

## Senior Citizen's **Nutrition Menu**





Greetings:

An adequate supply of food and natural fibers is essential to our Nation. Many of the citizens of Eastland County are directly or indirectly dependent upon agriculture for their livelihood. All of our citizens benefit from the continuing advancements in agriculture.

Farmers and ranchers have learned the value of improving agriculture and rural life in America through organization. Four out of five agricultural producers in this Nation are voluntary members of Farm Bureau, an independent farm organization striving to build a better social and economic life for farm and ranch families and all Americans.

Therefore, I, Scott Bailey, County Judge of Eastland County, do hereby designate February 11-16, 1980, as FARM BUREAU WEEK in Eastland County, and urge our citizens to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

It's gardening time again and many home gardens in Eastland County are getting a good start. We have noticed a lot of people have already set out onion plants. Some are thinking about

weed control. We have had several requests this last week concerning chemical herbicides that my be used effectively in the garden.

Weed control in the home garden depends on garden size, kinds of vegetables being grown, and types of weeds.

Weeds (any unwated plants) compete with vegetables for soil moisture and nutrients. They have extensive root systems and flourish under a variety of conditions.

Effective control of weeds depends on how they spread. Crabgrass and other annual weeds survive by seeds. Perennial weeds such as bermuda grass and johnson grass survive both by seed and underground plant parts

Seeds are transmitted by


wind, water or animals. They may also reach the garden in improperly prepared compost manure or other organic matter add-

ed to the soil. Some weed seeds remain viable in the soil for years. They and underground storage parts contain stored food reserves to support

weed seedlings until they emerge or are exposed to sunlight. Herbicides or chemical weed killers are the least desirable home garden weed control. While they are a necessity in commercial crop production to reduce labor and achieve maximum

vield, there are not enough chemicals with a wide enough margin of error to be used safely and successfully in home gardens. Also, most hervicide. Also, most herbicides are effective on speific weeds in specific crops, and most gardens contain a variety of vegatables. Furthmore, hervicides are expensive; a

garden can cost \$70 or more.

Mulching makes weed control easier. A three inch mulch layer (after it settles) controls annual weeds from seed and preventing many weed seedings from reaching light. Also, those that do push through are easier to pull.

Several types of mulches can be used. Grass clippings work well, but make sure they do not include weed seeds. Paper can also be used effectively. Black plastic is effective except against nutgrass which readily penetrates it. Clear plastic is ineffective since it allows light to reach soil.

## H.T. Wagley **Dies In Fire In** Putnam Thurs.

H.T. Wagley, 67, of Moran, died early Thursday morning when flames engulfed the two room tin building in Putnam he was staying in. Justice of the Peace Ida Mae Waddell ruled the death was accidental.

Mr. Wagley had apparently been living in what was once the Hilltop Liquor Store reportedly to more or less protect the property.

The fire reportedly started when one of the two heaters (one butane, the other woodburning) ignited with plastic or cloth near Wagley's bed. Both heaters were reportedly kept close to the bed.

Four trucks from the Baird Volunteer Fire Department responded to the fire call about 8:30 a.m. Thursday. By the time firemen arrived at the scene. Wagley, had been in the building about 15 to 20 minutes, and was already dead.

Citizens at the scene said they tried to rescue Wagley using a fire small extinguisher.

It took 4,000 gallons of water to bring the fire under control about 9:15 a.m., nearly 45 minutes after the call went out.


