It is important for you, the people of Eastland County, to know why I am asking you to elect me your District Judge. The office of the District Court establishes a standard for law enforcement, for legal guidelines, and for government which directly affects you in this county.

The State does have such a program available to this County, and I will put such a plan into effect.

You also have the right to expect that the Judge of the 91st District Court have training, experience, maturity, and integrity. I measure up to these guidelines, having prepared myself for this Judgeship for 29 years and having represented hundreds of clients in their legal problems and litigation.

My experience as a practicing attorney; as a prosecutor for the State; as City Attorney for the City of Midland with its administrative, office, and trial practice; as a Defense Attorney; and as a Civil Attorney, qualifies me to serve as your District Judge of the 91st District Court.

Your consideration, your vote, and your support will be appreciated."

Stenholm Confident US Will Solve Problems

Congressman Charles Stenholm expressed confidence that Americans would take the Lions Club motto "We Serve" and add the words "and care" and solve problems facing the nation at home and abroad in a talk at the Cisco club's annual Sweetheart Banquet last Thursday night at the Cisco Country Club.

"We have demonstrated many times in our nation's 204-year history that we care enough for our country and our flag to accept and meet all challenges," Mr. Stenholm said. "We must remember that many have died to preserve our freedoms."

Mr. Stenholm, who serves 33 counties in Congress, cited the plan of action that the late Vince Lombardi, noted football coach, advocated: 1. God, 2. Country, 3. Country and 4. The Green Bay Packers. He noted that "Lombardi demanded 100% from everyone around him every day and he was successful."

The congressman paid a tribute to Lionism for playing an important role in building and maintaining a strong nation.

He urged "as we face the future, we need to be mindful of waste, be proud of our heritage, and offer no apologies for having the world's best and strongest country." He quoted George Washington as saying "to avoid war, we must be ready to repel it."



GORDON SPOT

by DeMarquis Gordon

Think back to last summer's heat and imagine what a difference a green canopy of shade would make around your home and neighborhood.

Trees around our homes provide more than landscape beauty. They provide climate control and make important contribution to improving the environment. They add increased value and esteem to our property. Trees filter and clean the air we breathe, provide oxygen for living, and serve to reduce noise and sound.

Trees are one of nature's best gifts and are a mighty fine investment for our homes and communities.

If you've been thinkin' of adding trees to your landscape, the time is at hand.

Plant trees as soon as possible so that root systems can develop and become well established before hot weather hits.

Most nursemen now have good supplies of container, balled and burlapped, and bare-rooted trees. So take time to visit him and make your selection.

After selection the tree, you next step is proper planting. Here are a few guidelines on getting that job done right.

1. Dig a hole large enough in diameter so that the root system has at least 6 inches clearance on all sides. Some people will dig their hole twice the width of the root ball, which is an excellent idea if you can manage it. It's not necessary to dig the hole much deeper than the root ball as the ball should rest on a solid soil foundation.
2. Plant the tree at, or slightly below, the level at which the tree was growing in the nursery. The original soil line can be seen as a discolored ring on the trunk.
3. Be sure to provide internal soil drainage. If you are unsure as to whether or not your soil drains well, try this test: Dig a hole and fill it with water. If the water does not drain through the soil in a day or two, plant roots will suffer from lack of oxygen. To improve drainage, dig a

trench leading away from the bottom of the hole and fill it with gravel so that excess water can drain to a lower area of the yard.

4. Carefully place the tree in the hole. Handle it by the ball and not by the trunk. A broken ball of earth can mean a dead plant. Always remove any container before you plant.
5. Back fill the hole carefully, using good topsoil or a mixture of soil, sand and organic matter, such as peatmoss. Firm the soil around the plant and water thoroughly to settle the soil around the roots and eliminate any air pockets.
6. Do not fertilize the tree after planting. Wait until

A Voice 'Against' Referendum

The order proposes to establish a Beef board of not more than 68 producers and 5 consumers. anticipated expenses and disbursements, and (4) authorization to approve and set a minimum percentage of assessed funds to be devoted to research activities.

The policy recently adopted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for all commodity research and promotion programs, as stated by the administrator of the Agricultural Marketing Service of USDA before a House agriculture subcommittee, is important to note.

The administrator said that any domestic food commodity research and promotion program will not be opposed by USDA as long as the following elements are included:

(1) The program must pay total federal administrative costs, both salary and

Beef referendum

Voting begins Tuesday, Feb. 19, and runs through Friday, Feb. 22, at the Eastland ASCS Office on the second floor of the courthouse, in the Beef referendum - a "check-off" program for all cattle raisers.

Nearly 350 cattle raisers registered in Eastland County between Jan. 28 and Feb. 6. A total of 40,320 registered in Texas, the ASCS reports. Only those who registered are eligible to vote.

And apparently feelings are mixed on the Beef Referendum.

The Texas Farm Bureau board of directors has just reaffirmed its total opposition to the program.

The Eastland County Farm Bureau Board of Directors has gone on record as being opposed.

According to information coming to this desk, the following are "against" the Referendum: The Farmers Union, Texas Farm Bureau, Tennessee Farm Bureau, Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas and Concerned Cattlemen of South Dakota.

Information shows that 128 organizations, including the National Cattlemen's Association and the National Grange, plus 30 other state Farm Bureaus, are "for" the referendum. A Texas Farm Bureau leader says that most livestock raisers support a program to promote their industry (the National Live Stock and Meat Board, a private voluntary check-off program), but believe that it would be difficult to comply with the proposed Order "because it is complicated, costly and difficult to administer."

Proponents of the measure, in a press release from an Amarillo headquarters, say: "The Beef referendum is a self-help program designed for and to be administered by a Beef Board comprised of cattlemen. And in true democratic fashion, cattlemen who do not wish to participate may request - and will promptly receive - refund of their contributions."

overhead, (2) a specified minimum percentage of the net assessments collected must be devoted to research activities, to be determined by the Secretary of Agriculture, (3) the program must engage only in promotion or advertising that is substantially devoted to presenting nutritional information and other educational information, as well as the results of research, (4) funds must be made available to those producers not willing to participate, (5) the program must be initiated by a referendum of producers and (6) provide for the appointment by the Secretary of Agriculture of public members (consumer advocates) to the program administrative agency.

"It is the nature of government to mismanage most everything they touch," Farm Bureau said, "and I can't see throwing away beef producer funds into a quasi-government agency directed by the Secretary of Agriculture."

A Voice 'For' Referendum

There's been a lot of talk about the Beef referendum being a government program that cattlemen should turn down. Fact is, cattlemen had better recognize the realities of government and its involvement with agriculture and quite being naive. Like it or not, the U.S. Federal Government now sets meat import quotas, inspects your product, regulates the use of animal pharmaceuticals and even taxes you for income you make on the cattle you produce. Cattlemen and the beef industry are already caught up in the government tangle.

Passage of the Beef referendum would at least give cattlemen some clout as they bump heads with government-funded consumer groups, government-funded anti-beef nutrition groups, and others who threaten our industry.

Yes, there are some individual farm and ranch organizations who make some effort to promote beef

and protect the interests of cattlemen as best they can. But no single group now in existence has enough money to do the job that needs to be done. The Beef Board, created by passage of the Beef referendum, will have enough money to expand foreign markets, promote the nutritional value of beef, combat beef substitutes, fight anti-beef propaganda and counter the extreme highs and lows in the cattle cycle. The Beef Board will be made up of cattlemen, and they'll have the kind of power it takes to meet the opposition head-on.

Whether you think the Beef referendum is government or not doesn't really matter. The important thing is to

recognize that cattlemen don't have enough force now to influence factors that affect them. It's important that they take advantage of this opportunity to put some power behind their punch. If the Beef referendum fails, cattlemen will have to admit that they were too scared of power to grab hold of some when it was offered them.



Its plain, low-profile building gives little hint of the fascinating business within - that of buying and smelting metals, from gold-filled watch cases to elegant silver services. And the Smelter doesn't need to advertise, for these unsettled times there are plenty of customers. They carry in various sizes of bags and parcels, and the first place they look is toward a bulletin board where the latest prices of gold and silver are posted.

While some workers pour over correspondence or accounting, pleasant young men carefully weigh and receipt the material brought to them. They exchange comments and information with each customer. "I think both gold and silver are going up - I don't believe you have much carat gold here - the filled doesn't turn out much, you know - I believe these spoon handles are just plate, but I'll test them -"

The test is one quick drop of a chemical. "This one is real stuff. Not quite sure about the other piece. I'll run it on through the smelter. We are about three weeks behind. Your check will be mailed out shortly after that."

So this is the place of transition, where a lot of valuable and semi-valuable objects will become gold and silver bars. And with gold around \$700.00 per ounce, and silver at \$40.00 per ounce, there are sometimes practical reasons to cash in.

Yet antique dealers, and lovers of beautiful and historical things feel that, if this trend continues, a lot of our American silver heritage is going to be lost. And American silver, which has been manufactured in this country for more than 300 years, has a special history.

Much of the Gold has always been a bit beyond the reach of the ordinary citizen, but ownership of a few good silver objects has been a part of the American dream. From the simple Colonial designs through the Civil War era, the Victorian rococo and modern pieces, American manufacturers have furnished more silver for the use of private citizens than at any other time in the history of mankind.

But times are changing. Now only the rich can afford to buy much silver for household use. Those of moderate means sell it to pay for life's necessities. And between these sellers of silver tea sets and heirloom jewelry and the Smelter lie too many middle men - or women.

Some of these buyers are honest and considerate - some are not.

And some are collectors, who enjoy fine things. But few laymen have the intricate knowledge of weight, manufacture, design, finish, age, and other factors which make up the value of silver pieces.

So when selling, nothing counts as much as knowing the person you are dealing with, or at least having your possessions appraised by a person whom you can trust. Jewelers who live in a town year after year, and build a reputation for fair dealing, obviously can be depended upon more than strangers who are staying in the area just to buy up family treasures and make money on them.

Al Anderson, Cisco jeweler, is not trying to deal in silver. "I tell people," he remarks, "That a Jewelry store is not the best place to sell to, for I would have to pay wholesale and sell back retail. And I hate to see people sell beautiful things - wedding presents and stuff - for scrap. I tell them it is better to sell to some individual who will pay a fair price and keep the things."

"Silver has gone so unbelievably high that it's not even practical for me to stock it. No one could have foreseen this coming. I still have silver and gold in wearable jewelry, but I'm not carrying Sterling - or even silver plate - in household items."

Ten years ago I started clearing out my Sterling silver tableware at about four or five dollars per piece. Now even a teaspoon sells for about \$100.

He points to stainless steel tableware, which has a soft, silvery sheen, and elaborate designs. "The brides are choosing this now. It's really practical - never have to polish it. Even a few years ago the technical know how and tools were not available for this fine work. And steel is more highly refined now -"

you get a good run. Oh, a few girls choose gold plate on stainless, but it's not as easy to care for."

Mr. Anderson feels that silver will probably remain more stable in price than gold. "Gold really doesn't have as many uses as silver," he says. "It is mostly piled up in vaults, as a medium of exchange. Silver has a number of industrial uses, and is non-renewable, unless we can find some more mines."

Bill England, long-time coin collector of Eastland, feels that this country made a serious mistake when it started making coins of alloy in 1965.

"It wasn't so bad when our country went off the gold standard. But when we went off the silver standard, too, that was the start of bad trouble. You take any of the ancient countries - Greece, Rome, the rest - when they pulled their precious metals out of the coinage and substituted base metals it always led to high inflation. Right now gold and silver are selling for unreal prices, while our Susan B. Anthony dollar has only a few cents worth of metal in it. Possibly copper will be the next scarce metal. You can say that our currency is being destroyed."

"Rare coins are bringing the highest prices in history. But the bad part is that collecting coins has grown so expensive that young people and small collectors can no longer go into it for just a nice hobby. Why, when I began collecting about twenty years ago, you could pick nice coins out of rolls from the bank, or change. Now it is almost impossible to find a circulated coin with any value."

When asked how a begin-

ner could find good coins to buy, Mr. England hesitated. "Now that's a hard question, for some companies which advertise in magazines are not reliable. They will send out coins with the dates they advertise, but the stuff is worn and of low grade. A person should look at stuff they buy, or be sure a company is dependable. Coin buying is really complicated now - it takes a lot of knowledge. So many people make a big business of it."

And if you are selling a collection - be careful. Some people drift around the country, buying - hoping to pick up valuable coins from elderly people or someone who is not knowledgeable. And coin books with price lists don't do you much good, for the prices change so fast they are always out of date. Teletype machines now bring the latest news on coin prices."

When asked why gold and silver have grown so scarce, Mr. England replied that a number of countries were storing gold instead of paper currency, and he understood that millionaire Texas oil men had cornered the silver market.

"I don't believe silver is going down in price," he stated. "And it is getting too valuable to keep around, for there is always the danger of theft. Anyone who has good silver should put it in a safe place."

As for the future, Mr. England said that "No one could really foresee" what would happen in the world of coin collecting, or what would become scarce and valuable in the future.

But there was one thing certain - rare metals would always be valuable, under the present world governments.

they have an important effect on their child, whether they live under the same roof or not.

When divorced parents maintain visitation and other contacts with their child, the child feels a sense of being loved and wanted, and his loss of self-esteem is not as great.

In addition, the child is less likely to blame himself for the divorce.

Shared parenting benefits the child in indirect ways, too. Neither parent feels totally alone in the responsibility of child-rearing - and parents who maintain contact with the child are more likely to help with his financial support.

As the rate of divorce spirals, leaving millions of children living with one parent, social scientists and members of the legal and mental-health profession are taking new looks at the question of child custody.

Finding answers to questions of sole or joint custody is difficult as society changes its attitude toward parenting, toward what decisions should be made and who should make them.

At this point the value of considering shared parenting arises, when circumstances make it possible.

For clarity's sake, shared parenting does not mean simply dividing up the year so that each parent has an equal number of days with the child. Nor does it mean that each parent spend equal amount of time and/or money towards the child's upbringing.

It does mean that adults can return their focus to the physical relationship NOT severed by a divorce decree - that of being a parent.

The old adage that "The

child will be better off if the parent just disappears" is not always stated from the perspective of what is best for the child.

Shared parenting is not the answer in many divorce cases but it is worth consideration when feasible.

DIETETIC APPLESAUCE COOKIES
1 3/4 cups cake flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 cup margarine
1 egg
1 cup dietetic apples
1 cup all-bran
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 Tbsp. liquid artificial sweetener
1/2 cup raisins

Sift together the flour, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves, and baking soda. Mix margarine, artificial sweetener and egg until light and fluffy. Then add flour mixture and applesauce, alternately, mixing well after each addition. Fold in raisins and all-bran. Drop by spoonfuls onto greased cookie sheet, about 1 inch apart. Bake at 375 degrees for 20 minutes. Recipe makes 4 dozen cookies, each contains 39 calories.


