

Six attorneys in the Eastland area are eyeing Nov. 28 with hopes of becoming the 91st District Court judge, but one of the lawvers said "there is a catch" to getting the bench appointment.

The current judge, 74-yearold Earl Conner Jr., will retire Nov. 28 with about one year left on his four-year elected term.

Republican Gov. Bill Clements may appoint one of the six attorneys to replace Conner, and that is where the "catch" comes in.

"We're all Democrats and the word is that Clements is very partisan in his appointments," Cisco attorney Tru-·man Kirk said.

Describing himself as a "very conservative Demo-crat," Kirk, a 55-year-old attorney who has been practicing law about 24 years, said Clements probably would like to appoint a Republican to the Judgeship.

"But we don't have any Republicans in the whole county," Kirk said, adding, "the governor likes conservatism.

If Clements does not appoint someone to fill Conner's term, the administrative judge for the district may make temporary appointments so that pending cases can be heard.

"But that probably won't happen. We expect Clements to appoint someone," Kirk said.

Kirk practiced law in Abilene and Odessa before beginning his private practice in Cisco, and served on the Abilene City Council from 1962-64.

"I'm probably the most conservative of the bunch,' Kirk claimed, "although most of them are claiming to be conservative right now." A check of the lawyers proved his statement correct: All but one of the six attorneys said they are con-

servative Democrats. Some, like Eastland attorney Bill Hart, said their philosophies reflect nonpartisan political lines.

"I would very probably run as a Democrat," Hart said, "but I definitely don't go along with Kennedy or Carter or any of that bunch up there in Washington."

Hart, a 56-year-old attorney who has been practicing law about 28 years, said his "variety of experience" makes him the most qualified

candidate for the job. He has served as an assistant city attorney in Lubbock, assistant district attorney and Midland city attorney. He began his Eastland private practice in 1964.

"From overall practice and experience," Hart said, "I'm probably the best candidate. "But they all are good candidates. I just wish the governor would select somebody," he said.

A spokesperson for Clements said the governor has not made a decision for the appointment.

Dewey Cox, an attorney from Ranger who has been practicing law about 26 years, said he hopes Clements will "let Conner con-

Although Cox said he "probably would be interested" in being appointed to fill Conner's term, he is the only one of the six attorneys who has not filed a written application with the governor's

office. Cox declined to reveal his age or political philosophies, but he said, "I usually vote Democratic.

'You have a Republican governor in there," Cox said, explaining that Clements 'may not want to appoint' anyone who claims to be a Democrat.

The best alternative for the governor would be to 'appoint Conner to fill his own term," Cox said.

"Conner is a fair-minded man and his health is good, and his appointment would allow us to get on with the cases" that have been filed

in the district, Cox said. Clements' failure to appoint a judge for the distict could cause some hardships, said Emory Walton, 91st district attorney and one of the applicants for Conner's job.

Chaos is not going to set in, but it can be difficult if someone is not appointed pretty soon," he said.

Walton, 48, has been district attorney since 1968

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and has been practicing law since 1965 when he served as assistant city attorney in Abilene.

His Democratic ideals, Walton said, should not keep him from the judge's chambers.

"Of course I've run as a Democrat, but that shouldn't matter. The important thing is having someone with a lot of trial experience who can remain impartial," he said. Impartiality is a trait Eastland attorney Jim Wright claims to possess, and he said it is reflected in his trial experience as well as his political philosophies.

Wright, a 32-year-old attorney who has been practicing law since 1972, said, "I'm a conservative Democrat, but I more or less go with the man instead of the

Wright graduated from Texas Tech Law School and served as a criminal trial laywer in Lubbock before opening his practice in East-

He wondered aloud when Clements will make his decision, saying, "You hear all kinds of tale about who will be appointed. But the only way to find out is to just wait and see.

Saul Pullman, another Eastland attorney vying for Conner's job, also has heard the tales. "There are a lot rumors,

but nobody knows for sure,' he said. Pullman, a 39-year-old

Democrat who has been practicing law about 15 years, said he is concerned abut conflicts of interest developing if any one of the attorneys is appointed to fill

Conner's term. 'We all have cases filed in the district, but I would think that Conner could fill in on cases where there is an obvious conflict of interest,"

Pullman said his experience with criminal cases qualifies him for the job.

"I think I'm more fairminded than any of the others," he said, "but we're all competent and able to

But, he said, "the governor will make the final decision at least until the next

That may the ultimate

If Clements refuses to appoint someone to the judge's office, the attorneys will have until the Democratic primary in May to plot

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



If there has been one single theme sweeping the country over the past few years it is frustration, even anger, at what people feel is too much government.

This sentiment is typified by the approval of Proposition 13 in California, similar tax and spending limitations in other states, the anti-Washington rhetroic of President Carter, and the growing conservatism of the Congress.

But, as always, the last people to recognize this trend are Washington bureaucrats. They are spending \$128.5 million a year in paid advertising and an estimated \$400 million in public information - publicity · activities to tell people the bureaucrats in Washington are doing a good job.

The federal government has one of the largest - and most costly - public relations and information operations in the United States. And it comes out of our pocketbooks through taxes.

According to a recent survey conducted by the authoritative trade journal Advertising Age, the federal government is the nation's 25th largest advertiser. The

The Department of Agriculture, with a budget of \$11.8 billion, reported only 8 employees in public affairs. This is an incredible contrast to the Department of Transportation, which reported 281 public affairs employees with a budget of less than half that of Agriculture, only \$4.3 billion.

The Agriculture figures directly contradict an earlier GAO report showing the department with 20 divisions having one to 123 employees engaged in public affairs activities. Agriculture officials explain discrepancy by saving their employees are engaged in information' "public "public activities, affairs" activities.

That distinction is lost on the GAO. They describe "public affairs" umbrella for term "numerous ways an agency, public or private, attempts to inform the public about its services and programs".

The GAO also took a look at some of the materials the Agriculture Department said were infomation only. One item studied was a film history of the U. S. Forest Service to be displayed at the Smithsonian Institution. The GAO said it appeared "this program is directed to promoting the Forest Service's image more than to disseminating information to the general public". It is clear the Department of

Agriculture is not eager to

brag about its expensive affairs operation. Despite this reluctance, the Department of Agriculture has the second largest public affairs and advertising program in the government. The biggest program, the granddaddy of them all, is the Department of Defense.

Larger ad budgets for military recruitment were responsible for a 10 percent in the federal government's advertising expenditures in 1978. Nine military recruitment advertising accounts spent more than four out of five government ad dollars

last year. The Department of Defense backs up this recruitment advertising budget with an ongoing marketing research program that last year alone had a \$2 million budget.

How effective is this tremendous outpouring of tax dollars?

Not very, according to a GAO study conducted in 1975. The GAO looked at the effectiveness of the Army's advertising to recruit persons into the all-volunteer force. They reported that 'although the all-volunteer forces program had been successful, all available evidence indicates that the contributions of advertising has been modest at best". Such a report in private business would likely mean advertising agencies, and a houseclean-

at Defense. The military indicates it intends to continue with its ad programs, with few if any changes.

ing at the home office. Not so

The Postal Service is also making big increases in its spending for advertising. This year's expenditures are expected to be \$11.5 million, up from \$7 million just two years ago.

This increased marketing power is being aimed at private enterprise. Advertising Age reports the increase "is almost certainly meant to install Express Mail solidly in the overnight intercity delivery market among a number of private delivery markets already there."

Other government advertisers include the obvious, such as Amtrak, and the obscure, such as the Federal Trade Commission. an agency that last year produced public service advertising explaining how women can protect their

credit ratings. A GAO-conducted study of public affairs activities at the Department of Health, Education and Welfare gives us an inside look at how one government agency conducts its publicity operation.

The GAO looked into two campaigns conducted by H.E.W., the smoking and health initiative and the National High Blood Pressure Education Program. The report on smoking and health initiative is particularly telling.

The GAO points out that

effective public relations is

dependent upon such elements as targeting objectives and audience before beginning a communications campaign. These basic principles of managing public information campaigns are taught in introductory college public relations courses. In spite of this the GAO reports, "There was little indication that the smoking and health managers had considered many of the essential elements of campaign develop-

Control over budget is a special problem. One million dollars has been budgeted this year for the public information campaign on smoking and health. The Director of the Office on Smoking and Heath stated a breakdown of how the \$1 million would be used did not exist and there was no documentary support for the amount. An earlier public information program directed toward smoking and averaged \$280,000 annually.

Clearly, there is something with wrong Government's public relations and information efforts. Tax dollars are being used to enable the government to compete with private enterprise. Massive advertising contracts are continued regardless of effectiveness. Information budgets are developed on the basis of how much money can be spent, not how much money is needed to do an effective job. The real costs of these efforts are hidden from the

taxpayer by layers of bureaucracy. Not answered is the question of what role, if any, the federal government should have in sellings its programs to the citizens. Should federal programs be allowed to sink or swim their own merits, not on the merits of Washington public relations men?

Taxpayers have a right to question whether their dollars should make the federal government the 19th largest advertiser in magazines in the country, sandwiched nealty between Kraft Foods and the General Electric Company on the lists for 1978.

Taxpayers have a right to object when their money is used by bureaucrats to make the federal government the 25th largest national advertiser in all media, ending up between Johnson & Johnson and Gulf-Western last year.

Taxpayers who think the Navy was created to do something other than to make movies like "How to Succeed with Brunettes," should make it all out on our seaborne defenders.

Other government film titles include "The Owl Who Gave a Hoot," "Makeup from the Neck Down, "Thoroughly Modern Mollie," "Identification of Some Common Sucking Lice," "Basic Dog Surger," "We Tiptoed Around Whispering," and "Project Slush."

Stamp collecting is one of the most educational hobbies possible for young children, and gives a great deal of pleasure to people of all ages. But do the taxpayers

really want to spend \$3.7 million a year through the federal government promoting it? What business is that of the federal government? Ask the Postal Service. They pay for the ads.

The original contract price was \$1,747,611.54. The final figure includes cost revisions for changes made during construction.

> Highway 183 is a federally-assisted project and the federal Government normally furnishes 90 percent of the financing. Additional right-of-way to expand overall ROW width between towns to an average of approximately 200 feet, was paid for by the County of Eastland. Some 700 feet of North Main,

which the highway enters the city, was widened, and the city paid for the additional right-of-way on this section.

The new pavement

has a 24-foot traffic lane with eight feet of paved shoulder on either side, making a total of 40 feet of surfacing. Stand-By Electric Generators A criteria was established and voted on for choosing outstanding 4-Her's for next Important For Farms, Ranches year's awards banquet. The organizational leaders of

COLLEGE STATION --Emergency stand-by electric generators proved their worth to Texas farms and ranches this year when flooding and tornadoes caused power failures.

'A stand-by electric generator is a good investment on any farm with mechanically ventilated production facilities, bulk milk handling equipment, mechanical feeding equipment, or facilities requiring continuous heat, such as brooders," points out Dr Gary Nelson. Nelson is an agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

the same type of power at the same voltage and frequency as that supplied by power lines," he explains. This is usually 120 to 240-volt single phase, 60-cycle alternating current. For generators up to 15

kilowatts, an air-cooled engine is often used. A liquid-cooled engine is necessary for larger generators. The engine must have about a two-and-onequarter hp capacity with the proper drive system for each 1,000 watts of generator out-

"A full-load system will handle the entire farmstead says Nelson.

Automatic engine-powered full-load systems will beign o furnish power immediately, or up to 30 seconds after power goes off.

The engineer points out that small, less expensive part-load systems may be enough to handle essential equipment during an emergency.

Power-take-off generators are about half as costly as engine-operated units. Under a part-load system, only the most essential equipment is operated at one time. This would be adequate for most farms. However, the genreator must be sized to keep certain necessary equipment, such as a milk cooler or ventilation fan, running continuously while providing enough extra power to start large noncontinuous equipment, such as a mechanical feeder.

"Check with your electrician or power supply representative for installation instructions since wiring and equipment must be installed according to applicable national codes, local ordinances and requirements of the power supplier," says Nelson. "Locate large engine generators in a heated, well-ventilated building, away from combustibles.

An automatice stand-by unit should automatically when power fails and stop when power is restored. When using an engine-driven generator with a manual start, or when using a tractor-driven unit, first bring the generator up

to speed. Then start the

largest motor first and add

other loads when each is up to operating speed, explains the engineer. As far as expenses are con-

cerned, Nelson says that a tractor PTO-operated 15-kilowatt unit may cost about \$1,600 whereas the same capacity automatic stand-by unit may cost up to \$4,000. Determine what type of stand-by electric generator to buy by comparing its cost to the probable livestock or production loss that would likely occur dur-

ing a power failure.
