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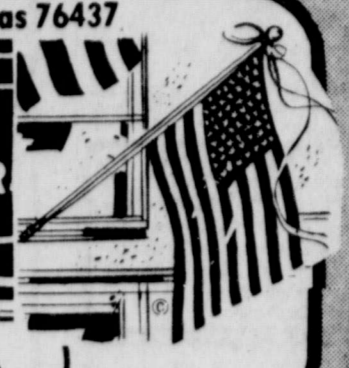
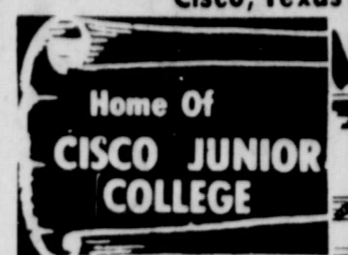

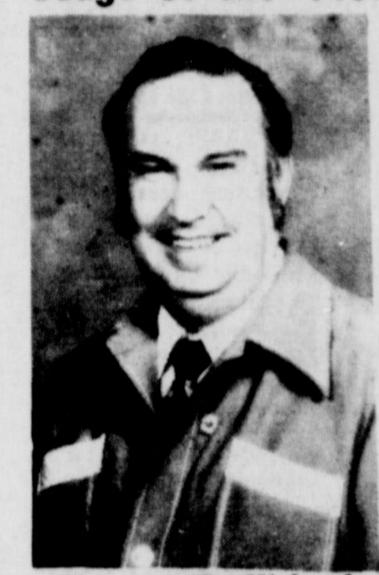

### Truman P. Kirk Is Candidate For Judge Of The 91st District Court



Truman P. Kirk of Cisco has authorized this newspaper to announce that he will be a candidate for the office of Judge of the 91st District Court, Eastland County, in the Democratic Primary election next May.

A veteran of some 25 years in the practice of law, Mr. Kirk has been in private practice in Cisco for the past 15 years.

Born Oct. 21, 1924, in Abilene, Mr. Kirk is a graduate of the Abilene Public Schools, holds a BA from Hardin-Simmons University, and a LLB degree from the University of Texas Law School. He is a Navy veteran of World War II, including sea duty aboard the Submarine Tender USS Eulton.

In law school, Mr. Kirk was active as editor of the Dicta (law school newspaper), Honor Council Representative Consul Awardee (All-Round Student Award) and graduated in the top one-third of his class. Mr. Kirk's legal experience has been varied, including two years as an attorney for the City of Abilene and four years as an attorney for the City of Odessa. He spent two years as a part-time government teacher for Odessa College and five years teaching government for Cisco Junior College.

During his school years, Mr. Kirk worked for newspapers in San Angelo, Austin, Big Spring, and Abilene, gaining valuable administrative experience. He spent two years as a member of the City Commission in Abilene before moving

project for Cisco, according to Mrs. Margaret Bearman, executive director of the agency. The site is to Cisco to join the staff of CJC and to practice law. He is a member of the various legal associations open to men in his profession.

Truman P. Kirk, active in Lions Club work is past President (1975-76) and Lions Zone Chairman for Eastland and Stephens County Zone. He and family are members of the First Baptist Church of Cisco. He did the drafting work for the new Cisco City Charter and is known throughout the State of Texas for his work as a City Attorney for Odessa and Abilene.

He is active in Little League and 4-H Club work with his son, Kevin.

1.4 acres. The contractor was moving in equipment to begin work on the project, which will cost approximately \$448,000. Joe Bill Pierce of Midland is the architect for the job. Plans call for the work to be completed by August 1. Federal funds will provide financing.

The project calls for construction of one triplex and seven duplex units. Mrs. Bearman said the project originally called for 20 units but it was cut to 17 due to inflation.

The housing units are being built especially for senior citizens, including two for handicapped seniors. Mrs. Bearman said the Cisco Housing Authority has a number of applications on file from persons wanting to rent the units. Rent charges

will depend on the income of the occupants, she said.

The Cisco Housing Authority has 72 units now in use. The original project was for 52 units with 20 added a few years later for senior citizens. Each unit has kitchen stove and refrigerator and wall heaters.

The M and M Dry Wall Company of Abilene began work last September on a contract that called for extensive remodeling the initial 52-unit project at a cost of about \$500,000. Mrs. Bearman said this work is due to be completed about March 1.

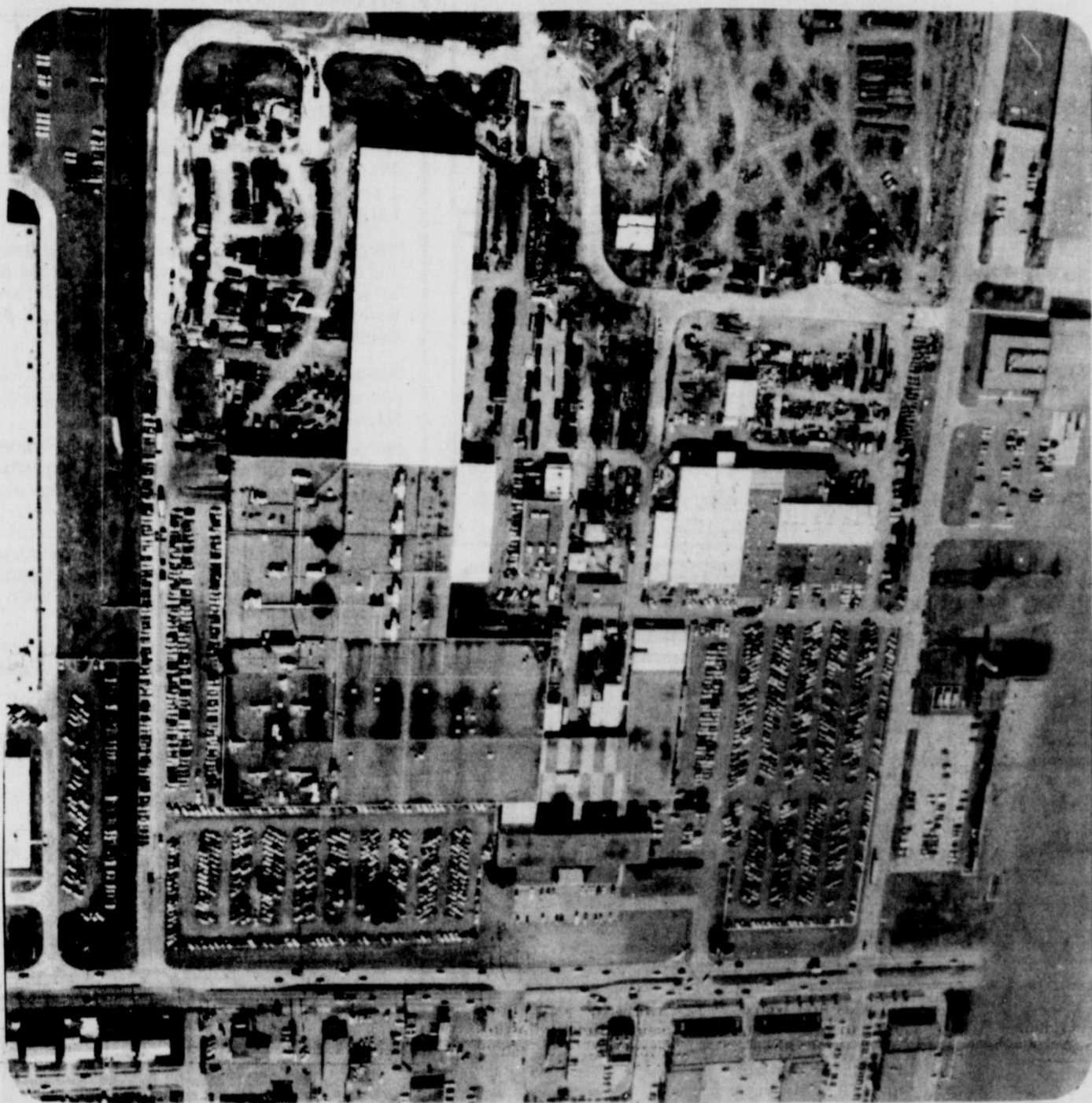

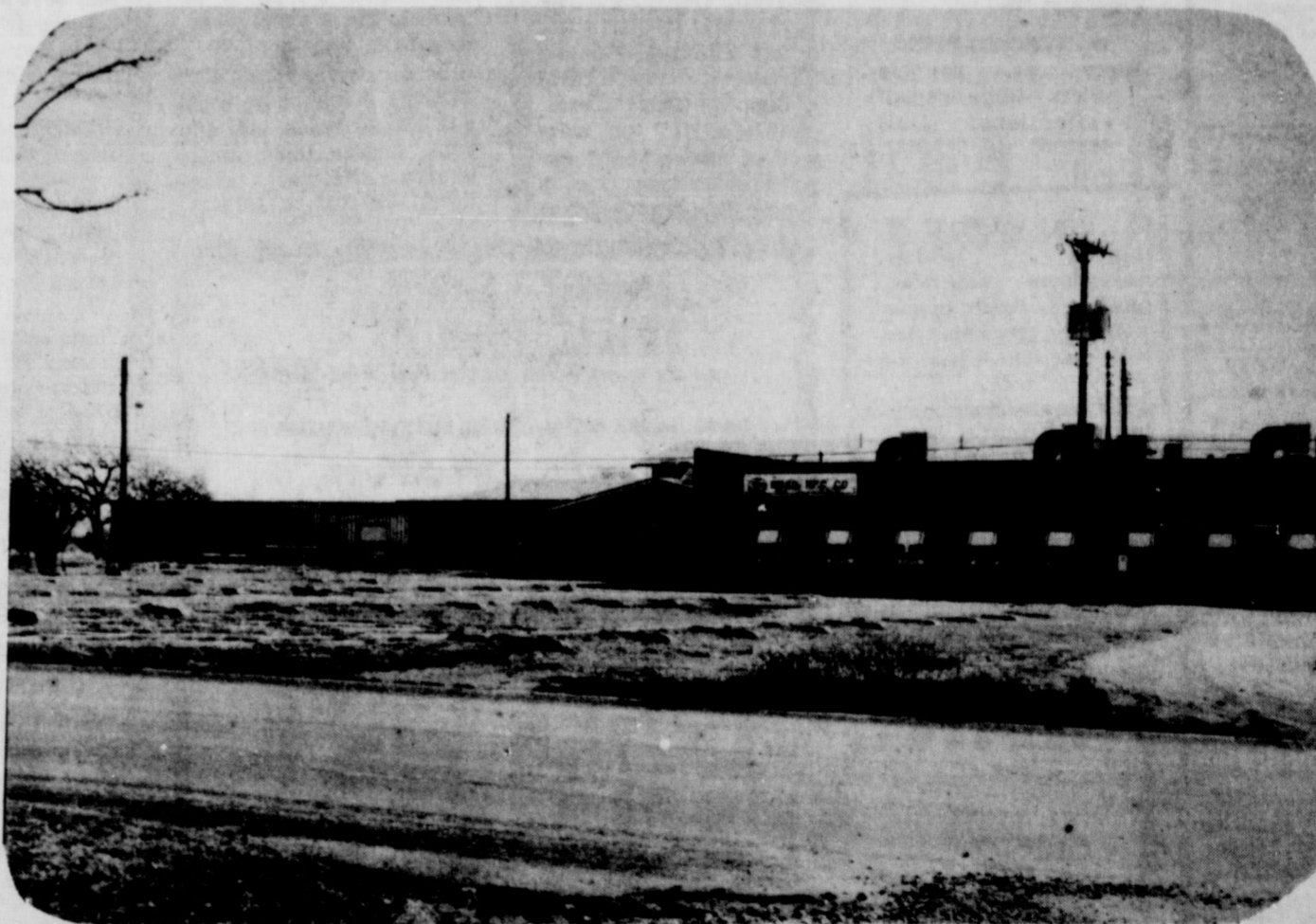

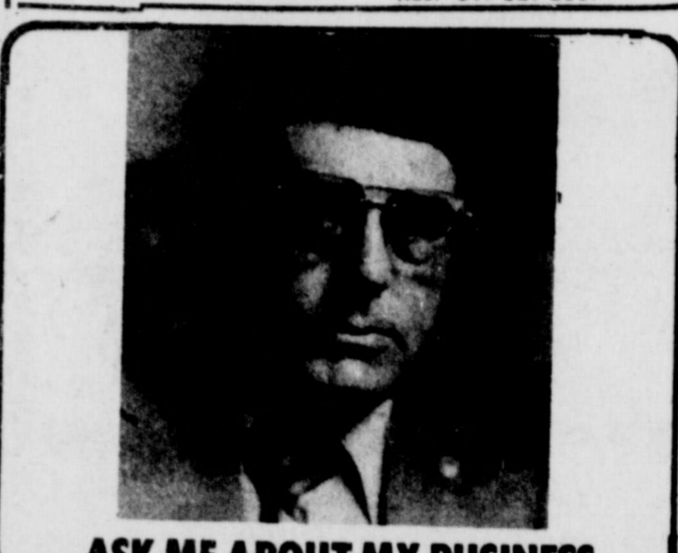

## Texas Farm Bureau Clarified Position On Beferendum

WACO -- The Texas Farm Bureau has clarified its position on the Beferendum, according to TFB President Carol Chaloupka.

In a letter to county FB presidents, Chaloupka said the TFB Board has voted to implement the state policy adopted at the recent state convention which supports voluntary contributions for beef research and promotion and opposes the proposed Federal Beef Research and Information Order.

Chaloupka explained that the Board met following the annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation Jan. 6-10 in Phoenix.

"National policy, as interpreted by the AFBF Board of Directors, permits each state Farm Bureau to establish its own position on this matter," he said. "The TFB Board voted to implement the state policy adopted in McAllen in December."

The state policy reads: "We support the National Livestock and Meat Board in

their promotion of the meat industry and urge all local livestock markets to participate in the voluntary check-off program.

"We also oppose the Federal Beef Referendum Program."

The TFB leader said livestock producers generally support a program to promote their industry, but said it would be difficult to comply with the proposed Order "because it is confusing and cumbersome."

Chaloupka explained that he wrote Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland Jan. 3 asking for clarification of "conflicting statements in the Order and in USDA announcements" regarding the exemption of dairy and beef breeding cattle.

"As of this date (Jan. 15), we have not received clarification of this matter," he said. "The farm leader said that many of the details as to how the program would operate would be decided later in regulations."

# Bi-Monthly Blood Drive Is Set For January 30

The third bi-monthly Cisco Blood Drive has been set for January 30, at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. A trained team of laboratory technicians from Mary Meek Blood Bank of Abilene will again be present from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The joint organized project of the Cisco Civic League and the Cisco Service Club has received outstanding response from Cisco citizens and CJC students in the first two Blood Drives. A total of 69 units were donated at the September 12 drive, with another 45 units credited to Cisco from the Cisco Junior College, November 14

Blood Drive.

The January 30 Blood Drive will be the first one of 1980, and even greater participation is anticipated. It cannot be emphasized enough, that in order to maintain Cisco's adequate blood supply and repay our long-time debt, that each Cisco citizen's every effort is mandatory - either by their participation or help in "soliciting" eligible blood donors.

Up until the past two Blood Drives, Cisco has been in debt to Mary Meek Blood Bank, 900 units of blood. And though 114 units have been generously offered in only two drives, everyone must realize that a great part of that blood is used to maintain Cisco's average need of 40 pints every two months. To maintain this blood supply and repay its present debt, the Blood Drive Committee has set its goal to collect 60 pints of blood every two months.

Striving to find the most effective means of conducting a successful Blood Drive, the Blood Drive Committee will be trying several approaches in the drives. Due to some impossibilities of time scheduling every willing donor, appointment times will be not be made for the January 30 Blood Drive.

A blood insurance policy is available for those interested donors, whereby for a pint of blood given, that donor's immediate family will be insured for having blood available to them for one full year. That donated pint of blood, however, will not count toward credit for Cisco, but for those persons interested in the insurance policy, perhaps at a later date, the donor can donate another pint of blood for credit for Cisco.

All types of blood are needed. There are no longer paid donors, due to FDA regulations, except in the cases of institutions, using only the plasma from a pint of blood, so it therefore depends on voluntary blood donations.

Blood donors should be aware of the following when preparing to give blood:

A. All donors must be age 18 or older; there is no age limit, only that each donor is healthfully able to give blood.

B. Blood donors should eat normally, and are encouraged to do so before giving blood.

C. No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood.

D. No medication, however, should be deleted without checking with the perspective donor's own doctor.

E. Any person who has been sick or has had a cold within the last seven days prior to donating blood, should not donate blood.

F. Any person who has had their ears

pierced within the last six months at any place other than a doctor's office, should not donate blood.

G. Any person who has been in Southeast Asia in the last three years should not donate blood, due to malaria possibilities.

H. Any woman who has menstruated in the last three to four days prior to donating blood, should not donate.

I. No woman who is pregnant, or suspects she is so, should give blood, and should not do so until six weeks after pregnancy.

J. Persons can donate blood every two to three months, with no foreseen problems, although, it is hopeful to not have to call on the same donors nearly this often.

Mrs. Fenley was born in Russellville, Arkansas, and moved to Eastland County, with her parents, at the age of 6, in 1897.

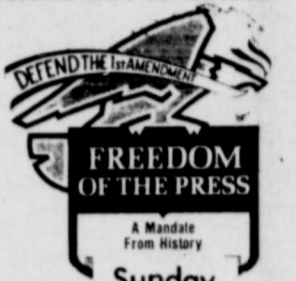

To be able to vote on this issue it will be necessary to be registered. Registration will be done by mail or in person at this office beginning January 28 through February 6, 1980.

Eligible producer is any individual, group of individual, association, cooperation, cooperative, partnership or any other entity which owned one or more cattle at any time during the representative period (except solely for the purpose of slaughter) will be eligible to register to vote. The representative period being January 1 through December 31, 1979.

Eligible producers should register to vote at this office January 28 through February 6, 1980.

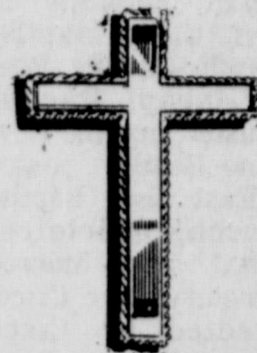

## God Bless America

Sometime ago the editorial page of *The New York Times* carried an article entitled "God Bless America." It was written by Janina Atkins, a Polish immigrant.

"Just six years ago I came with my husband to this country with \$2.60 in my purse, some clothes, a few books, a bundle of old letters, and a little eiderdown pillow. I was an immigrant girl hoping for a new life and happiness in a strange new country.

"There is something in the air of America that filled my soul with a feeling of freedom and independence. This begot strength. There is no one here to lead you by the hand and order you about. We believed in the future and the future did not disappoint us.

"Today my husband is studying for his doctorate. We live in a comfortable apartment. "I love this country because when I want to move from one place to another I do not have to ask permission. When I want to go abroad I just buy a ticket and go.

"I love America because I do not have to stand in line for hours to buy a piece of tough, fat meat. I love it because, even with inflation, I do not have to pay a day's earnings for a small chicken.

"I love America because America trusts me. When I go into a shop to buy a pair of shoes, I am not asked to produce my identity card. When I visit my friends, it is not reported to the secret police.
