Harold Pippen Takes Oath

Harold Pippen was sworn in as Cisco City Council member place 3 by City Judge O.T. Killion at Tuesday night's regular council meeting. Mr. Pippen took his oath of office following the acceptance of the canvassing of the December 4 run-off election by election judge Carl Gorr. The motion to accept the election canvassing was made by council member Louise Allison and seconded by Bill Eudy. All members voted in its favor.

In council action before Mr. Pippen was sworn in, council member Lucy Collier made a motion to raise leases on Lake Cisco lots to \$75 per year for a term of 50 years, with an option to increase the rent a maximum of \$25 each five years. (This motion only applies to delinquent leases which have been terminated.) Eudy seconded the motion and all members voted in its favor.

Collier also made a motion to adopt the minutes of the previous regular council meeting as corrected. Raymond Whitley seconded the motion and all voted for its approval.

Following the discussion of a request by the Cisco Ministerial Alliance for an ordinance which would govern where alcoholic beverages could be sold should Cisco ever go "wet," Morgan Fleming made a motion for City Attorney Billy Wright and City Manager John Boland to work up an or-

Burkett Resigns As City Bookkeeper

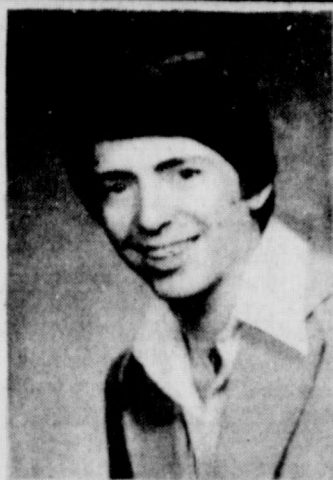

Mr. Boland stated the city is now looking for a bookkeeper and applications for the position may be made at City Hall.

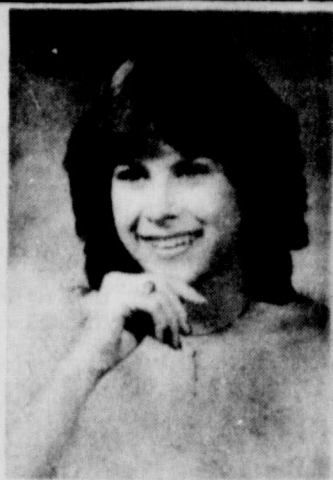

It was necessary to replace some eight feet of the main line. New plastic pipe was used, Mr. Boland said. He said the break was believed to have resulted from ground shifting, due likely to temperature extremes and dry conditions.

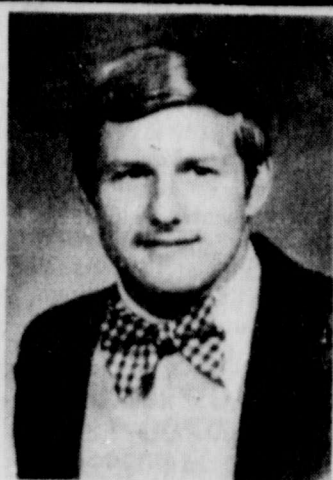
The repair crew had what is called a "wet job," meaning that the four men worked while standing in water, sometimes up to their necks. The water was pretty cold, they reported.

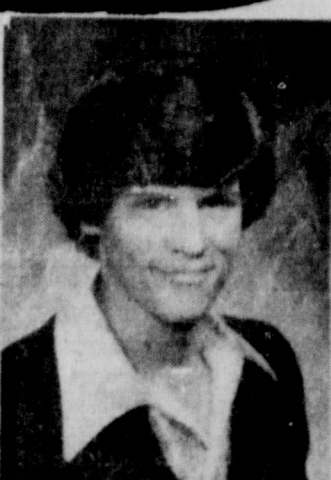

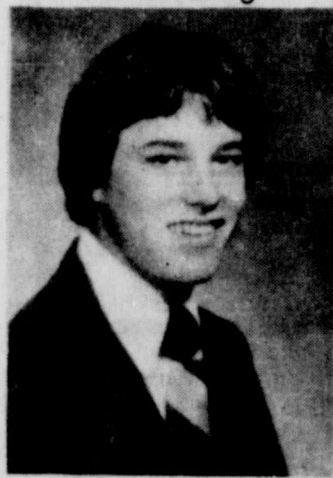

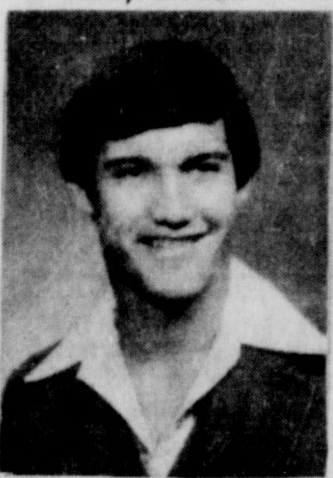

He said Mr. Woolley outlined the benefits provided to the city by the bank and he now feels satisfied with taking the lower interest rates of the bank as compared to the purchase of U.S. Treasury bills with city funds. Allison made a motion to leave deposits of city funds in the First National Bank in Cisco. Fleming seconded the motion with all voting in its favor, except Whitley who stated he would rather have more information before voting for such a proposal.

Since the next regular council meeting would come on Christmas Day, Eudy made a motion to combine the regular meeting with a called meeting about the city auditor sometime next week. Collier seconded the motion and all voted in favor of the proposal.

Eudy also made a motion to go along with the annual policy of giving Christmas bonuses to city employees. Pippen seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

In final council action, Eudy made a motion to grant a request for December 24 off for city employees whose jobs are non-essential to the health, wealth and welfare of the city. If an employee has to work that day then he will be let off another day. Allison seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Pullman Announces For Judge Race



Saul Pullman, local attorney and lifelong resident of Eastland County, today announced that he will be a candidate for the office of judge of the 91st District Court of Eastland County, Texas, in Democratic primary coming up in May, 1980.

Pullman, who will be 40 on his next birthday, attended the Eastland public schools through high school; the T.C.U. for 4 years on an Athletic scholarship, graduating with a degree of Bachelor of Science in Commerce. Deciding upon a career in law, he attended St. Mary's University Law School in San Antonio for one year, then transferred to U.T. Law School, where he earned his L.L.B. (Bachelor of Law), in 1965. He has practiced law in Eastland since his admittance to the State Bar in 1965; first with the Texas Highway Department, and since 1968, in his own office for the general practice of law.

In announcing his candidacy, Pullman stressed "that a strong court is essential to the preservation of the American way of life, and if elected, I will dedicate my full time to presiding over the historic 91st District Court."

Mr. Pullman continued by issuing an invitation to his many friends and acquaintances to contact him at his Eastland office for any

volunteer help or assistance they might wish to offer during the campaign, and that he would be grateful for any consideration and support he receives.

Stenholm Urges People To Mail Cards To Hostage

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has urged the American people to "mail a Christmas card to hostage American citizens in Iran during the holiday season as an indication of our concern and support"

Stenholm is to introduce a concurrent resolution before Congress Monday asking that "the American people immediately send Christmas cards to the hostages as an indication of our concern for their welfare and our support for the government of the United States as it seeks to secure their release."

"The cost of a Christmas card and the approximate 62 cents for postage is a small price for us to pay to indicate to the Iranian government the unity and resolve of our people," Stenholm said.

"In a situation like this, particularly one which has lasted so long, it is frustrating because everyone wants to do 'something' to help, but as individuals. While the State Department has given us little assurance that the cards would ever actually be delivered to the hostages, we can hope.

In his resolution, Stenholm said both the Iranian government and the students illegally holding the hostages "do not believe the government of the United States currently enjoys December 13, 1979

the support of the American people in its dealings..."

I can't think of a better Christmas present for the Ayatollah Khomeini than an avalanche of cards being sent to our embassy people," he concluded.

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LONE STAR EXPLAINS CURTAILMENT PROGRAM
On a weekday, when the average temperature drops to 15 degrees Fahrenheit, Lone Star Gas Co. estimates all customers—from the largest industry to the homeowner with only one or two

space heaters—will need a total of 3,299,345 thousand cubic feet (Mcf) of gas. But Lone Star's pipeline network can deliver a maximum of 2,709,975 Mcf under optimum conditions. An inadequate system? No, not at all; it is purposefully

designed to carry less than a peak-day load. "Designing our system to carry the maximum load during temperatures that might only come a few days each winter would be like designing a church big enough to handle the Easter congregation," says Herb King, director of the gas control department at Lone Star. "The cost would be too high and that would cause gas rates to be higher. Nonetheless, we expect to have adequate gas supply this winter for all anticipated needs, in accordance with our curtailment program," King adds.

Since designing the Lone Star transmission pipelines to handle the approximately 3.3 billion cubic feet maximum is not economically wise, Lone Star makes sure it can continuously serve what it calls its human needs customers—homes, hospitals, churches and schools. To ensure those customers have fuel, Lone Star reduces the volume of gas delivered to large industrial buyers and electrical generation plants.

"These large industrial users and electric generation plants contract for gas known their fuel will be cut back on severe winter days," explains Alan Tarrant, who as director of industrial gas sales acts as the liaison

REA APPROVES \$97,500,000 LOAN GUARANTEE COMMITMENT TO TEXAS PROJECT

The Rural Electrification Administration announces the following loan guarantee commitment: Brazos Electric Power Cooperative, Inc., Waco, \$97,500,000. This commitment enables the system to borrow from legally organized lending agencies with 100 percent guarantee under arrangements satisfactory to REA. The funds will finance Brazos' 3.8 percent undivided ownership interest (87.4 megawatts) in the 2300 MW (two 1150 MW units) Comanche Peak Nuclear Steam Electric Station, and a 51 percent undivided ownership

between Lone Star and its industrial customers. "Customers that face possible curtailment are required under terms of their contracts to have an alternate fuel supply if they consider their operations essential to public welfare."

Lone Star's curtailment procedure was approved in 1973 by the Texas Railroad Commission. And even with a winter as hard as January, 1979, when the cold temperatures increased customer heating needs while causing an unusually high number of gas wells to freeze, curtailments did not go beyond electric generation and the very largest industrial users of natural gas.

Barring unexpected weather-related problems, Lone Star customers can expect dependable natural gas service for the coming winter heating season.

Other participants in the project are: Texas Electric Service Company, Texas Power and Light Company, Dallas Power & Light Company, and Texas Municipal Power Agency. Brazos, a power supply cooperative, is responsible for the wholesale power requirements of 19 member distribution systems. Facilities provided for in this guarantee will help the cooperative meet the increasing power and energy needs of its member systems.

Brazos has interconnections with Texas Power & Light Company, and with four neighboring cities which form the Texas Municipal Power Pool. The Brazos system also is interconnected with systems of the Texas Electric Service Company, Brazos River Authority, Southwestern Power Administration, Lower Colorado River Authority, and seven other municipal systems. In addition, Brazos is a member of the Texas Interconnected Systems.

Distribution systems comprising the membership of Brazos provide electric service to over 131,000 farm and other rural consumers, including Comanche County Electric Cooperative Assn., Comanche.

On completion of this project, the Brazos system will include 542,400 kilowatts of generating capability and 2,345 miles of transmission line and related facilities in 55 counties.

HOW TO SURVIVE A HEART ATTACK

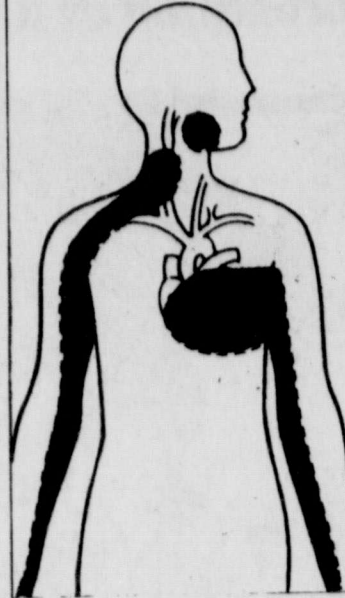
This self-help plan could save your life. Clip and keep.

Every year in this country, over one million men and women suffer a heart attack. But in the last 10 years the death rate has dropped 20%, according to the American Heart Association. This is probably partly due to better preventive measures and better emergency care. Getting help quickly can be the most important factor in surviving a heart attack.

Says Dr. James R. Bell, cardiologist and assistant professor of Clinical Medicine, Dartmouth Medical School, Hanover, N.H.: "Most heart attack deaths occur outside the hospital. Once you get there, your chances of survival increase tremendously, but if you don't know you're having one, you'll be in trouble." The first step is to recognize the symptoms.

If you are unconscious, you will have to depend on others for help. At least 5,500 lives a year could be saved, according to Dr. Julius E. Stolfi, professor of medicine, Downstate Medical College, Brooklyn, N.Y., if anyone present at a heart attack knew CPR. The technique takes 60 minutes to learn, and with it, damaged hearts have been kept beating for an hour.

KNOW THE SYMPTOMS



▼ A feeling of fear or "impending doom" is often present.
▼ Heavy pressure or a choking feeling in the center of the chest, with pain that may radiate down the left or right arm or over the back, with shortness of breath.
NOTE: The feeling may not be this specific. Pain can occur anywhere between the ears and diaphragm, often coming from just under the breastbone, but sometimes only in the jaw, or, rarely, only in the back, and then usually between the shoulder blades.
▼ Perspiration may break out.
▼ Dizziness or a giddy feeling sometimes occurs—but not in all cases.
▼ One thing does not happen: You do not feel your heart racing or pounding. You usually don't feel your heart at all.
NOTE: The heart pain called "angina" usually brought on by strong emotion or exertion—is not an actual heart attack, but can sometimes quickly lead to a heart attack. Angina usually subsides in two minutes with rest. If the pain lasts longer than two minutes, it is probably not angina. See a physician as soon as possible.

GET HELP QUICKLY

The greatest risk of dying occurs in the minutes after the attack is occurring. After that, risk of dying decreases.

- ▼ Don't panic. Try to remain calm and get help quickly. Fear itself can trigger heart damage. But don't deny what may be happening. "Don't sit down and hope it will go away," warns Dr. Joseph C. Greenfield, cardiologist of Duke University Medical School. "Because it won't." Don't try to "walk off" a heart attack. Don't smoke a cigarette, warns Dr. Bell.
- ▼ Call for help. Warning can be fatal. Call your rescue squad or anyone else who can get you to a hospital immediately. When you phone for help, supply the following information: Phone number from which you are calling. Address and special directions for reaching you. Nature of the emergency (heart attack).
- ▼ Your name. Don't hang up. Give emergency personnel a chance to ask questions and give special instructions.
- ▼ Stay calm. This is of utmost importance. Once you have made that call and know help is on the way, sit or lie down and relax until help arrives. Take the position that is most comfortable for your breathing, says Dr. Kevin McIntyre, Chief, Emergency Cardiac Care, Harvard University Medical School. But do lie or sit so if you lose consciousness, you don't fall and get hurt.
- ▼ If you cannot reach help, you probably will have to save yourself! Stay calm and walk, don't run—to some form of transportation that will get you to a doctor quickly. If you feel you are going to faint, sit down until that sensation passes and then get someone to take you to a hospital.

DON'T PANIC

A plan of action can improve your survival chances by keeping you calm and helping you get to a hospital fast.

- ▼ Memorize your emergency number. Find out and memorize—but also keep handy—the emergency number that will respond to help fastest. Have a backup number to call if the first number doesn't respond.
- ▼ Write down emergency numbers and other information you have to give so you'll know what to say.
- ▼ Have help available. Be sure that you, your spouse and other family members are trained in CPR (Cardiac Pulmonary Resuscitation) and take a refresher course once a year.
- ▼ Know the cardiac-emergency procedure in the place where you work and be sure your immediate co-workers know it.
- ▼ If you have a known heart problem, carry a Heart Card or a Medic-Alert card or other signal for rescue personnel.
- ▼ Know your risk factors. Most at risk for heart attack are men over 35 (especially over 45). Women over 55 (especially over 65). Those with high blood pressure or known heart disease. Those who have had a previous heart attack. Those under stress. The intense striving type personality (the workaholic). Heavy drinkers. The sedentary. Those who eat a high-fat diet. Those with heart disease in the family. Diabetes. The obese. Any of these risk factors—except diabetes, previous heart disease and the genetic factor—may be changed and your risks lowered. See your physician to learn your risk factors and how to lower them.

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Dr. Charles Simpson Trying To Improve The Peanut Industry

Bay James E. Vance STEPHENVILLE--More often than not farmers shake their heads in disbelief when they walk into Dr. Charles E. Simpson's peanut research greenhouses. "Those weird looking

things are peanuts?" They ask. "But," Simpson said, "after some explanations and answers to questions farmers usually change their minds."

Simpson is a plant geneticist and peanut breeder who collected hundreds of peanut plants in the wilds of South America to establish probably the most, and certainly the most unusual and hopefully valuable assortment to improve the peanut industry.

"We collected everything we saw, and a lot of them didn't seem close to resembling peanuts as we know them in the U.S.," Simpson explained. "You never know, however, what genetic material a plant might contain which could become of value to our domestic drops."

Simpson's array of more than 400 plant selections is at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at Stephenville. He was a member of team making the collection under auspices of the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations. Although improvements made at Stephenville will be shared with other peanut scientists, and with farmers and processors, Simpson's efforts are directed primarily to benefit Texas farmers who harvest some 300,000 acres per year, qualifying peanuts as a crop of significant economic importance in this state.

Peanuts are processed into a variety of products, primarily peanut butter and oil in the U.S., but Simpson said the big utilization in

South America, where peanuts originated, is for home consumption--an excellent source of energy-providing protein. Only about 5 per cent of the U.S. peanut crop is used by the entertainment trade.

Livestock and wild game munch tops of peanuts right down to the ground, making identification difficult for the research team.

"The natives came to our aid," Simpson said. "Some of the peanuts have been maintained within tribes, families or colonies for generations. Some were cultivated. Some were not. Argentina, Bolivia and Brazil are the center of South America's peanut production."

He described soil in those countries as similar to the deep sandy soil where peanuts are produced in Texas, primarily in the West Cross Timbers and in an area southwest of San Antonio.

"Our major concern is to locate characteristics which are resistant to diseases, a costly item to peanut farmers," Simpson explained, "particularly leaf spot, a fungus which kills leaves, cutting off plant food intake and ultimately reducing yields of peanuts. Leaf spot is the Number 1 disease problem in all geographical areas of peanut production."

Much research has been directed toward development of peanuts which would make higher yields, which currently averages some 1,500 pounds per acre--double the average 25 years ago. Some "better farmers" dig up to and in excess of 4,000 pounds per acre when produced under irrigation. Texas produces Spanish type (small) peanuts with a bunch type plant with upright branches, thereby leading to one of Texas' peanut growing problems, compared with the newer Florunner developed in Florida.

Florunner has branches, but they lie prostrate, putting out runners which spread the fruit load," Simpson explained. "This requires a longer growing season for maturity of Florunner, resulting in larger peanuts produced over a larger solid area. Florunner yields are 15 to 20 per cent higher than Spanish type peanuts."

He said that with exception of a longer growing season Florunner and Spanish type peanuts produce under similar conditions.

"To improve our Texas yields the runner germ plasma has been incorporated into our breeding program," Simpson said. "Some of the promising lines are being tested, but we also realize it will be difficult for peanut breeders to improve on the current yielding ability of Florunner."

Simpson assured that plant breeders "cannot take all the credit" for existing increases in yields, but he said that Spantex and Starr varieties developed by B.C. Langley at the Stephenville facility and released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station to farmers did trigger 20 per cent more peanuts per acre. Simpson and Dr. Olin D. Smith of Texas A&M's Soils and Crops Sciences Department developed Tamnut and Toalson, with a spinoff of another five to eight per cent increase in yields.

Toalson's biggest impact on the industry was described as "a foot in the door", although modest, toward overcoming a soil-borne organism which causes pod rot of peanuts.

In addition to selection of new plants in hopes of disease and insect resistance, Simpson said scientists also collected the Rhizobia--the nitrogen-fixing bacteria within a plant.

"High cost of nitrogen fertilizer mandated research to increase the amount of nitrogen-fixing capabilities in all legumes, not just peanuts," Simpson explained.

Simpson said that one of the biggest challenges of the plants introduced from South America is keeping them alive. And handle them with care and detail, Simpson does.

"One bunch won't pollinate within a greenhouse, and another bunch of the plants has to be manipulated by hand to pollinate," he said. "Cross pollination must be done during morning hours and emasculation by artificial light at night."

Mrs. Dorothy Whitt is labeled "The Bee Lady" because she "trips" the flowers, similar to the action of a bee gathering pollen for making honey. This is done outside of a greenhouse. Other plants self trip inside a greenhouse.

"A peanut flower has four petals--standard two "wings" and a keel," she explained. "Hold the standards with one hand, and with the other hand pull the wing petals back," she demonstrated. "This forces pollen out of the keel and increases chance of pollina-



tion." Simpson also is excited about possibilities of hybrid peanuts--the vigor of wild varieties combined with the improved domestic varieties. Simpson noted also that peanut oil will fuel diesel engines, with minor mechanical modification. "When we get yields high enough to make energy output higher than energy input (in production of peanuts), then the peanut industry can be in the energy production business," the scientist explained. He added that when diesel fuel was 20 cents per gallon the equivalent in peanuts would have been yields equivalent of five tons per acre. "However, diesel fuel is nearing \$1 per gallon," Simpson added. "So the target production of peanuts is a whole lot lower, and I figure we aren't in the far too distant future from five tons of peanuts per acre." He said that a West Texas farmer produced 7,000 pounds of peanuts per acre with an existing variety--Tamnut 74. "Peanut breeders have a long way to go, genetically, and we are at the level of progress likened to the wheat breeders in the early 1900's," he concluded.

The tragedy today is in Kampuchea (formerly known as Cambodia). EARLY FERTILIZATION FOR 1980 CROPS COULD PAY

Texas farmers might be able to save some money as well as get a jump on the 1980 crop by fertilizing crop-land early.

"The possibility of shorter fertilizer supplies and much higher costs next spring should provide some incentive for farmers to put out fertilizer early for next spring's crops," believes Dr. Charles Welch, soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University.

Increased crop acreages, export demands and reduced fertilizer production have caused a decline in fertilizer inventories, points out Welch. This, coupled with an increasing transportation problem, makes it uncertain and difficult for many local

fertilizer dealers to obtain fertilizer to maintain a desired inventory level.

And fertilizer prices are going up due to increased production costs, inflation and market pressures. By planting time next spring, some fertilizer materials such as anhydrous ammonia and ammonium phosphate may cost twice as much as last spring.

"With expected higher fertilizer prices, it is especially important to obtain soil tests and all available agronomic information for using fertilizers efficiently for next year's crop," emphasizes Welch. "Now is a good time to start planning for an efficient fertilization program."

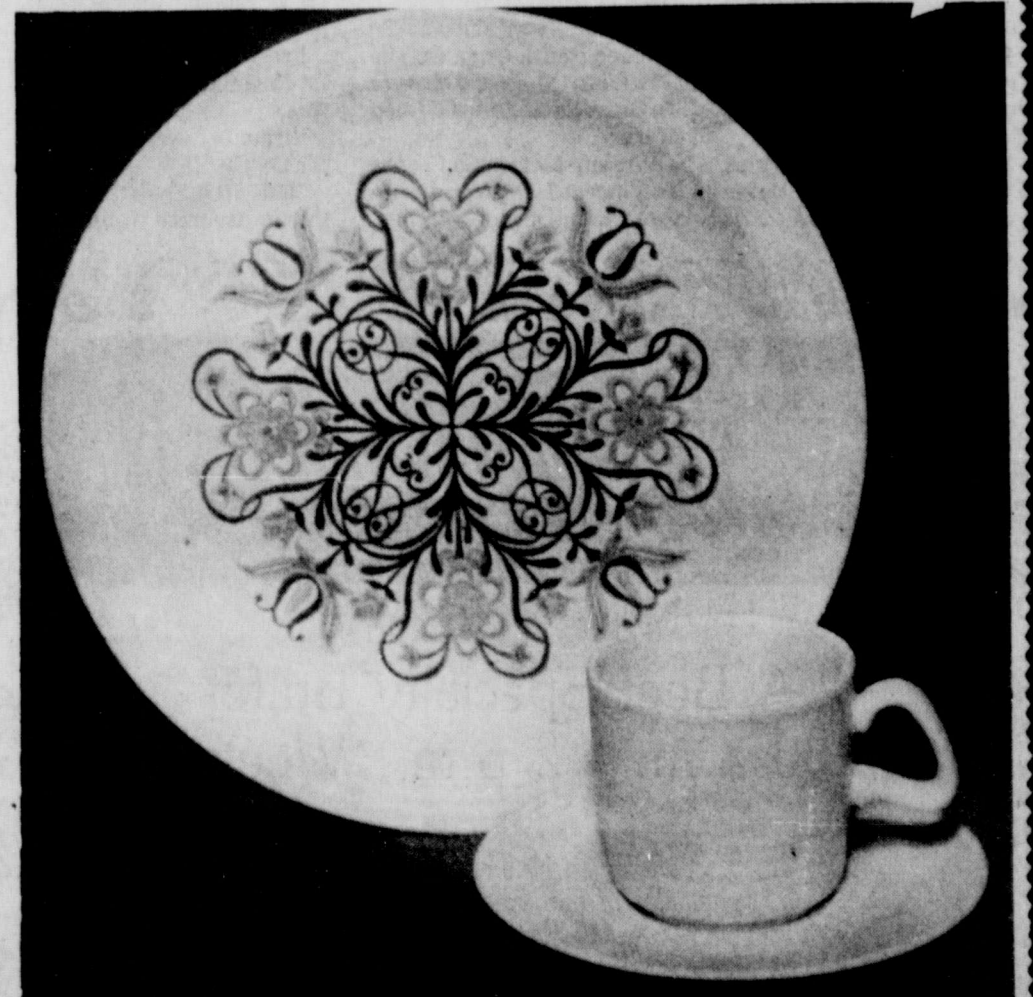

Pecan Show

Dan Childress of Cottonwood was the big winner at the 27th annual Eastland County Pecan Show in Eastland Friday and Saturday. Champion pecans were selected from 136 entries representing over 40 different varieties.

Childress' Mohawk entry was named Champion In-Shell pecan while his Barton entry was named Reserve Champion In-Shell. The winning Mohawk pecans were also the largest pecans in the show, only 33 pecans per pound and shelled out 60.5% kernels.

An entry of Sioux pecans owned by Childress was named Shelling Champion. The Sioux pecans shelled out 61.3% kernels and contained 55.7 nuts per pound.

The Reserved Champion Shelling pecans were another entry of Sioux shown by Southern Star Pecan Orchard of Rising Star.

James Alexander of Rising Star had the Champion and Reserve Champion Native pecans. The Champion Natives shelled out 61.5% kernels and contained 64.6 nut per pound.

Judges for the show were Sammy Helmers, Area Extension Horticulturist and Dr. Thomas Lee, Area Extension Plant Pathologist. The show was sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. Members of both organizations and other volunteers assisted in the processing of pecan entries.

County Extension Agent, DeMarquis Gordon said the show was small this year because of the shortage of good quality pecans. Pecan trees set large crops, but due to the summer and fall drought the did not mature well and many pecans did not hull from the shucks properly.

The first place entries in each class will compete in the Central Texas regional pecan show in Dallas next week.

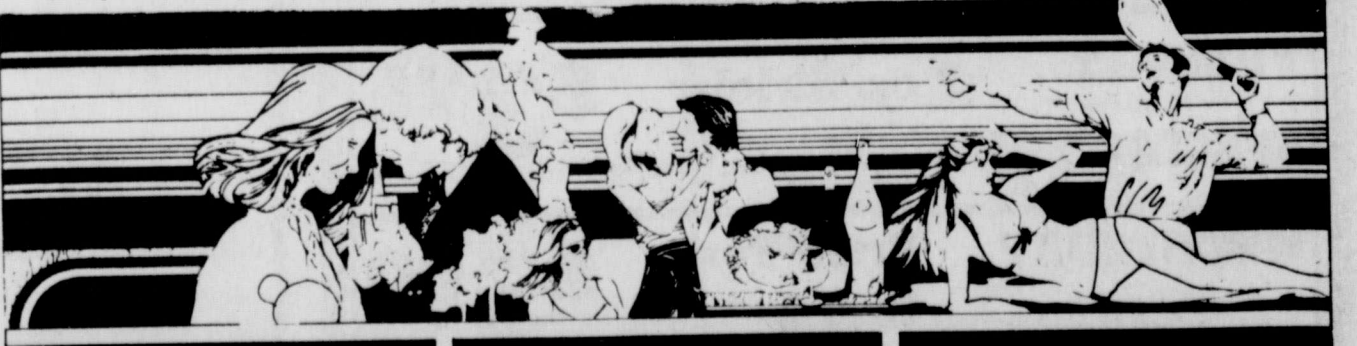

5) Check tree lights and outdoor lights each year before using.
 Look for frayed wires, loose connections, broken or cracked sockets and spots where bare wire is exposed. Repair them or throw them away.
 Be sure all lights have been tested for safety and have a "UL" Underwriters Laboratory seal.
 6) Place the tree so its lights turn on and off with a switch located away from the tree.
 7) Don't leave tree lights burning while away from home -- or after going to bed.
 8) Don't overload electrical outlets. Don't put more than three sets of lights on any extension cord.
 Also, keep connections away from the water supply of a live tree.
 9) In decorating, use a balanced ladder -- never a box, bench or chair.
 10) Never use wax candles on a tree, near it or near other flammable items, such as pine boughs.
 11) Teach children the importance of these safety steps. Make an emergency plan to use if fire breaks out anywhere in the house. Be sure each family member knows what to do.

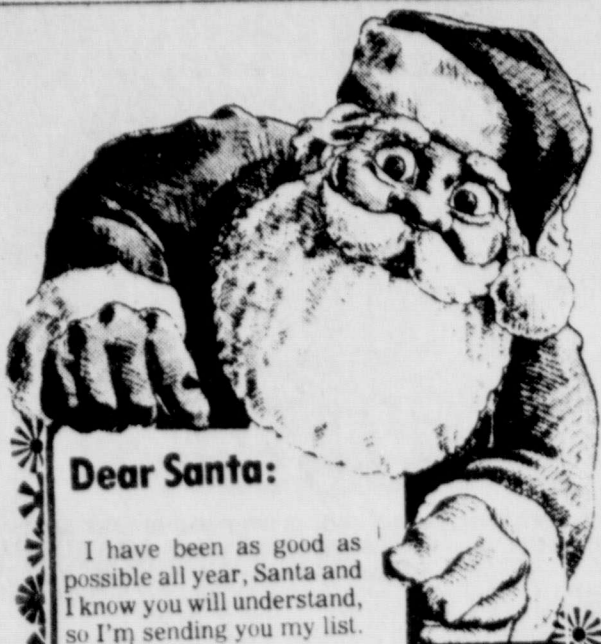

bably be through the employment of a professional tax appraiser and/or firm.

The board is made up of representatives from 13 taxing entities in the county, and the formula for representation is based on as near possible equal portion of tax levy.

Here are the board members:

Cisco Independent School District—Emmett Reich.

Eastland Independent School District—W.H. (Bill) Hoffmann Jr.

Ranger Independent School District—Dr. Bill Auvenshine.

Cities of Eastland, Ranger and Cisco—Volney Day of Olden. (The three cities which together earned one representative, drew lots to pick the first board member).

Carbon and Gorman, Cities and Schools—Jimmy Hughes.

Rising Star, City and School—Jack Hubbard.

Eastland County—Arlin Bint.

Sometime after Jan. 1, 1980, the board will hold its first meeting. At or before that meeting, each member will taken an oath of office (prescribed in the law as are all details of implementation)

The board will elect a chairman and a secretary. The board may adopt resolutions and may appoint a chief appraiser. (Details of the chief appraisers' duties will be available in February.)

A bank depository will be selected so that state funds can be deposited by February or March. Competitive bids are recommended.

Twenty seminars will be held over the state to inform board members of their duties and responsibilities. Nearest scheduled to Eastland is for Abilene on March 7, at Briarstone Manor at 101 Eplan Court off S. 1st St., from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Board of directors will serve until 1982. Primary

task will be to establish the appraisal office and prepare the 1981 and 1982 budgets. The following calendar shows the sequence of events for 1980 through 1981:

August 1980 - Most school districts and cities will finalize their budgets. The amount of 1981 contributions from the districts should be estimated so that money can be budgeted.

September 1, 1980 - Chief appraiser prepares budget. If no chief appraiser has been chosen, then the board of directors prepares the budget.

October 1, 1980 - Board officially meets to consider 1981 budget. Ten days notice must be given to each taxing jurisdiction.

December 1, 1980 - First of payments from the taxing jurisdictions are due by this date. 1981 is the year for establishing the appraisal office.

This calendar repeats for the year 1981.

The Texas Legislature has appropriated state funds to help the appraisal districts began operations. These funds are to be distributed in 1980 and 1981.

One-fourth of the 1980 monies are to be distributed in equal amounts to each appraisal district. This will be approximately \$2,800 which will be mailed to the chairman of your board in late February or early March.

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Know How Shade Works

Know how your window shades work -- for operating success and for repair jobs, a housing and home furnishings specialist advises.

Window-shade operation may seem complicated, but it's really easy.

Here's how the window shade roller works.

One end of the roller has a flat metal pin that is attached to a spring on the inside of the roller.

This pin fits into a vertical slot on one of the window shade brackets -- so the pin cannot turn as the shade is unrolled.

As the shade is pulled down (unrolled), the spring winds up.

A small pawl and ratchet mechanism (see illustration A) on the outside of the roller "catches" -- and that holds the roller in place so the shade won't fly back up when you let go (see illustration B). give it a slight downward pull first to release the pawl from its locked position (see illustration C).

This slight downward pull

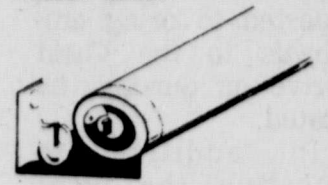

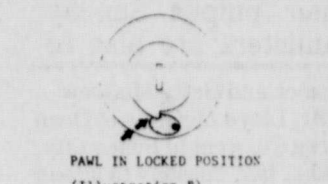

makes the wound-up spring let go, and it pulls the shade back up (see illustration D), too. A rapid-raising motion keeps the pawl loose.

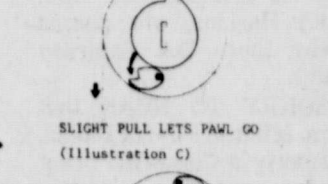
On the opposite end of the roller is only a round pin. It fits into a corresponding hole in the bracket, and it acts to support that side of the window shade.



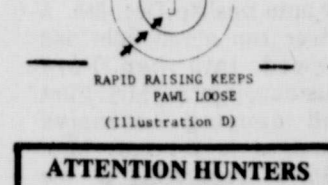
Pawl, ratchet keep shade in place, prevent "flying up" (Illustration A)

Checking over fire department records, he finds that Cisco has recorded a total of 108 fires during the months of December during a 10-year period. The number of grass fire calls has been increasing, too, his record check shows. To show you something about grass fire, most of the alarms this month have been to put out grass fires. On Dec. 8th, firemen put out three, including one south of Scranton. And there were two such calls to put out railroad right-of-way fires west of town.

All of which is the reason Cisco needs a well equipped Rural Fire Department. Some time ago, an appeal was sounded by Fire Chief C.W. Guthrie in a move to raise \$4,000 to update the equipment of the rural trucks. So far, \$700 or a little over 15% has come in.

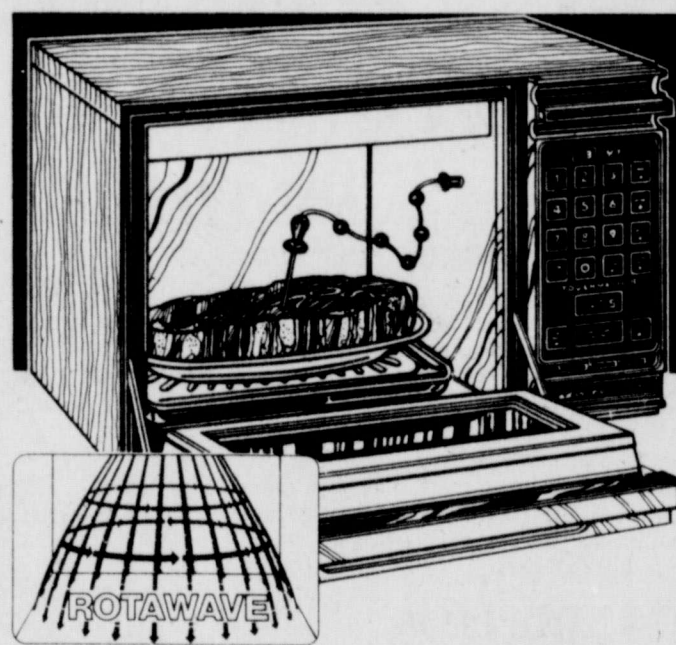

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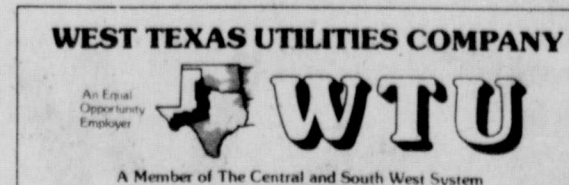
