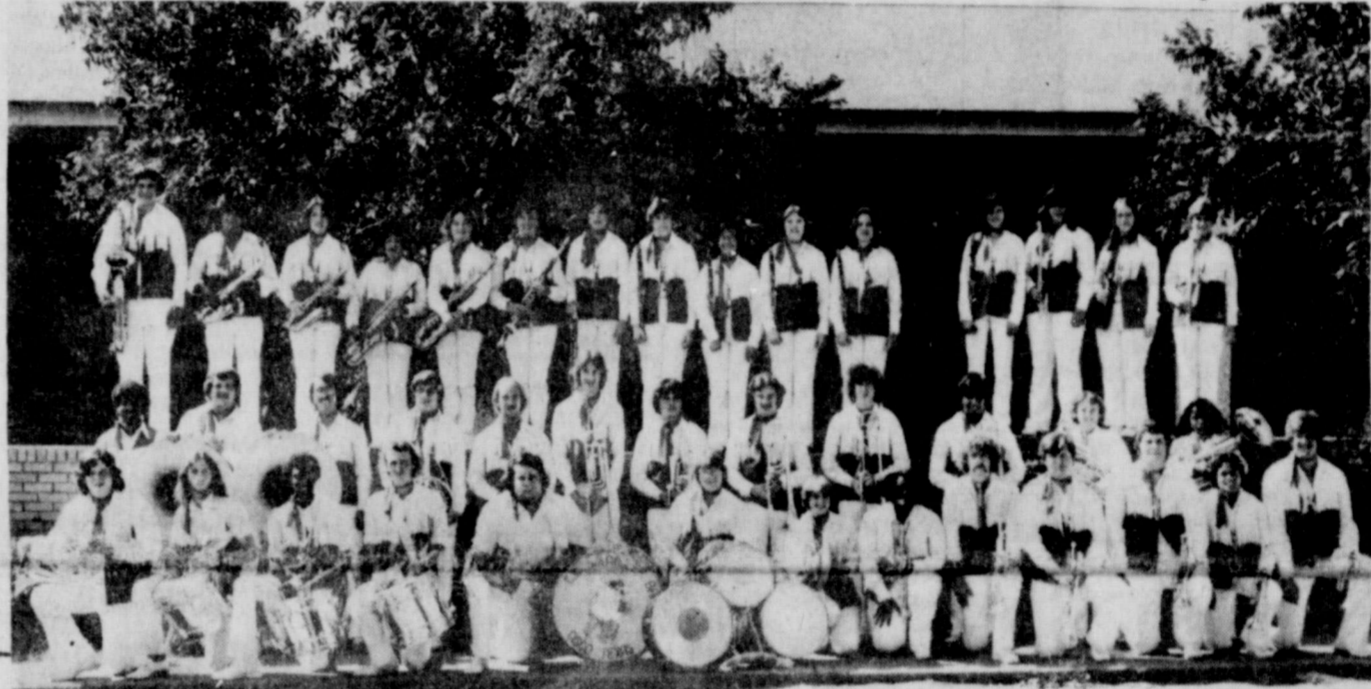
Ranger was up on the scoreboard first after a 43 yard drive in 6 plays to set up a David Meyer 47 yard field goal in the first quarter. Ranger added 7 more in the second quarter via Jerome Lanier's one yard run and Meyer's conversion. The score was compliments of a fumble caused by defensive end Marc Seguin and coverage by John Herrera, defensive end. The half ended 10-0.

Second half action also saw explosive action by Jerome Lanier and Cio Lewis who continued to punch out the yardage. Lewis and Lanier split up the action and capitalized on it for the scores. Lewis gained 143 yards in 22 carries and Lanier picked up 98 yards in 18 jaunts. Lanier scored on runs of 1 and 8 yards in the third period while Meyers was 100 per cent on conversions.

Defensively, Ranger players held Cisco to only 43 yards rushing the entire night. Tracy Bullard and Richard Crayton each picked off passes at key moments while nose guard Ernie Jordan was credited with a quarterback sack.

Fourth quarter action came alive when Elmo Richardson, RJC fullback, began punching out the yards with Kelvin Smith at the quarterback spot replacing David Worsham. Just when things slowed down, Jeff Fisher took the pitch around the left side and raced 56 yards for the score. Meyer added the point after, bringing the game to 31-0. Ranger totaled up 351 yards rushing while their defensive unit, known as "The Purple Haze" held Cisco to 65 yards on the ground.

These two teams will meet again this year near the end of the season on Saturday, November 10, at 2:30 p.m. in Cisco at Chesley Field.

County Farm Bureau Elects Officers

Officers were elected and resolutions adopted representing the 1,444 member Eastland County Farm Bureau at its annual meeting here Monday. Officers elected were: Roy Johnson, president, Desdemona; Pete Hathcock, vice president, Ranger; C.M. Guthery, second vice president, Desdemona; and Ernest Reich, Secretary-treasurer, Cisco.

Seven new directors to serve through 1981 also were elected: Don Boyett, Rising Star; Raymond Beck, Eastland; Ted Botts, Ranger; J.C. Clearman, Gorman; David Kerr, Gorman; Cecil Self, Gorman; and Dee Williamson, Eastland. The group voted to delay the election of delegates to the state farm bureau convention to be held Dec. 2-5 in McAllen until the county's

next meeting the first Monday in November. In short, some of the resolutions and reaffirmations of policy adopted included: Support the right to work law but oppose compulsory unionism. Oppose any beef referendum if administered by the federal government. Support a brucellosis program centered on calf-hood vaccinations.

Oppose the metric system. That public education be financed by a sales tax instead of valorem tax. That school districts be reimbursed 100 percent for any revenue loss from state tax law exemptions. The Eastland County organization also favors loan levels and target prices showing more realistic cost of production figures, and then an adjustment in direct proportion to the inflation rate. The Eastland farmers also said they want acreage allotments on peanuts instead of the unpopular poundage quota (production limitation)

on peanuts currently. The group also said they oppose the sale, lease, or transfer of any peanut allotment out of the county. They support the local school districts and teaching the basics, but they opposed the tax dollars for teaching of "humanism" and "atheistic values." In a final resolution, the farm bureau members proposed that school busing for racial balance be stopped, citing it as an energy waste.

In special action, Herman Schaefer, 82, who farms south of Cisco, was made an honorary lifetime member of the bureau. He is one of its oldest members. Holdover directors to serve through 1980 are Reich, Hathcock, Johnson; Bob Schults, Rising Star; Terry Grimes, Eastland; and K.F. Kirk Ranger. Among the special guests were District VII Farm Bureau Director Doyle Condra and Mrs. Condra of Talpa.

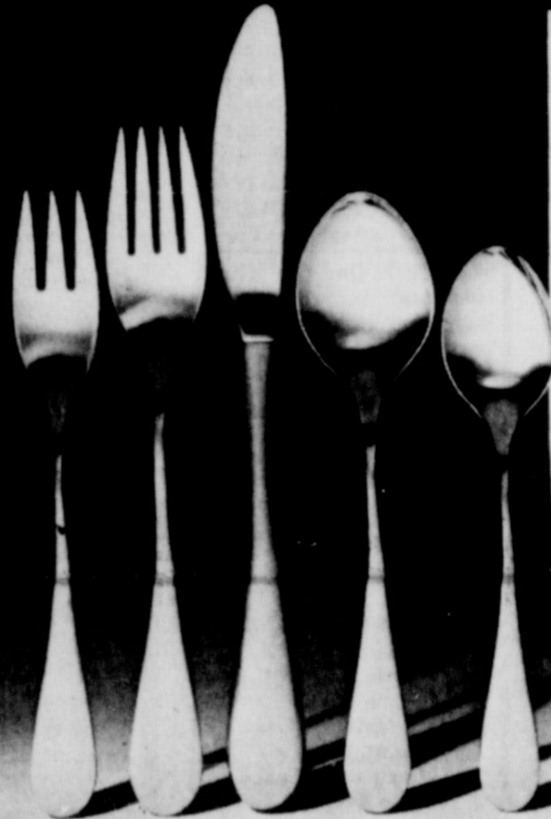

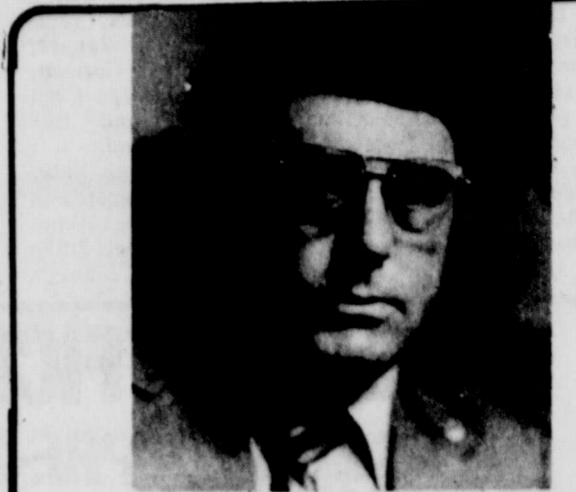

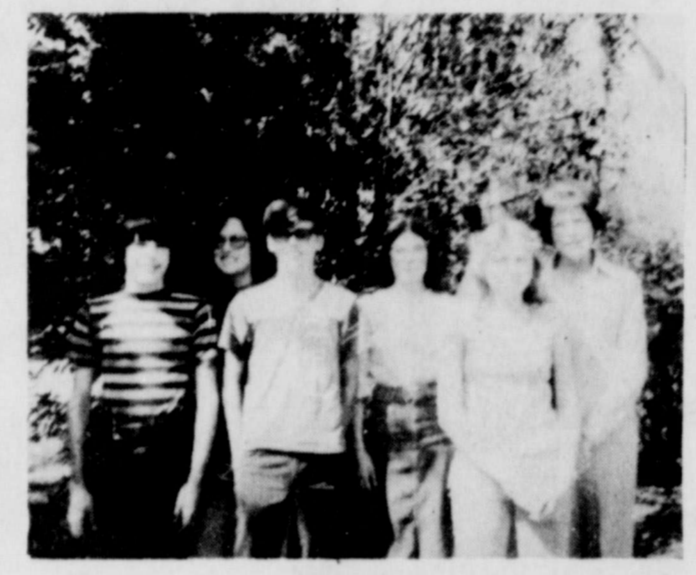
The other squads elected our group as the most spirited squad, and our squad was also elected by the NCA staff to try out for

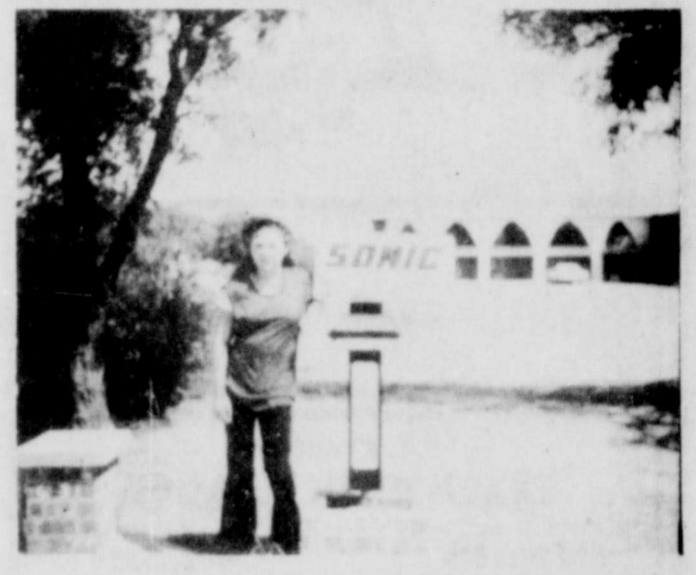

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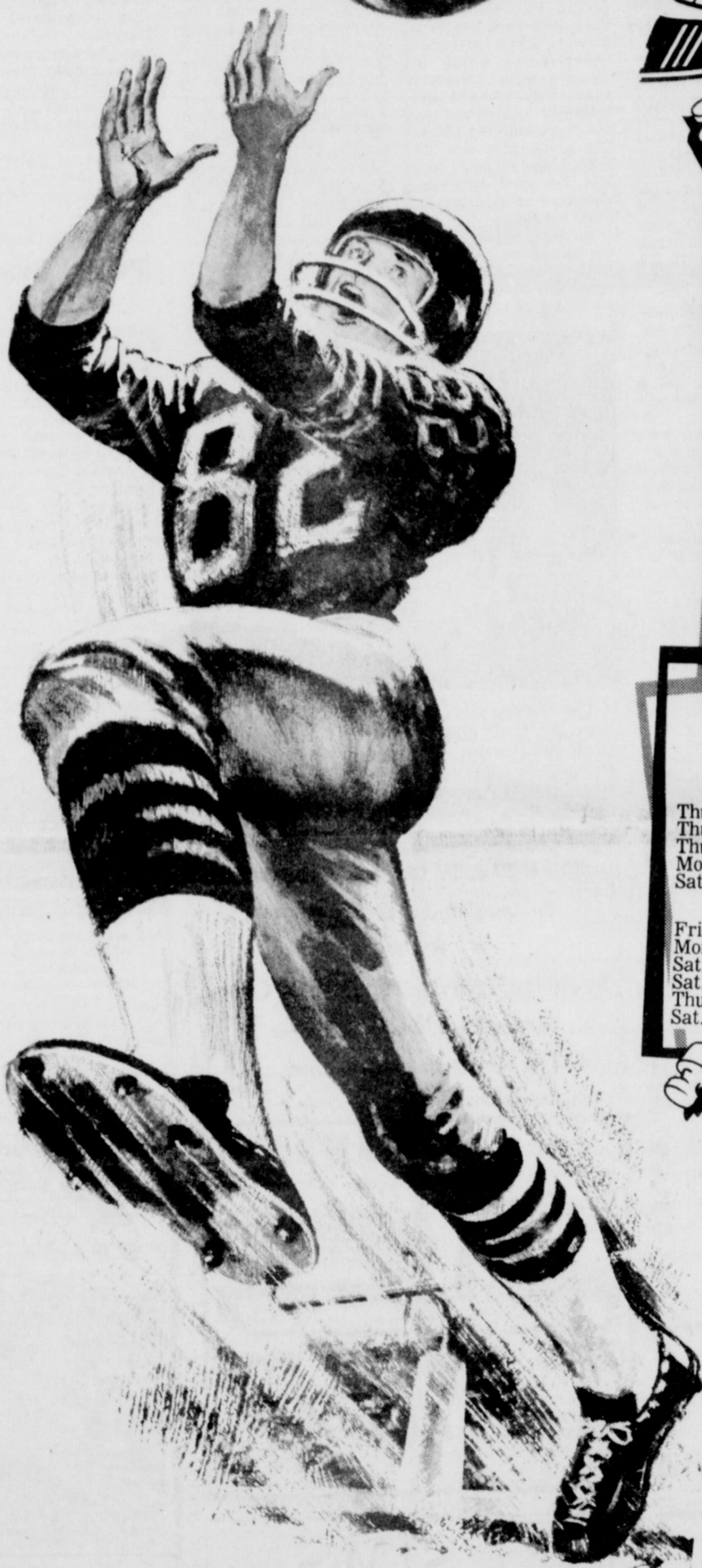

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The Methodists

In 1865 the first Christian sermon was preached in Eastland County by a Methodist minister named William Monk. This Circuit Rider was working in a vast area designated as the Palo Pinto Mission, and stopped at the Allen and Davidson Ranch to hold religious services. Here he organized the first Methodist Church, which consisted of nine members. This was the beginning of a vast evangelistic thrust by the Methodists, which would establish Churches in every town, settlement and rural area from the Brazos to the Big Bend.

These first Methodist preachers in Eastland County owned little but the clothes on their backs, a Bible, a rifle, and a good horse. Reverend Monk even lost his horse, for the Indians stole it from him. He mentioned in a letter that he had to catch a ride on a wagon going to Comanche, where he planned to buy

another horse.
The frontier setting of Eastland County is reflected in other sparse accounts of its early Churches. The first Church near Cisco was established by Rev. Lamb Trimble at Red Bluff, northwest of the present town. The first Eastland Church consisted of a log building near the Leon River, southeast of the present town. During worship services several men always stood guard outside, watching for a possible Indian attack.

The Carbon Church began in a store and Railroad Station House. The Rising Star, Ranger, and other Churches began about one hundred years ago, with rural Churches raised up in the countryside. One of these was Bullock, about five miles north of Ranger. All these Methodist Churches are rich in history and memories.

As congregations prospered they built larger Churches. During the late 1920's several fine Methodist Churches

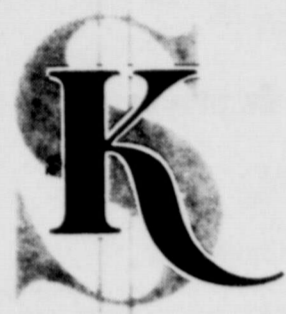
were constructed, including Cisco, Eastland, and Ranger. These are still in use, and contain priceless woodwork, stained glass windows, fine pipe organs, and beautiful furnishings given by various families in the Churches. The Wilda Dragoo chimes, in Eastland Church, were given memory of this outstanding Choir Director, pianist and violinist, who served the Church for many years. Many of the faithful workers in the Methodist Churches have made outstanding contributions to the communities in which they have lived. The list in each town is a lengthy one, but would have to include such names as the Killingsworths in Ranger, the Dragoo, Frost Perkins and Conner families of Eastland, and Marene Johnson-Johnson of Eastland. In Cisco the Methodist Church has included such families as the A.Z. Latch family, which included photo-journalist Mary Carey and Author-teacher Lela Latch, the Norman Wallace family, Bill Wright and family, and the O.L. Stamey family, which includes Dr. Joe Stamey of McMurry

College in Abilene.
At the present time the United Methodist Church has seven Churches and 1618 baptised members in Eastland County, with a larger enrollment in the 9-45 A.M. Sunday Schools. In these Sunday Schools the churches provide Classrooms for all ages. Most of the Churches support Vacation Bible Schools and various Youth Programs, including summer camps. Instrumental and vocal music is used in all phases of worship, including the 11:00 sermon hour on Sunday. The Minister, who is referred to as "Pastor" or "Reverend", keeps the Church office open for counseling, Church Business, or programs which assist the community. The Fellowship Halls of Methodist Churches are used in many worthwhile community activities, such as meetings of Senior Citizens groups. Local Methodists help support a Child-care center, and other projects. Women's Missionary Societies assist with food baskets, clothing, disaster relief, and other Christian work. The Church, on a state level, supports Colleges, Univer-

sities, Children's Homes, and hospitals. The Methodist Churches give offerings to needs of the world community, including relief of world hunger.
The Methodist Church teaches that the Bible is the inspired word of God, and the basis of all faith and religious practice. It holds that a Christ-like life is the example set before all believers, and that this extends into all areas of personal conduct and social consciousness. The Church believes that the Ten Commandments, being an expression of God's unchanging moral laws, are valid for Christian believers in this age. The Church also believes that Christ will make a literal, visible appearance on this earth at some time in the future, cumulating the hopes of all Christians.
The Church recognizes that man cannot save himself by any good works, and is accounted righteous before God only for the merits of Christ, by faith. Good works can only be the fruits of faith, following after justification. All persons seeking to be saved from their sins and sincerely desiring to be Christ in faith and practice are proper candidates for full membership in the United Methodist Church. The Pastor who administers the Rite of Baptism gives the candidate a choice as to which he prefers, sprinkling, pouring, or immersion. Some Methodist families have their babies baptised by sprinkling, at which time they are enrolled as a Preparatory member of the Church. Parents of such children are under a solemn obligation to train their children properly for fuller membership. At around the sixth grade the child is instructed by the Pastor in what is called Confirmation training. When this is completed the young person is enrolled as a full member.
Members moving from one place to another simply request that their names be changed from Church roll to another. A member in good standing in any Christian denomination who has been baptised and who desires to unite with the Methodist Church may join by a certificate of transfer or by a declaration of Christian faith, and willingness to be loyal to the Methodist Church.
The Methodist Church differs from some denominations in that it believes it is possible for a person, even after salvation, to fall away from the grace of God. Not, they add, because of any lack of God's grace, but because of the wilful disobedience of the individual, who retains the power of choice.
The Methodist Church has always advocated the separation of Church and State, and believes the State has no right to tax Church property. The Church has taken no definite stand on the matter of Government grants to Church Schools. The Church advocates loyalty to one's Government as far as one is able - unless man-made laws conflict with the laws of God. The Church believes that society can be transformed by Christian living, including abstinence of alcohol and dangerous drugs.
The Methodist Church is administered by a representative from government, with elected members vested with authority to vote in

called meetings. The Church is geographically divided into Conferences and Districts, with the General Conference overseeing the world-wide work. There are a number of councils, boards, commissions and committees, drawing from both Pastors and laity for knowledge and counsel. The handling of local funds is done by an elected and approved Treasurer.
Methodists assert the sanctity of the marriage Covenant, believing that it has long been blessed by God. At the same time, the Church rejects social norms that assume different standards for women than for men. In marriages where the partners are, even after thoughtful consideration and counsel, estranged beyond reconciliation, the Church recognizes divorce and the right of divorce persons to remarry - and has concern for the children of such unions.
Recently several leaders within the Methodist Church published this statement as a challenge to the Church:

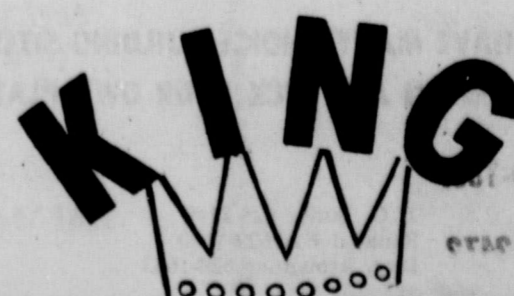

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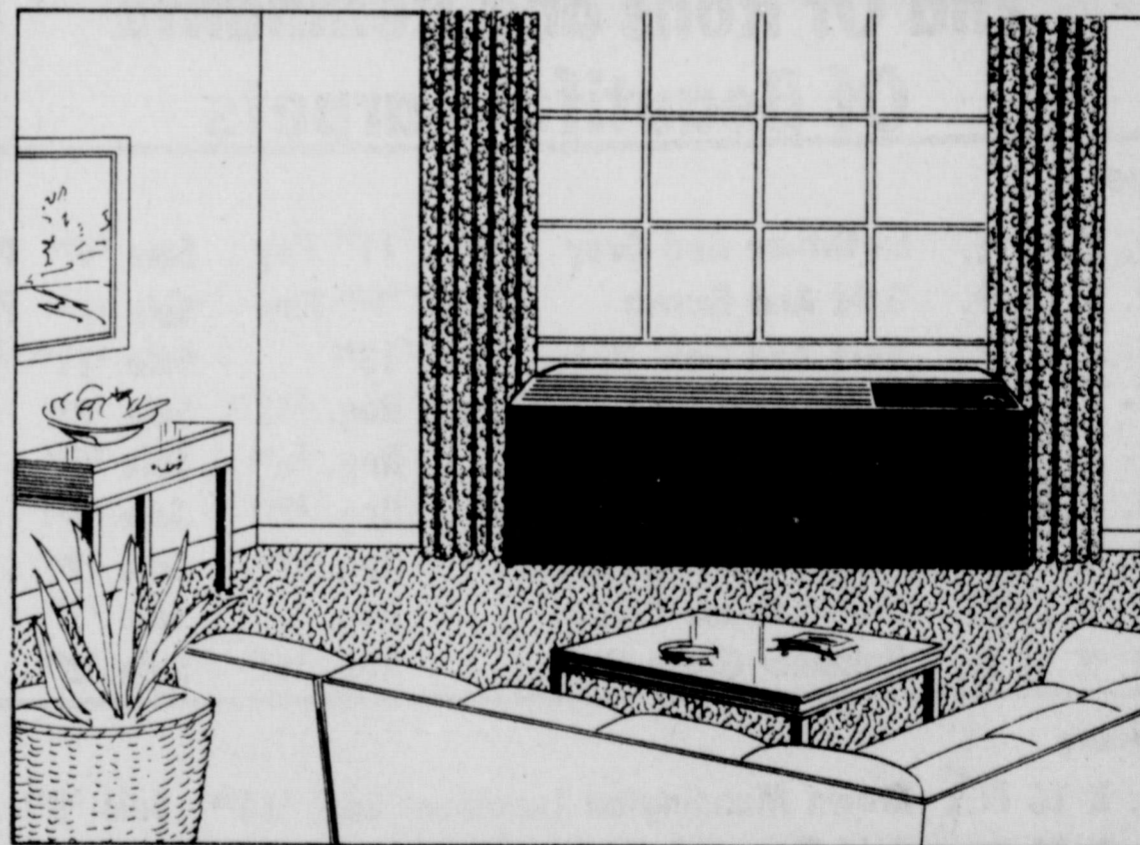
