

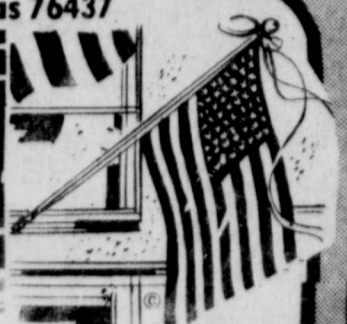

Men's Supper Set At Country Club

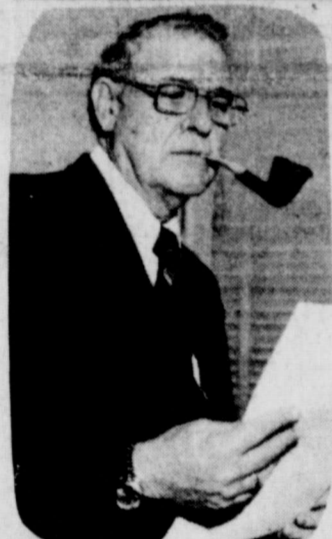

My experience as a practicing attorney; as a prosecutor for the State; as City Attorney for the City of Midland with its administrative, office, and trial practice; as a Defense Attorney; and as a Civil Attorney, qualifies me to serve as your District Judge of the 91st District Court.

Your consideration, your vote, and your support will be appreciated."

Stenholm Confident US Will Solve Problems

Congressman Charles Stenholm expressed confidence that Americans would take the Lions Club motto "We Serve" and add the words "and care" and solve problems facing the nation at home and abroad in a talk at the Cisco club's annual Sweetheart Banquet last Thursday night at the Cisco Country Club.

"We have demonstrated many times in our nation's 204-year history that we care enough for our country and our flag to accept and meet all challenges," Mr. Stenholm said. "We must remember that many have died to preserve our freedoms."

Mr. Stenholm, who serves 33 counties in Congress, cited the plan of action that the late Vince Lombardi, noted football coach, advocated: 1. God, 2. Country, 3. Country and 4. The Green Bay Packers. He noted that "Lombardi demanded 100% from everyone around him every day and he was successful."

The congressman paid a tribute to Lionism for playing an important role in building and maintaining a strong nation.

Texas Cities Receive More Rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said Texas cities will receive more than \$36 million in February rebates from the optional one-percent city sales tax.

Bullock said the February allocation is about \$11 million more than cities received during the same period last year.

He said more efficient deposit procedures in his agency have resulted in larger rebate checks to cities during the past few months.

Breckenridge will get a check for \$23,005.16, bringing that city's total for 1980 to \$33,461.06.

Cisco's rebate for this month will be \$9,841.27, compared to \$5,617.86 during the same period last year. Cisco's 1980 rebates total more than \$17,000.

Eastland will receive a

February check for \$9,957.18, raising its 1980 payments to date to \$15,989.23.

Gorman's check will be \$862.21, bringing its 1980 payments to date to \$1,589.46.

Ranger's rebate for this month will be \$7,180.57, compared to \$3,919.20 during the same period last year. Ranger's 1980 rebates total \$9,298.18.

Rising Star will receive a February check for \$664.11, raising its 1980 payments to date to \$1,663.19.

The city sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses along with the state's four-percent sales tax and its rebated monthly by the Comptroller's office to cities where it is collected.

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Students, Teachers May Intern In Washington

Applications for two summer internship programs sponsored by Congressman Charles W. Stenholm have been finalized and are now available at the Congressman's Abilene District Office.

The program will include two Omar Burleson Congressional Interns and two

Lyndon Baines Johnson Congressional Interns, with one intern from each program to serve during June or July of this year at Stenholm's Washington office.

"A number of persons have expressed their interest in the two programs since we first began developing the positions last month," Stenholm said, "and I am pleased to be able to honor former Congressman Burleson in this small way, as well as offer valuable experience in government to four interns from the 17th Congressional District."

Burleson will chair a special seven-person selection committee, chosen from throughout the District and State Representative Gary Thompson, an Abilene educator, is to serve as special advisor to the group.

Applicants for the Burleson internships must be 18 years of age at the time he or she is in Washington, allowing high school seniors who have enrolled in an institute of higher learning to be eligible. Others eligible include any student or graduate student who was enrolled during the preceding academic year at any of the District colleges, universities or technical institutes, or any other school, if the person's home of record is within the District.

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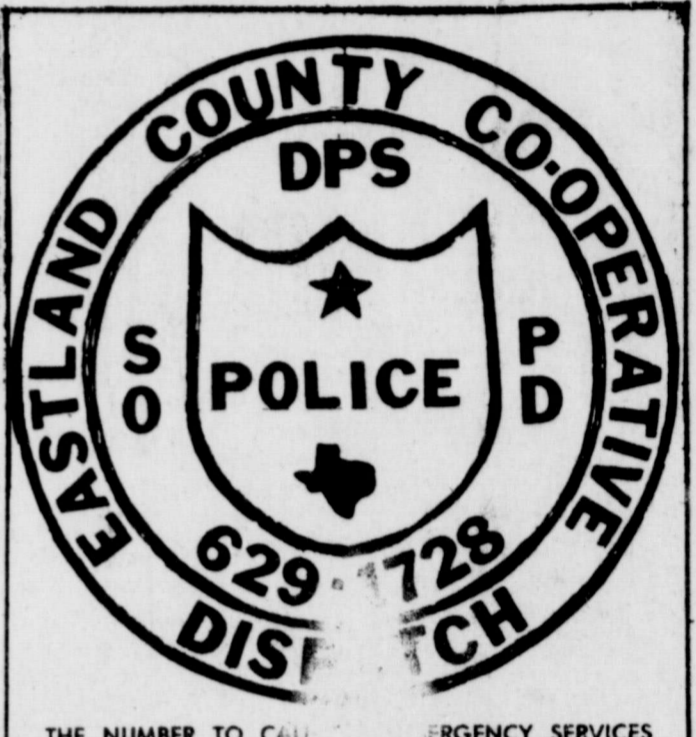
