



Several homeowners in naturally concerned because of the publicity of health hazards connected

asbestos.



Stewart, Extension Agricultural Engineer - Structures and Environmental Control, about the dangers of asbestos building materials. Dr. Stewart said there are no hazards in the use of asbestos siding and roofing. However, in the application of these materials, where they are sawed and dust is produced, a filter mask should be used to reduce dust intake.

He also stated that the problems that have been involved in asbestos products are related to long term exposure of asbestos fibers and dust, primarily in the manufacturing process.

Composition roofing does not generally contain asbestos. The newer shingles contain faberglass, but not in a situation which would pose a hazard.

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department's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), unintentional excess marketing occasionally occurs during harvest season when warehouses and other marketing points are crowded with farmers waiting to dry and market their peanuts. Most excess marketings are the result of mistaken bookkeeping or other paperwork errors, according to the offi-


The reduced penalty for unintentional peanut marketing is authorized by resent legislation. ASCS county committees will determine if the excess marketings were unintentional.

The proposed amendment would reduce the current 25.2 cents per pound penalty for peanuts unintentionally overmarketed to 2.1 cents per pound for the 1978 crop and 4.2 cents per pound for the 1979 crop.

Producers who intentionally try to circumvent peanut marketing quotas would still be subject to the 25.2 cents per pound penalty.

The department is proposing also a change in the method of establishing peanut quotas for farmers who marketed less than the poundage quota for their farms. Currently, if farmers market less than their yearly quota, they are given 'credits" which allow them to market their quota plus the undermarketing in a

regulations, these undermarketing credits can be accumulated and carried over several years. Today's proposed change would not undermarketing permit credit to accumulate past the first year. Thus, the credit would have to be used the first year following the undermarketing.



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


