# Cisco Livestock Show To Be Friday & Saturday

The Cisco Livestock Show will be held Friday and Saturday, March 7-8 at the County Precinct Barn, Avenue D and West 18th Street. Charles Moad is the president of the Cisco Livestock Show Association.

Jimmie Lee is show superintendent with Gaston Boyd as assistant superintendent. Ross McCaghen is paymaster.

The stock show schedule is as follows: FRIDAY--sift all animals 6 p.m.; judge breeding swine 7 p.m. and market barrows 7:15 p.m.

SATURDAY--goats 10:30 a.m.; breeding sheep 10:40 a.m.; market lambs 11 a.m.; breeding beef 11:30 a.m.; market steers 11:40 a.m.; beef bulls 12 p.m. and dairy cattle 12:10 p.m.

The rules and regulations are (1) all animals must be in place by 6:00 p.m. Friday, March 7, and remain until 4 p.m. Saturday, March 8. (2) There will be a sifting committee to sift and send home either breeding or fat animals that will not be a credit to this show. (3) In classes with less than three animals, the judge will decide what place money the animal shall receive. (4) The Cisco Livestock Show

Association will not be responsible in any way for injury or accident to any exhibitor, spectator, animal or property at the show.

(5) There will be no entry fees. (6) Each junior exhibitor will be limited to two animals in each class, in both breeding and market division. (7) All market hogs must weigh in at least 175 pounds, but not over 260.

(8) Market lambs may

be of any breed or sex. (9) Judges decision will be final. (10) The junior division will be limited to FFA and 4-H club members enrolled in the Cisco Public Schools.

Thinking Day is the one day a year when Girl Scouts and Girl Guides all over the world think of each other and their affiliation with the International Scouting organization.

At the local observance, a message about Thinking Day and the name and address of each participating Girl Scout was wrapped in a plastic bag and tied to either a balloon or pair of balloons. The girls hope that when the balloons fall, people will find their messages and respond to the requests to notify the Scouts. Some of the little Brownies speculated that some of the balloons might get to China.

Carried by a west wind, the balloons headed east and disappeared in a dusty sky.

A few of the balloons floated only across the street where they were snagged by trees. But some of the older tree-climbing Scouts retrieved these and sent them on.

and will feature a team of Extension Service Specialist. The specialists will discuss all areas of peanut production from planting to harvest. The program will immediately follow the meal.

All peanut growers are urged to attend the meeting and take advantage of the most recent information on peanut production, says Gordon.

## Tax Rights Published

AUSTIN—Kenneth E. Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), today announced a statewide program to make citizens more aware of their rights, remedies and responsibilities as taxpayers.

"This public education program is the most comprehensive effort of its kind in the state's history. It will involve the State Property Tax Board, local tax assessors throughout Texas, and the newspaper and broadcast industries," Graeber noted.

The state property tax official said the program consists of two elements. The first involves distribution of a comprehensive 12-page pamphlet titled "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies and

Responsibilities."

"The pamphlet discusses a broad range of tax-related matters, and will help Texans become much more knowledgeable on how the property tax system operates," the SPTB executive director said.

Taxpayers may obtain a free copy by contacting county, city or school tax offices in their area.

"The second element of the program consists of efforts by the news media to inform all Texans of tax rendition deadlines, and the procedures and requirements to apply for homestead exemptions and productivity values.

"Local tax assessors will also be cooperating in this part of the taxpayer educa-

tion program," Graeber noted.

According to Graeber, the program is being conducted in March to enable Texans to apply for all tax relief to which they may be entitled before local tax rendition deadlines.

"To qualify for most homestead exemptions and productivity valuation for agricultural land, applications must be made to each jurisdiction before the rendition period ends. Most of the state's local taxing units have rendition deadlines of April 1 or April 30, and failure to make timely application causes loss of the tax relief until the next tax year," Graeber added.

He noted that when the new State Property Tax Code is fully implemented in 1982, all jurisdictions will have a rendition deadline of April 1.

SPTB officials said these categories of homestead exemptions are available:

—General Homestead. Those persons qualifying for a residence homestead are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of the homestead for school tax purposes. An additional \$3,000 county homestead exemption from assessed value is available against the portion of the county tax rate for farm-to-market roads or flood control.

—Persons 65 or Older. Elderly citizens are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of their residence homestead for school taxes. And, while an elderly citizen's property may increase in value through the years, the school taxes owed in any one year cannot be greater than the amount owed in 1979 or in the first year the property owner qualified for the exemption, whichever is greater. An annual application to the school tax office is required.

By local option, school district, cities and counties may offer additional exemptions to elderly homeowners of not less than \$3,000.

—Disability Exemption. Citizens who are disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value of their residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only, and a property owner may not receive both the disability exemption and 10,000 exemption for the elderly.

School districts, cities and counties may offer an additional local option disability exemption of not less than \$3,000.

—Disabled Veteran or Qualifying Survivor. Certain disabled veterans or their

survivors may be entitled to an exemption ranging from \$1,500 to \$3,000, depending on the percentage of service-connected disability.

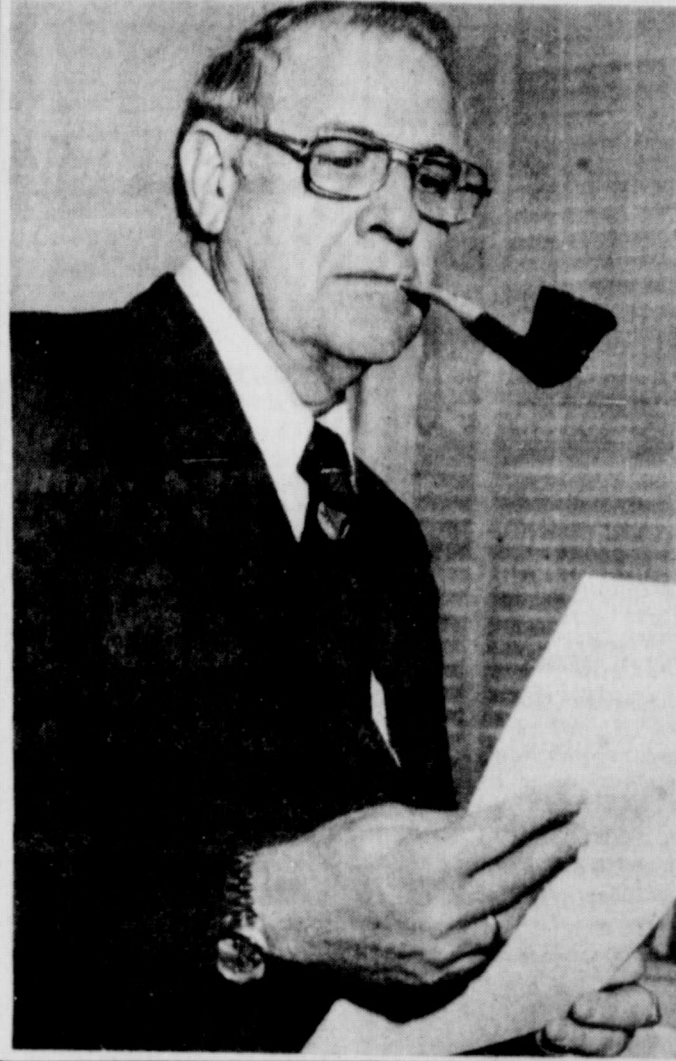
This exemption may be applied against the value of any property owned on January 1 of the year in which the application is made. The disabled veteran must be a Texas resident and complete an annual application at local tax offices. Only one property may receive the exemption, and VA or armed forces documents verifying disability are required.

State Property Tax Board officials said agricultural productivity values, mentioned earlier, may reduce the tax liability of qualified farmers and ranchers. Details on what types of land may be taxed on productivity rather than market value are available in local tax office, or in the "Remedies" pamphlet.

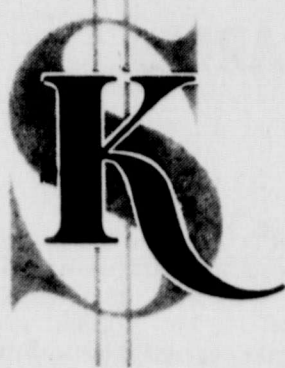

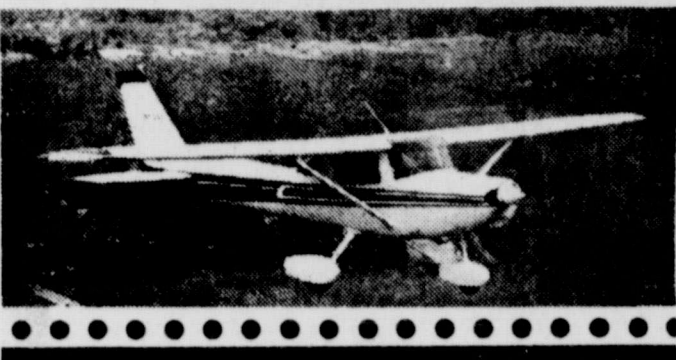

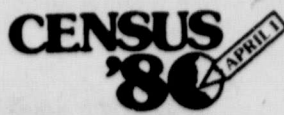

Beginning March 11 and continuing through March 28, enumerators will systematically canvass their assigned enumeration districts. Using the address list compiled by the Census Bureau, they will add any unlisted housing units and delete any demolished or otherwise nonexistent housing.

At each door they will ask for the name and telephone number; determine if a Spanish language questionnaire or other foreign language help is needed; and then leave the questionnaire, calling attention to the fact that it is to be filled out and mailed back on April 1 in the enclosed pre-addressed postage-paid envelope.

Householders will be sent a postcard in early April to remind them, if they have not already done so, to fill out and mail the questionnaire. Enumerators will contact, either by phone or in person those households that have not returned their completed questionnaires within a reasonable time.

This experiment of having enumerators drop off questionnaires, rather than having them mailed out, will be done in four other areas in the country. It is an entirely new census technique in which the Census Bureau seeks answers to several questions. Would enumerator delivery of questionnaires and reminder postcards improve return of completed questionnaires? Would listing of occupied and vacant housing units at the time questionnaires are delivered help to insure that none was missed? If the answer turns out to be "yes" to these questions, is the degree of improvement enough to make the method worth the extra cost?

This census district is one of the 385 throughout the land where the mail-back method is being used. But in those areas not in the experiment, the addressed questionnaires are delivered by mail on March 28 and no reminder postcard is sent. Here the mail carrier makes a time-of-delivery address check. The Census Bureau estimates that more than 90 percent of the U.S. population lives in these 385 mailback areas.

There are 24 more census districts in which the remaining population lives. These areas are outside the large cities and their suburbs. On March 28, mail carriers will distribute unaddressed questionnaires to each residential mailbox. Householders are asked to fill them out and hold them for census takers who will begin picking them up March 31.

However, all districts are alike in one respect in that some households will fall into a sample and be asked to

provide more information about each person and about the housing. In places of 2500 population or more, one-in-six households will be in the sample. In areas with populations of less than 2500, one in every two households will fall into the sample. This large sample in less populated areas is necessary in order to provide statistically adequate data for use as the basis for Federal revenue sharing program allocations. Households not in the sample will receive the "short" form which has seven population questions about each person and 12 housing questions about the dwelling.

The Census Bureau says that having the questionnaire in the home for several days before it is to be mailed back on April 1 or held for census taker pick-up, enables the family to fill it out in privacy, and when each member is likely to be present at some time and can provide accurate information about himself or herself and about the housing.

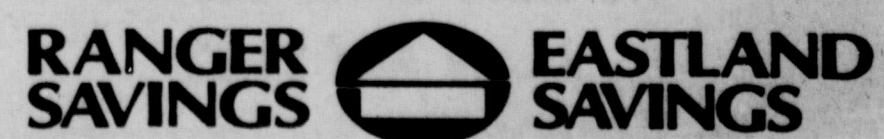

# Islam

Islam, a religion founded upon the revelations of Mohammed, is sometimes called Mohammedanism by outsiders. Its believers, however, prefer to be called Moslems. Although there have been Moslems in the United States for generations, Eastland County has had its most direct contact with the religion through a number of students from the Mid-east.

These young people began attending Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges around 1960, and continued to do so until recently. They, like other foreign students, were directed to Eastland County Colleges because it was felt they would be well-treated here, and receive a favorable impression of life in America.

Their impressions of what life is like where Christianity is the leading religion will probably never be fully known. Sometimes they were shocked at the dress and behavior of Americans, but were generally amazed at the material things available to citizens in this country. Undoubtedly they were touched by the efforts of teachers to assist them in the English language, and the hospitality of homes opened to them.

Some of the graduate students managed to enroll in American Universities for further education. Very few remained in this area. The ones who returned home to Iran were caught in bewildering waves of revolution - changes which are little understood by the western world. For the roots of this conflict lie deep in age-old differences - differences which rose from an area which have given the world three leading religions.

Although Islam is primarily a religion of the Mid-east, there are about 500,000 Moslems in the world today. Many are found in Northern and Middle Africa, Western Asia, India and Mayala, the East Indies, the Philippines, China and some parts of the Europe. There are an estimated 100,000 in the United States, including a number in Texas. Although all Moslem groups agree on basic doctrines, the Church is divided into about ten small groups and two main ones - the Sunnis - the largest by far - and the Shiites. At the present time the Shiites are in control in Iran, with most of the rest of the Islamic world in disagreement with their conduct.

The world "Islam" means "submission to the will of God", and it venerates a single, all-powerful God. Its founder, Mohammed, was not considered a savior, but one through whom God chose to speak. Its faith

concerns itself as much with man's behavior in this world as with his fate in the hereafter. The reasons for Islam's huge initial success lie entangled in history, but the reason for its continued strength and durability lie in the nature of its appeal - simple, lucid, and affirmative. For Islam is more than a formal religion - it is a way of life which guides thought and action in a manner almost unknown in the western world. In the broadest sense Islam is a brotherhood, with no segregation as to race or nation, a people united in an effort to do God's will as they understand it.

A lot of Islam's strength lies in its belief that the utterances of Mohammed, as preserved in the Koran and other writings, represent the final and absolute will of God. To the Moslems they supersede all previous revelations, and confirm the truths of the Old and New Testaments in the Bible of Jews and Christians. Islam shows respect to the Bible prophets from Abraham to Christ (Christ is considered only a prophet, not a savior) but contends that Mohammed was the last and greatest, the "Seal of the Prophets". Mohammed was traditionally born in 570 A.D., in Mecca. He was from a family of high caste, but was orphaned at an early age. He worked as a camel boy for a wealthy widow, and traveled from one country to another in his work. He was especially interested in religion, and unhappy about the worship of idols which was forced on his people.

Once Mohammed went to a mountain called Hira to pray and meditate. There the Angel Gabriel is believed to have appeared to him in a vision, telling him to proclaim God and teach His will to the people. Eventually Mohammed became a leader of the people of Arabia. He did away with many harmful customs such as worshipping idols and killing baby girls at birth. He limited the practice of polygamy and divorce, reformed laws, and helped the poor. Although he approved of war and conquest, he was tolerant of Christians and Jews.

There are five basic practices of Islam: (1) Proclamation of the unity of God, and belief therein, as expressed in the creed: "There is no God but Allah, Mohammed is the Messenger of Allah", (2) Prayer, performed five times daily, facing Mecca, and on Fridays in the Mosque (Church), (3) Almsgiving, as an offering to Allah and an act of piety, (4) the fast of Ramadan, and (5) Pilgrimage to Mecca. In addition to these major religious duties, the Koran also contains certain moral and legal ordinances. It forbids

believers to use alcoholic beverages, eat pork, gamble, or practice usury. It lays down rules for marriage and divorce, and penalties for crimes. It forbids the making of images, a directive which explains the absence of any picture or sculpture of Mohammed in Islam.

Moslems believe that their religion makes no discrimination on the basis of sex. "But Islam," they say, "Makes one realize that the spheres of potential capabilities and responsibilities of men and women are equally important, but not exactly the same."

The man's responsibilities include support of the family, and the right to head his household and make important decisions concerning his children. If a married woman has no children, she may engage in business outside the home. But when children are born, it is considered a sacred and realistic duty that she remain home and care for her children properly. Family life, and respect for all members and their needs, is very important to Moslems.

A man may have as many as four wives, only if he can properly support extra wives, and live in harmony with them in his household. Few Moslems choose to marry more than one wife at a time. Divorce is permissible only if the parties involved are absolutely incompatible. Women may divorce husbands, as well as husbands divorcing wives. Moslems feel that the limited polygamy of Islam, which is actually supposed to be used only in special situations, is far preferable to the prostitution they see in the western world.

The architecture of the Moslem mosques is impressive and distinctive, featuring rounded arches and high-ceilinged rooms, and minarets where the call to prayer is given. Pools near the Churches are for

ceremonial washings entwined with the rituals of worship. Religious leaders in each mosque give sermons to the people each Friday, the Holy Day of the week, and these are followed by private devotions in prayer. Men and women worship together. The Leaders in the Mosques have been trained by education in religious schools, a number of which are located in Arabian countries. One noted training school is in Cairo, Egypt. Leaders such as the Ayatollahs in Iran were trained in such schools.

Until recently there was no separation of Church and State in Moslem countries, but the tendency is toward more distinction in Civil and Religious laws. The present unfavorable reaction to this is notable in Iran, but other Arabic populations are not in favor of returning to the old ways in every area of life. The dress of women, for example, is generally left to the taste of the individual woman in most Moslem countries, with the obvious implication that she will use modesty and good taste in her choices.

In the Moslem concept there are sharp divisions between the good and the wicked - as sharp as the total contrast between the bliss of Heaven and the torment of Hell. Undergirding the principle of the Oneness of God as sole Creator and sole Judge is the doctrine of the Last Judgement. The Koran is vivid in its descriptions of the delights of Heaven and the terrors of Hell.

But a devout Moslem is just as interested in the realism of the present - attempting to make the best of what he considers the nature of man, and his relation to the Creator and the Universe. The religion of Islam, he considers, offers a realistic and honest solution. And, with this faith coming to the forefront of the world's

## Last Freeze Dates For Texas

Farmers as well as gardeners get the urge to plant spring crops just as soon as there are a few days of warm weather. But there's still plenty of time for freezing temperatures over much of Texas.

Keith Hayes, NWS agricultural meteorologist, has compiled information on the last freeze dates for the various districts of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

In the table below, "early" represents a 90 percent chance for a freeze (32 degrees F.) later than the date indicated. "Average" represents a 50-50 chance of a freeze after the date indicated while "late" indicates only a 10 percent chance of a freeze occurring after the date shown.

West Central, March (Early), March 29 (Avg.), April 13 (Late).

Central, March 9 (Early), March (Avg.), April 10 (Late).

Due to a generally milder winter season so far, the "odds" are good for an "early" spring, notes Hayes. In other words, chances of a freeze later than the "average" date listed above will likely be slim.

So, farmers and gardeners will want to keep that date in mind when planting warm-season crops that could suffer freeze damage if planted too early.

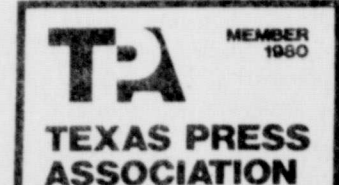

## ASTP To Hold Reunion At Tarleton

STEPHENVILLE.-A reunion of the men who attended Tarleton State University under the Army Specialized Training Program during the World War II years of 1943-44 will be held next fall, according to J. Louis Evans, executive secretary of the Tarleton Alumni Association.

The reunion will be sponsored by the association and will be held on the Tarleton campus Oct. 11-13.

The ASTP was established during WW II to teach engineering to hand-picked members of the different

branches of the armed forces.

At its peak, approximately 700 men were attending ASTP classes on the Tarleton campus. Regular students living on campus were moved out of the dormitories, and ASTP students were housed in the university facilities.

Several Tarleton faculty members were reassigned from their regular teaching responsibilities to the ASTP program.

The training sessions were originally designed for three sessions of three months each, with the students moving on to Texas A&M University to complete their work. Students assigned to the program had an IQ of 125 or better.

After seven months of operation, however, the program was abandoned because of the need for men in combat forces and impending "D" Day.

A majority of the men were assigned to the 99th Infantry

Division at Camp Maxey, TX, and later went into the line in Belgium near the German border to relieve the 2nd Infantry Division.

Evans said that names and addresses of ASTP members are now being compiled in the Alumni office and urged anyone having information on any of the men to call the office at 817-968-9074.

## Be Careful With Microwave Popcorn

Be careful with microwave popcorn - there's a slight danger of damage, and the popcorn may be dried out, a family resource management specialist cautions.

If you're popping corn in your microwave, you could damage the oven itself - even if you have a special popper for the oven, Lillian Chenoweth says.

Mrs. Chenoweth is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

There are so many variables involved that at least one

major manufacturer recommends against the practice.

Another manufacturer can recommend only their brand of popper for use - only in their oven with strict adherence to the precise times.

If you still want to try microwave popcorn, first check the cookbook that came with your oven. Although many food-product packages offer information and directions, these may not apply to your oven.

Since other popcorn methods take about as little time as microwave popcorn, it may be wise to use one of these.

All members are urged to attend and bring along a guest. Guests are admitted at the door for \$1.00.

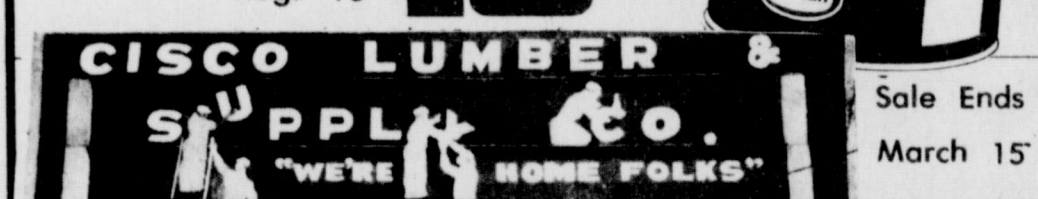

## The "Jackson Five-O" was Super

Last spring, Ed Jackson began contemplating an exceptional event to commemorate the half-century mark in his life. The seasoned marathon runner decided to run 50 miles non-stop in honor of his 50th birthday. "I'd like to have some other runners out there to keep me company," he said. As Jackson's plans progressed, interest from other runners increased until he had a full-fledged AAU sanctioned and certified 50-mile race to conduct — complete with race directors, aid stations, trophies, timers, jackets, entry fees, injury waivers, and 34 outstanding distance runners.

Jackson found that sponsoring a race was not an easy task. "I spent no less than 100 hours in meetings and preparation time for the race," he commented. The Vice President of Manufacturing at Fomey Engineering, Jackson gave credit for the successful event to his company and to the other race directors who included his wife, Re, and Fomey co-workers Kathy Garcia, Joe Grimland, and Hank North. Active in supporting fitness, Fomey also sponsors an exercise program for company employees which Jackson and Mrs. Garcia coordinate.

race ever held in Dallas. "It was like an all-day picnic," Jackson reported. "I ran for 11 minutes, then walked for 3 1/2 minutes. My goal was to complete the course in less than eight hours." Jackson's time was a respectable 7:53:05 — not bad for a 50-year-old man.

Participation trophies were given to every runner who completed the distance. First place was defined as any time under eight hours, second place was a time of eight to ten hours, and completion trophies were planned for all other finishers. As it happened, all of the 34 starters ran at least the marathon mileage (26.2). Of the 28 finishers, 22 earned first-place trophies, while the other six gained second-place awards.

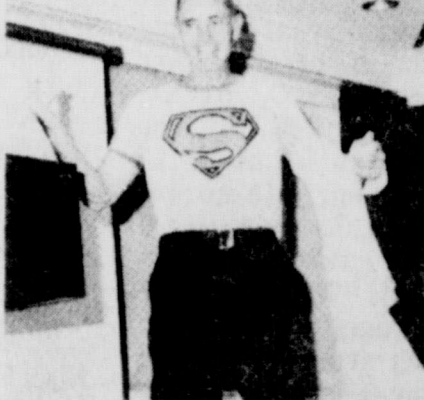
Don Key was the first to complete the 16 laps around the lake with a winning time of 6:39:10. Lou Neeb, the only participant who had ever run a 50-mile race before, finished in 6:49:51 to take second. Bob Haugh bettered the previous best time for a 59 year old male with his 7:37:22 record-breaking run while Mary Jones and Paula Beard broke records for 35 and 28 year old females.

Jackson believes that they have found the perfect combination to make the "Jackson Five-O" an annual event. "The weather in Dallas in January is usually cold," he said, "which is perfect for a long run. The course at Bachman is ideal because it is flat, does not have automobile traffic, and is short enough to only require two aid stations. And the runners in Dallas are really interested in this kind of race."

What will Ed Jackson do next year to top this birthday celebration on his 51st? "I'll take a one-mile warm-up lap before the race," he smiled.
