

Cong. Stenholm To Run For Second Term

Citing mounting tension in the middle east a prime example of the need for increased United States preparedness as top priority in the 1980s, Congressman Charles W. Stenholm will announce his plans Tuesday to run for his second term of office.

Stenholm told a large group of supporters of his firm commitment to a stronger defense position that could "leave no doubt in any nation's mind of America's resolve to defend our hard won freedoms."

"That is one of my primary goals during the next session of Congress," he said. "One of the reasons I am asking for a renewal of my contract to serve the people of the 17th District."

"Cindy and I wanted to make this announcement here at home where it all began," Stenholm told the group. "We could not have won in 1978 without your help. We shall continue to work hard to merit your confidence and pledge to every citizen in the district our commitment to listen to their views, to respond to their needs; and to represent them in Washington to the best of our abilities."

Stenholm, 41, was elected to Congress following the retirement of longtime Congressman Omar Burleson of Anson. He serves on the House Agriculture Committee and was recently named to the House Small Business Committee. A native of Jones county, he graduated from Tarleton State University in 1959 and in 1961 received his BS degree from Texas Tech University. The following year he earned his MS in Agriculture Education at Texas Tech.

Stenholm told the group of the "new and varied challenges" faced every day in the Congress. Outlining his overall views, he said he had "every confidence in our system of government and I am optimistic about the second session of the 96th Congress." He stressed the elimination of deficit spending as another primary goal and emphasized his intentions "to continue to do all that is possible to cut any unnecessary federal spending."

"The true test of a good Congressman however is knowing where to cut -- knowing what is unnecessary fat and what is real muscle. In the case of national defense, we are dealing with the backbone of our country," he emphasized.

"We are grateful for the encouragement and help given by all of our good friends in the past and during the upcoming campaign," Stenholm concluded. "We know our roots here in Texas soil will continue to provide the strength and determination to use all of our energies in service to the people of the 17th District."

Leaders Study Plan To Support New College

Preliminary plans for conducting a campaign to raise funds as a community contribution to the new Cisco Chiropractic College were discussed at a meeting of some 15 civic leaders last Thursday noon at Brown Sanitorium.

Plans call for the new four-year college to begin classes next September, using leased facilities at Cisco Junior College. Students are now being enrolled for the initial class and officials are busy with various details necessary to open the new college.

Walter Burch of Abilene, one of the leaders in the project, told the group that a survey showed a growing need for another chiropractic college in Texas. The state's only such school is located at Pasadena and it must limit enrollment. The number of practicing chiropractors has been steadily decreasing.

Dr. Norman Wallace, president of Cisco Junior College, said that four years of preparatory work has gone into the college planning "and the foundation is very sound." He added that "dedicated people are behind Cisco Chiropractic College and it deserves our complete support."

Manager Gene Abbott of the Chamber of Commerce reported that a community participation campaign would be organized for the spring.



GORDON SPOT

There is a class of insects that we do not often recognize until they have done extensive damage to fruit trees and ornamental plants. These are small sucking insects known as scale insects. These insects attach themselves to plants and form a wax covering over their bodies.

There are many kinds of scale insects. Some attack fruit trees. We have seen a number of fruit trees this part month that were infested with San Jose scale and white peach scale.

Now is a good time to control these scale. Spray the fruit trees with Dormant Oil. This is a light weight oil and should be mixed with water. The directions will tell you how to mix the oil with water. The oil should be applied during dormancy, when the temperature is between 40 degrees and 70 degrees Fahrenheit.

Euonymus, a popular shrub in Eastland County, is often damaged severely or

killed by euonymus scale. These insects are found on the shrub's leaves, stems and trunk.

There are two or three generations each year. Scale insects spread to new foliage during the crawler stage. As crawlers begin to feed, a wax covering forms over the insect.

The oil will control adult euonymus scale. Malathion or diazinon added to the oil and water mixture will control crawlers. Summer oil rather than dormant oil is recommended on euonymus, since they retain their green leaves throughout the winter. Two or three insecticidal applications may be required to control scale insects. Thorough coverage of the entire shrub is important.

Inspect euonymus ten to fourteen days following each insecticidal application. The wax covering will remain on the plant even after scale insects have been killed.

Rub scales on a leaf or stem to determine if they are still alive. If a yellow liquid can be forced from the scales, they are still alive and another insecticidal application will be required. If only brown and white waxy scale coverings are removed when rubbing leaves and stems, the scale insects are dead.

Be sure to follow directions on the insecticide label when spraying for euonymus scale. Too much oil in the mixture can damage foliage.

If you are considering planting fruit trees, you

should place orders now, because all orders are filled as they are received. By ordering early, you may get the pick of the best trees and varieties available.

All trees should be ordered

from reliable nurseries. Always insist on disease-free stock. And for satisfactory performance, order trees that are adapted to your locality. Just because trees are available, don't assume

that they are adapted to the local area.

For peach and plum trees, select year-old plants that are three to five feet high. Apple and pear trees should be four to six feet tall.

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

Everybody Benefits

Lets assume that today is payday in Texas towns and cities. Why specifically Texas? Though this story is applicable to people in every city and community in the

nation, the figures used in this article are applicable only to Texas.

At some time during the day paychecks will be handed to approximately 55 thousand workers in the printing and publishing industry, 96 thousand workers in the food processing industry, 73 thousand workers in the apparel industry and 56 thousand workers in the wood based industry. Are you one of those workers?

Whether your job fits into one of those categories or not, have you ever stopped to think why your job is in existence? Why you are needed by your employer? Why your job is dependent upon a continued uninter-

ted flow of raw materials that originate from the land.

The need for your job in the free enterprise system's complicated economic web surrounding the manufacturing and marketing of goods and services to consumers can be traced back to the demand for a product which originated from or was dependent upon the basic renewable resources of soil and water.

What is the purpose of this story? Its purpose is to try and put into better perspective how Texans in all walks of life have a common interest and stake in the conservation of soil, water and related natural resources.

Some would advocate that the conservation of renewable natural resources should be the sole responsibility of the agricultural producer because he is the owner or operator of the majority of the lands from which these resources come.

But is it only his responsibility, particularly when in recent years the public has raised its expectations as to what should be adequate land treatment measures to control sedimentation and improve water quality?

It shouldn't be a surprise to anyone that agricultural producers are inherently conservation conscientious. They have to be because of the tremendous investment they have in their land and equipment. Most of all, its naturally instinctive to take care of land bought and being paid for by the sweat of the brow. Secondly, its just good management to improve the productivity of one's land to its maximum capability if that owner or operator expects that land to support him year after year.

Talk with most any farmer or rancher and one will probably be pleasantly surprised to learn that he has at one time or another reshaped some of his land for better farming or ranching techniques. He will usually talk about one conservation practice or another which he is applying for more efficient irrigation techniques or better grazing systems. Or he will talk about building terraces to hold rainfall or control erosion. He will talk about contour plowing, strip-

cropping, employing minimum tillage or a multitude of other things to increase his efficiency and to conserve water and save the soil or improve wildlife habitat.

Texas total land area consists of over 168 million acres. Over 158 million acres of that land is in farms, ranches or other agricultural units. Of significant importance is the fact that agricultural producers who own or operate over 110 million acres of Texas' land area have installed or are installing some type or types of conservation systems to conserve soil, water and related resources.

However, as farming or ranching operations change to meet new demands or conditions, it is often necessary for agricultural producers to employ new conservation measures or to upgrade systems already in place on his land. This may mean extensive outlays in capital. If the cost to apply a necessary conservation measure is too extensive, the job may not get done because the producer, like any businessman, would be reluctant to bear added economic stresses which do not promise any immediate returns. Before long he would rapidly be losing ground, both literally and financially. So would we.

Fortunately the agricultural producer has at his disposal various federal cost-share programs to assist him in applying conservation measures-measures which are keeping his land stable and productive to produce the renewable resources which keep the nation's factories and stores thriving.

An example of such a program is the Great Plains Conservation Program which enables farmers or ranchers to enter into long term contracts (up to 10 years) for installing eligible conservation systems as specified in a conservation plan approved by a local soil and water conservation district. Though the program is administered by the USDA's Soil Conservation Service, in Texas the conservation district directors approve contracts and provide guidance in the administration of contracts. Agricultural producers may receive as high as 80 percent of the costs to install a needed practice.

Enacted into law in 1956, the cost-share program is available to farmers and rancher in 123 Texas counties as well as to producers in parts of the nation's nine other Great Plains States. The initial and

current intent of this program is to stabilize agriculture in the Great Plains area plagued by unusual agricultural hazards including recurring prolonged and severe droughts.

Major benefits of this program have enabled producers to improve grasslands for red meat production, reduce wind and water erosion on croplands, conserve water in a relative low rainfall area, correct critically eroded areas and improve wildlife habitat. Of equal importance are the offsite benefits the public enjoys such as better water quality and other environmental improvements.

The initial law authorized appropriations of \$300 million for the overall cost-sharing program throughout the 10 Great Plains States. Texas is currently receiving approximately \$5 million per year and yet the demand by agricultural producers to take advantage of this conservation program in the 123 county area eligible for this program has far exceeded available funds.

The popularity and success of the program in Texas speaks for itself. Approximately 16 thousand agricultural producers who operate over 20 million acres have signed contracts to implement needed conservation measures since the beginning of this program. Approximately 12 thousand producers have completed their contracts while another 17 thousand producers have submitted applications for assistance. Last year, for example, 263 producers signed contracts, 357 completed contracts and 428 have asked for assistance, but must wait till funds are available.

Because of the success and necessity of this program, the U.S. House of Representatives Subcommittee on Conservation and Credit which is a subcommittee of Agriculture has approved a bill to re-authorize and extend the Great Plains Conservation Program for another 10 years in the amount of \$600 million. Of that money, based on past funding levels, Texas might expect approximately \$6.5 million per year. If the new bill finds favor in both

the House and Senate and is signed by the President, it would become effective October 1, 1980.

Though agricultural producers have the Great Plains Conservation Program as well as other cost-share programs available to them

as tools to protect the state and nation's most important renewable natural resources --its soil and water--the job of conservation will never be completely done.

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The Lutheran Church

Some emigrants to West Texas tried to leave everything of the past behind them, including their religious heritage. But a group of German settlers who came to the area between Cisco and Romney considered their Lutheran faith an indispensable part of their lives. By the 1880's and 90's families such as the Ziers, Reichs, Stroebels and Weisers had begun to settle in this area. Most of these people came by boat from Galveston, and up through Texas, rather than overland from the east.

Eastland County land sold for \$5.00 per acre in those days, but had to clear it and somehow survived - they improved any place where they settled. Much could be written about the experiences of these pioneers, who endured countless hardships for a chance to live in peace and enjoy the fruits of their labors. None of them probably ever saw their old homes or families in Germany again, but they left an indelible mark on a whole segment of Eastland County.

The Lutheran pioneers were soon visited by Pastors from the Texas District of the Missouri Synod of the Worldwide Lutheran Church. This was the day of the Mission-

ary-at-large, when most of the roads were trails. One Missionary, Rev. Leimer, did all his traveling on horseback. On one trip he covered 475 miles in the saddle. Then a Rev. Barthel made his headquarters at Aleman, near present-day Hamilton, from 1886 to '89. He visited Cisco and places farther west. In 1891 Cisco was designated as the "T and P" field, indicating that the scattered local members could be reached the easiest by using rail travel. In 1892 Rev. E.F. Moerbe arrived in Cisco, and decided to stay in the country south of town where the people of the Mission lived. When he needed to go elsewhere on the train his people took him to the station, sometimes in an ox cart.

The first Lutheran Church buildings in the County were located several miles apart, southwest of Cisco. One was called the "Peace" congregation, and the other the "Bethlehem" congregation. About seven years later, in 1903, the Zion Lutheran Church was established at Romney. Each Church dedicated land for cemeteries, and two of these burial places are still used.

By 1904 members of the Peace and Bethlehem congregations resolved to unite. The combined group choose

the name Christ Congregation, and was formally organized in March, 1904. The Charter families of this Church were: Reich, Stroebel, Wende, Winge, Koehler, Siewert, Eifert, Arzie, Appelt, Baumann, Weiser, Ziehr, and Schaefer. Bethlehem and Peace congregations decided to move their chapels to a plot given by the Stroebel families. The men of the Church attempted to move these chapels by using mules to pull them.

But their efforts proved futile, due especially to the well-known inclinations of mules! so stump pullers were finally used, and this moving process - across pastures and fields and up roads - took about two weeks. But this did not daunt the people, who had Sunday worship in the Chapels wherever they happened to be parked! Lee Leiske, of Cisco, remembers the interesting sight of the Chapels being moved. Two other persons are still alive who were present for this event - William Ziehr and Carl Weiser.

For a time Zion and Christ Congregations were served by the same Pastor. But in 1919 Christ Congregation resolved to become self-sustaining, and call its own Pastor. In 1921 Zion Congregation moved to the city of Cisco and became Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church. Leading families in this Church were the Gerhards, Ziehrs, Weisers, Blankens, and Luehrs. In

1965 Christ and Grace Congregations merged, to become the Redeemer Lutheran Church of Cisco serving the area between Breckenridge and Brownwood.

The Lutheran Church, which is family oriented, has always supported Christian education for children of the Church. Both Christ Church and Grace Church maintained day-schools for a number of years, with the last being taught in 1944. These schools were taught by the Pastors, and the results of their instruction speaks for itself. For the young people who attended these classes became outstanding in many fields - the Ministry, teaching, writing, or in business, professions, agriculture - leading citizens and Church workers. One of the graduates was Erwin Prange, nationally known Minister, author, and counselor.

Some local Church members remember the distinctive flavor of the early worship services, conducted in the German language. At Christ Church the rostrum holding the pulpit was six feet off the floor. Men and women sat on opposite sides of the Sanctuary. After a boy became confirmed he was considered a man, and moved to the side with his father. The singing was accompanied by an old pump organ, which was skillfully played. The German language services were gradually phased out, with the last being held around 1950.

The Redeemer Lutheran Church, located on Ave. D in Cisco, has 253 baptised members. Some of these come from Eastland, Gorman, Rising Star, Clyde, and rural areas. The present building, which is spacious and attractive, served as an Army Chapel in World War II. It was moved from Camp Berkeley, Abilene, in 1947. A separate Parish Hall back of the Church building has been recently remodeled.

Pastor Dell J. Crockett, like all Lutheran Pastors, completed an eight year religious training program before his ordination. This included the study of Greek, German, Latin, and Hebrew languages. Knowledge in Church doctrine was stressed, and its practice in the life.

Sunday School at the Lutheran Church begins at 9:15, with classes for all ages. The Worship Service begins at 10:30. This is a liturgical Service which includes Bible readings, singing and instrumental music, tithes and offerings, and a sermon by the Pastor. Communion is celebrated once each month, and Church-Year Holy Days are observed. These include Lent, Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany.

There are Bible Studies in the Church each Wednesday evening, and during the week there are meetings of the Youth Fellowship, the Woman's Group, and the Men's Lutheran Laymen's League.

The local Church supports the world-wide missionary and educational work of the Lutheran Church, but is autonomous on decisions concerning its own affairs - including that of financial matters. Each Church member 18 years or older is privileged to vote on these matters, and the majority rules.

Lutherans are encouraged to take part in Civic affairs, and contribute to local needs. The Church in Cisco has a regular service at Cisco Nursing Home, and it contributes to the Child Care Center. Members work with the Civic League, scouting, and a number of worthwhile projects.

Lutherans teach that the Bible is the word of God, and that it is the only divine truth known on earth. All valid translations are acceptable, with possible preference shown to the King James and Revised Standard Versions.

The Church supports the separation of Church of State, and believes strongly that the State should not tax buildings used for Christian education or worship. It teaches its people to obey the laws of the state, insofar as possible with Christian conscience. It has no position on the use of alcohol in itself, but drunkenness is forbidden.

Lutherans believe that their Church is not a new organization, or denomination, but the original Christian Church in its present-day form. They believe the Church has two

Sacraments. Baptism and the Lord's Supper. They teach that the body and blood of Jesus Christ are truly present in and with the wine in Holy Communion, and these are taken by all who eat and drink at the Lord's Table.

The Church believes that Baptism is intended for young and old without exception, and may be administered by sprinkling, pouring, or immersion. All who receive this Sacrament in faith are given the grace of God, forgiveness of sins, and the promise of eternal life. Many Lutheran parents have their babies baptized when two or three weeks old. There are emergency baptisms in the case of severe illness or injury. These children are confirmed in the faith by study of the Catechism (Bible study in Christian teachings and doctrine) usually during grades 7 or 8 in schools. Confirmation is on Palm Sunday. Adults who wish to become Church members study for sixteen weeks with the Pastor, and are baptized or confirmed at the end of this time. Baptisms from other faiths are considered valid, if administered in the name of the Triune.

Other Pastoral studies include counseling for three months with couples planning to be married. Lutherans teach that the marriage bond must be kept inviolate - that before God no divorce is valid except in the cases of adultery or malicious desertion. They believe the present tendency to make light of engagements and the marriage relation is resulting in harm to the home, children, the Church, and the State - in fact to the whole structure of human society.

Lutherans teach that God is Triune - one God in three Persons - Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. These Persons are equal in all things. They also teach that God's Law - including the Ten Commandments - demands perfection of heart, thought, word, and deed, and condemns all who transgress it. The Law cannot save sinners, and its chief function since the Fall is to lead man to the knowledge of his depraved condition, and his need of the Gospel.

The Gospel, they believe, is not a new or higher law, but the special revelation of what a loving God has done and still does, through Christ, for the salvation of mankind. Christ bore the punishment

for our sins by dying on the Cross - He rose from the dead and lives today, and he will come visibly for the second and last time at the world's end to judge the living and the dead.

This justification of mankind by Christ becomes the property of the individual by personal acceptance. Righteousness comes only by grace - for Christ's sake - through faith. This Universal truth, the Church believes, was derived by Martin Luther from the Scriptures more than four hundred years ago, heralding a great reformation in religious thought.

Lutherans teach there is an INVISIBLE aspect to the Church which consists of all who truly accept Christ as their Savior. They also teach there is a VISIBLE aspect to the Christian Church, consisting of all who profess the Christian faith and gather about God's word. It is the duty of every Christian to unite with that section of

the visible Church which stands for pure preaching and right practice. For there are bitter enemies of the Church (called 'devils' by the Bible) whose work is all too apparent.

"But fortunately," states Pastor Crockett, "The Holy Spirit loved the world enough to see the Gospel proclaimed. It also leads us to believe Gospel promises, and keeps us believing. Faith is the hands which the Holy

Spirit gives us to take hold of the Gospel promises and make them ours."

Undoubtedly the Lutheran pioneers, now resting in the beautiful cemeteries south of Cisco, had a great measure of this faith. And if they could see the large congregation streaming into the Redeemer Church to worship - prosperous, happy and faithful people - they would realize their hopes for their families came true.

Motorcycle Course Slated For Texas

As the price of gasoline inches steadily upward and the freeways in cities across the state become more crowded, more Texans are parting with their automobiles and mounting motorcycles...not for recreation purposes alone, but as a primary means of "getting from here to there".

The parking lots at high schools across Texas are filled with motorcycles. Parents are purchasing the motorized two-wheelers for their children to travel to school independently and in an economic manner. Unfortunately, these teenagers learn to ride their new motorcycles by trial and error. A recent Department of Public Safety report revealed that within the age group of 15-24, there was a 21 percent increase in motorcycle accidents for the first half of 1979 over the first six months of 1978. Statistics have consistently shown that nearly a quarter of the total number of motorcycle-involved accidents happen to riders with less than six months riding experience.

Something is being done in Texas to improve this dangerous situation. The Texas Legislature overwhelmingly approved Senate Bill 553 which will require young riders to take an educational and instructional course before receiving a restricted operator's license.

The legislation deals specifically with persons 15-18 years of age. Riders over 18 will in no way be affected. Upon completion of the course, students will be eligible to pass the state test to obtain the "Motorcycles Also" designation on their driver licenses.

State Senator Gene Jones of Houston authored the bill and guided it to passage, basing his arguments on the old maxim that "an ounce of preven-

tion is worth a pound of cure."

Similar courses have been available in Texas for a few years, but have been largely unpublicized and of little impact on the overall situation. The Motorcycle Safety Foundation, with home offices in Linthicum, Maryland, developed the course and has taught instructors for years.

When the new Motorcycle Education Law goes into effect on January 1, 1981, the State will be required to make the course available to all those meeting the eligibility requirements. At present, there are 396 motorcycle safety instructors in Texas.

Only certified Driver Education teachers are authorized by the State of Texas to teach Driver Education courses, under which the new motorcycle course will fall. However, few of them are qualified or knowledgeable enough about motorcycles to be utilized as instructors.

So, who will fill the slots created by the establishment of the motorcycle course and how will these teachers be certified by the state?


One group of Texans is already moving to fill this gap. The newly formed "Society of Motorcycle Instructors" consists of members who have finished the comprehensive 50-hour instructor course taught by the Motorcycle Safety Foundation.

The goal of the Society of Motorcycle Instructors is to be recognized as para-professional Driver Education instructors and share their valuable experience with Texas youngsters.

People completing the 50-hour course must continue to participate in seminars and special courses developed by the Foundation to maintain knowledge of new safety information.

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Bi-Monthly Blood Drive Is Set For January 30

The third bi-monthly Cisco Blood Drive has been set for January 30, at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. A trained team of laboratory technicians from Mary Meek Blood Bank of Abilene will again be present from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The joint organized project of the Cisco Civic League and the Cisco Service Club has received outstanding response from Cisco citizens and CJC students in the first two Blood Drives. A total of 69 units were donated at the September 12 drive, with another 45 units credited to Cisco from the Cisco Junior College, November 14 Blood Drive.

The January 30 Blood Drive will be the first one of 1980, and even greater participa-

tion is anticipated. It cannot be emphasized enough, that in order to maintain Cisco's adequate blood supply and repay our long-time debt, that each Cisco citizen's every effort is mandatory - either by their participation or help in "soliciting" eligible blood donors.

Up until the past two Blood Drives, Cisco has been in debt to Mary Meek Blood Bank, 900 units of blood. And though 114 units have been generously offered in only two drives, everyone must realize that a great part of that blood is used to maintain Cisco's average need of 40 pints every two months. To maintain this blood supply and repay its present debt, the Blood Drive Committee has set its goal to collect 60 pints of blood every two months.

Striving to find the most effective means of conducting a successful Blood Drive, the Blood Drive Committee will be trying several approaches in the drives. Due to some impossibilities of time scheduling every willing donor, appointment times will be not be made for the January 30 Blood Drive.

A blood insurance policy is available for those interested donors, whereby for a pint of blood given, that donor's immediate family will be insured for having blood available to them for one full year. That donated pint of blood, however, will not count toward credit for Cisco, but for those persons interested in the insurance policy, perhaps at a later date, the donor can donate another pint of blood for credit for Cisco.

All types of blood are needed. There are no longer paid donors, due to FDA regulations, except in the cases of institutions, using only the plasma from a pint of blood, so it therefore depends on voluntary blood donations.

Blood donors should be aware of the following when preparing to give blood: A. All donors must be age 18 or older; there is no age limit, only that each donor is healthfully able to give blood.

B. Blood donors should eat normally, and are encouraged to do so before giving

C. No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood.

D. No medication, however, should be deleted without checking with the prospective donor's own doctor.

E. Any person who has been sick or has had a cold within the last seven days prior to donating blood, should not donate blood.

F. Any person who has had their ears pierced within the last six months at any place other than a doctor's office, should not donate blood.

G. Any person who has been in Southeast Asia in the last three years should not donate blood, due to malaria possibilities.

H. Any woman who has menstruated in the last three to four days prior to donating blood, should not donate.

I. No woman who is pregnant, or suspects she is so, should give blood, and should not do so until six weeks after pregnancy.

J. Persons can donate blood every two to three months, with no foreseen problems, although, it is hopeful to not have to call on the same donors nearly this often.
