### Tax Rights Published

AUSTIN--Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax (SPTB), today announced a statewide program to make citizens more aware of their rights, remedies and responsibilities as taxpayers.

"This public education program is the most comprehensive effort of its kind in the state's history. It will involve the State Property Tax Board, local tax assessors throughout Texas, and the newspaper and broadcast industries," Graeber noted.

The state property tax official said the program consists of two elements. The first involves distribution of a comprehensive pamphlet titled "Taxpayers" Remedies

Responsibilities."

"The pamphlet discusses a broad range of tax-related matters, and will help Texans become much more knowledgeable on how the property tax system operates," the SPTB executive director said.

Taxpavers may obtain a free copy by contacting county. city or school tax offices in their area.

"The second element of the program consists of efforts by the news media to inform all Texans of tax rendition deadlines, and the procedures and requirements to apply for homestead exempproductivity tions and values.

"Local tax assessors will also be cooperating in this part of the taxpayer educaThursday,

tion program," Graeber

According to Graeber, the program is being conducted in March to enable Texans to apply for all tax relief to which they may be entitled before local tax rendition deadlines.

'To qualify for most home stead exemptions and productivity valuation for agricultural land, applications must be made to each jurisdiction before the rendition period ends. Most of the state's local taxing units have rendition deadlines of April 1 or April 30, and failure to make timely application causes loss of the tax relief until the next tax year," Graeber added.

He noted that when the new State Property Tax Code is fully implemented in 1982, all jurisdictions will have a rendition deadline of April 1. SPTB officials said these categories of homestead exemptions are available:

--General Homestead. Those persons qualifying for a residence homestead are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of the homestead for school tax purposes. An additional \$3,000 county homestead exemption from assessed value available against the portion of the county tax rate for farm-tomarket roads or flood

control

-- Persons 65 or Older Elderly citizens are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of their residence homestead for school taxes. And, while an elderly citizen's property may increase in value through the years, the school taxes owed in any one year cannot be greater than the amount owed in 1979 or in the first year the property owner qualified for the exemption, whichever is greater. An annual application to the school tax office is

By local option, school district, cities and counties may offer additional exemptions to elderly homeowners of not less than \$3,000.

-- Disability Exemption. Citizens who are disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value of their resihomestead. exemption applies to school taxes only, and a property owner may not receive both the disability exemption and 10,000 exemption for the

elderly. School districts, cities and counties may offer an additional local option disability exemption of not less than

-- Disabled Veteran or Qualifying Survivor. Certain disabled veterans or their

survivors may be entitled to an exemption ranging from \$1,500 to \$3,000, depending on the percentage of serviceconnected disability.


This exemption may be applied against the value of any property owned on January 1 of the year in which the application is made. The disabled veteran must be a Texas resident and complete an annual application at local tax offices. Only one property may receive the exemption, and VA or armed forces documents verifying

disability are required. State Property Tax Board officials said agricultural productivity values. mentioned earlier, may reduce the tax liability of farmers and qualified ranchers. Details on what types of land may be taxed on productivity rather than market value are available in local tax office, or in the "Remedies" pamphlet.







Beginning March 11 and continuing through March 28, enumerators will systematically canvass

enumeration assigned districts. Using the address list compiled by the Census Bureau, they will add any unlisted housing units and delete any demolished or otherwise nonexistent hous-

At each door they will ask for the name and telephone number; determine if a Spanish language questionnaire or other foreign language help is needed; and then leave the questionnaire. calling attention to the fact that it is to be filled out and mailed back on April 1 in the enclosed pre-addressed

postage-paid envelope. Householders will be sent a postcard in early April to remind them, if they have not already done so, to fill out and mail the questionnaire. Enumerators will contact, either by phone or in person those households that have not returned their completed questionnaires

within a reasonable time. This experiment of having enumerators drop questionnaires, rather than having them mailed out, will be done in four other areas in the country. It is an entirely new census technique in which the Census Bureau seeks answers to several questions. Would enumerator delivery of questionnaires and reminder postcards improve return of completed questionnaires? Would listing of occupied and vacant housing units at the time questionnaires are delivered

help to insure that none was missed? If the answer turns out to be "yes" to these questions, is the degree of improvement enough to make the method worth the

extra cost? This census district is one of the 385 throughout the land where the mail-back method is being used. But in those areas not in the experiment, the addressed questionnaires are delivered by mail on March 28 and no reminder postcard is sent. Here the mail carrier makes a time-of-

delivery address check. The Census Bureau estimates that more than 90 percent of the U.S. population lives in these 385 mailback areas. There are 24 more census districts in which the remaining population lives. These areas are outside the large cities and their suburbs. On March 28, mail carriers will

unaddressed distribute questionnaires to each residential mailbox. Householders are asked to fill them out and hold them for census takers who will begin picking them up March 31.

However, all districts are alike in one respect in that some households will fall into a sample and be asked to provide more information about each person and about the housing. In places of 2500 population or more, one-in-six households will be in the sample. In areas with populations of less than 2500, one in every two households will fall into the sample. This large sample in less populated areas is necessary in order to provide statistically adequate data for use as the basis for Federal revenue sharing program allocations. House holds not in the sample will receive the "short" form which has seven population questions about each person

about the dwelling. The Census Bureau says that having the questionnaire in the home for several days before it is to be mailed back on April, 1 or held for census taker pick-up, enables the family to fill it out in privacy, and when each member is likely to be present at some time and can provide accurate information about himself or herself and about the housing.

Islam, a religion founded upon the revelations of Mohammed, is sometimes called Mohammedanism by outsiders. Its believers, however, prefer to be called Moslems. Although there have been Moslems in the United States for generations, Eastland County has had its most direct contact with the religion through a number of students from the Mid-east.

These young people began attending Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges around 1960. and continued to do so until recently. They, like other foreign students, were directed to Eastland County Colleges because it was felt they would be well-treated here, and receive a favorable impression of life in Amer-

Their impressions of what life is like where Christianity is the leading religion will probably never be fully known. Sometimes they were shocked at the dress and behavior of Americans, but were generally amazed at the material things available to citizens in this country. Undoubtedly they were touched by the efforts of teachers to assist them in the English language, and the hospitality of homes opened to them.

Some of the graduate students managed to enroll in American Universities for further education. Very few remained in this area. The ones who returned home to Iran were caught in bewildering waves of revolution changes which are little understood by the western world. For the roots of this conflict lie deep in age-old differences - differences which rose from an area which have given the world three leading religions. Although Islam is primarily

a religion of the Mid-east, there are about 500,000 Moslems in the world today. Many are found in Northern and Middle Africa, Western Asia, India and Mayala, the East Indies, the Phillipines, China and some parts of the Europe. There are an estimated 100,000 in the United States, including a number in Texas. Although all Moslem groups agree on basic doctrines, the Church is divided into about ten small groups and two main ones the Summis - the largest by far - and the Shiites. At the present time the Shiites are in control in Iran, with most of the rest of the Islamic world in disagreement with their conduct.

The world "Islam" means "submission to the will of God", and it venerates a single, all-powerful God. Its founder, Mohammed, was not considered a savior, but one through whom God chose to speak. Its faith

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concerns itself as much with man's behavior in this world as with his fate in the hereafter. The reasons for Islam's huge initial success lie entangled in history, but the reason for its continued strength and durability lie in the nature of its appeal simple, lucid, and affirmative. For Islam is more than a formal religion - it is a way of life which guides thought and action in a manner almost unknown in the western world. In the broadest sense Islam is a brotherhood, with no segregation as to race or nation, a people united in an effort to do God's will as they under-

stand it. A lot of Isalm's strength lies in its belief that the utterances of Mohammed, as preserved in the Koran and other writings, represent the final and absolute will of God. To the Moselms they supersede all previous revelations, and confirm the truths of the Old and New Testaments in the Bible of Jews and Christians. Islam shows respect to the Bible prophets from Abraham to Christ (Christ is considered only a prophet, not a savior)

but contends Mohammed was the last and greatest, the "Seal of the Prophets'

Mohammed was traditionally born in 570 A.D., in Mecca. He was from a family of high caste, but was orphaned at an early age. He worked as a camel boy for a wealthy widow, and traveled from one country to another in his work. He was especially interested in religion, and unhappy about the worship of idols which was forced on his people.

Once Mohammed went to a mountain called Hira to pray and meditate. There the Angel Gabriel is believed to have appeared to him in a vision, telling him to proclaim God and teach His will to the people.

Eventually Mohammed became a leader of the people of Arabia. He did away with many harmful customs such as worshiping idols and killing baby girls at birth. He limited the practice of polygamy and divorce, reformed laws, and helped the poor. Although he approved of war and conquest, he was tolerant of Christians and

There are five basic practices of Islam: (1) Proclomation of the unity of God, and belief therein, as expressed in the creed: "There is no God but Allah, Mohammed is the Messenger of Allah" (2) Prayer, performed five times daily, facing Mecca, and on Fridays in the Bathing, Clipping, Grooming Mosque (Church), (3) Almsgiving, as an offering to Allah and an act of piety, (4) the fast of Ramdan, and (5) Pilgrimage to Mecca.

In addition to these major religious duties, the Koran also contains certain moral and legal ordinances. It for-

bids believers to use alcoholic beverages, eat pork, gamble, or practice usury. It lays down rules for marriage and divorce, and penalities for crimes. It forbids the making of images, a directive which explains the absence of any picture or sculpture of Mohammed in Islam.

important, but not exactly the same. The man's responsibilities include support of the family, and the right to head his household and make important decisions concerning his children. If a married woman has no children, she may engage in business outside the home. But when children

are born, it is considered a

sacred and realistic duty that

she remain home and care

for her children properly.

Family life, and respect for

all members and their needs. is very important to Moslems.

A man may have as many as four wives, only if he can properly support extra wives, and live in harmony with them in his household. Few Moslems choose to marry more than one wife at a time. Divorce is permissible only if the parties involved are absolutely incompatable. Women may divorce husbands, as well as husbands divorcing wives. Moslems feel that the limited polygamy of Islam, which is actually supposed to be used only in special situations, is far preferable to the prostitution they see in the western

world. The architecture of the Moslem mosques is impressive and distinctive, featuring rounded arches and highceilinged rooms, and minarets where the call to prayer is given. Pools near







### **Last Freeze Dates** For Texas

Farmers as well as gardeners get the urge to plant spring crops just as soon as there are a few days of warm weather. But there's still plenty of time for freezing temperatures over much of Texas.

Keith Hayes, NWS agricultural meteorologist, has compiled information on the last freeze dates for the various districts of the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

In the table below, "early" represents a 90 percent chance for a freeze (32 degrees F.) later than the date indicated. "Average" represents a 50-50 chance of a freeze after the date indicated while "late" indicates only a 10 percent chance of a freeze occuring after the date shown.

West Central, March (Early), March 29 (Avg.), April 13 (Late). Central, March 9 (Early), March (Avg.), April 10

(Late). Due to a generally milder winter season so far, the 'odds'' are good for an 'early' spring, notes Hayes. In other words, chances of a freeze later than the

'average' date listed above

will likely be slim. So, farmers and gardeners will want to keep that date in mind when planting warmseason crops that could suffer freeze damage if planted

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

Jackson believes that they have found the perfect combination to make the "Jackson Five-O" an annual event. "The weather in Dallas in January is usually cold," he said, "which is perfect for a long run. The course at Bachman is ideal because it is flat, does not have automobile traffic, and is short enough to only require two aid stations. And the runners in Dallas are really interested in this kind of race.

What will Ed Jackson do next year to top this birthday celebration on his 51st? "I'll take a one-mile warm-up lap before the race," he smiled.

By opening the Lake Bernie dam gate, the Lake Cisco watershed would be increased by at least 25%. With the usual spring rains around the corner, this should be considered very soon. Lake Bernie serves little purpose at present. An enlarged watershed for Lake Cisco seems very desirable.
