Chief Eaves Suffers Broken Leg In Fall

Police Chief Kenneth Eaves was directing the work of the Cisco Police Department by telephone from a bed at Graham Memorial Hospital Friday as he recovered from injuries sustained in a fall at Lake Cisco at 12:35 p.m. Wednesday.

Mr. Eaves sustained a compound fracture of his right leg between the ankle and knee in a fall of eight to ten feet. He and Officer Lynn Rice had gone to the Lake Cisco dam to investigate a possible criminal case. They were looking in the hollow concrete area when he fell.

A Cisco Funeral Home ambulance was summoned and took the police chief to the hospital. He sustained several cuts and bruises as well as the broken leg. His doctor had not decided when Chief Eaves could be released Friday.

Mr. Eaves has served as Cisco police chief since his appointment to the post last July 15th. He said that he could not comment at the time as to the

The Loboes of Cisco High School scalped the Comanche Indians 35-15 in a 9-AA district battle here Friday night. The Loboes are now 2-0 in district play and 3-3 for the season. Comanche dropped to 0-3 in district and 4-3 overall.

The Lobo offense scored in every quarter Friday night

and had 271 total yards offense, while the defense recovered five of Comanche's seven fumbles and intercepted three passes. The efforts of both squads led Cisco to its first victory over Comanche in six years.

The Loboes took the opening kickoff from the Indians at their own 27 yard line. With

Barton Philpott at quarterback, the Lobo offense started their first scoring drive of the game. Handoffs to Gary Speegle, Donnie Worley and Steve Hopson, as well as passes to Ronnie Eudy and Mark Evatt, moved the ball downfield in 13 plays netting five first downs. With the ball on the one yard line, Philpott plunged across for the touchdown. The PAT by Jimmy Elrod was good, making the score 7 to 0 with 6:33 left in the first quarter.

Cisco started their second scoring drive late in the second quarter when the Loboes recovered their third Indian fumble of the game, this time on Comanche's 37 yard line. Philpott handed off to Worley, Hopson and Speegle to get the ball down to the 18 yard line. In a fourth down and four yards situation, Philpott pulled the Indians offside for a five yard penalty

giving Cisco the first down on the Indians 14 yard line. A handoff to Worley around the left side got the touchdown with 3:41 left in the half. The PAT by Elrod was no good, making the score 13 to 0.

The Indians took the ensuing kickoff at their 31 yard line and started their first scoring drive of the night. Quarterback Lloyd Martinez hit Salinas with a pass right on the boundary line. It was ruled complete, giving the Indians the ball at Cisco's 45 yard line. Rodney Strube and Melvin Kunkel helped move the ball to Cisco's 16 yard line in eight plays, making three first downs. Martinez threw a pass to Dendy Feist for the touchdown with 53 seconds left in the game. The PAT by David Davis was good making the score 13 to 7.

The Loboes were not through scoring in the first half and 36 seconds later they added seven more points to their first half total.

Cisco's Forrest Starr took the kickoff at the Loboes 20 yard line and ran it back to the Indians 37 before being stopped by Rodney Strube. Following two incomplete passes, Philpott handed off to Worley who fought through the maze of players, breaking a number of tackles, and scampered to the goal line. The PAT by Elrod was good, giving the Loboes the half-time lead of 20 to 7 with 22 seconds left in the half.

In second half action, the Loboes recovered an Indian fumble on their first series of plays and started another scoring drive. With the ball on Comanche's 35 yard line, Speegle and Worley took handoffs from Philpott moving the ball down to Comanche's two yard line in four plays. A handoff to Worley got the touchdown with 9:02 left in the third quarter. On the PAT attempt, a bad snap forced the ball holder, Forrest Starr, to try and get two points. He threw a pass to Chuck Cannistraci in the end zone making the score 28 to 7 in Cisco's favor.

The Indians came back in the fourth quarter making their final score of the night, when the Indian defense forced the Loboes to punt from Cisco's 28 yard line. The Indians started the drive from their own 46 yard line. Five incomplete passes and two pass interference penalties against

Cisco, moved the ball to the Loboes 34 yard line. A handoff from quarterback Kyle Steward to Eddie Strube got the touchdown. A pass to Strube in the end zone got the Indians two more points, making the score 28 to 15 with 9:34 left in the game.

With a little over three minutes to play, Cisco's Forrest Starr intercepted an Indian pass at Comanche's 28 yard line setting up the Loboes final scoring drive. Handoffs to Speegle and Hopson moved the ball to Comanche's 21 yard line. A handoff to Worley up the middle got the touchdown with 1:57 left in the game. Elrod's PAT was good making the score 35 to 15.

The Indians had possession of the ball two more times, but both drives were killed when the Loboes intercepted two passes. The first interception was by Audie Woolley with 1:33 left in the game. Four plays later the Indians received Cisco's punt at Comanche's 29 yard line with 9 seconds left in the game. On the first play, Cisco's Jimmy Elrod intercepted a pass to kill any chances of another score by Comanche.

District Judge Earl Conner Jr. will retire on Nov. 28 of this year as judge of 91st District court—but it won't necessarily be the end of his long and dedicated career of public service.

The term to which Judge Conner was elected runs the rest of 1979 and through 1980.

Texas Republican Governor Bill Clements may or may not make an appointment to fill the unexpired term.

If he does not, Judge Conner could in all likelihood be asked by the administrative judge of this district, to continue to serve in a temporary position. Judge Charles Murry of Fort Worth is administrator of the Eighth Judicial District.

If the governor were to make an appointment, he apparently would depend on the recommendations of Eastland County Republican officials.

Indications are that there are several Eastland County attorneys (all Democrats) who would accept the appointment and/or who possible may file as candidates for the office in

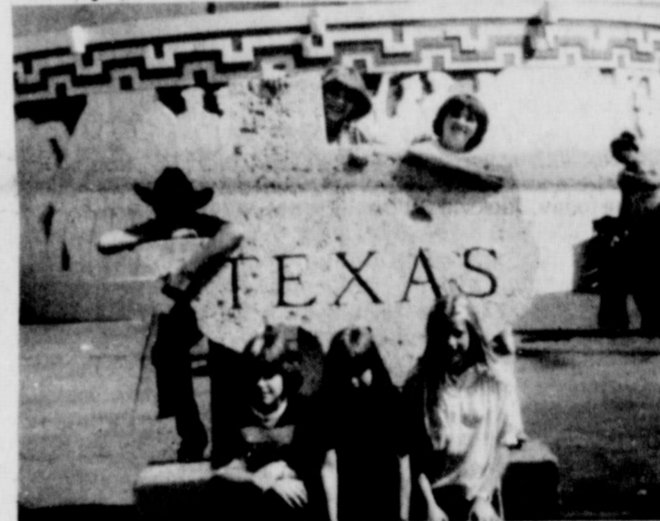

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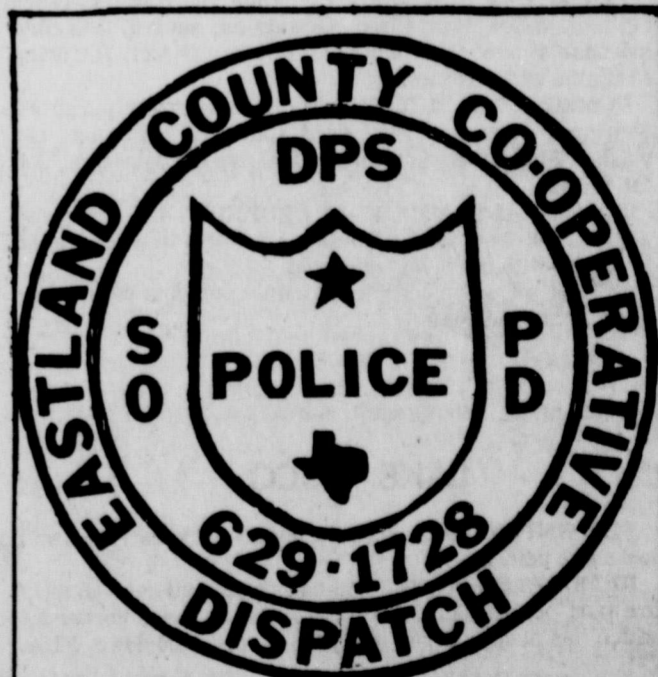

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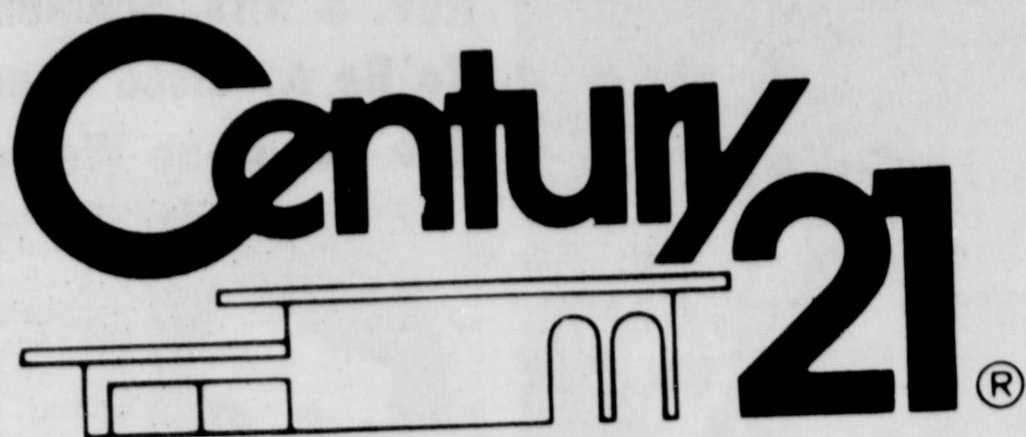

Its congregations are distributed evenly across the area, located in small communities as well as the towns. Ministers from the Church of Christ were probably working in the County as early as 1880, meeting with small groups in homes and holding services under brush arbors.

The deed dates of property owned by the congregations show that Eastland had the first Church building in 1886. Rising Star followed in 1894, with Crossroads in 1904 and Ranger and Pioneer in 1905. Ranger's first members consisted mostly of persons who had moved in from Merriman.

By 1907 Okra and Gorman were construction Churches, with Liberty and Yellow Mound acquiring property deeds in 1908 and '09. Chaney, New Hope and Desdemona all built Churches within the next ten years.

Cisco constructed its Church in 1922, with Carbon in 1925. The date of the first Flatwoods Church of Christ is unknown. Two more Churches were built out on rural surveys.

With Churches located in so many of these communities, the Church of Christ had a great impact on the social and religious structure of the County.

The simple pioneer Churches have been replaced by spacious buildings of various styles. The Church on S. Daugherty in Eastland was built in 1919 - a model of classic beauty and lasting construction.

Stately contemporary Churches have been built in Cisco and Ranger in recent years. A

number of Churches have also cooperated in the establishment of a "Bible Chair" at Cisco Junior College. The program in the "Bible Chair" facility is directed by Gary Adams.

The main worship services in each Church of Christ are held on Sunday, often referred to as "The Lord's Day" by the Church. There are usually Bible Classes for all ages.

No instrumental music is used with the worship service - singing is a Capella. After the Bible Studies, the Communion Service - The Lord's Supper - is held each week. This is considered of vital importance, and members feel a desire and obligation to be present.

After Communion there is a preaching service-usually conducted by the Minister, or sometimes a local Elder.

Church of Christ Ministers do not use the titles "Reverend" or "Pastor", but are referred to as "Preacher", "Minister", "Brother", or "Evangelist".

The Minister may or may not be an Elder or Deacon. These offices are usually filled by laymen of the Church, and are extremely important in the Church government. For these laymen, rather than the Minister, direct the affairs of the local Churches, including the handling of financial matters.

Each of these Churches is autonomous, but may elect to cooperate with other area Churches in Christian projects. Church of Christ Congregations support all their Missionaries directly, instead of sending money to a central Board for distribution.

The Church has Sunday night services, as well as mid-week prayer meetings.

There are special services for young people, and close ties are maintained with Abilene Christian U. and its programs and Lectureships. A summer camp for young people is maintained near Lake Cisco.

The Church of Christ states that its name, origin and doctrine are Scripturally sound. It believes that the Bible is the inspired word of God (2 Tim. 3:16, 17) and the Churches use any translations which are faithful to the Greek and Hebrew text. The Church considers itself undenominational, tracing its beginning to the New Testament Church begun on the Day of Pentecost.

God's people, the Church teaches, suffered greatly during the Dark Ages, but began to re-emerge with pure doctrine during the Reformation. A movement surfaced in America in the early 1800's, inspired by the powerful preaching of Abner Jones, Elias Smith, Barton Stone and Thomas and Alexander Campbell. They gave a plea for religious unity based on the Bible, and a restoration of New Testament Christianity. From this came the Church of Christ congregations as we know them today.

The Church of Christ believes in the Trinity - the Three Persons of the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. "The Holy Spirit is alive and working on this earth," stated one Minister. "Unfortunately the method of His working is a subject with much difference of opinion."

A person is added by the Lord to the Church (Acts

2:47) when he hears the Gospel, believes (John 8:24, John 3:16, Mark 16:15,16), repents of past sins (Luke 13:3,5, Acts 17:30, Acts 2:38), confesses Jesus as Lord (Matt. 10:32, 33, Romans 10:9,10, Acts 8:37) and is baptised into Christ for remissions of sins. (Mark 16:15,16, Acts. 2:38, Acts 22:16, 1 Peter 3:21).

A person may continue as a member of the Church of Christ by living a Christian life as set forth in the New Testament. This includes regular attendance at Church, a kind and unselfish life, help to the needy in the Community, and using talents for the benefit of mankind. A Christian will not use alcohol or other mind-destroying drugs. The Church teaches that the marriage contract is binding for life, and may be dissolved only for the sin of adultery. In that case the innocent party is free to remarry (Matt. 19:3-12).

The Church teaches that it is possible for a Christian to fall away and be eternally lost (Heb. 10:26-31; II Peter 2:20-22). Heaven and hell are real places.

But on the Ten Commandments - the Church teaches they are no longer binding, as such, on Christians. They are described as part of "The Old Law", or "The Old Covenant" given to the Jews at Mt. Sinai.

"God has made no difference between the Moral and Ceremonial Laws of the Old Testament," a Minister stated. "Any differences are man-made. All of the Old Covenant was nailed to the cross" (Eph. 2:14, 15; Col. 2:14), and Christians live under the New Covenant, or dispensation of Grace. Commandments for the 'New Testament' Church were given after the Day of Pentecost."

The Church believes that miraculous manifestations of the Holy Spirit have ceased in this age. Jesus had to perform miracles to establish the claim that He was the Son of God.

It was essential that signs accompany the Apostles, so their claims be authenticated. But the Apostles were guided into all Truth, which was completed with the Book of Revelation.

So there is no further need for miracles, only for obedience to the Gospel.

The Church of Christ teaches its members that they have a duty to the Civil powers under which they live (Rom. 13:1-7). It is felt that the Government should not tax building actually used for worship, but when Churches undertake money-making ventures outside the Church they should be taxed. The Church does not teach that Christ will return to earth to set up a "thousand years of peace", or an earthly kingdom. "He will return to take His people Home," a local leader stated. "Then the earth will be totally destroyed for all time (2 Peter 3:5-13). But actually, the Kingdom of Christ has already been established on this earth. It is a spiritual rather than an earthly Kingdom. Christ's Kingdom is His Church."

The Church voices concern over the many different religious groups in the country, feeling that "freedom of religion" has been abused many times. "Freedom of religion doesn't mean that each person should just go his own way, believing what he wants to, ignoring the claims of God," a member stated. "Christ wants His people to be truly one (John 17:20, 21), and religious leaders who have misled their people will have much to answer for in the Judgement!"

It remains to be seen how much of humanity the Church of Christ can unite. But it is a growing Church - there are now four times as many members as were

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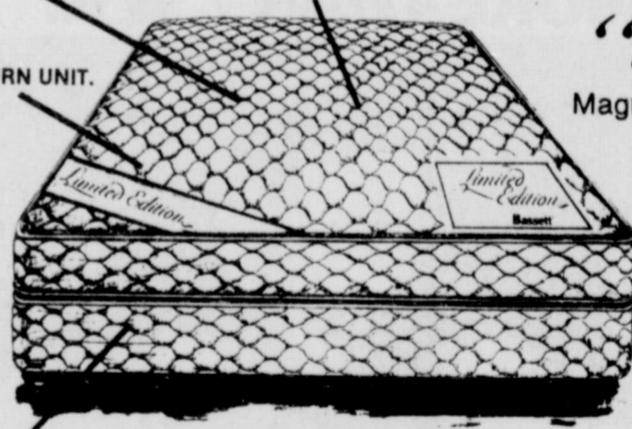

With the warm weather we have had in October it does not seem possible that a frost may be a few weeks away. However, our average first killing frost date is November 15. And as you can remember we have had a killing frost much earlier. We would like to remind livestock owners that frost can lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pastures grasses and forages.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazed after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant

material begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

As far as prussic acid poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10-15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two or three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also causes the blood to appear bright red.

To prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock we suggest following these steps.

1. Allow plant material affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.

2. Feed animals hay or a supplement before turning them in on plants that may contain prussic acid. Animals that are not hungry will not be affected as seriously by toxic material since their intake will be limited.

3. Remove all animals from the pasture if one in the herd shows any signs of poison.

4. Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early. This product is available from veterinarians.

5. Have suspect plant material checked by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratories at College Station or Amarillo. Local veterinarians will be

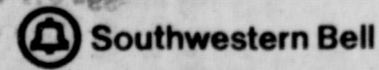

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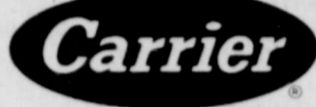

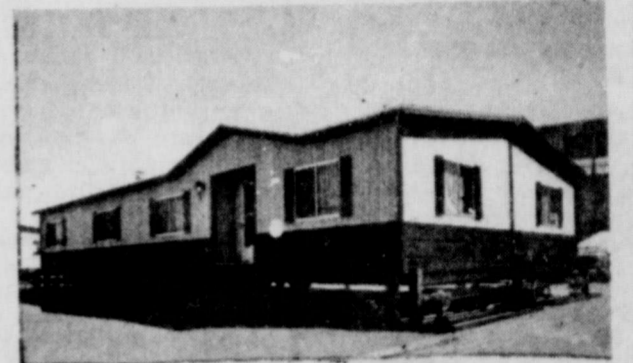

Historical Marker To Be Erected

A Official Texas Historical Marker for W.H. (Uncle Billy) Gibbons will be erected on November 3, 1979. It was announced today by Mr. David Williams of San Saba, Chairman of the San Saba County Historical Commission.

The marker will be placed at Camp Billy Gibbons, Local Road, 15 miles South of Richland Springs. Dedication plans will be announced in the near future.

Made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect, the marker measures 18" X 28" inches and is sponsored by Comanche Trail Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

The inscription on the marker reads:

W.H. (UNCLE BILLY) GIBBONS (1846-1932)

In the 1870s Irish-born William Henry Gibbons drove 1500 sheep into San Saba County. After a time

"Uncle Billy" became one of the largest landowners in the county, a prominent banker, and a community leader. In 1930 he gave the Boy Scouts Of America a 99-year lease to campgrounds along Brady creek on his ranch. Gibbons' son James Edward inherited Camp Billy Gibbons land in 1932 and continued the agreement with the newly organized Comanche Trail Council. In 1947 the camp moved to this 103-acre site donated by "Uncle Billy's" son John William Gibbons.

The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas Historical Commission's program of preservation activities. These include archeological investigations, history museum consultation, and administering the National Historic Preservation Act in Texas. As of 1976 the Historical Commission had erected more than 7,200 official markers.

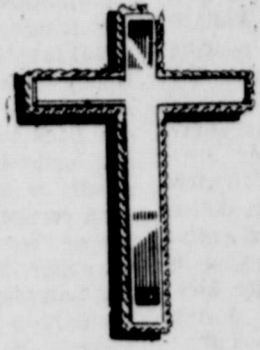
