Cisco City Council Sets Run-Off Election Dec. 4

Following a canvassing of the November 6 City Election by Carl Gorr, the Cisco City Council voted unanimously that a resolution be prepared calling for a run-off election Tuesday, December 4 for City Council member place 3. The candidates will be Harold Phippen and Charles Moad since neither received a majority of the total votes cast in the past election.

Council member Louise Allison made the motion which was seconded by council member Lucy Collier. Mayor Brown and council members Allison, Collier, Bill Eudy and Morgan Fleming voted in its favor. Council member Raymond Whitley was absent.

The canvassing of the November 6 election was unanimously approved in a motion by Fleming to accept the counting of votes. The motion was seconded by Eudy.

In other action, Fleming made a motion to accept the minutes of the October 23 City Council meeting. Eudy seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Allison made a motion the City accept a bid from Brian Edwards for a six month lease of 80 acres of City property at the Sanitary Landfill for the purpose of drilling an oil well. Collier seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Mr. Edwards then asked if the City would put the remaining 132 acres of the original

212 acres of land up for bid. Whoever is awarded the bid will have to work out agreements with those persons who now have grass leases on the land.

Allison made a motion the City advertise for bids to lease the remaining 132 acres owned by the City with the stipulations discussed at the meeting. Eudy seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Following a financial report for the month of October by City Manager John Boland, Eudy made a motion to accept the report. Fleming seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

City Engineer Billy Jacobs was present at Tuesday night's meeting and reported on the Front Street project. He said the final paving cost to the city was \$65,091.81 (less than the original bid of \$67,000 plus). The City has already paid \$61,958.65 and its final payment of \$3,103.16 is due. Mr. Jacobs then presented a change of order on the project (including the additional paving of one block of 11th Street, narrowing the paving on Front Street and ending the north part of the paving where the bricks begin) to the Council for approval. Collier made a motion to accept the change order. Eudy seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

In the City Manager's report, Boland stated under work projects that city crews are working on streets. They have

Each vehicle cost \$1500 making the total for both \$3,000 (\$2,000 less than budgeted for police vehicles).

No decisions were made on the matter.

carries, and Lanier, 138 yards in 34 trips into the line. Stamford, who is from Breckenridge, gained virtually all of Cisco's 85 yards rushing.

Top defenders were Hunt, with two interceptions and four tackles, Rusty Ellis, Mark Seguin, Rocky Hubble and John Herrera for the Rangers.

Barrett, for CJC, had eight tackles to go with his interception. Cisco's top tackle maker was LB Ken Mizel, who had 14. Roy Kruemcke, defensive end, had two fumble recoveries and five tackles. Mike McClellan, Mike McMillan, Mike Bailey, Ricky Nunn and Brian Vickers were also busy in the tackle making department for CJC.

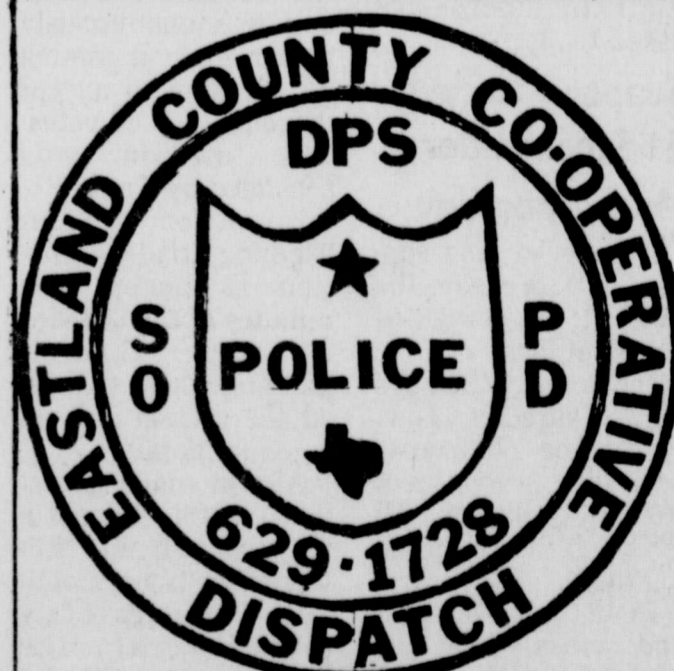

U.S. Postal Service Gives Packaging And Mailing Tips

Often the U.S. Postal Service reminds the public to prepare parcels properly for mailing but do not always advise exactly how to do so.

With the holiday season rapidly approaching, some practical packaging and mailing tips are in order. Customer cooperation in following these simple guidelines will help the U. S. Postal Service provide the best possible delivery service this Christmas.

To begin with, most materials needed for preparing parcels for mailing can be found around the home.

The first step is selecting a proper container. Corrugated fiberboard boxes are excellent. Also acceptable are reinforced bags and paperboard boxes, depending on the physical characteristics of the item being mailed.

Containers should always be large enough to hold the contents plus allow about an inch for cushioning material on each side. Adequate cushioning will protect the contents from shifting in transit as well as damage from other parcels.

Shredded or crumpled newspaper, polystyrene or "bubble" plastic also are recommended. However, popcorn is no longer recommended—in fact, it should not be used—because it absorbs moisture and crumbles.

If an adequate container is being used, it is not necessary to wrap paper around the box. However, if the container needs to be covered to protect or cover markings or interior wraps, ordinary grocery bags are excellent to provide an outside surface.

Cellophane and masking tapes are not acceptable for closing or reinforcing parcels. Pressure sensitive and reinforced tapes are highly recommended. Twine and cord are not recommended because they may become loose and get caught in mail processing equipment.

Finally, the outside of each parcel must be marked clearly with the address, including Zip Code, of both the sender and receiver. The addresses must be legible whether typed or handwritten and should be applied directly on the parcel, since labels may come off.

It's also a good idea to place return address inside the package as well, just in case the outside address should be obliterated in some way.

This information will help the U.S. Postal Service in delivering all parcels in time for Christmas even if an outside address becomes illegible for any reason.

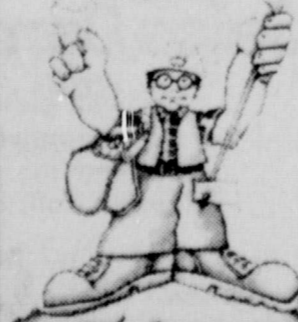

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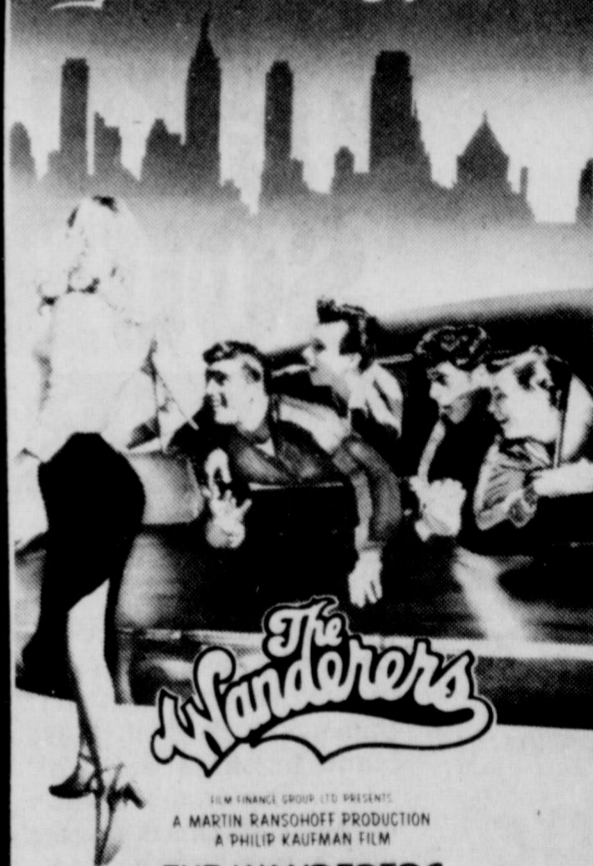

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C. — After World War II the confidence of Americans seemed almost unlimited. We had defeated the Axis powers and then, through the Marshall Plan, rebuilt most of Western Europe. We could do all this and at the same time provide prosperity for our own citizens. People all over the world were beginning to predict that the next 100 years would be an "American Century."

Looking back on this era, it is hard to imagine today that confidence in our leaders and ourselves is at such a low ebb. Few people are talking about extending America's power and influence and no one is using the phrase "American Century." The present situation is, in a large part, due to our Country's involvement in the Vietnam War. This conflict shattered the belief in our ability to find pragmatic solutions to difficult problems. It has

shaken the concept of ourselves as a Nation.

Now there is a pervasive sense among Americans that we ought to put Vietnam behind us and get on with the business of the world. This attitude neither does justice to ourselves or to the people who fought and died in this conflict. If we sweep the issue under the rug, the lump will show.

One of the legacies of Vietnam that we must continue to confront is the MIA question. Uncovering the fate of these American servicemen and civilians listed as missing must remain important to the United States. We cannot lose sight of the sacrifice these men and their families have made. This Country should be ever mindful of the pain and uncertainty which shrouds the lives of the families and friends of those still listed as missing. The Vietnam conflict is still very much alive in the hearts and minds of

these people and we must not forget them.

It has been over six years since the signing of the Paris accords and we still have not received a full accounting of the over 2,500 MIA's. Very little has been done to convince the Vietnam government that we will not forget the issue. The President's MIA commission was told by the Defense Department that it is reasonable to assume the Hanoi regime can provide information on over 1,000 of the missing servicemen. But the Administration has applied little pressure to receive this data.

The communist governments of Vietnam, Laos, and Cambodia have repeatedly sought economic assistance from the United States. They claim that we owe them "reparation" payments. Though they seek our aid, they have done little to provide information about MIA's. It is callous and cruel to use this

knowledge as a pawn in an international chess game.

We must not allow the issues of the present to bury the problems of the past. If we are going to revitalize our confidence as a Nation, we should not suppress the difficulties of our recent history. The MIA question still remains unresolved — let us not forget.

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Chaos Reigns In Iran, County Man Believes

The situation in Iran was described as "complete chaos" by Weldon Ussery, retired Eastland County business executive, in an interview Tuesday. Mr. Ussery returned home a year ago after spending 11 years working in Iran.

Iran under the Ayatollah Khomeini is a country of temperamental and emotional people with religion as their way of life, Mr. Ussery said. They are difficult to understand and their actions are hard to analyze, he added.

Actually, nobody is in control of the government of Iran, Mr. Ussery said. He follows the situation there closely by televi-

sion, radio and newspapers. He still has a number of close friends, both U.S. and Iranian citizens, there.

The Shah, whose delivery by the U.S. is being demanded in exchange for 63 hostages held captive in Iran, did more for that country during 37 years on the throne than was accomplished by any other country in the Middle East, Mr. Ussery said.

Mr. Ussery, who is acquainted with the Shah, regarded the exiled leader as a very sick man whose overthrow was the result of emotion created by the Ayatollah.

Action of President Carter to cancel all contracts between the

U.S. and Iran to buy oil was applauded by Mr. Ussery. "I had been telling him by mental telepathy to cancel oil and all other business ties with Iran," he said.

The Moslem belief in "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth" might be considered by U.S. officials in their efforts to find a solution to the hostage problem, Mr. Ussery suggested.

"We can't consider military action," he said, "for we would be unable to land troops closer than nine miles of the beleaguered U.S. Embassy, and there were between three and four million people in that area." And every Iranian who wants one has a gun.

What can be done? "With the Ayatollah having little or no control over his people, about all we can do is wait and hope for the best," Mr. Ussery said.

A native of Eastland County, Mr. Ussery spent so 25 years in foreign assignments with engineering and construction companies before retiring.

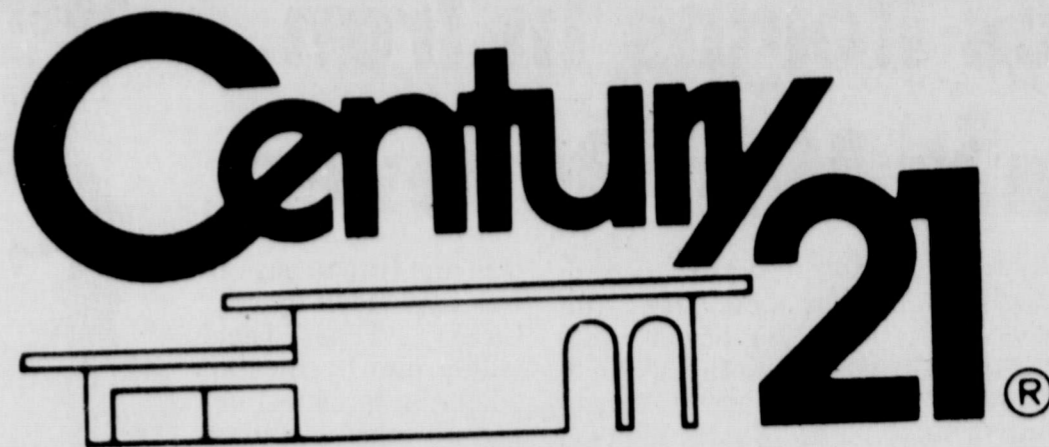

Most of all, we want to prevent others from becoming a slave to the nasty, dangerous habit. If you're right now toying with occasionally smoking a cigarette because you think it's cute: STOP, RIGHT NOW, WHEN YOU CAN. It's not worth it!

If you've smoked; keep it that way. You deserve a prize.

Thursday, Nov. 15, is Great American Smokeout day again...and I'll try, if you will.

Surgeon General Dr. Julius B. Richmond today issued the following statement urging the nation's smokers to give up cigarettes for 24 hours on Thursday, Nov. 15:

"More than 30 million American men and women have quit smoking cigarettes since 1964 when the Surgeon General's Report linked cigarette smoking with lung cancer, heart disease, chronic bronchitis, and emphysema.

"Solid scientific evidence has shown that smokers are sick more often and die earlier than nonsmokers. Last year, more than 5 million Americans stopped smoking for just one day - the Great American Smokeout - and many were still not smoking one month later.

"This year again, you have a chance with millions of others to stop smoking for just one day to show your desire to quit and in recognition of the health risks of smoking. On November 15, the American Cancer Society is sponsoring the Great American Smokeout to encourage you to show your determination to quit for one day in the hope that you will quit for good.

"Today, 15 years after the first Surgeon General's Report on Smoking and Health, the reasons for quitting are even stronger than they were in 1964. The evidence of the health risks of smoking is now overwhelming.

"We now know that smoking has grave health implications for women - especially pregnant women and teenagers. Smoking habits that are started during the teenage years shape a lifelong habit of cigarette consumption. Smoking during pregnancy has significant adverse effects on the health of the unborn child.

"As Surgeon General and as Honorary Chairman of the Great American Smokeout, I urge all Americans to take part in the Great American Smokeout and make Nov. 15 the first day that you find the willpower to join the growing number of Americans who have quit smoking."

Per capita use of tobacco by Americans is at a 46-year low according to a Department of Agriculture report. The report, published in the department's Farm Paper Letter, shows cigarette smoking leading the decline in personal use of tobacco. Consumption has declined for the sixth consecutive year even though the use of chewing tobacco has shown modest increase.

Per capita smoking figures used by the department refer to persons 18 years and older and include nonsmokers as well. They are statistical references rather than guides to actual smoking habits.

Total tobacco use is down to 7.91 pounds per capita, down from 8.28 pounds in 1978 and the lowest per capita consumption since 1933.

Governor William Clements has declared November 15, 1979, Great American Smokeout Day in Texas. In an official memorandum he noted that "the Great American Smokeout, while light-hearted in approach, has potential for improving the health of the people of this state." He also "urged all cigarette smokers to try giving up cigarettes on that day."

An estimated 60,000 Texas smokers will pledge not to smoke for 24 hours this year. Thousands of volunteers in 350 plus ACS Units statewide, will be distributing pledge cards

Hints For The Aged & Handicapped

DEAR PAT-Can you or your readers give me any good ideas on how I might continue my sewing?

Because of arthritis, I find it increasingly difficult but it is something I have always enjoyed and will do most anything to continue. I'm sure there are others who will also benefit by any directions or ideas that you can offer through your wonderful column.--Mrs. K.S., Tennessee

DEAR MRS. S.--Sewing can be both pleasure and frustration, and hopefully, from what I have compiled on how it can be accomplished despite hand limitation, it will be more pleasure than frustration.

Thread your needle easier by first sticking the needle into a pin cushion. For even more stability, add a strip of Velcro to your sewing table and another strip to the bottom of the pin cushion.

Automatic needle threaders are also available. If you can't find one locally, check with Fashion Able, Rocky Hill, N.J. 08553.

For ease in cutting material, use electric scissors. Even if you don't have finger or hand limitation, these are great to have.

The Scandinavian design handle is the easiest to manage when cutting with regular scissors. The handles are larger than normal and are of molded plastic that is designed to fit your hand. Weight is only three ounces and Jay Norris Corp., 25 West Merrick Rd. Dept. L-307, Freeport, N.Y. 11520 carries them if you can't find them locally.

Left handed scissors will enable you to continue to work independently if your right hand is disabled.

Any good sewing center or fabric shop can aid you in selecting the newest and easiest to use products on the market. From iron-on mending and decorator patches that eliminates stitching and sewing, to spray-ons that will hold patterns securely on your fabric and eliminate pinning. The pattern is then easily peeled from the fabric and can be used again.

Choose your sewing area with care: Make sure this is good lighting, a low work surface that will allow you

work comfortable and enough space to accommodate all of your sewing materials and equipment, and any special equipment you may use personally.

Keep one or two heavy weights close by in order to "hold" your material when cutting or sewing-and of course, keep your magnetic reaching-stick on hand to retrieve dropped articles, pins, needles, etc.

City Sales Tax Rebates Are Higher

AUSTIN, Tex.--State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said city sales tax rebates to Texas cities through November are 11 percent higher than payments during the same period in 1978. Bullock also announced that 923 Texas cities would share \$25.8 million in rebates for the month of November. He said 1979 payments to date now total \$390.4 million, compared to allocations of \$349.8 million through November of last year. Net payments to cities during November of last year

totalled about \$19.8 million. Cisco will get a check this month for \$5,470.95, bringing this year's payments to \$88,733.82. Eastland's check for November will be \$5,934.88, pushing its yearly total to \$98,726.18, up 04.00 percent. Gorman will get \$849.19, bringing that city's payments up to \$16,777.99 for the year. Ranger will receive \$4,445.86 this month. That city's rebates this year have been \$65,771.83. The optional, one-percent

city sales tax is collected with four-percent state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated on a monthly basis to the cities by the Comptroller's office.

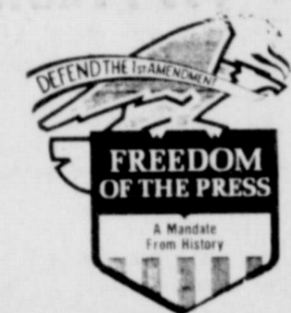

This does not mean students ten years ago were more intelligent; perhaps they were more determined, more hungry for success and accomplishment.

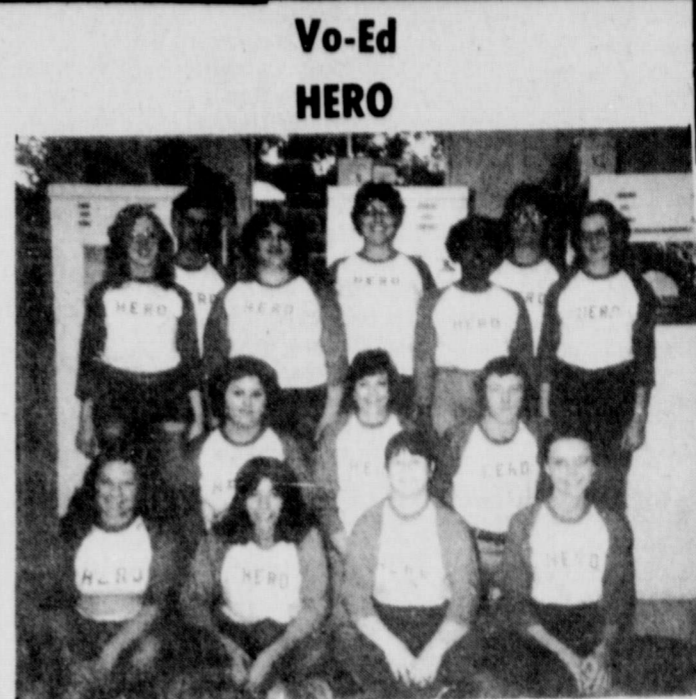
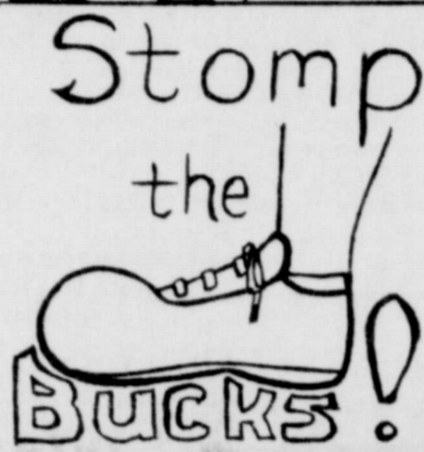
A typical student today may submit homework late or not at all and not be overly concerned. Tests are taken with little or no preparation, classes are cut, and study time is wasted.

Educational values and standards that were common place a few years ago may never return!

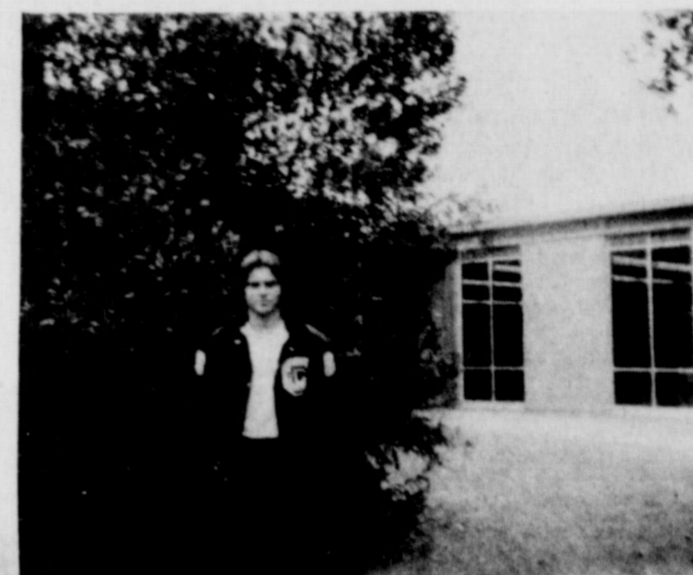

ice, it does not enter the city's sewer system. He stated Mr. Smith has invested several hundred dollars to recycle the unused water and probably the only water entering the sewer system comes from one rest room facility. He went on to say that probably no more than 10,000 gallons at most enters the sewer system itself. Eudy made a motion to make an adjustment of the sewer charge, retroactive two months, and bring it down to the \$4 (10,000 gallons) minimum charge. Collier seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

The Council also heard a request of Mrs. Everett Martin to close the 700 block of West 19th Street. Mrs. Martin stated 19th Street dead ends and the final block is extremely muddy in wet weather. The Martins own an overnight trailer park in the vicinity and could use the street to allow some of the larger trailers room to park. Mrs. Martin stated they own the land on both sides of 19th Street on the discussed block and no other businesses would be interfered with by the closing of that portion of the street. The Martins requested the closing of the street a year or so ago and at that time they had statements from everyone living on 18th and 19th streets saying it would be alright to close the street. Fleming stated there are several new families now living on 19th Street and suggested the Martins get in contact with those people. Mayor Brown instructed Mrs. Martin to get the list of people completed and give it to the City Manager for future council consideration.

Eudy made a motion to table a request from W.E. McGough to close the 700 block of Beech Avenue. The motion came about following a statement by Chamber of Commerce Manager Gene Abbott that representatives of the Otis Company have ex-

pressed the desire to use that street to reach their plant from Highway 80. (The Otis Company has purchased the Boss Manufacturing building here). He said they are interested in that street (which passes just east of Poor Boys Salvage) in order to avoid the intersection and school crossing at Avenue A and 8th Street. Fleming seconded Eudy's motion and all voted in its favor.

Mayor Brown suggested action be tabled on an ordinance concerning the Eastland County Appraisal District until they can get a rehearing. Allison did not approve of voting for the naming of a representative from Cisco six years in advance. The ordinance would have a representative from Eastland this first two years, one from Ranger the next two and then one from Cisco. She did say she would like to see it approved for the City of Eastland to have a two-year representative.

In the council's final action, Eudy made a motion the monthly bills be accepted. Collier seconded and all voted in its favor.

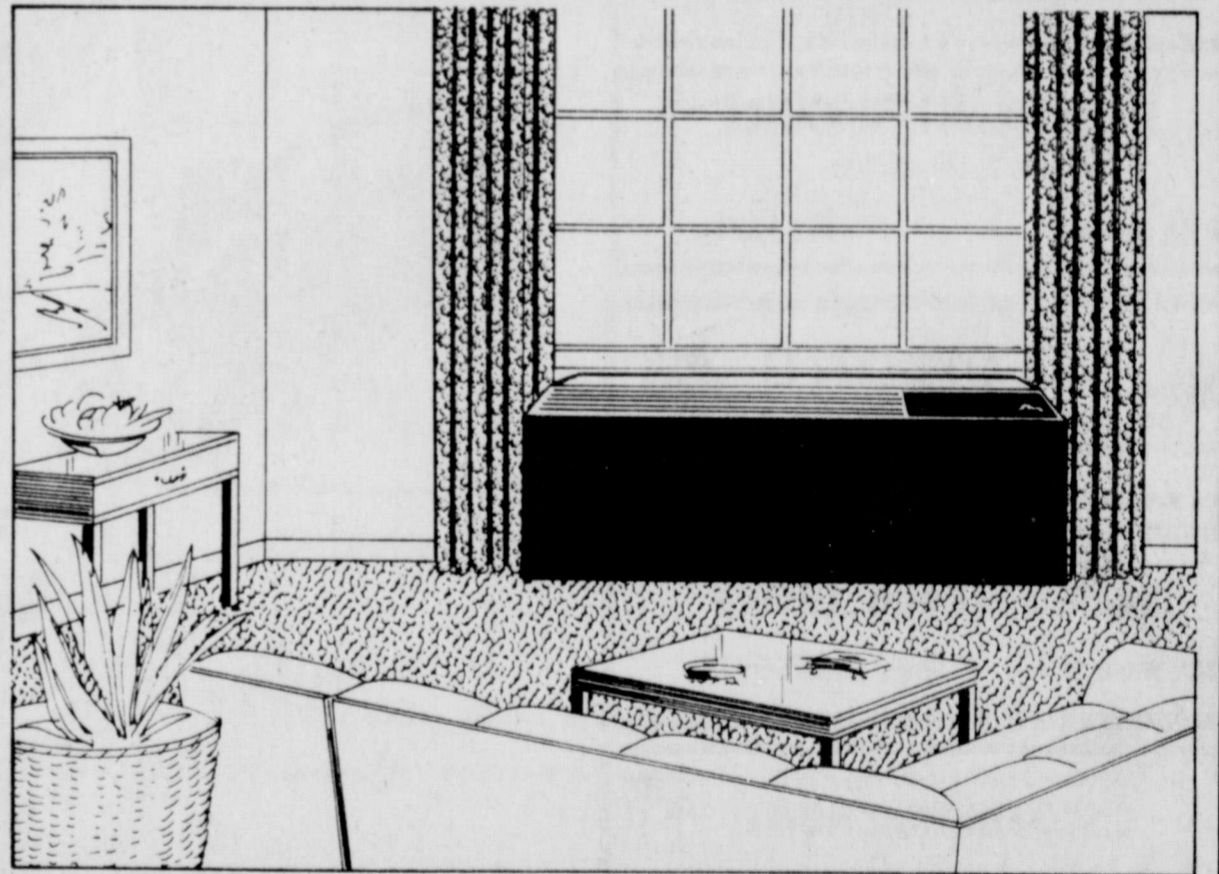

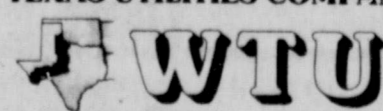
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
