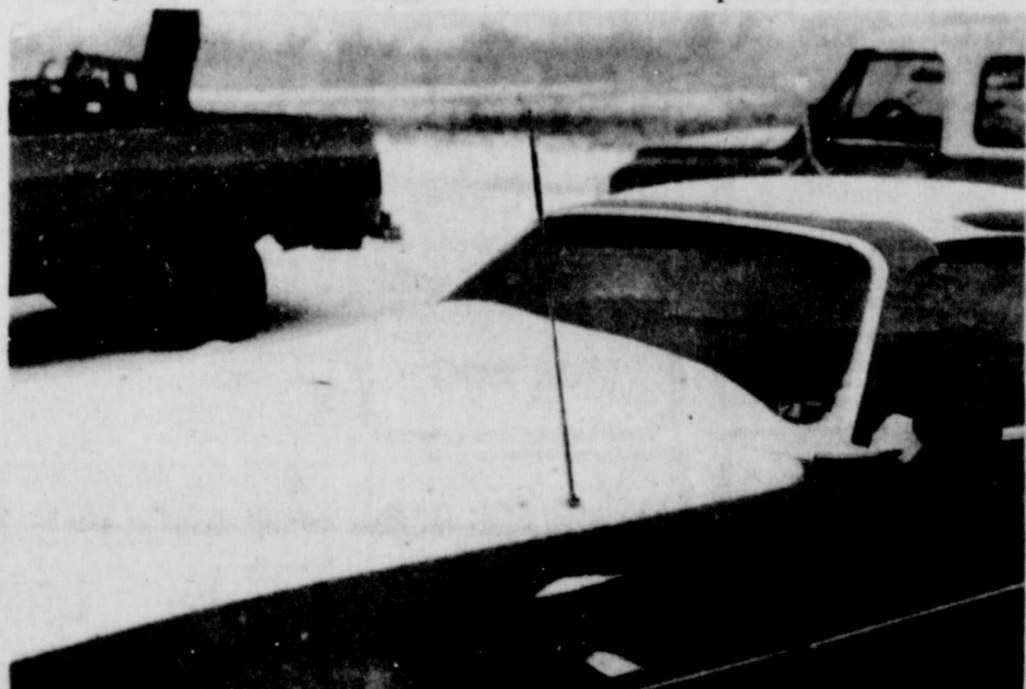

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## Valentine Customs

Valentine's Day, February 14, is traditionally a time for lovers and good friends. Cards, candy, and gifts are exchanged as a display of affection.

The custom evolved over a period of hundreds of years, possibly beginning with the ancient Roman festival of the Lupercalia. During this festival, barren women who desired children were whipped lightly by priests during the celebration. Supposedly, the striking would remove the "sterile curse" and make the women fertile and productive.

English women of the eighteenth century fastened bay leaves to the center and each of the four corners of their pillows on Valentine's Day. This practice would hopefully cause them to dream about their future husbands.

In another English custom, eligible females would write the names of desirable males on small pieces of paper, enclose them in balls of clay, and toss in water. Eventually, the paper and clay would separate, allowing the notes to float to the top. The first piece of paper to surface was the girl's true love.

The practice of writing romantic messages and giving gifts to dear friends eventually became popular. Each year on February 14, millions of valentines, both handwritten and commercially printed, are exchanged by friends in all parts of the world.

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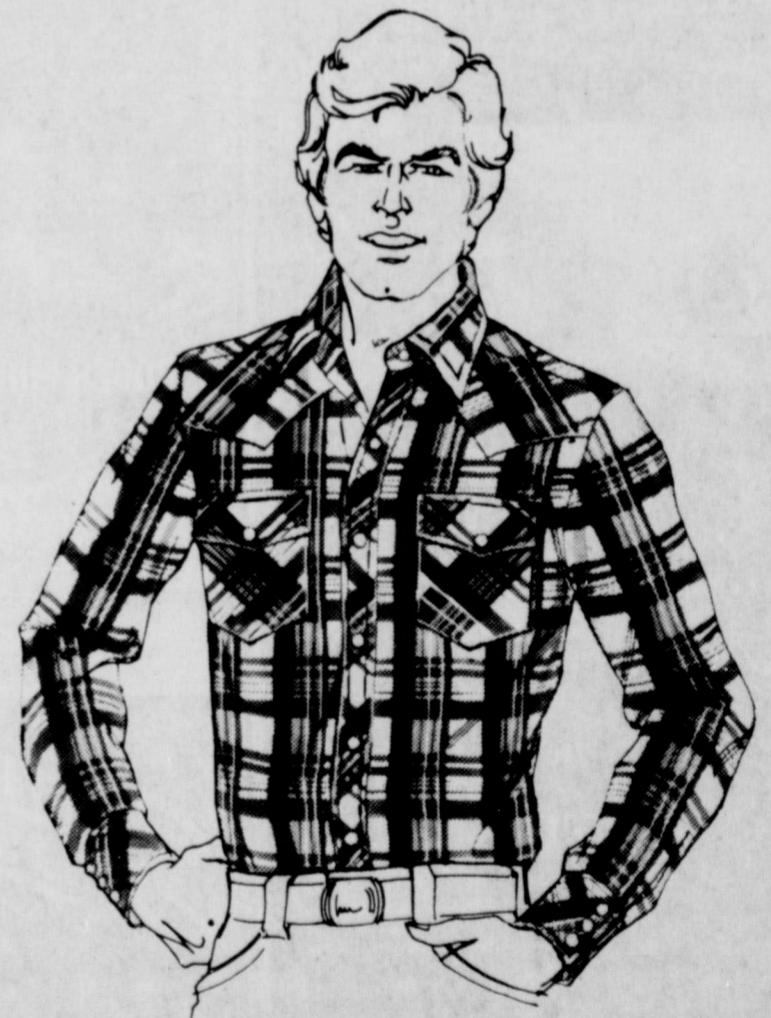
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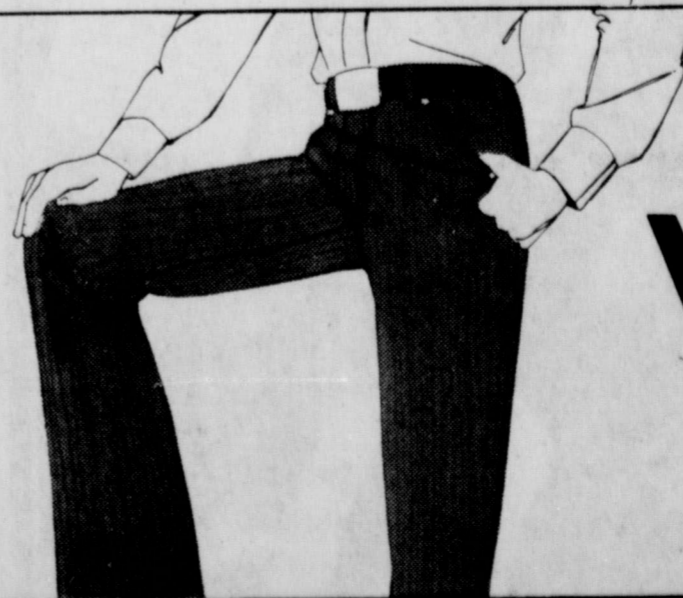

Cattlemen in Eastland County are reminded to vote in the upcoming referendum on the Federal Beef Research and Information Order, according to Roy Johnson of Desdemona, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

Eligible producers may vote anytime between Feb. 19-22 at the county ASCS office, the county farm leader said. Registration for the vote was held Jan. 28-Feb. 6.

"Beef producers have a big stake in the Beferendum," Johnson said. "After all, it's their money that will be collected for use in beef research and promotion. We need a large turn-out of producers to get a consensus of thinking on this matter."

Johnson said the issue is whether or not cattlemen want a mandatory check-off program that is run by a quasi-governmental agency. The county FB president said the proposed Beef Research and Information Order, if passed, would:

Notice of Availability of Findings of No Significant Impacts Pursuant to Section 102(2)(C) of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969; the Council on Environmental Quality Guidelines (40 CFR Part 1500-1508); and the Soil Conservation Service Guidelines (7 CFR Part 650); the Soil Conservation Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, gives notice that an environmental impact statement (EIS) is not being prepared for the Lake Leon Critical Area Treatment Measure Plan in Eastland County, Texas.

The environmental evaluation of this federally-assisted action indicates that the proposed project treatment will not cause significant adverse local, regional, or national impacts on the environment. As a result of these findings, Mr. George C. Marks, State Conservationist, has determined that the preparation and review of an EIS is not needed for this project.

The measure concerns a plan to stabilize three (3) acres of critically eroding areas below Lake Leon Dam. The planned works of improvement include excavation of the existing river slope (bank) to a stable slope and vegetation to a permanent grass cover; construction of a grass waterway above the riverbank to intercept and convey upland runoff to a safe outlet; and construction of a fence around the treated area for vegetative establishment and protection purposes.

The Findings of No Significant Impact (FNSI) has been forwarded to the Environmental Protection Agency. The basic data developed during the environmental evaluation and the environmental assessment are on file and may be reviewed by interested parties by contacting Mr. George C. 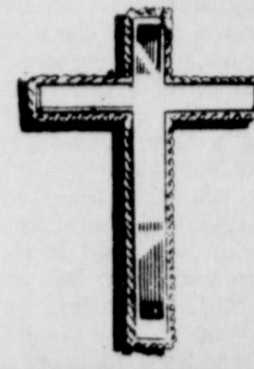

## The Purpose Of Cisco Jr. College

### PURPOSE OF CISCO JUNIOR COLLEGE

First in a series on Cisco Junior College: Cisco Junior College was created in 1939 by an act of the Texas Legislature. The following year the institution began operation as a state supported junior college offering a post secondary course of study.

The purpose of the institution and its operation in fulfillment of its purpose is left largely to the local Board of Regents; the college, however, must expand state money within specified guidelines and seek approval of programs from the appropriate state agencies.

From its origin to present, the purpose and functions of the college have changed continually. In the beginning, the purpose was to offer a two-year academic program for the young men and women in this area.

While this is still one of the primary purposes, the college has grown into a fully accredited, full-service institution offering a wide range of educational services.

At present, the college seeks to service the educational needs of the whole community including the academic, vocational, and retraining needs of both the younger and older adults of the area.

As well as offering the Associate degree, the curriculum is designed to provide two-years of academic course work leading to the baccalaureate and professional degrees in most fields.

One and two-year vocational and occupational programs are offered which lead to immediate employment opportunities. Adults seeking job skills to enter an occupation or to retrain for an occupation are offered Adult vocational courses.

To help the students utilize the resources of the college for their educational needs, a full-service counseling and guidance program is available.

One of the purposes of the college which

has not changed is the desire to offer a wide range of courses to younger and older adults in their chosen field of study at a minimum cost. CJC began with reasonable costs for quality education and has continued to offer its services at a very low cost to its students.

In addition to the above educational purposes, Cisco Junior College seeks to enrich the cultural, social and economic environment of the community through is programs and activities.

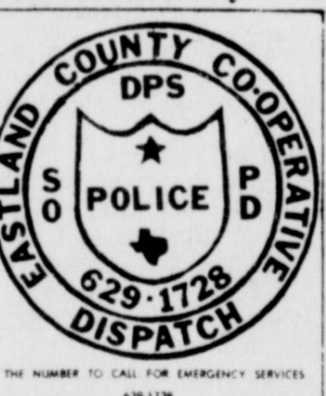
Throughout the year, the college offers the Roof Garden Dinner Theater, band and choral concerts, art displays, the Wrangler Belles, and intercollegiate athletics.

College facilities are made available for the needs of the community. The Fine Arts Building and Maner Memorial Library have been especially utilized by the public for civic meetings, lectures, conferences, concerts and receptions.

The college is the sponsoring agency for the Cisco Junior College Senior Citizen's program providing both facilities and support services for the older adults of the community.

A last program widely utilized by all age groups of the community is the offering of Community Service courses; these are short courses appealing primarily to hobbyists in many diverse fields from dance to fine arts, to micro-computers.

In fulfilling its purpose, Cisco Junior College attempts to promote an environment in which people of all ages, social and racial backgrounds and economic levels can function comfortably and harmoniously.
