Stark Family Donates Building To Lions Club

The family of Tom B. Stark, long-time Cisco business man who died November 4th, is providing the sum of \$6,000 to purchase the Church of God building for donation to the Cisco Lions Club as a memorial to him, it was announced Wednesday at the weekly luncheon of the club at the Laguna Hotel.

Tom Stark was a member of the Cisco Lions Club for many years and was active in the organization. The building, located at the corner of Avenue F and West 11th Street, will be known as the Tom B. Stark Memorial Building and a suitable plaque will be erected there by the Lions Club, President Archie Chamness said.

The club passed a resolution of appreciation to Fletcher Stark and other members of the Tom B. Stark family.

Lion E.L. Jackson, member of the club for some 40 years, paid tribute to Mr. Stark in a short talk. He said that "Tom Stark stood for all of the good principals of Lionism and worked hard at being a good Lion."

Lion Truman Kirk

introduced the resolution of appreciation which read in part:

"Whereas, Fletcher Stark, as guardian of the estate of Tom B. Stark, and members of the Stark family purchased and donated the building located at Avenue F and West 11th St., in Cisco to the Cisco Lions Club as a memorial to the said Tom B. Stark;

"Whereas, Tom B. Stark passed away on Nov. 4th, 1979, now, therefore,

"Be it resolved by the Cisco Lions Club officially and as personal expression of each member that we express to the family of Tom B. Stark our sincere condolences and sympathy upon the death of Tom B. Stark, and,

"By this resolution, the Cisco Lions Club officially expresses its thanks and appreciation to the family of Tom B. Stark for the very gracious gesture and gift to the Cisco Lions Club and the Cisco community;

"That said Cisco Lions Club hereby accepts the gift and agrees to keep it in good repair and to use it for Lions Club meetings and other community activities

of a nature that are compatible with Lions objectives; and,

"That said building shall be known as the Tom B. Stark Memorial Building and a suitable plaque of dedication will be attached to said building."

The resolution was signed by President Chamness and Secretary Olin O. Odom III. Copies were sent to the Stark family, the Cisco Press and placed in the club's records.

Mr. Chamness reported that the club would take steps soon to provide the building with restroom and kitchen facilities, obtain tables and chairs, and other needed items. He said that a number of cash and material donations have already been made for improvements.

Lion Ralph Glenn was program chairman and presented Lion Wyley Peebles who showed slides of a 1978 tour of Europe. Bob Barkley of Brownwood and Mark Chamness of Cisco were guests. It was announced that local Lions have been invited to a zone cabiness meeting in Graham Saturday.

Loboes Defeated By Mavericks 19 To 0

The Loboes of Cisco High School were unable to stop the Eastland Mavericks aerial attack Friday night at Maverick Stadium and the Lobo offense was unable to sustain a scoring drive. The Mavericks pleased their

homecoming crowd as they soundly defeated the Loboes 19 to 0 in District 9-AA action.

The Loboes are now 3-2 in district play and 4-5 for the season while the Mavericks are now 2-3 in district and 5-3-1 for the season.

The Loboes will face

the apparent 9-AA champs, the Breckenridge Buckaroos, at Chesley Field in Cisco next Friday to close out the Loboes season. Friday night's loss to Eastland put Cisco a game and a half behind Breckenridge in the district race.

The Mavericks scored in each of the first three quarters and mounted up a total of 337 yards offense while Cisco only had 87 yards total. Eastland quarterback Ken Swift completed 7 of 14 passes for 147 yards and Eastland had 15 first downs as compared to 6 by Cisco.

Swift also scored Eastland's first touchdown, with three minutes left in the first quarter, on a 29 yard run.

A 35 yard pass play from Swift to end Tommy Shook in the second quarter gave Eastland a two touchdown lead at half-time.

Eastland's Swift came back in the third quarter and fired a pass to wingback Frank Norris for a 41 yard touchdown play, ending the scoring for the night. Only one of Swift's three attempted PAT kicks was good making the final score 19 to 0.

DEAR PAT--I believed I had arthritis for nearly five years and now my doctor says I have Lupus. Sometime I go for long periods and am able to use my hands well and generally get along by myself.

Without warning, I am in pain for months at a time and have to call on my daughters out of town or go stay with them because I am unable to do so many things for myself (I live alone).

Do you have any information on Lupus and how I can help myself. I am getting older and realize I need to plan for the future as much as I can but never knowing what my physical state will be, it is difficult.

I can't understand why it took five years for them to finally decide what was causing my pain and disability but I hope you can help me now.--Mrs. V.M., Georgia

DEAR MRS.--Because of its similarity to other illnesses, Lupus can be difficult to diagnose. It is a chronic, inflammatory disease whose cause and cure are currently unknown. Common symptoms are aching, weakness, malaise, excessive fatigue; low grade fever, chills and in some cases a light rash will appear on the face. Arthritis joint swelling and stiffness are also common.

Because lupus is erratic, symptoms come and go. Lupus is never cured, but with proper care, a good relationship with your physician, and understand co-operation by family members will aid in an individual leading a more normal life.

For homeowners with peach trees, fall is the best time to treat for one of the most destructive peach tree pests, the peach tree borer. A sure sign of the pest is gum oozing down the tree's trunk or branches.

This pest primarily attacks peach trees but can also infest plum, cherry and apricot trees. Sooner or later, your trees stand a good chance of being infested.

Actually, two borers attack peach trees. The larval stage of the peach tree borer feeds within the tree's cambium layer in an area about six inches above the soil line to six inches below. The lesser peach tree borer attacks the cambium layer of the upper portion of the tree's trunk and larger branches.

The approach to controlling these pests is basically the same, but the method of application differs. The best time for treatment is now until about Nov. 15.

Two fumigants generally used for peach tree borer control are paradichlorobenzene (PDB) crystals or ethylene dichloride in both liquid and crystal forms.

PDB also is the active ingredient in some kinds of mothball crystals sold in "five-and-dime" or discount stores. You can save considerable money by using mothballs as a source of PDB for borer control. However, some mothballs are made from naphthalene instead of PDB crystals and must not be used against borers.

Using fumigants around peach trees is a delicate operation, so apply them with great care and precision. Over-treatment can damage trees. The crystals, when applied to warm soil, quickly volatilize into a heavy gas which penetrates through soil crevices into burrows of overwintering borers and kills them. Apply

crystals only when soil is dry and the temperature is 55 degrees or above.

When using PDB for peach tree borer control, remove weeds from around the tree's base and level soil one foot from the trunk. Place PDB crystals in a narrow groove encircling the tree about two inches from the trunk. Be careful to keep crystals from directly contacting the tree.

Place clean soil over the crystals to form a cone-shaped pile about six inches high around the tree's base. Remove this soil from the base of the tree in late March or early April.

The amount of PDB to use is determined by age and size of the tree. In general, use one-half ounce of crystals for two-to three-year-old trees, three-fourths ounce for four-to five-year-old trees, and one ounce for mature trees.

Both PDB and ethylene dichloride can also be used to treat peach trees infested by the lesser peach tree borer. Treat affected areas, recognized by masses of gum mixed with saw dust running down the surface of the trunk and branches, after leaves fall from the peach trees.

Use a mixture of four ounces PDB in one pint of miscible (easily mixed) oil diluted in two pints of water or a smaller amount at the same proportions. Paint the mixture on wounds and damaged areas without encircling the trunk or limb.

Proper rates and application instructions for using ethylene dichloride for either peach tree borer or lesser peach tree borer control will be found on the product label.

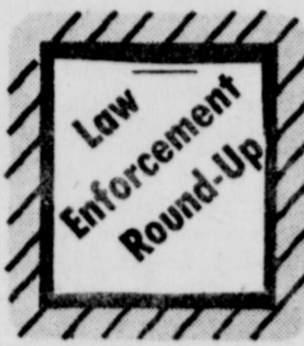
For the homeowner with peach trees infested with either peach tree borers or lesser peach tree borers, control measures can greatly lengthen the life of the trees.

Brownwood Man Abductor Caught

A Lake Brownwood man was abducted at gunpoint early Thursday and forced to drive several miles before being released unharmed. Brown County Deputy Sheriff Randy Donahoo said.

Investigators said the man's stolen car later was involved in another abduction and two armed robberies in Granbury and Arlington.

A 23-year-old man matching the description of the suspect was arrested about 6:45 p.m. Thursday by Eastland County Department of Public Safety troopers, said DPS dispatcher Buddy Rowch.

The man broke and ran when DPS Troopers Kenneth Rose and Steve Foster arrived to investigate a minor accident on the service road of Interstate 20, two miles east of the Cisco city limits, Rowch said. The troopers arrested the 23-year-old in a field, he said.

A check on the 1975 Chevrolet the man was driving revealed the car was stolen. Rowch added, and the man was wanted in connection with several charges, including armed robbery and possibly kidnapping.

The man was en route to Brownwood in custody of Brown County Sheriff's Deputy and a Texas Ranger about 10:30 p.m. Thursday.

Howard Harris of Lake Brownwood told authorities he had been driving toward Brownwood on Highway 279 early Thursday when he stopped to assist a man

standing beside a car with its emergency flashers on.

Harris said while he and the man - described as white, tall, slender, with brown hair - were driving into Brownwood to buy gas for the man's vehicle, the man threatened him with a blue steel revolver, instructing him to continue through Brownwood east on U.S. Highway 377.

At about the same time Harris was reporting the incident to authorities, the sheriff's department was notified that the disabled vehicle on Highway 279 was a stolen car.

A man fitting the same description as the man who abducted Harris robbed a convenience store in Arlington later Thursday, abducting the store clerk and forcing her to drive him from Arlington to just outside of Weatherford, Donahoo said.

EYE EXAMS -- MORE IMPORTANT THAN YOU THINK

Eye exams are more important than some people think. Says a health education specialist.

Almost half of the nation's entire population needs visual correction. Carla Shearer explains.

Ms. Shearer is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Also, one of every 20 children ages three to five has an eye problem, she says.

Have your child's eyes examined by age three, the specialist advises.

After that, you and the doctor should decide how often to return for eye exams.

Most children should have eye exams every year -- or every other year -- until they reach age 20, the specialist adds.

Between the early 20's to age 35-40, you may need an eye exam every three or five

years, since visual acuity (seeing ability) doesn't change very rapidly during this time.

After ages 40-45, it's a good idea to have an eye exam every two years to test for glaucoma and other diseases, along with visual acuity.

NINE-POINT EXAM
A thorough eye examination generally includes nine points:

- 1) Taking of a general health history.
- 2) A thorough examination of the eye -- including the eyelid and any scars or inflammation around the eye.
- 3) An internal examination of the eye with an ophthalmoscope, which illuminates the interior portion of the eye.
- 4) A check for coordination of eye movement.
- 5) Close examination of the cornea.
- 6) A test for blaucoma -- usually done for persons over age 30.
- 7) A depth-perception test --

The Evangelical Methodist Church is a young organization, being formed about thirty three years ago. Yet it feels that it is an ageless organization, in that it is called to give the gospel of Christ, and teach moral reforms by being true to the Bible. It has one Church in Eastland County, an attractive building on West 8th Street in Cisco. The congregation consists of around forty two persons, and the Pastor is John W. Clinton. The Pastor is also referred to as "Reverend", or "Minister". Greg Nichols is the Youth Director, and Gary Fink the Music Director.

There are Evangelical Methodist Churches in Sweetwater, Abilene, the Dallas-Ft. Worth area, across the state of Texas and the whole nation. The movement has been growing, attracting persons from all ages and all walks of life. Much of its initial inspiration came from West Texas leaders, who joined with other Methodists to begin the organization. The Church is said to have been "born in a prayer meeting" in May, 1946, when a group of Ministers and lay people met

in Memphis, Tennessee, stating they wished to conserve the Biblical faith which had fired the Spiritual revival under John and Charles Wesley in the 18th Century. The group termed themselves "conservative" in religious concepts, stating that the gulf between their thinking and that of "liberals" was irreparable.

Dr. J.H. Hamblen, of Abilene, was elected chairman of the group meeting in Memphis, and was elected the first General Superintendent of the Evangelical Methodist Church the following November at the first Annual Conference at Kansas City, Missouri. At this Conference Dr. Ezequiel B. Vargas, Superintendent of the Mexican Evangelistic Mission, founded in 1946, was present - and proposed that this work become a part of the Evangelical Methodist Church. Since that time the Church has been the leading Protestant evangelizing agency in all of Northern Mexico.

Two other American Churches united with the Evangelical Methodist in 1960 and 1962. These were the Evangel Church and the People's Methodist Church.

The "Mother Church" of the Evangelical Methodist

organization was established in Abilene, with Dr. J.H. Hamblen as its Pastor. His well-known son, Stuart Hamblen of Hollywood, California, assisted his father in some of the first evangelistic meetings. Stuart Hamblen, a singer, is the composer of the songs: "It Is No Secret", "This Old House", and "Until Then".

The Church in Cisco was begun in 1957 with fifteen charter members. John Syrios was the first Pastor. The group purchased land at the present location of the Church, and began worship in a small building which had been used as part of a lumber yard. This has been remodeled into the present structure, which includes an, attractive sanctuary, a large Fellowship Hall, and classrooms.

Sunday services at the Church in Cisco begin with Sunday School at 10, followed by a Preaching service at 11. There is a Sunday night service at 7, followed by a Young People's Meeting. On Wednesday night a service is held which is called "Hour Of Power And Prayer". Instrumental and vocal music is used with all these services. The Sacraments of the Church are Baptism and The Lord's Supper.

The Church has a "Congregational" form of government, in that the Church owns its property and elects its Pastor. There is an annual election to choose Church officers, including the Board of Stewards. This Board, which consists of five persons in Cisco, serves in the capacity of an Eldership. They administer the affairs of the Church, including finances and support of Missions. The Evangelical Methodist Church has Mission Work in many countries of the world, and the Cisco Church helps support projects in Mexico and Bolivia. The local Church elects delegates to help decide matters within the Methodist Conference. The World Headquarters of the Church is located at

Wichita, Kansas. The Church holds membership in the National Association of Evangelicals, but has no connection with the National Council of Churches or the World Council of Churches.

A person who is a member of a Christian Churches may transfer his membership to the Evangelical Methodist Church by profession of faith. Or, a person of another Church may transfer by letter. Any person who has been saved from his sins, who believes in Christ and has confessed Him may become a member by baptism. This person may choose his mode of baptism either by sprinkling or immersion.

The new member is expected to be willing to walk in the light of God's word and that of the Holy Spirit. The Church believes that the Bible is the inspired word of God. It uses various translations, requiring only that they be true to the original Greek and Hebrew texts.

"We believe the Bible teaches very strongly that we are saved by Grace," Pastor Clinton states. "But when a person joins the Church, he should be committed to a life-style which follows this word of God."

This includes total abstinence from alcohol and other dangerous drugs, and assisting the community whenever needed.

"We try to reach out to those in need, regardless of Church denomination, color, or creed," the Pastor adds. "We promote the idea that God is the one who helps."

The Church teaches that the Ten Commandments are part of the life-style of a Christian. "The Old Testament and the New Testament compliment each other," Pastor Clinton explains. God established these Laws, and they tell us how God wants us to live. The Grace of Christ, which saves us, enables us to walk in God's way."

The Evangelical Methodist Church teaches that marriage is meant to be

Tx. Agriculture Highlighted During Farm-City Week

Farm-City Week, Nov. 16-22, is dedicated to bringing about better understanding between rural and urban residents and their interdependence on each other. It is sponsored by the Farm-

City Council, Inc., in cooperation with Kiwanis International.

"During Farm-City Week, it's important to focus on the bigness of the agricultural industry in Texas," points out Dr. Carl Anderson, economist in marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "Production assets exceed \$60 billion. Farmers also pay production expenses of almost \$9 billion annually to earn a net income of slightly more than \$1 billion."

Yet, Texas farmers and ranchers make up less than 4 percent of the state's population. On the average, each has about \$350,000 to \$400,000 invested in land, machinery, livestock, working capital and farm buildings and nets about \$5,500 a year. "By most business standards, this is a relatively low return to capital," points out Anderson.

"Despite this, agriculture is vital to the economy of Texas," emphasizes the economist. Many businesses, financial institutions and individuals are involved in supplying and servicing agricultural production and in processing and marketing farm and ranch products. The agribusiness sector will add more than \$32 billion to the state's economy this year, estimates Anderson.

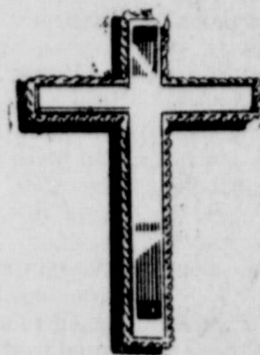
