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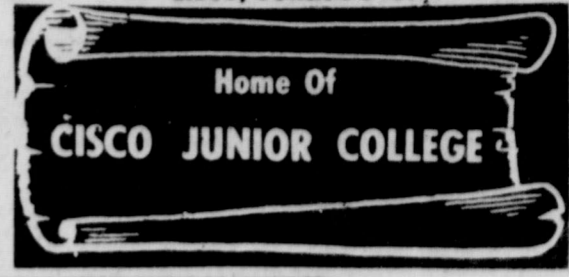

"Our local Community Chest campaign was not as successful as we'd have liked last year," President Dennis said, "and we want to urge all citizens of Cisco to take part this year. Help is needed in two areas, both of which are mandatory for our reaching our budget--volunteers to help in the fund raising drive and people who will

give generously of their 'fair share' to put the program over the top. With all citizens doing their part, \$11,000 is a very reachable goal for a community with the resources that we have," he concluded.

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STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — The curtain opened last week on the second act of a political drama that has promised for weeks to put the Governor of Texas and the Texas Attorney General on a collision course in the courtroom.

Attorney General Mark White filed suit in a Houston federal court last week seeking \$10 million in damages from SEDCO, the oil drilling firm founded by

Gov. Bill Clements, and a Mexican drilling firm, Permargo.

White told reporters he will seek to prove negligence on the part of both drilling firms in connection with the Ixtoc I oil well blowout, the largest in history, which washed millions of barrels of crude oil up onto Texas beaches this summer.

Although the well is still flowing, engineers last week

managed to slow the flow with a giant metal cap placed over the wellhole on the Gulf floor.

White told reporters he declined to sue PEMEX, the Mexican government-owned oil company, because he did not want to interfere with U.S.-Mexico negotiations for damages in regard to the oil spill.

However, he left open the door on such legal action, should the negotiations fail to satisfy Texas interests. "We are refraining (from suing PEMEX) until it is certain that all negotiations by the U.S. Department of State for damages from Mexico have been exhausted," he said.

Clements Says "Politics"

White said several weeks ago, after he discovered SEDCO had scuttled the damaged drilling rig in deep international waters, that he would include SEDCO in the negligence lawsuit.

The Dallas-based drilling firm was founded by Republican Gov. Bill Clements, who turned it over to his son in a blind trust when he took office. Clements has charged that the suit is "politically motivated."

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and House Speaker Bill Clayton are two leaders whom Democrats are considering running against Clements in 1982. Several Clements supporters think White is maneuvering to have himself become a third choice, but so far White has mentioned only lawsuits, not gubernatorial races.

Meanwhile, SEDCO filed suit early last month to have all liability limited in a suit against SEDCO.

Fuel Tax Increase

Regarding tax issues, Clements last week said he will propose that the next Legislature increase the state gasoline tax, the lowest in the nation.

In concurrence with Hobby, Clements said the drop in gasoline sales has caused a shortage of revenues for highway construction. The nickel-a-gallon tax is levied on every gallon sold at the pumps, and recent curtailments in driving because of the fuel shortage is blamed for the loss.

Sales Tax Boost

Earlier, Clements told a group of Texas mayors he would consider backing an increase in the local option sales tax for cities from one cent to three cents.

The Mayors' Advisory Committee had urged him to boost the tax in order to replace all or part of the property tax revenues. Currently, cities may collect a one-cent sales tax in addition to the four-cent state sales tax.

The mayors would like to drop or lower property taxes in concurrence with the sales tax increase. Clements said he had no opinion on the issue at this time.

Grassroots Candidates

In the Panhandle, two farmers who were prime movers in grassroots organization of the American Agriculture Movement are moving into politics.

Gerald McCathern of Dalhart announced he will run against incumbent State Sen. Bob Price, R-Pampa.

R.C. Porter of Spearman announced for the House seat being vacated by Rep. Bob Close, R-Perryton. Close, a lawmaker highly respected by his colleagues, said last month he was getting out of politics to stay closer to home.

Bullock Heart Attack

State Comptroller Bob Bullock is in stable condition in an Austin hospital following a heart attack last week. Bullock, a hard-working politician who sometimes is thought to burn the candle at both ends, was reportedly reading press releases as he was wheeled into the intensive care unit for treatment.

AG Opinions

Mark White issued four attorney general opinions last week, including one ruling public junior colleges, in order to be eligible for state appropriations, must charge foreign students the same tuition rate charged by state senior colleges.

White also ruled the Texas Tech Board of Regents must comply with the terms of Senate Bill 213 in order to sell the land to which the bill relates.

And, the coordinating board and the governing boards of state-supported colleges and universities may not change the legislatively established name of an in-

stitution under their jurisdiction.

Finally, water supply corporations removed from the jurisdiction of the Public Utility Commission as of April 19, 1979, must pay assessment imposed by state law for the period during

which they were subject to PUC jurisdiction.

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

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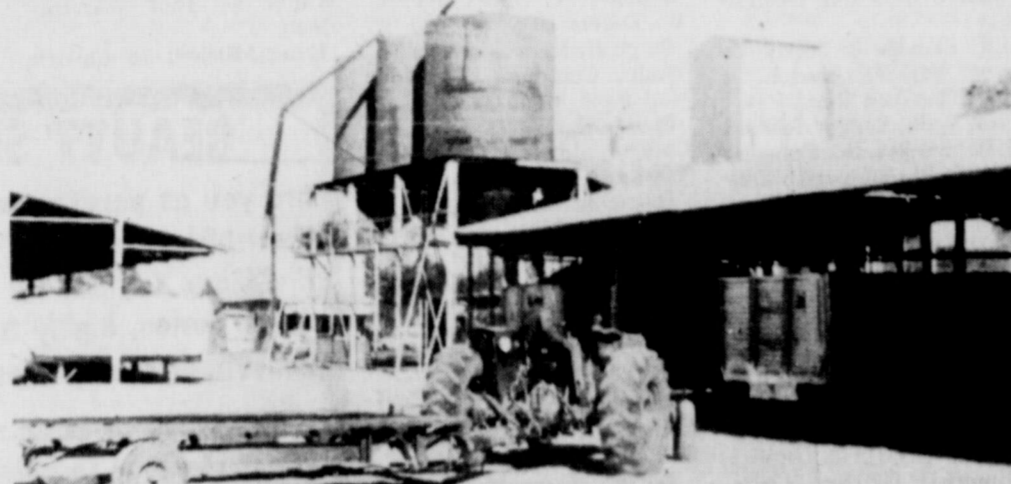

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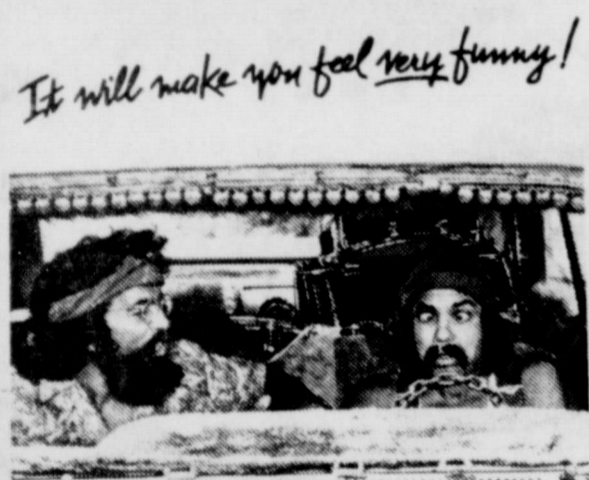
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Gospel Assembly

The Gospel Assembly Church is not one of the largest religious groups in Eastland County, but it is certainly a growing one. Seven years ago, when Pastor John C. Begley arrived in Cisco to minister to the only congregation in the area, he found it had seven members. Now the Church has a membership of around seventy-five, with a number of visitors in attendance at various functions. "We are a Christian Fellowship," the Pastor states. "Not an organization. We are World-wide, the groups meeting in many countries. But there is no central headquarters - no direction from man-made authority. Our bonds are love for each other, and a desire to learn the true doctrine as taught by Christ. Names divide. If I were putting a name on the front of our Cisco Church building I would call it 'The Church'. Our groups have different names in different places. The Church in Abilene is called 'Gospel Tabernacle', and at Ft. Worth 'The Church At Ft. Worth'."

There is no set order of service - the worship is unstructured and spontaneous, with the congregation participating as inspired. The King James translation of the Bible is used in the services, being constructed as Divinely inspired and the only rule of faith. On Sunday afternoon the children and young people go to class; for an indefinite time, they return to the main assembly. Sometimes the Pastor will hold a healing service, where the sick go to the front for special prayer. There will be other types of prayer services, or testimonies by Church members. Sometimes a member will "speak in tongues", which is believed to be caused by a "baptism" - or "infilling" - of the Holy Spirit. "This experience is not a sign of Sanctification," the Pastor cautions. He adds that the Church has all the gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit. Members bring their tithes and offerings, which will be placed in charge of the Pastor. All funds are used locally - there are no foreign Mission offerings. Foreign Churches take care of their own local needs. When the Pastor begins his Sunday sermon, he is "subject to question" meaning that a laymember or visitor may interrupt or question him from the floor. This can lead to some animated discussions. Along with this program there is a lot of music - singing, and instrumental music produced by a unique fifteen-piece Church band. began in the early 1900's. They still have the belief that the complete truth, as taught by Christ, was lost in the Dark Ages, and has not been fully restored. Martin Luther is considered a great spiritual leader, who went as far as he could in his lifetime. Other European and early American reformers discovered even more Truth. But much remains to be illumined by the Spirit of God. The Fellowships agree on four Cornerstones of the Faith - the Doctrine of Baptisms (water, the Spirit, and fire) the Laying On Of Hands, the Resurrections, and Eternal Judgement. From this they have launched into various areas of discussion - and sometimes individuals have different shading of opinion. In the early 1940's L.C. Anderson, who was pastoring an Independent Church in Cisco, came in contact with this type of Fellowship. In 1945 he brought his Church into the group, where

it has remained. The Gospel Assembly occupied several structures in the same area before building its spacious rock-front on Avenue A. The Church meets on Thursday and Saturday nights, and Sunday afternoon at 2:30. The Pastor is the sole authority for Church government, but counsels with Elders of the group.

There is no set order of service - the worship is unstructured and spontaneous, with the congregation participating as inspired. The King James translation of the Bible is used in the services, being constructed as Divinely inspired and the only rule of faith. On Sunday afternoon the children and young people go to class; for an indefinite time, they return to the main assembly. Sometimes the Pastor will hold a healing service, where the sick go to the front for special prayer. There will be other types of prayer services, or testimonies by Church members. Sometimes a member will "speak in tongues", which is believed to be caused by a "baptism" - or "infilling" - of the Holy Spirit. 'wash the feet' of the Church members by becoming servants of those who need us," the Pastor explains. The widows in the Church receive the special care of fellow Church members, and this may include repair work on cars or homes. The Pastor, a skilled carpenter, spends a lot of time with physical labor. "We are a close group," he says. "But always open to new members. A person may join the Fellowship by attending, first all, and by professing faith. Usually the Spirit will move a person to accept our mode of Baptism in the name of Jesus Christ." The Church teaches the separation of Church and State, and does not believe in taxation of Church property. The Church does not accept Government aid or Grants for Church schools, and does not believe in registering with the Government as an organization. The members are taught to abstain from alcoholic beverages and any harmful drugs. Marriage is considered binding for life, with divorce permissible only for the Biblical reason of fornication. When converts who have been divorced come to the Church, the Fellowship recognizes that God forgives and wipes away the past. It is far more serious, the Church believes, for persons who have accepted the salvator of Christ to willfully sin in this manner or any other. "The Old Law - the Ten Commandments - is the foundation for the New," the Pastor states. "In the Old Covenant, the Law was written on tables of stone. In the New Covenant, the Law is to be written on the heart. We are saved by grace through faith. But how can we expect to keep sinning and have grace cover it?" The Church teaches that the next coming of Christ to this earth will be unseen by the wicked. He will draw His people from the earth to the Home of God - Heaven - where they will rule for a thousand years. Then Christ will return to the earth in a Judgemental coming 7 1/2 years later. After the Judgement, Satan, and evil will be destroyed. The earth will be cleansed and restored. Christ will set up an everlasting Kingdom on this earth, and redeemed men will inhabit it and worship Him in freedom, joy and peace. This will be the fulfilling of God's original purpose of the earth He created. This is the understanding of the Church on this matter - and its special hope.

locked up...and how hard it is to pass sentence on a young person who's been convicted of a crime. You'd better believe they were interested with a Highway Patrolman told about what constitutes DWI, and the fact that a patrolman makes the first decision. Then he showed a film (pretty much like the old Army training film) about what happens when a car going 80 miles an hour goes out of control. Blood, guts and tears scattered everywhere. And the kids roared their approval, or disapproval, as the scenes unfolded. But they were interested, and they did look and they did ask questions.

Music, music, music. There was plenty of it. Not the kind we older folks know. There was no Wayne King or Lawrence Welk...It was what they call Disco, because every time there was music, there were funny lights all over the place. And there were hundreds and hundreds of kids. There have been some good sweet potatoes produced in Eastland County this year and now is the time that gardeners are harvesting the sweet potatoes. We usually get several calls concerning the harvest and storage of fresh sweet potatoes.

The following are some suggestions from Samuel Cotner, Extension Horticulturist:

Harvest sweet potatoes before soil temperatures drop to 50 degrees to prevent injury. If frost damages the vines before digging, remove them to prevent decay from starting in the dead vines and moving into the roots. If possible, dig sweet potatoes when the soil is dry, less soil will stick to the roots and they will be easier to handle. Let the roots dry about three hours after digging. Dry soil for digging potatoes is the least of our problems now. In fact it may be too dry for digging.

Successful storage depends greatly upon proper curing. Cure by placing a large quantity of roots in a fairly airtight building. If artificial heat is not available, the heat of respiration and high outside temperature is often sufficient for curing. Artificial heat can be used to bring storage temperature up to 80 to 90 degrees. Bring the relative humidity up to 85 to 90 percent with a water hose or humidifier. Wounds heal rapidly and there is some root drying. The curing process takes about 2 weeks.

Store sweet potatoes in a warm building where the air is dry and the temperature uniform. The curing room may also be the storage room if conditions are right. Temperatures during storage should be kept as close to 55 degrees as possible. The roots may chill if the temperature drops below 50 degrees. Ventilate the storage room if the

temperature gets to 60 degrees or above.

Cellar houses used for storage should be ventilated. Poor ventilation is one reason why losses are sometimes heavy when pits or banks are used for storage. Disturb the sweet potatoes as little as possible after they have been cured and stored. Excessive handling will result in increased rot and decay during storage.

Peanut harvest here in Eastland County has progressed about as fast as we have ever seen. Harvest is about 80 percent complete. There has been no wet weather to slow peanut harvest. In fact it's getting hard to remember what wet weather is like. Even though we had about 10 inches of rain in the spring our annual rainfall total for 1979 is below 19 inches, the average annual rainfall total for 1979 is below 19 inches. The average annual rainfall for the county is about 27 inches. It has been five years since we have had that much rainfall. In 1978 we had 22 inches, in 1977-17.94 inches, in 1976-22.79 inches and in 1975-23.87 inches. The last time we had above average rainfall was in 1974 when we had 30.32 inches.

Amendments Pro - Con

AMENDMENT NO. 1-H.J.R. No. 108

Proposing an amendment to Article IV, Section 26, of the Texas Constitution to authorize the legislature to provide terms of office of notaries public and to specify the appointment of notaries public for the state instead of for each county.

The proposed amendment to Article IV, Section 26, of the Texas Constitution would authorize the legislature to provide terms for office of notaries public that are not less than the current terms of two years and not more than four years. The amendment also would provide that the secretary of state shall appoint a convenient number of notaries public for the state instead of the present appointment of a convenient number of notaries public for each county. I would add temporary provisions to the Texas Constitution to establish January 1, 1980, as the date on which the amendment would take effect and to provide each person ap-

pointed a notary public before that date would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed.

ARGUMENTS

FOR:

1. Extending the term of office of notaries public from two years to four years and appointing notaries public for the state instead of for each county will reduce government personnel and will reduce costs to both the government and notaries public by decreasing the number of renewals and reappointments to be made.

2. Processing notary public applications and renewals is time-consuming and costly for county clerk's offices. The personnel in those offices could better spend their time performing other duties, and many county clerks favor the change. Currently, all applications must be forwarded from the county clerks to the secretary of state for approval, and applying directly to a centralized office for

appointment as a notary public would be more efficient and would avoid the middleman step.

AGAINST:

1. The convenience and personal contact that is found in county clerks' offices, especially in rural counties, would be lost if the secretary of state took over all responsibility for appointing and reappointing notaries public.

2. This proposed amendment would increase state control over a function that has been handled successfully at the local level. It would add to the growing state government bureaucracy and would be an instance of centralization of state government down to and through the office of notary public.

AMENDMENT NO. 2-H.J.R. No. 133

Proposing a constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department.

The proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to enact law establishing procedures for "legislative review" of state-agency rulemaking. The law could prescribe condition for agency rules to take effect and could provide for implementation of this authority by delegating powers to one or both houses of the legislature or to committees of either or both houses. The proposed amendment expressly recognizes that this scheme would be an exception to the separation of powers doctrine.

ARGUMENTS

1. The proposed amendment would provide for the close and continuing supervision needed by the state bureaucracy in order to make it more responsive to the people and to the public policies expressed by their legislature.

2. If legislative committees are given the responsibility of continuing review of agency rulemaking, it is likely that the legislature will learn to be more careful and precise in the way it delegates this power to state agencies.

3. The legislature should review state agency rules because it delegated the

specific rulemaking authority to the agencies in the first place, and the rules have the effect of laws.

4. Just as the governor's veto is a necessary check on the powers of the legislature, legislative review of agency rules can serve as an important check on the powers of the executive branch.

AGAINST:

1. The proposed amendment clearly would infringe upon one of the fundamental principles of American government—separation of powers. Under this principle the legislature makes law, the executive branch carries it out, and the courts resolve disputes under the law. Legislative review of agency rulemaking is an obvious encroachment of executive power.

2. If legislative committees get involved in the day-to-day process of agency rulemaking, then special interest groups will have one more chance to impose their will on the public. In many cases four or five sympathetic legislators might be able to block administrative actions that are needed to carry out policies set by the legislature.

3. The people have consistently rejected attempts to expand the time the legislature is in session. If this amendment is adopted, legislative committees may be "in session" on a year-round basis.

4. The legislative committee and staff members who would review agency rules do not have the same level of expertise and understanding as do agency officials who deal with the problems daily. Furthermore, the length of time that the legislative committee would take to review and make decisions could postpone the effectiveness of important and immediately needed regulations.

AMENDMENT NO. 3-S.J.R. NO. 13

Proposing a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas.

This proposed constitutional amendment would add Section 50c to Article III of the Texas Con-

stitution, authorizing the legislature to establish a program of state guaranteed loans to be used for the purchase of farm or ranch land.

The amendment would authorize \$10 million in general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which would be administered by the commissioner of agriculture without appropriation for the purpose of:

1. guaranteeing loans made by private lenders to individuals for the purchase of farm or ranch land;

2. acquiring mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased under a guaranteed loan.

3. advancing to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due on a guaranteed loan. The amendment would require that any advances made to a borrower bear interest at the rate of six percent. The amendment would also provide for investment of the bond proceeds and would place a first call on the treasury for repayment of the bonds.

ARGUMENTS

FOR:

1. The family farm makes an important contribution to the health and economic well-being of the state, but the average age of Texas farmers is reaching 55. This proposed amendment would aid young men and women who have been unable to begin in the farm and ranch business because of the high price of land and the extremely high down payment required on the land (now averaging 20 percent) by making affordable loans available.

2. Because of safeguards concerning who is eligible for loans, the risks to the state from defaults are minimal and land speculators and large corporations will not benefit. Furthermore, in case of a default, the state would be able to resell the land with the possibility of making a profit because of the initial requirement for a fair appraisal before a loan is approved and because of increasing land values.

3. The proposal has been modeled after a successful Minnesota program, and

that state's experience show that the loan security program is a viable way to encourage young farmers and ranchers.

4. Large corporations are gaining control of more and more agricultural land in the state, and this loan program enables individuals to begin to operate economically efficient and competitive farms or ranches.

AGAINST:

1. A state guaranteed loan program financed by bonds means that the state is, with borrowed money, assuming the risk of default for loans made by private lenders. Not only is this government interference with traditionally free marketplace, but it is also an unreasonable assumption of risk without tangible benefit to the state as a whole. If the presently unstable economic conditions were to worsen, the taxpayers would bear the cost of the defaulted loans. The potential for that default is reflected in current interest rates and down payment requirements; without that potential, state guarantees would not be needed to encourage private lenders to make loans.

2. Even with no or few defaults, the program is not without cost to the taxpayer. Under the enabling legislation, the costs of administering the program through the commissioner of agriculture are paid from appropriated funds. In addition, the guarantees may tend to create higher land prices and add to the inflation rate.

3. Although the number of individual farms and ranches has dropped by 50 percent since 1940, there are no proven ill effects from the decline which justify a guaranteed loan program. Farms have become fewer, larger, and more expensive to operate, but have also become far more productive.

4. The "payment adjustments" provided for under the proposed amendment and the enabling legislation are, in effect, loans to the individual borrowers. The state, therefore, is not only assuming the risk of a private lender on the

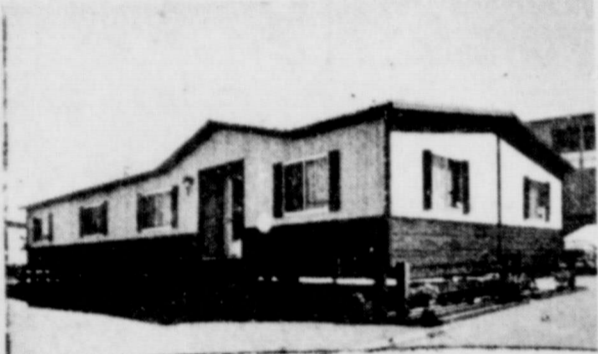

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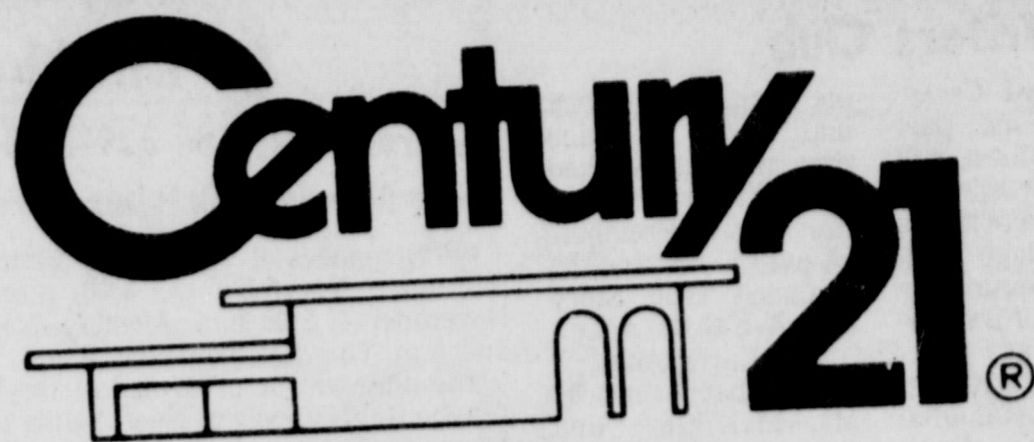

Mary Carey To Speak At Cisco Writers Club

Mary Lloyd Carey, of Alaska and past resident of Cisco, will be the guest speaker for the Cisco Writer's Club, Tuesday, Nov. 13, in the Community Room of the First National Bank, at 7 p.m.

Mrs. Carey grew up in Cisco, graduated from Cisco High School, married, and lived quite a normal life for many a year. She and her husband, David, spent three years building a cabin cruiser, and had plans to sail to Alaska via the Panama Canal. Then her husband was stricken by a heart attack, and died.

Because she and her husband had planned to go to Alaska, Mary decided that she would go ahead with this plan, but not in the cruiser. She drove it instead.

In 1962, the newly widowed Mary Carey drove the Alcan alone from Texas to Alaska, where she would make herself a new life. Her life there, whether she's been teaching in an eight-pupil pilot school in Talkeetna, Alaska, flying Mt. McKinley with bush pilot Don Sheldon or homesteading in the Alaskan wilderness—has been one of the continuous pioneering.

A crackerjack photojournalist—she obtained exclusive eyewitness coverage of the 1964 earthquake in Kodiak, Seward and Valdez. Ms. Carey won five first prizes in an Alaskan Press Club contest in 1963. She did

not reenter the contest until 1974, at which time the lady walked off with three more first prizes. Previously, in 1955, she won the National True Story Award—a \$5,000 prize.

Ms. Carey built a lodge, that overlooks Mt. McKinley, and named it Mary's McKinley View Lodge, which she built on her homestead in 1972.

"Alaska: Not For A Woman," was the first book that Mary published. In it are many accounts of her adventures in Alaska; flying Mt. McKinley when the chill factor was 148 degrees below zero; building a homestead in an inaccessible area—between two unbridged rivers on the southern flank of Mt. McKinley. She gives accounts of humorous happenings, as well as some heartbreaking events that took place.

Her second book, "Fireweed Philosophy," has recently been released. Doug Lindstrand, Alaska's most noted artist, was the illustrator for the book of verse. The fireweed is a wild flower in Alaska.

Mrs. Carey has been dubbed as America's most versatile writer, for she has written on all subjects.

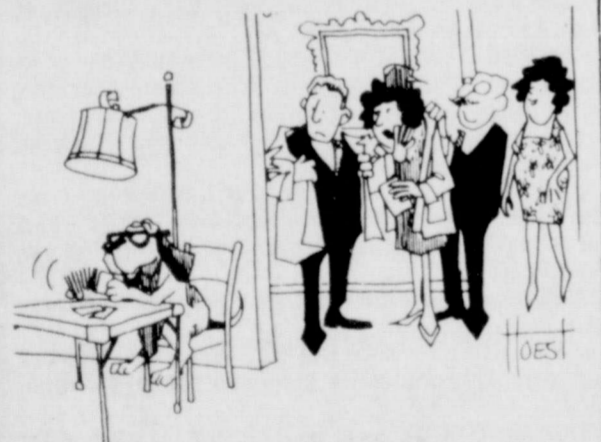

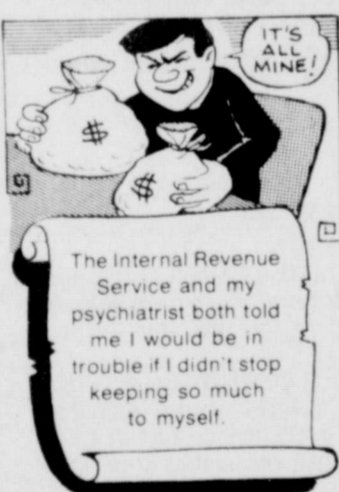

DAR Holds Meet In Pence Home

Mrs. B.C. Cromwell read the President's Message which reported 208,000 members.

Mrs. Harold Durham brought the program, titled "The Great American Seal—Its History and Symbolism" by Jimmy Morgan, a Fort Worth minister.

Mrs. Durham explained briefly the history of our Great Seal of the United States of America, saying, a committee was formed in 1782 to work out designs for the Seal. Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson and John Adams worked on a committee which contributed designs for the Seal. Other committees chose designs for the early dies, or cuts from 1782 to 1903—when the present die was accepted.

The Great Seal is attached to all important documents; it is the official signature of the United States of America. Mrs. Durham pointed out that the current one-dollar bill carries both the reverse sides of the Seal. An eagle is shown with arrows clutched in one foot; and an olive branch in the other. In its beak is a ribbon with the Latin words meaning "one out of many." Above the eagle's head there is a group of 13 stars; across its breast is a striped shield.

These symbols represent what our forefathers envisioned for the welfare of future generations.

The eagle stands for the United States Congress; the arrows symbolize strength; the olive branch represents hope for peace; the 13 stars stand for the original 13 states of the Union. The unsupported shield shows that the country should depend upon its own strength and virtues.

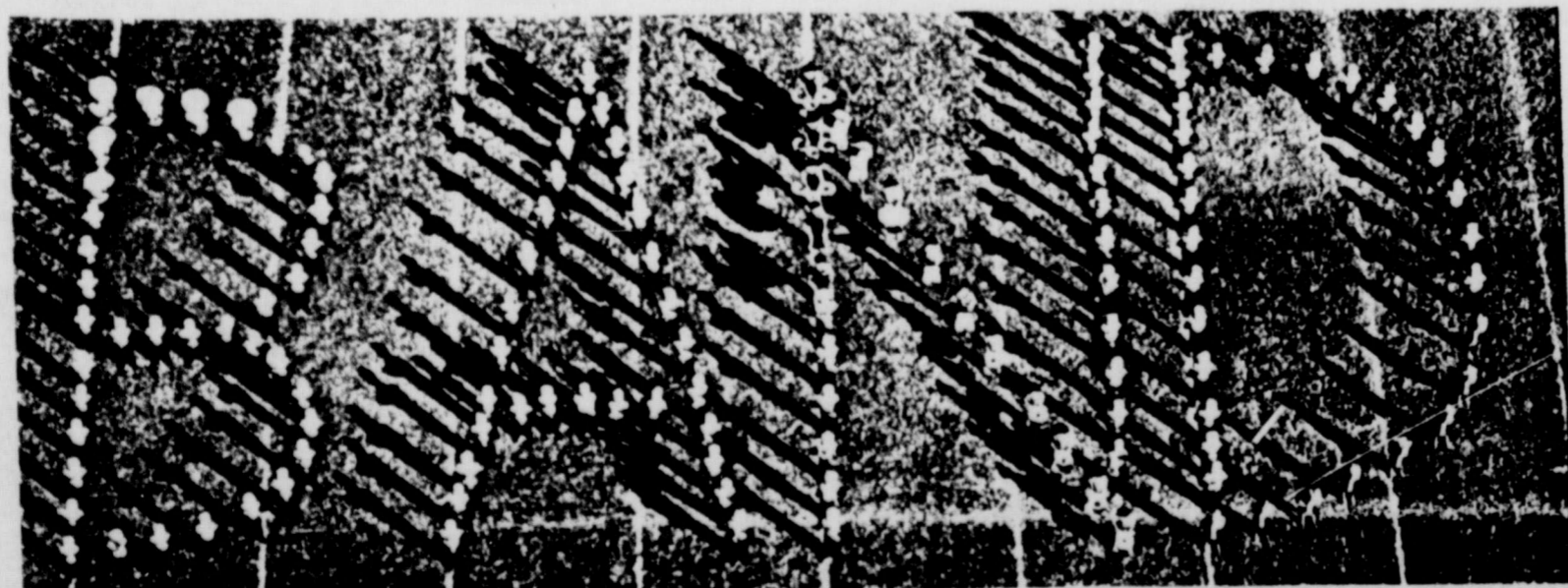

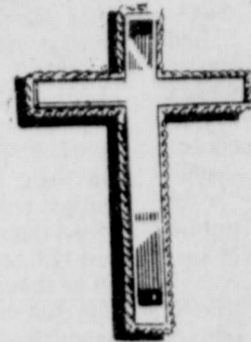

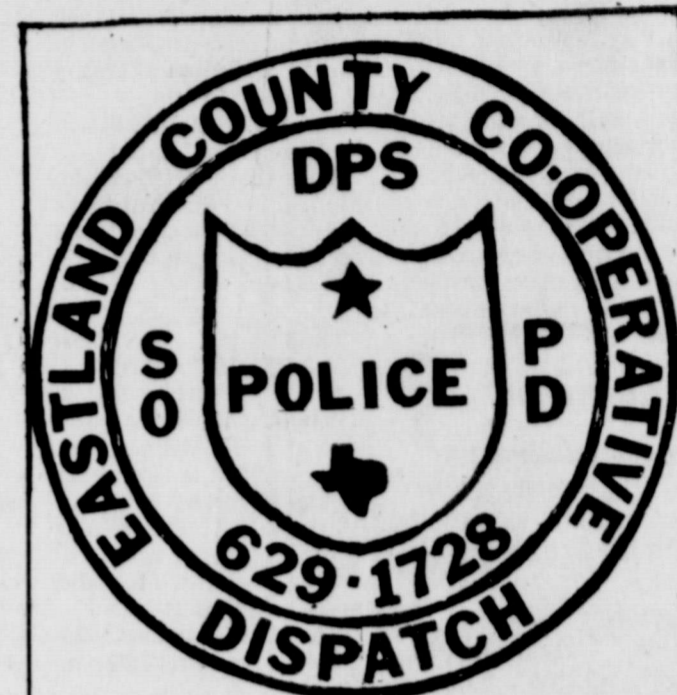
for this year. Modestly and proudly, Mrs. Killion points to her name with three winning titles printed beneath it.
