

FINANCING MOBILE HOMES

COLLEGE STATION --Spiraling housing costs have also taken their toll on mobile home prices and have affected financing, says Dr. Richard Floyd, real estate economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M Univer-

sity Syste.

'Mobile home buyers should explore all avenues to financing prior to acquiring a new or used unit," says the specialist.

Floyd says there are three common forms of financing mobile or manufactured housing--financing directly through a lending institution. through a mobile home dealer, or through a conventional home loan.

'If the wheels and axles of the unit are removed and the unit is permanently attached to a foundation, it may be eligible for a conventional home loan with home mortgage terms and government backed loans," contends Floyd. "In other words, it will be treated in a fashion similar to a site-built home.

"Typically, the individual seeking to financing a mobile home will either arrange financing directly from a lending institution or from a mobile home dealer," Floyd maintains.

The bank, savings and loan, or credit union will provide a purchase-money loan which is subject to an 8 percent maximum add-on rate for both new and used units. explains the economist. Sunday,



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

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

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Romney Church Of God (7th Day)

By Viola M. Payne Since pioneer days a number of Churches have made their area headquarters in Eastland County. When Church buildings were not available, congregations met in school houses or homes. Since World War II several more Churches have been established, including the Romney Church of God

(7th Day). Although the Church of God (7th Day) is a comparatively small organization, there are members in most nations of the world. Like some other Churches, there are splinter groups among them, each having its own headquarters to give direction to its adherants.

Some of these headquarter locations are: Denver, Colorado, Salem, West Virginia, Pasadena, California (H.W. Armstrong), Tyler, Texas (Garner Ted Armstrong), Caldwell, Idaho (M.L. Ogren) Bethel, Pa. (A Sacred Name Group), Walker) and Jerusalem, year.

Israel. (Gordon Fauth). Since it is the view of the congregation here in Eastland County that each local group should be autonomous, the Romney Church is not officially affiliated with any of these organizations. It does send donations to several of them,

The service in the Wilks home begins at 11:00 a.m. each Saturday (Sabbath) morning, and lasts about an hour. All the members and visitors sit in one room for worship, and the Bible is the literature used. There are a number of songs, prayers, Scripture readings, and a

Once each year the Church observes The Lord's Supper, called "Passover" rather than "Communion." The date is determined by a Sacred calendar from Jerusalem, a Lunar calendar which the Jewish people still follow. This is called "The Bible Calendar", or "God's Calendar" by the Church of God (7th Day). Passover is held on the night of the 14th day of the first month of Abib, and this falls in March or April - in the Easter season. Christ is considered the Pascal Lamb in this service, with the bread and wine a memorial of His death. This Lord' Supper, as well as other observances of the Church, is open to all who

care to participate. Anyone who wishes to become a member of the Romney Church is added upon their acceptance of Christ and baptism by immersion. The Church also accepts persons who have been baptised in other Churches, upon their profession of faith.

The local church, as well as the worldwide Churches of God (7th Day) accepts the Bible as the inspired word of God. The Romney Church prefers the Revised Standard Version, and this is used in Church services. A number of different versions are available in the church library, and may be checked

The 7th Day Churches of God agree on some other points, including that Saturday, the 7th day of the week, is the Sabbath, and is to be observed as a sign that the members are sanctified by their Creator. Most believe in one God, the Father - a form of monotheism, rejecting the concept of the Trinity. All believe that Jesus (Yahshua) is the Son of God and the true sacrifice for sin. All believe in observing the

Lord's Supper, and all

believe in salvation by

All believe that man is a soul rather than that he has a soul within him. The Churches teach there will be a ressurection from the grave when the dead in Christ will rise to meet him in the air. This is known as the first ressurection. The rest of the dead will not rise until 1,000 years later. All believe that Christ (and his saints) will reign on this earth for 1,000

All do not agree on some other points, such as the belief that man is now mortal. The local Church teaches that immortality will not be given until the first ressurec-

No one will ascend the Heaven until this ressurection of the Just, and then only for a short time. Eventually God will descend to earth and make His dwelling with man. The wicked will be destroyed, not punished with eternal torture. The Devil, too, will be cast into the lake of fire and burned up.

We believe that Christianity is a Jewish religion not a Gentile religion," states Voy Wilks, Leader of the Romney Church." Jesus and all his apostles and the earliest disciples were Jewish

We believe that none of the covenants of promise were made with the Gentiles. All were made with the Jews-God's chosen people. Therefore the Gentiles have no chance of salvation, except to be grafted (adopted) into the Commonwealth of Israel - by baptism into Christ. To Israel belongs the covenants, the glory, the sonship, the giving of the law, the worship, and the promises. To them belong the patriarchs, and of their race is the Christ!

We believe that not one fragment of the Law was or is to become void. Mt. 5-17-79 and Lk. 16-17.

The Church teaches that the festivals of God as mentioned in Lev. Chapt. 23 are to be observed today - the festivals which Jesus observed. The Church considers such days as Easter, St. Valentine, Whit Sunday, Good Friday, Halloween, and Christmas "religious holy days of the Gentiles" and does not observe them.

The Church believes that God is bringing the Jewish people back to their homeland to finally bless them, when they say Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord". It also believes that the Gentiles will not be redeemed until the Jewish people are ready for salvation.

The exclusive use of the Sacred names of the Father and His Son (Yahweh and Yahsua respectively) are being taught strongly by a number of group leaders of the 7th Day Church of God.

The Church teaches that the marriage contract between a man and woman should be for a lifetime. It also recognizes that - society being what it is - this cannot always be. Divorce is forced upon some people, and they should not be held accountable for this unfortunate situation.

The Church of God teaches temperance, and does not condone drunkenness. Alcoholic beverages are not served for social occasions. If a person uses wine or strong drink as a supplement to private meals, however, or as a health measure, it is not considered a moral ques-

The Church has always taught - and worked for - the seperation of Church and

The local Church has a number of community programs and services, including a good library for public use. This includes cassette tapes of the Bible. as well as tapes on various other topics. The Church has free literature for public distribution on Bible Doctrines, Creation vs. Evolution, ect. Some of these articles have been printed by the local group. At the present time the Church is arranging a slide and filmstrip presentation for Eastland County Churches and Clubs. This will promote faith in special Creation, as opposed to faith in the evolutionary

"I consider Evolution a type of National religion,' states Voy Wilks, "In which the Stae forces the instruction of school children in that faith."

The Church will give a Young's Analytical Bible Concordance to any serious Bible student who is unable to buy one. And the Church not only makes donations to individuals, but gives generous support to the American Red Cross, West Texas Rehab., Christian Record Braille Foundation, Seventh-day Adventist World Services, the Bible Sabbath Association, Bible-Science Association, the annual Seminars on Israel, and to several of the different Churches of God (7th Day). The Church members also make personal contributions to the community. Mrs. Voy Wilks (Myrtle Wilks) is a noted artist of this area. Her paintings are on display for the month of December in C.J.C. Maner Memorial Library

"Some of our doctrinal points are quite different from most religious groups," states Voy Wilks. "But in the areas of religious thought in which we do agree, we wish to cooperate with the different Churches of Eastland County - in an effort to offset the inroads of evolutionalism, atheism, and uniformitarianism.


Engagement Announced
