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





## **City Council Adopts 1980 Airport Grant Agreement**

The Cisco city coun- city secretary Sherry cil adopted a 1980 Airport Grant Agreement for \$25,000 at Tuesday night's regular meeting. The motion to adopt the grant was made by council member Raymond Whitley following a public hearing for discussion on the grant. Council member Lucy Collier seconded the motion with Mayor H.C. Brown and council members Morgan Fleming, Whitley and Collier voting in its favor. Council member Louise Allison voted no and council member Bill Eudy was absent.

In other council action, council member Allison made a motion to accept the second reading of an ordinance to close certain streets and alleyways adjacent to Block 139 of the original townsite. Collier seconded the motion and all voted in its

Allison also made a motion to approve a resolution for the Eastland County Appraisal District. It was seconded by Whitley and all voted in its favor. In the resolution, Eastland will appoint a member to the county tax board for the first two years with Ranger and Cisc following with their own two year terms.

City manager John Boland reported the police department has had to use the city manager's pickup durbecause the timing Cisco. chain went out on the 1978 Ford and the front end is worn out on the Plymouth. The council approved the minutes of the last regular council meeting with some clarifications on a motion by Whitley. It was seconded by Fleming and all voted in its favor.

A financial statement submitted by Boland was approved with a motion from Whitley Allison. seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

> The possibility of acquiring street signs to identify street names was discussed by the council. The council seemed in agreement that the buying or making of street signs could be gradual with first priority being main streets such as Avenue D and 8th Street. Boland said he would check into the matter further and come back with some more definite price

figures. Boland also informed the council that the city has \$228,287.37 in various savings accounts with a \$30,825 certificate of deposit scheduled to mature in March of 1980. This will give the city a total of \$259,112.37 in savings accounts drawing 5 to 51/4 percent in-

terest. He suggested the city could place part of the money (emphasizing that he does not advocate taking all the money out of the First National Bank of Cisco) in U.S. Treasury Bills which draw from 11.5 percent to 12.5 percent interest. He said such an account could be opened with the First National Bank in Dallas. Mayor Brown tabled the matter saying the Cisco bank officials should be informed of what the city is considering doing and find out their feelings before any action is taken on the matter.


