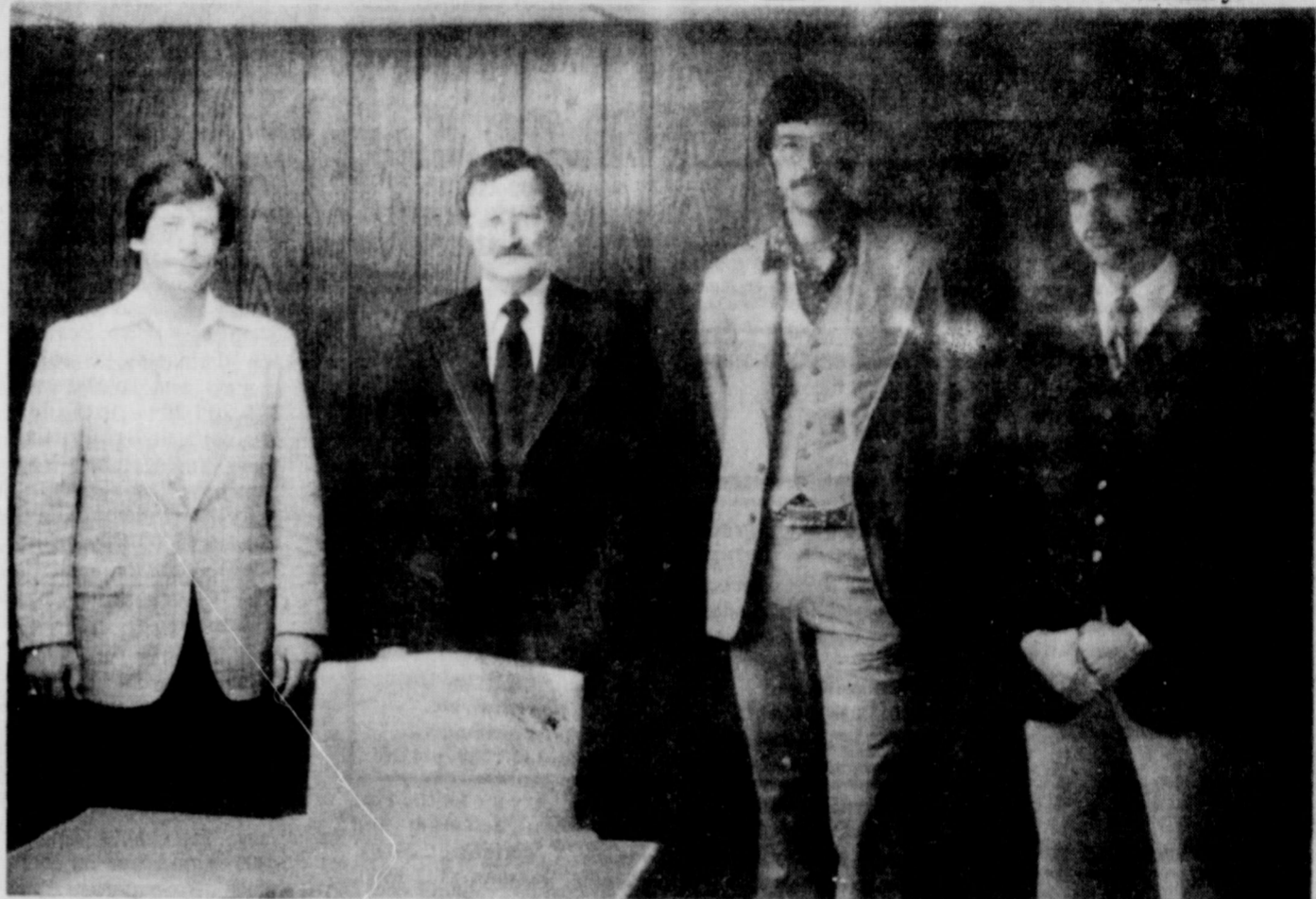

SENIOR CITIZENS RESPOND TO TP&L RATE HIKE REQUEST

United by their concern about rising utility rates, thirty-three (33) senior citizens from Brownwood, Mineral Wells and Cleburne, on Monday, January 14, 1980, formally petitioned the Texas Public Utility Commission for permission to intervene in the Texas Power and Light's (TP&L's) proposed \$124 million rate increase.

The increase requested by TP&L, which serves customers in fifty-one (51) counties in North Central and East Texas, would add 20 percent to the electric rates of residential customers and 12 percent to industrial rates.

Speaking on behalf of the senior citizens from whom he represents, Geoffrey M. Gay, staff attorney with West Texas Legal Services, expressed their concern. "The bulk of TP&L's requested increase is designed to finance the construction of additional lignite and nuclear generating facilities, even though the company presently has huge quantities of reserve power. The low-income, elderly customers are typically low-volume users, yet they are being asked to pay a disproportionate share of the increase."

"Therefore", stressed Gay, "we have petitioned the PUC for permission to intervene in this proceeding to ensure that TP&L, the general public, and the Commission itself, are made aware of and remain sensitive to the difficult economic conditions under which our clients and other low-income, elderly citizens in Texas are attempting to survive."

According to the petition filed by the senior citizens, "TP&L's application for rate relief is unjustified and unconscionable because of the burden it places upon low-income and elderly individuals." The petition also asks the PUC to impose a "lifeline" rate for essential electrical needs. Additionally, the senior citizens have requested the Commission conduct hearings on the electric rate standards under the Public

Utility Regulatory Policies Act of 1978, including cost of service, declining block rates, and the implementation of time-of-day and seasonal rates, and peak-load pricing. The senior citizens have called for a complete denial of TP&L's request and an immediate reform of the company's rate structure which, according to their petition, is discriminatory to low-income and elderly customers.

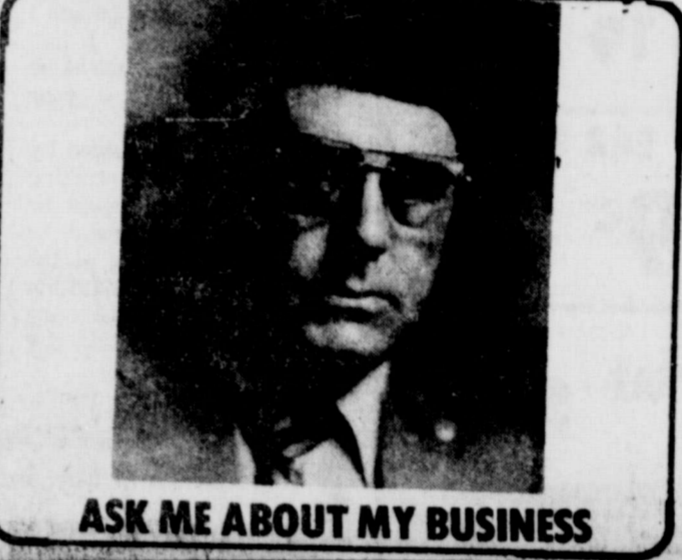

Blood Drive.

The January 30 Blood Drive will be the first one of 1980, and even greater participation is anticipated. It cannot be emphasized enough, that in order to maintain Cisco's adequate blood supply and repay our long-time debt, that each Cisco citizen's every effort is mandatory - either by their participation or help in "soliciting" eligible blood donors.

Up until the past two Blood Drives, Cisco has been in debt to Mary Meek Blood Bank, 900 units of blood. And though 114 units have been generously offered in only two drives, everyone must realize that a great part of that blood is used to maintain Cisco's average need of 40 pints every two months. To maintain this blood supply and repay its present debt, the Blood Drive Committee has set its goal to collect 60 pints of blood every two months.

Striving to find the most effective means of conducting a successful Blood Drive, the Blood Drive Committee will be trying several approaches in the drives. Due to some impossibilities of time scheduling every willing donor, appointment times will be not be made for the January 30 Blood Drive.

A blood insurance policy is available for those interested donors, whereby for a pint of blood given, that donor's immediate family will be insured for having blood available to them for one full year. That donated pint of blood, however, will not count toward credit for Cisco, but for those persons interested in the insurance policy, perhaps at a later date, the donor can donate another pint of blood for credit for Cisco.

needed. There are no longer paid donors, due to FDA regulations, except in the cases of institutions, using only the plasma from a pint of blood, so it therefore depends on voluntary blood donations.

Blood donors should be aware of the following when preparing to give blood:

A. All donors must be age 18 or older; there is no age limit, only that each donor is healthfully able to give blood.

B. Blood donors should eat normally, and are encouraged to do so before giving blood.

C. No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood.

D. No medication, however, should be deleted without checking with the perspective donor's own doctor.

E. Any person who has been sick or has had a cold within the last seven days prior to donating blood, should not donate blood.

F. Any person who has had their ears

pierced within the last six months at any place other than a doctor's office, should not donate blood.

G. Any person who has been in Southeast Asia in the last three years should not donate blood, due to malaria possibilities.

H. Any woman who has menstruated in the last three to four days prior to donating blood, should not donate.

I. No woman who is pregnant, or suspects she is so, should give blood, and should not do so until six weeks after pregnancy.

J. Persons can donate blood every two to three months, with no foreseen problems, although, it is hopeful to not have to call on the same donors nearly this often.

Revenue Sharring Loss Would Hurt Locally

Revenue Sharring, the federal plan which returns tax money to cities and counties for local use, is due to expire in September. The cut-off of these funds will hurt this county in some fairly drastic ways, according to several city officials. One ray of hope is that the federal government may extend Revenue Sharring.

During 1979, the city of Ranger received \$50,288.00, stated Barbara Wheat, Ranger City Secretary.

Ranger will not be able to maintain streets, and water lines if the money is no

longer provided according to Wheat.

Ranger has used the funds in a variety of ways, such as maintenance of fire trucks, police cars and sanitation trucks. The city recently has been improving sewer lines with its share of the funds.

"We'll suffer from it...really suffer," stated Wheat, "all departments depend on it."

Eastland apparently won't be hurt quite as bad as Ranger by the expiration of Revenue Sharring.

City Manager, Lewis Tiner, said the money allotted to Eastland is used for special projects, and the city

tries to keep it separate from the operating fund.

Eastland has gotten \$13,000.00 from Revenue Sharring. Some specific projects in Eastland have been the servicing of water tanks, cleaning water lines, and recently they are purchasing a new fire truck.

Judge Scott Bailey stated, "Revenue Sharring has a profound affect on Eastland County. It has kept us from having to raise property tax values, and the county has adopted equal opportunity employment to be able to receive Revenue Sharring."

It has provided at \$3000.00 homestead exemption for those over 65.

The Libraries of the county receive a small amount to help pay utility bills. It is used throughout the county for road and bridge work also.

If Revenue Sharring were

to expire Eastland County would feel quite an impact. \$100,000.00 would be lost Judge Bailey said.

Cisco City Manager, John Boland, states "We don't depend on it for total survival but there is some dependence."

Cisco has used their funds to improve streets, sewers, water lines and purchase sanitation trucks as well as other equipment.

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"It would severely restrict us in this area," said Boland. The cost of the Front Street improvement project in 1979 was \$65,000.00 which was taken from Revenue Sharring funds, Boland said.

If the Revenue Sharring plan does expire something will have to be done to compensate for it, according to Judge Bailey.

He said ad-velorem taxes would probably have to be raised, and they might have to cut off the homestead exemption which, Bailey stated, "is not something we want to do."

Increased water and sanitation rates, user fees for the landfill, and raised taxes would probably be the outcome if Revenue Sharring is stopped, claimed Boland.

As Eastland City Manager, Lewis Tiner says, "We would miss it."

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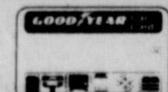

The Catholic Church

Although the Catholic Church has never embraced a large membership in Eastland County, things are different in many other places.

On a world-wide scale, this organization has accomplished work almost unbelievable in scope. The Church has been in the forefront of every global population shift, and its impact upon world history has been profound.

In the past, wars have risen within her and without, influencing events of such magnitude as the Crusades,

the topping of European kingdoms, and the rise of Protestant Churches.

Over the centuries the church has been a repository for relics and priceless art treasures. Her Cathedrals are among the world's most impressive, her shrines are visited by millions, and her institutions are manned by devoted followers in special Orders. The Catholic influence has been widely felt in music and literature, particularly in that of Europe.

At this time the Catholic Church has over 700 million world-wide members, with

the faith predominating in Mexico, Portugal, France, Spain, Italy, Ireland, and Central and South America. The church has 40 million members in the United States, a larger membership than any other religious group in this country. Most nations of the world, including the United States, send representatives to the Vatican, which is the seat of Catholic government on this earth. Pope John Paul's recent visit to the United States caused the largest assemblies ever recorded.

Long before Columbus discovered America, the Catholics had a Diocese in Greenland. When Columbus sailed west, a Priest from Catholic Spain sailed with him. By 1598, Priests of the Franciscan Order were venturing up the Rio Grande to establish missions in the Southwest. The oldest Texas Mission was built at Ysleta, near El Paso, and was soon followed by beautiful Churches in the San Antonio area - and New Mexico. The ruins of old Churches and functioning parishes of present-day churches in the southwest give a special flavor to the area.

The Churches of Eastland County were not founded by Priests riding horseback over long, dusty trails, but by persons who came to the locality from the east during the first oil "boom".

The first Catholic Church in Eastland County was started on July 2, 1919, in Ranger.

Previous to that date Mass was held in the Jas. Casey home. Then, as needed space was available, in the Leveille-Maher Ford Agency

and later a dance hall and skating rink. A tent was rented in Dallas, and this was moved to Ranger. The bad roads and overheated car caused this trip to take two days. The tent was used until the Church was completed Feb. 23, 1920.

The beautiful altars and Communion rail in the present Church was a gift from the W.K. Gordon family of Thurber, a Protestant family, in memory of their daughter, Mary Louise.

St. Rita's school, in Ranger, was opened in Sept., 1921. Sisters of the Incarnate, from San Antonio, were in charge. This school, with a Rectory, filled the block. A cyclone on April 8, 1922 damaged the Church to such extent that it was necessary to again have services elsewhere. A school bus operated from Cisco and Eastland to bring students to St. Rita's school.

The Cisco Church was dedicated on April 17, 1921. There was also a Parish Hall used for teaching catechism and Bible lessons.

The congregation at Eastland met in the Court House until 1923, when St. Francis Church was completed.

Rev. R.A. Gerkin was in charge of Ranger, Eastland and Cisco until August, 1926, when he was made Bishop of Amarillo and later Archbishop of Santa Fe. Catholics consider it a real honor that the local Churches were built and attended by a Priest who later was made an Archbishop.

CISCO: Josephine Wallbraun, J.J. Collins and family, John Collins, John Keough family, Mrs. G.B. Kelly and John Bryns family.

RANGER: The F.L. Higginbotham family, James O'Neil, Edward H. Maher and Morris Leveille (First Ford Dealership) and James Casey family.

At the present time there are 300 members in the County, with Father Dennis Smith of St. Rita's Rectory, Ranger, taking care of the three Eastland County Churches and Strawn. The churches are in the Diocese of Ft. Worth. The Church in Cisco is called the Holy Rosary Church, and dedicated to St. Dominic. St. Frances Church, in Eastland, is named for Her Patron Saint, and St. Rita, Ranger, is named after an Italian Saint. In the center of the altar of each Church is a relic of Her Patron Saint.

Services at the Church are held at various times, and visitors are welcome. Catholics point out that some of the festivals, Holy Days, and religious customs instituted by their Church are still observed in many Protestant Churches. Mass is held in Ranger at 9:45 Sunday morning. In Eastland it is held at 6:30 p.m. Saturday, and on Monday nights. In Cisco there is an 11:30 Mass Sunday morning.

Catholics maintain an atmosphere of reverence in their Churches, and the services stress worship rather than study and discussion.

The Priest conducts the Mass, but members participate in the service with singing (to organ music) and the reading of scripture. Catholics have a special regard for their Priest.

A secular Priest takes the vows of chastity and obedience. The Priest of a religious Order - besides these two - also takes the vow of poverty. Church members point out, however, that a Priest does not forgive sins in Confession. He acts as a mediator and counselor for the penitent.

Catholics have many visual and symbolic aids in their worship. There are bells to call the faithful to worship. Incense burning in the Church represents prayers ascending to God. A Sanctuary Light burns near the altar, and candles are lit for prayers, Communion, and other special services. Holy water is used, as well as statues and pictures of the Holy Family and Saints. The Priests wear robes in sanctuary services. The sign of the Cross is made at appropriate times.

The Rosary is a private type of devotion using a string of beads which has been

blessed. Each bead represents a special prayer and meditation.

Mary, the Mother of Christ, is venerated, loved, and honored. She is regarded as being in Heaven at this time, and holding an exalted position there. She is often spoken of as being "The Mother of God". The United States of America is believed to be under the special protection of Mary.

Catholics believe there are three original sources of faith and doctrine: the Bible, the Creeds (Apostle's, the Nicene, and the Athanasian), and Tradition. They believe in God as a Supreme Being who made all things, in the Trinity, in a literal Heaven and Hell, in the forgiveness of sins, the incarnation, the Church, the Holy Spirit, in the communion of Saints, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting.

They believe that seven Sacraments were instituted by Jesus Christ for the salvation of mankind: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist (Communion) Penance, Extreme Unction, Orders, and Matrimony. They believe that Christ founded their Church, and that Peter was the first Head, or "Pope".

Next to the Pope is the College of Cardinals, who has great bearing on any Papal decisions concerning faith and morals. A Catholic leader has stated: "The origin of our faith is not the Bible alone, but the Church which gives us both the written and the unwritten word."

Precepts of the Church (general things expected of members) are: To keep Sundays and Holy Days of obligation holy, by hearing Mass and resting from servile work. To go to Confession at least once a year. To receive the Blessed Sacrament at least once a year, and that Easter or thereabouts.

To contribute to the support of Pastors. To not marry within certain degrees of kindred. To visit the sick, care for their needs, and to engage in other works of charity.

Catholics believe that life is a period of probation in which we are all tried and tested. We can be saved only through the merits of Jesus, and to avail ourselves of those merits we must have faith. But good works are pleasing to God, and they must work in harmony with faith. Catholics believe that many may remove or avoid the natural consequences of his sins by subjecting himself

to penances or disciplines. At the time of death those guilty of mortal sin will go to eternal punishment. Since nothing defiled can enter Heaven, the soul having the taint of sin even in small degree must go to an intermediate place (after death), call Purgatory. Purgatory means a place of purification, and souls remain there for an undetermined time. Catholics may aid the departure of these souls from Purgatory by prayers and Masses for the dead.

Members of the Catholic Faith accept the Bible as the inspired word of God. (The Douai version, translated into English in 1609). They feel they preserved the Bible for 1500 years before the Protestant Reformation. The Douai version of the Bible has seven Books not included in the King James and most other translation: Tobias, Baruch, Judith, Wisdom, Ecclesiasticus, First and Second Maccabees, seven chapters of Esther and sixty-six verses of the Book of Daniel.

In the Douai translation, the Ten Commandments are recorded differently from the Protestant translation of the Bible. The "Second Commandment" of King James and like versions is omitted, and the Tenth Commandment (on coveting) is divided into two commandments. Catholics point out that an early Church scholar, St. Augustine, made this division.

Catholics state that each member of their Faith has a moral obligation to observe and live by the Ten Commandments. Time does not change moral and spiritual beliefs.

One basic Catholic doctrine is belief in the "real presence" of the Lord in the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. (Communion).

Although the Catholic Church does not have the type of "revivals" and "evangelistic campaigns" of some other Churches, members and Leaders have missionary work of other types.

There are classes that teach those interested in becoming Catholics - open to all. Persons are baptized, however, if they have been in other faiths, and this is accepted by the Church. Baptism in the Catholic

Church is by pouring of water. There are classes of Bible, catechism, and Confraternity of Christian doctrine for young people in each Parish. Members are expected to be an edification to the Church, and in so doing they will be Christians in the community. The Church teaches that the abuse of anything is sinful, such as drugs and alcohol.

The finances of the Church are all free-will offerings, with no set form of tithing. Marriage is one of the Seven Sacraments. The Church considers that a valid marriage can not be invalidated. If a marriage cannot make for a Christian home, then separation is permitted, but not remarriage.

Catholics oppose any artificial means of birth control. They do support responsible parenthood, and family limitation by means of natural means. The Church maintains Family Planning Clinics at a number of places throughout the country.

Catholics have led out in the fight against abortion, which is considered a grievous sin. The Church states a belief in separation of Church and State, and members are taught that responsibilities of citizenship is a spiritual matter. Catholics are very much in favor of tax exemptions for Church schools, since they make sacrifices in order to maintain a large Parochial school system.

The Church knows that the spiritual interests of its children are most important. The Church has records that the first schools founded by the Franciscan Fathers in what is now Florida and New Mexico date back to 1598.

Many cities have more than half their children in Parochial Schools, and their families pay State School Taxes in addition to supporting these schools.

Catholics note this is saving millions each year for the tax payer. Many parochial schools have closed - due to inflation - that had been in operation for more than a hundred years.

Catholics quote from their catechism on their belief that Christ will come to the earth. "Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again."

This belief sustains a Church which most people agree is sure to increase in influence and numbers.

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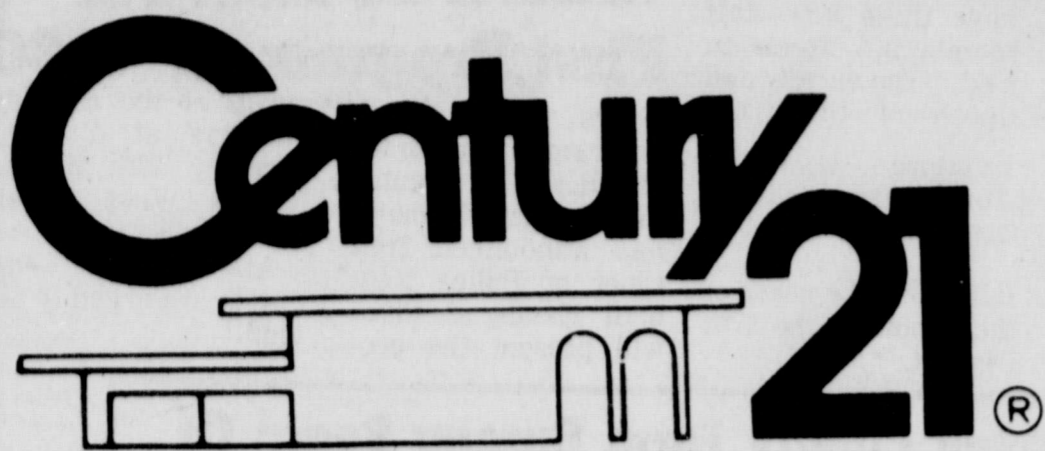

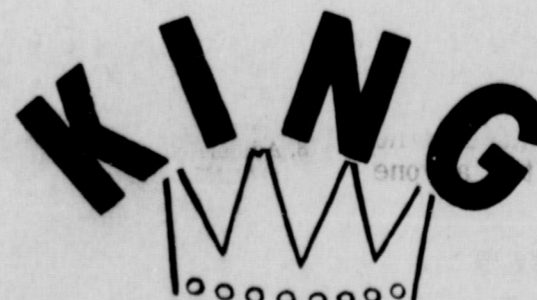

City Manager Reports At Council Meet

City Manager John Boland made reports on various functions to the Cisco City Council at its regular meeting Tuesday night at City Hall. Among those reports were a financial report, swimming pool report and 1979 building permits report.

The council unanimously approved the minutes of the regular meeting held on the 8th of January. Council member Louise Allison stated the minutes were very good and made a motion to accept them as read. Council member Bill Eudy seconded the motion. Mayor H.C. Brown and council members Allison, Eudy, Raymond Whitley, Morgan Fleming and Harold Pippen all voted in its favor. Council member Lucy Collier was absent from the meeting.

Following the approval of the minutes, city manager Boland gave a report on the city's financial condition during which he said, as of January 17 the city had collected 73 percent of its city taxes. He went on to say tax payments have picked up since they become delinquent if not paid before the first of February. Council member Allison made a motion to accept the financial report and was seconded by Whitley. All members voted in favor of the motion.

In his report on the swimming pool Boland stated he does not foresee any major repairs needed at the pool but there are several small items. Some of the items he spoke of included improvement of the water circulation system, particularly in the baby pool area, and the repair or replacement of the water heater inside the building at the pool. He also spoke of the possibility of extending the concrete about five feet further on the west side of the pool to allow more room around the swimming area on busy days. Council member Eudy suggested Boland get some price figures on what such an extension would cost and bring it back before the council. Council member Allison said the pool, as well as the whole park area, should be kept in top condition. She asked that a special effort be made to clean up the area this year.

Boland stated in his report on 1979 building permits that there were five new residences built in Cisco during the year, with the average cost being approximately \$25,000. He also said two new businesses were built and one renovated.

Council members submitted two names for possible appointment as a member of the Housing Board. The two persons suggested were Kathy Worthy and Holland Nix. Mayor Brown suggested both persons be contacted to see whether they would care to serve on the board and bring it back to the council later.

Council member Eudy made a motion for the city to purchase 15 pagers from Motorola for use by Cisco's volunteer firemen. Whitley seconded the motion and all voted in its favor. Dr. R.F. Blackstock suggested to the council that they get a maintenance agreement for the pagers. The motion to buy the pagers was made following the review of a list signed by 23 of Cisco's 30 volunteer firemen stating they would wear the pagers and take care of them. It was pointed out that the list comprised 100% of all firemen attending the meeting when they were asked to sign the statement.

The council passed a motion to allow City Attorney Billy Wright Jr., to draw up an ordinance for the closing of the 700 block of West 19th Street. The ordinance must pass two readings by the council before it will go into effect. The request to close the street was made by the Everetts who own the property on both sides of the street and presently have an overnight trailer park north of the street. They would like to expand their park south of the street and do not want a traffic hazard in the area. Mayor Brown said the closing of the street would not hurt anybody and the expansion of the park would be an improvement to Cisco. It was also explained that when it rains the street becomes very muddy and most people avoid that block anyway. Council member Eudy made the motion to close the street and Allison gave the second. Mayor Brown and council members Eudy, Allison and Pippen voted in its favor. Council members Whitley and Fleming voted against the motion with Fleming stating he had talked to several families in the area who did not want that block closed.

In a discussion of the Cisco Chief of Police Kenneth Eaves running for Sheriff of Eastland County, council member Allison stated the council must depend upon the police to maintain law and order in the city and the position of police chief is very important. She said the council should have been advised before the chief made an announcement and they should have been told of his intentions when he was hired. She stated that since a Police Chief is on duty 24 hours a day she was suggesting "Chief Eaves be given one months leave of absence prior to the election so he can campaign all he wants." In response, Chief Eaves stated that when he came to Cisco from the Sheriff's office the idea of running for Sheriff was in the back of his mind, but he saw no reason to tell anyone except his immediate superior of his possible future plans. He went on to say his decision to run for the office was made lately and he had

made no formal announcement to the news media on his decision. He further emphasized that he intends to be a police officer first and politics will have to come second.

The other members of the council seemed to be in agreement that Chief Eaves should have enough time off duty to allow him to campaign for the Sheriff's office without its interfering with his job as Cisco's Chief of Police. Council member Eudy made a motion to retain Eaves as Police Chief and let him campaign on his own time. Pippen gave the second to the motion and all except Allison voted in its favor.

Anton White, president of the Cisco Cemetery Association made a request to the council for possible suggestions in speeding up the process of issuing deeds on the sale of cemetery lots. He said the deeds have to be signed by the Mayor and City Secretary and he was trying to find some way for the deeds to be issued as soon as the money for a lot is paid. Mayor Brown said the request would be taken under advisement and the matter checked in to for a possible solution.

A request by the Otis Engineering Corporation, a Halliburton Company, to close certain streets and alleys in the Harris addition was heard by the council. City Attorney Wright stated the Otis Corporation has purchased all of the land adjoining those streets and alleys, and he went on to say there is only one street in the area which is actually open at the present time. Council member Whitley made the motion to allow the City Attorney to draw up an ordinance for the closing of those streets and alleys. Eudy seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

A mobile home ordinance was presented by the Planning and Zoning Commission to the City Council for it to be explained and discussed with possible changes being made before it undergoes two readings. The proposed ordinance would regulate the location of mobile homes and would set rules and guidelines for trailer parks as well as an in-

dividual mobile home site. City Manager Boland stated the Planning and Zoning Commission's proposed ordinance is not intended to stifle the growth of mobile homes, but to regulate their placement so a quality development can occur and will not cause surrounding property to be devalued. Those mobile homes now existing would not have to be moved because of the ordinance, but they would be required to follow its rules and regulations, such as its outlines for sanitation standards. Council member Allison stated the proposed ordinance is too "all-encompassing" and needs more work. No action was taken by the council on the proposed ordinance.

Following a discussion about the need of the police department for portable transceiver radios which allow an officer to have radio contact with other officers and the County Dispatch at all times, council member Pippen made a motion for the city to purchase four portable transceivers from Motorola. Eudy made a second to the motion and all voted in its favor.

Council member Eudy made a motion for the council to accept Mayor Brown's recommendation to appoint Ginger Parker as City Secretary. Whitley seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

A discussion was held concerning a letter from the State

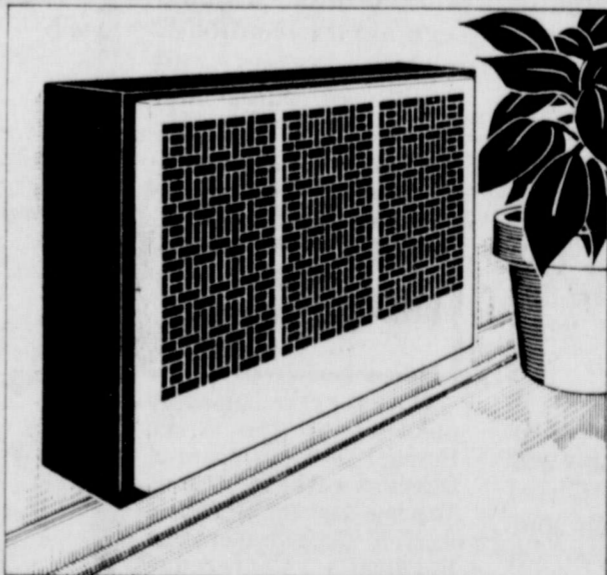

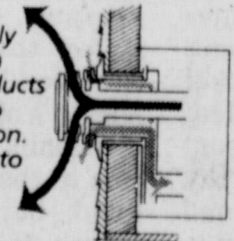
