





with the best year ever. It has been over four years since a screwworm case has been confirmed in Eastland Producers who raised livestock before 1962 can fully appreciate this fact. The challenge of the livestock industry in 1980 is to keep screwworms out of the Southwest.

Producers will have a head start on doing this if all necessary animal surgery operations are completed, before warm weather sets in. Producers also should continue to treat all wounds, and immediately submit samples of any worms found in a

Preparations are underway this winter to combine efforts with Mexico to push this warm weather pest farther

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south. Progress is being made in the battle to eliminate this parasite of all warm blooded animals from the American Southwest and from most of Mexico. In the U.S. the challenge will be to see if we can keep them out

during 1980. This successful program began back in 1962, when the Livestock Raisers of Texas gave the money to get this eradication program started. After it proved successful, the government started paying the bill.

We owe much thanks to the Eastland County Livestock Raisers, who had faith in this program and gave from their pockets to get it going. Oscar Schaefer still serves as Chairman of the Eastland County Committee.

This doesn't seem like good weather to think about seeding pasture grasses, but it is time to prepare the seed bed. A well prepared seed bed is one of the basics for jetting a new pasture off to a good start

What makes a good seed bed? It's smooth, clod-free and has been settled by weathering into a firm. moisture-filled soil profile. Winter is a good time to prepare seed beds for

A TOTAL of 313 Eastland County Livestock Raisers have registered to vote in the upcoming Beeferendum Election, County Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service Manager David Martin reports.

Others will be coming in by mail, he said, and while this might not represent every stock raiser who was eligible to register and vote, it does represent a good number who qualified themselves for the key voting.

The important vote for cattle producers is coming up February 19-22.

Cattlemen who registered between January 28 and February 6 can vote on the Federal Beef Research and Information Order at their county [ASCS] offices.

The Order, if approved, would authorize a mandatory deduction from each sale of cattle. The money would go to a Beef Board [authorized in the Order and to be appointed from producers by the Secretary of Agriculture] which would administer the beef research and promotion program. Producers can get refunds by applying for them within a specified time.

A lot of money is involved. The Order permits deductions up to 2/10 of 1 percent for the first two year; this could go to 1/2 of 1 percent after two years without another producer referendum. Money raised annually would amount to about \$40 million and \$100 million, respectively

contrast, seed beds prepared just prior to planting are usually loose and dry and will not provide the moisture reserve for seedling use and survival

For the first major plowing, use a turning or moldboard plow if the field is trashy or has a lot of undesirable vegetation or weeds on it.

Trash or weed seed can be buried with the turning or moldboard plow. Then disk to help smooth the field. A heavy tandem or offset disk may be all that is needed for a clean field. However, use a chisel or subsoiler if the field has a major plow pan or compaction problem. Checking the field with a shovel can help evaluate plowing needs.

After major plowing, time and weather will have the greatest effect on the seed bed. Several minor or light diskings may help to smooth and settle the seed bed surface, but weather does the major internal settling.

planting approaches, it's best not to disturb the settled seed bed. A light disking may be necessary to control winter weeds, but disturb only the top inch or so of soil.

With a well-planned, wellprepared seed bed, planting of either seed or sprigs is easier and the grass can get off to a good start. A good seed bed is just good insurance for establishing a pasture

That's the goal for your local Eastland County newspaper, as it makes preparations for changes in its delivery system.

A dry, well-placed personal copy of the newspaper for every subscriber is the goal, as delivery is switched from carriers to Postal Service delivery.

Mailing stencils are now being prepared and the change-over will be made as quickly as possible, probably by late February.

Under the new system, the newspapers will be delivered along with the regular mail, and placed in subscribers' mailboxes, at their home.

Those persons who receive their mail at boxes at the post office may have their papers sent there if they prefer. They're advised to contact their local newspaper as soon as possible to give their Post Office Roy Number. Other-

wise the papers will be mailed to their physical address

The Cisco Press, Eastland Telegram and Ranger Times will be delivered under the new system, and it is hoped that it will not only be an improvement in delivery, but also a great fuel economy measure. The increasing cost of fuel is presently making carrier delivery almost prohibitive, and as it continues, subscription costs would have to be raised. It is hoped that rates may be held by going to the Postal Service Delivery.

The change will necessitate some scheduling changes but it is hoped that these will be as undisruptive as possible. Initially, it will mean probably an earlier receipt of the weekend paper with subscribers delivery on Saturday, and a little later delivery of the midweek paper, in Thursday's mail.

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

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'Farm Bureau Week' Is Feb. 11-16

"Farm Bureau Week" has been proclaimed for the period of Feb. 11-16 by County Judge Scott Bailey and also by Governor Bill Clements.

County Farm Bureaus across the state will be conducting membership campaigns during that week, according to Roy Johnson of Desdemona, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

The Texas Farm Bureau is seeking to increase its 1979 membership oi 249,210 member families. The local county, which ended the 1979 year with 1495 member families, is also working for another gain in members.

Farm Bureau began almost 70 years ago. It is now organized in 2,800 counties in all states except Alaska.

The first Farm Bureau began in 1911 as a "bureau" of the local chamber of commerce in Broome County, New York. The first Farm Bureaus were organized primarily to help pay the salaries of the new county agents being hired to relay the latest agricultural information from land-grant col-

Most states had organized

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local county Farm Bureaus before the move was made to organize into state units. The need was recognized for statewide cooperation between producers of various commodities to help solve mutual problems.

The Farm Bureau emerged in the national light during World War I, not as a protest organization, but as a tool for unifying agricultural producers. The state Farm Bureaus met in 1919 in Chicago to organize the American Farm Bureau Federation.

The state Farm Bureau founded in Texas in 1920 flourished for several years. and was instrumental in beginning numerous commarketing modity cooperatives. As the co-ops grew, the state organization became less effective, partly because Farm Bureau began to depend upon fees from the

members for its financing. The first Texas Farm Bureau officially ceased to exist in 1934 when delegates met and dissolved the

co-ops instead of dues from

organization and reorganized it as the Texas Agricultural Association. Within two years, the TAA saw the need for a voice in national affairs and rejoined the American Farm Bureau Federation. The name was changed back to Texas Farm Bureau shortly thereafter.

Increased legislative activity, particularly on the state level, along with estabishment of economic service programs, helped push the membership upward in the years just after World War II. By the early 1950s, county units had been organized in almost all major agricultural counties in Texas. Membership reached 100,000 members by 1966 and has more than doubled since that time.

The Texas Farm Bureau, which maintains a full-time legislative office in Austin, has accomplished much in the field of state legislation in the past three decades. Recently, TFB waged a statewide campaign to pass a tax relief bill which pro-



Eligible producers may vote anytime between Feb. 19-22 at the county ASCS office, the county farm leader said. Registration for the vote was held Jan. 28-Feb. 6.

Beef producers have a big stake in the Beeferendum," Johnson said. "After all, it's their money that will be collected for use in beef research and promotion. We need a large turn-out of producers to get a consensus of thinking on this matter."

Johnson said the issue is whether or not cattlemen want a mandatory check-off program that is run by a quasi-governmental agency. The county FB president said the proposed Beef

the sales price of cattle for the first two years of the program. After that, the deduction could be raised up to 1/2 of 1 percent without another referendum of producers.

- Require purchasers of cattle to make the deduction. Failure to comply would make the purchaser subject to a \$1,000 fine.

- Require the deduction at each point of sale. The buyer would pay the purchase price minus the amount of the check-off to each seller of cattle. The check-off money would be paid to the administering agency at the point of slaughter.

- Exempt from assessment breeding cattle and cattle used for commercial milk production.

- Raise about \$40 million annually at the 2/10 of 1 percent assessment, and some \$100 million annually at the 1/2 of 1 percent figure.

- Provide for refund of assessment if demand is made within 60 days after the end of the month in which the transaction was made.

- Establish a Beef Board (a quasi-government agency) composed of not more than 68 producers to administer the program.

- Provide for appointment to the Beef Board by Secretary of Agricultural of up to five non-voting consumer advisors whose expenses would be paid by

assessment funds. -- Authorize the U.S. Department of Agriculture to hire new employees to monitor the check-off program. All such expenses would be paid out of assessment funds.

The county Farm Bureau leader said that, for the Order to be approved, ballots must be cast by at least 50 percent of producers registered to vote in the referendum, and a majority of those voting must favor or approve the issuance of the





People In Things The Purpose Of Cisco Jr. College

First in a series on Cisco Junior College: PURPOSE OF CISCO

JUNIOR COLLEGE Cisco Junior College was created in 1939 by an act of the Texas Legislature. The following year the institution began operation as a state supported junior college offering a post secondary course of study.

The purpose of the institution and its operation in fulfillment of its purpose is left largely to the local Board of Regents; the college, however, must expand state money within specified guidelines and seek approval of programs from the appropriate state agencies.

From its origin to present, the purpose and functions of the college have changed continually. In the beginning, the purpose was to offer a two-year academic program for the young men and women in this area.

While this is still one of the primary purposes, the college has grown into a fully accredited, full-service institution offering a wide range of educational services.

At present, the college seeks to service the educational needs of the whole community including the academic, vocational, and retraining needs of both the younger and older adults of the

As well as offering the Associate degree, the curriculum is two-years of academic course work leading to the baccalaureate and professional degrees in most fields.

One and two-year vocational and occupational programs are offered which lead to immediate employment opportunities. Adults seeking job skills to enter an occupation or to retrain for an occupation are offered Adult vocational courses.

To help the students utilize the resources of the college for their educational needs, a full-service counseling and guidance program is available. One of the purposes

of the college which

has not changed is the desire to offer a wide range of courses to younger and older adults in their chosen field of study at a minimum cost. CJC began with reasonable costs for quality education and has continued to offer its services at a very low cost to its students.

In addition to the above educational purposes, Cisco Junior College seeks to enrich the cultural, social and economic environment of the community through is programs and activities.

Throughout the year, the college offers the Roof Garden Dinner Theater, band and choral concerts, art displays, the Wrangler Belles, and intercollegiate athletics.

College facilities are made available for the needs of the community. The Fine Arts Building and Maner Memorial Library have been especially utilized by the public for civic meetings, lectures, conferences, concerts and receptions.

The college is the sponsoring agency for the Cisco Junior College Senior Citizen's program providing both facilities and support services for the older adults of the community.

A last program widely utilized by all age groups of the community is the offering of Community Service courses; these are short courses appealdesigned to provide ing primarily to hobbyists in many diverse fields from dance to fine arts, to microcomputers.

In fulfilling its purpose, Cisco Junior College attempts to promote an environment in which people of all ages, social and racial backgrounds and economic levels can function comfortably and harmoniously.
