Rehab '80, the tenth annual telethon benefitting WTRC, raised more than \$800,000 in gifts and pledges. This year's budget for the facility in Abilene, San Angelo and Snyder will be approximately \$2.7 million.

In 1979, more than 7,000 handicapped children and adults were treated at the West Texas Rehabilitation Center without charge.

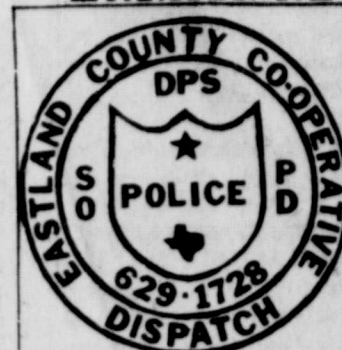

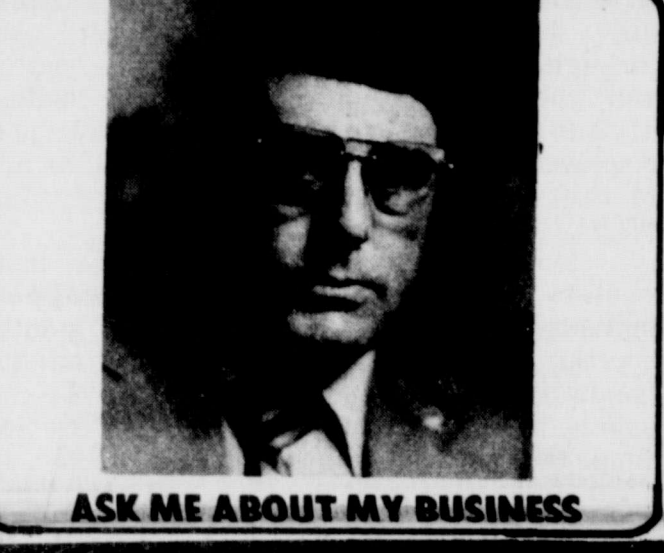

Marilyn was instrumental in starting the statewide association for paralegals, the Texas Association of Paralegals, in Austin, Texas in March of 1978. She served as the first president of that association and is currently President Ex-Officio of

T.A.P. The association is a non-profit corporation seeking to upgrade the profession of paralegals throughout the state.

They keep in close contact with local paralegals associations and those outside the state and are currently working with the State Bar and local bar associations throughout Texas to keep the new profession of the paralegal educationally sound.

The Association hopes someday to offer educational seminars to working paralegals and others interested in law around the state to upgrade skills and work hand in hand with the attorneys of Texas to bring equality and quality of law to all individuals.

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Assemblies Of God

 Although its Eastland County membership is not large - about 60 persons - the Assemblies of God Church is the world's largest organization of the group termed "Pentecostal".
 Long before the word "charismatic" became popular, this movement began with religious revivals in the United States. One of the first was a prayer meeting at Bethel Bible College in Topeka, Kansas, on Jan. 1, 1901. There participants came to believe that "speaking in tongues" was the Biblical evidence for baptism in the Holy Spirit.

The revival spread rapidly to Missouri and Texas, then to California and elsewhere. Within a few years the Evangelists and leaders realized that to preserve the results of the revivals the believers must be united in a cooperative fellowship.

In 1914 about 300 preachers and laymen gathered from 20 states and several foreign countries for discussions in Hot Spring, Arkansas. Their desires were doctrinal unity, conservation of the work, foreign mission interests, chartering Churches under a common name for legal purposes, and the need for a Bible training school.

The group banded together under the name Assemblies of God, and the General Council added a statement of Fundamental Truths two years later. Along with these came a belief in separation of Church and State.

The phenomenal growth of this Church has undoubtedly been aided by its careful foundation of Church government, the balanced tone of its doctrines, and emphasis on evangelism.

At this time it has 1.4 million members in the United States, and about 6 million overseas. The

Assembly of God Church in Seoul, Korea has the largest membership of any group in the world - 100,000!

With a World Headquarters at Springfield, Mo., the Church is working in 101 foreign countries, utilizing 167 foreign Bible schools. In this country the Church has a number of colleges and a graduate school of theology. The leading Church magazine, "Pentecostal Evangel", prints 278,000 copies weekly. The Education Dept. of the Church conducts the Berean School of the Bible and the National Correspondence Institute. Methods of these departments include independent study by correspondence and class study by extension.

The Church is governed by a Board of Administration and the General Council. This council is composed of all Church Pastors and one elected member from each Church. The work is divided into districts, with 55 in the U.S. The North Texas District, including Eastland County, has 54,000 members. Under the General and District Councils are the Executive and General Presbyteries. Pastor O.T. Killion, of the Assembly of God Church in Cisco, serves as an Honorary District Presbyter.

Local Churches are directed by the pastor and officers elected from the membership. Each Church calls its own Pastor, and supports its work by tithes and offerings. From the beginning of the Assemblies movement, women have been accepted for the Ministry. There are organized ministries for Youth, Music, for Sunday School, and all adults. There are special programs for the handicapped, the disadvantaged, and the needy.

The first recorded Assemblies of God meetings in Eastland County were held by Pastors Jesse and Josephine Kaye in the 1920's. No Church was organized from these efforts, however, and the work lay dormant about twenty years. After World War II, in 1945, Pastors Bill and Vivian Burr established a Church in Eastland, on Sadosa Street.

The J.M. Smith's, Charter members, assisted in this. In 1971 this building was sold, with the money placed in the Abilene Sectional Fund until feasible to open another Church in Eastland.

In November, 1973, the property at 1608 Commerce was purchased. This Church was pastored by Johnny Pratt, Jr., until July, 1974. Rev. G.L. Huffman and his wife, Oleta, arrived at that time.

Rev. Huffman, a skilled carpenter, enlarged the building to twice its size, to accommodate a Sunday School, Fellowship Hall and kitchen.

Pastor Keith Kitchell, a graduate of Southern Assn. Bible College, came to Eastland at that time. He has an active program in the Church, including special work for children and young people. There are three services on Sunday: Sunday School at 10:00 A.M., 11:00

Worship service, and a meeting at 6:00 P.M. Pastor Kitchell's wife, Sharry, is in charge of a "Children's Church" during a portion of the 11:00 A.M. worship service. A special prayer meeting is held at 7:30 each Wednesday evening.

The Eastland Church has begun to set up funds for a building program in the future.

During 1945 a Rev. Young began a Church in Ranger with a building moved from Caddo. This was later disbanded.

In 1950-51 Misses Maureen Short and Margie Nickell pioneered a Church in Rising Star. Services were held in a store until a small building was erected. This group was later disbanded, with the building sold around 1970.

Rev. Short later pastored the Church in Cisco. At the present time she is serving as an Assistant to Wilson Estes, Bethel Temple Christian Center, Abilene, Texas.

Rev. Margie Nickle went on to serve as a Missionary in Africa. After returning to the States, she eventually became the Women's

Missionary Director in Wichita Falls, Texas. During an April day in 1979 she was planning for a Sectional Banquet at the beautiful Assembly Church late that afternoon. Just before time for the guests to arrive she called a friend from the Church: "I'm at the Church - everything is ready - I'm just waiting -"

Shortly afterward the Church was demolished by the tornado, and the faithful worker killed.

In the fall of 1946 Rev. C.H. Fuston began a Church in Cisco, with the first meetings held upstairs in City Hall. When lots were purchased on West 7th Street a portable tabernacle was moved on the property. Then Rev. Guy Burton came to Cisco in 1954, and built the present Church auditorium. In 1969 Pastors O.T. and Vida Killion came to Cisco, and undertook a building program which has transformed the structure into a spacious, attractive brick building. The Killions, who were pioneers in Assemblies work in many places, have carried on the Church tradition of friendliness and helpfulness to the community.

The Church assists with Senior Citizens and other Civic programs, and furnishes music for the Nursing Home and other places. Sunday School at the Cisco Church begins at 9:45, with Worship Services at 11:00 A.M. on Sunday morning. The Sunday evening service is at 6:00 P.M., with Wednesday evening services at 7:00 P.M.

Pastor Killion serves as Municipal Judge in Cisco, and Vida Killion is a noted writer. Her skits and articles, have won prizes and been widely published.

Basic beliefs of the Assemblies of God Church center around four points: **Salvation** - a "born again" experience, through the blood of Jesus Christ, and resulting in a life of Holiness, **Baptism With The Holy Spirit**, with evidence of speaking in tongues as the Spirit gives utterance, **Divine Healing** - through the atoning blood of Christ, and the **Second Coming of Jesus Christ**. The final evidence of baptism in the Holy Spirit is revealed in the life of a Christian.

The Church believes this experience should lead to a

deeper reverence for God, and a greater dedication to God's work. It also opens the door for special ministering gifts of the Spirit. Assemblies of God members do not believe that the doctrine of Healing opposes the practice of modern medicine, neither does it preclude the proper use of medication. Divine healings should be confirmed by proper authorities.

Two ordinances are practiced by the Assemblies Church. One is Holy Communion, or the Lord's Supper - an open communion in which all believers are invited to take part. The other Ordinance is baptism, by immersion, as a believer's public declaration of his identification with Jesus Christ and his new relationship with God through faith. New members are added to the Church in this manner. The Church does not baptize infants, but encourages parents to dedicate their children to the Lord in a public service.

The Assemblies of God Church teaches that the Bible - in its original languages - is the inspired revelation of God and His purpose to man. Any translations faithful to the original texts are used in the Church. The King James Bible is still a favorite, but the American Standard Version and others are also studied. The Church teaches that the Ten Commandments, as an important part of the Bible, still have validity for Christians.

Bible standards against "worldliness" are stressed in the Church. This is defined as "an inordinate love of pleasures, position, or possessions, which lead to their misuse." Anything which "defiles the body, or corrupts the mind and spirit" should be avoided. The Church feels strongly that the use of alcohol and other drugs falls into this category.

The Church believes that God's plan for man's happiness includes a stable home. It works to strengthen the homes of all members and

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN-The Federal Trade Commission has issued a final rule which requires disclosure of energy efficiency ratings and costs for seven categories of appliances.

Regardless of our concern about energy consumption and conservation, the purpose of the rule will not be achieved unless consumers are aware of its existence and are sufficiently informed about its purpose and scope to be able to take advantage of the new information that will be provided.

The primary purpose of the Commission's rule is to encourage consumers to comparison shop for energy efficient household appliances. The rule was promulgated under the *Energy Policy and Conservation Act*, passed by Congress in December, 1975 as a result of hearings which indicated that home appliances account for a sizeable portion of American energy consumption.

The rule covers the following categories of appliances:

1. Refrigerators and refrigerator freezers
2. Freezers
3. Dishwashers
4. Water heaters
5. Clothes washers
6. Room air conditioners
7. Furnaces

The rule does not cover five categories of appliances:

1. Clothes dryers
2. Home heating equipment
3. Television sets
4. Kitchen ranges and stoves
5. Humidifiers and dehumidifiers

Beginning in May, 1980, the rule requires that specific energy cost or efficiency information for the covered home appliances be disclosed at the "point of sale", that is, at the place where consumers shop for appliances. The information relating to energy efficiency must be displayed on labels or facts sheets. The information must include (1) a highlighted energy cost or efficiency disclosure, (2) a comparison of the labeled product's energy cost or efficiency with that of competing brands, and (3) a chart that permits an individual to estimate how much it will cost to run the appliance each year.

To ensure that the disclosures are meaningful, each appliance's energy efficiency and cost of operation must be measured by means of a standardized test to be used by all manufacturers.

If the labeling program works as expected, the availability of this new information should enhance consumer demand for appliances that save energy. In turn, competition will be generated among manufacturers to meet this demand by producing more energy efficient appliances.

Energy efficiency and conservation rightfully is of concern to all of us. For this reason the Federal Trade Commission's new rule deserves support and cooperation. It is by no means the solution to our present energy crisis but it is a step in the right direction.

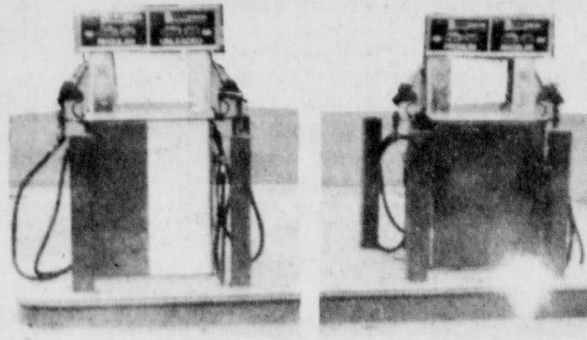

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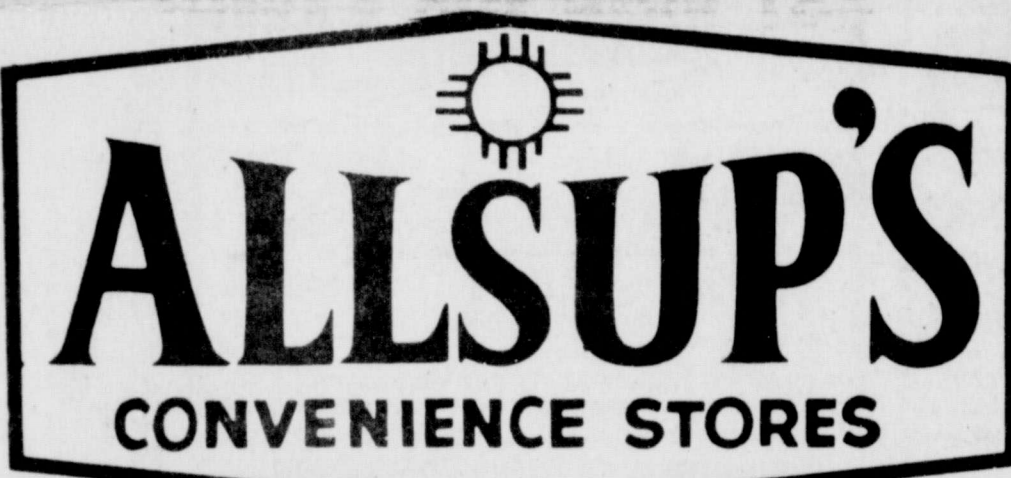
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
