spokesperson: 1) Spring cleaning may involve the use of household chemicals. Be sure to read the labels carefully and never mix cleaning agents unless the bottle says it's safe to do so.

2) Chemicals and dangerous supplies should be stored in locked cabinets or placed on very high shelves. Although most chemicals are packaged in safety containers, they should still be kept away from children and away from any potential fire hazard.

3) Slippery floors and stairways can treacherous. Removing oil, excess wax and dirt outside the home helps to increase traction inside.

6) Spring is also a good time to check out a home's electrical system. Insulation on extension cords and other circuits should be checked for wear and proper grounding. Don't "play the ex-pert." Serious electrical problems should be checked out by a licensed electrician.

7) Free the yard of loose debris and fallen branches.

College Pays Big Dividends To Area, President Reports

On a dollars and cents basis, Cisco Junior College pays dividends amount to 2,824% on the cornmunity's tax investment, Dr. Norman Wallace, CJC president, told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk at their weekly luncheon last Wednesday noon the Colony Restaurant.

Dr. Wallace said the Cisco college district pays a total of \$108,000 in taxes each year to support the school.

For this investment, community receives the benefits of a budget expenditure by the school in excess of \$3,000,000 each year. He added that the value of a college to a community has been calculated as being 2.7 times the money it spends.

Cisco Junior College has a monthly payroll of about \$120,000, Dr. Wallace said. Under state regulations, the college must pay all utilities bills and building maintainence costs from tax revenues, he said. These items, he added, exceed the tax receipts considerably.

The defendent pleaded not guilty and was represented by a Fort Worth attorney. Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton prosecuted.



Workers hired after age 40 generally attain a higher performance rating in a shorter time than those hired before the age of 30. Older workers tend to have a more positive attitude toward work than do younger workers. They have a greater job stability and a better record of continued acceptance by employers once they are hired.

The number of days lost 100 workdays for all reasons goes down as age increases. Workers in every age group above 50 lose fewer scheduled workdays than those in any age group below

"However, many older workers have difficulty finding jobs," says David Hartwig, state director of Texas Green Thumb. "Many

Randy Lee Wells escaped from his mother's house about 1:15 p.m. Thursday while in the custody of Sheriff Morren.

Wells has been convicted of cattle theft and has been on probation. He had been in the county jail since sometimes February for probation violation.

Sheriff Morren said he took Wells out of jail Thursday to allow the prisoner to show him some of the alledgedly stolen merchandise and to go to the doctor.

He got a glass of milk and bolted out the back door of the house,

the sheriff said. At this writing the law enforcement officials from the sheriff's office, the district attorney's office and the Department of Public Safety assisted by police from Ranger, Rising Star, and Gorman have not located Wells.

PERSONAL MESSAGE FROM JUDGE JIM R. WRIGHT:

Upon my assuming the position of District Judge of the 91st District, I immediately embarked upon a course of action which would result in the increase of the number of cases disposed of.

Cases do not dispose of themselves, but rather are disposed of by hard work, by setting the cases for trial and by actually trying them. A program such as this requires work and time. Such a program requires work not only by myself and the staff of the 91st District Court, but also by the general public as jurors.

On many occasions jurors are called to Court but do not actually serve in the trying of a case. Nevertheless, the jurors who are called fulfill an important role in the administration of justice. Many cases are settled and disposed of civil as well as criminal, without trial just because the case has been called for trial and a jury is present waiting to try the case. Therefore, your work and mine is not in vain because our goal of disposition and justice has been reached.

In the short time in which I have been privileged to serve as your Judge, we have utilized an average of over two jury weeks per month in the administration of justice. The remainder of the time has been used extensively and solely for non-jury matters. We intend to continue our work in this area in an effort to give all parties their day in court. You have a right to expect this from your Court, and will receive no less so long as I am serving you as vour Judge.

Many politicians make many promises which they cannot keep. However, one promise that I can and will make and keep is that, if I am elected to continue as Judge of the 91st District Court, the Court will be a working Court and will be one in which cases are tried and disposed of as rapidly as possible in accordance with justice. I am asking you to assist me in my keeping of this promise. Your vote and your support will enable us to continue with the plans and to reach the goals which we all have for the 91st District Court.

DPS Will Enforce "Double-Nickle"

Over 4,000 traffic deaths in Texas last year is reason enough. State-wide nonobservance of the limit AND the addition of thousands of new drivers and vehicles annually are reasons given for the ever-climbing death

Since we're in the sun-belt and it's a fact that our state population is going to increase, we just as well accept the fact that there will be more and more drivers, so only logical thing to do is for all of us to obey the speed limit. (Many wonder if the licensing division isn't too easy on testing, but with the influx of new applicants as young people attain the legal age, perhaps there is no way to adequately weed out the unqualified, so the number

grows.) What speed is going to be enforced? Remember with the 55 went into law. It was generally understood that the DPS wasn't going to enforce anything below 60 -so most drove 60 feeling

Today -- under a new DPS director, and the stepped up enforcement procedures -DPS is not saying what speed they're enforcing. One official said: "Our personnel will be instructed to enforce the law when the violation is a clear-cut and substantial violation of the speed law." DPS will use marked and unmarked vehicles, pede-

strians (equipped with handheld radar), and utilization of the natural terrain to look for the violators. And "professional violators" are the ones they are after. They agreed that we all innocently transgress occa-

sionally, but they are after the professional speeders who rely on C.B. radios, fuzz-busters and police scanners to elude the law. It's a two-point goal for DPS and the state:

1. Reduction in fatal accidents because reduction in speed lessens the severity in accidents and continued enforcement emphasis on DWI and other hazardous violations will effect a reduction in both fatal and non-fatal accidents.

2. To effect significant reduction in speed in compliance with the 55 mph limit because Texas needs to achieve the national level of compliance of 40 per cent by Sept. 1, 1980, and any signireduction in the ficent

average speed will reduce full consumption and the ultimate reliance on foreign oil, and fuel consumption directly relates to our inflationary spiral, and any reduction can significantly impede the rising costs in our everyday expenditures.

Texas could lose federal highway money if we don't slow down.

Col. James Adams, new DPS director, says, "I have decided to remove selfimposed limitations on lawful techniques in order to allow the field commanders greater flexibility in determining the techniques and procedures best designed to detect and apprehend those determined violators.'

Sure there'll be squalking, moaning and groaning and screams of rights violations, but DPS is willing to take the

have nothing to fear. So there's two good reasons for slowing down: life and

It's a shame life alone wouldn't do it.

We all may consider ourselves behooved to observe the 55-mile-an-hour speed limit!

We're being given fair warning from the Department of Public Safety that the "double-nickle" WILL

only going to have to reduce their speed by about 10 miles an hour to be in compliance with speed laws.

A total of 79 per cent of the auto drivers surveyed in Eastland and Callahan Counties were driving below 65 miles an hour. However only 88 (19 per cent) of the 458 checked were driving less than 55 mph. 143 (31 per cent) were driving between 56 to 60; 134 (29 per cent) 61 to 65 mph; 58 (13 per cent), 66 to 70 mph; and 35 (8 per cent) were driving 70 or more

Yes, truckers are the worst offenders, followed closely by out-of-state drivers driving the Texas highways.

But the fact remains that the bulk of drivers (83 per cent) cars and trucks in this area were driving no faster than 65 mph. So reducing that down to the legal 55 should be no major undertaking, it would seem. But what happens in practice might prove different, but it's worth the effort ... in lives saved.

Of the 239 trucks checked around here, 43 (18 per cent) were under 55; 61 were closed at from 56 to 60; 79, from 61 to 65; 34, from 66 to 70: and 22, more than 70.





population. 'This is an entirely new census method," manager said, "and is being used in four other areas throughout the country. If results show that response to the census is improved, both in completely filled-out questionnaires and in timely mail-back, it could well be the method used nationwide

in future U.S. censuses." The manager asked that you watch for your enumerator. They're easy to recognize. They carry large portfolios boldly lettered "U.S. Census -- 1980" against a red, white, and blue background. Each wear an official identification badge bearing the U.S.

Teenagers

Should eighteen year olds be required to register for the military draft? The answer to this question may be determined, at least in part, by the age of the respondent and his military eligibility.

Many teenagers contend that registration is only an inevitable short step away from conscription. That eventuality is frowned on by some as reeking of totalitarianism and infringing on personal freedom.

Advocates, on the other hand, use such terms as patriotism, allegiance, and pride in one's country when defending registration and the draft. To them, registration might even be a catalyst prompting more individuals to join the service. In addition, they argue it will reduce the time needed to place trained military soldiers on foreign soil in the event of an international conflict.

Those in opposition counter with "There are 1.3 million reservists and 2 million uniformed military personnel to ward off or prevent a crisis." They suggest increasing pay scales and fringe benefits to attract a greater number and higher caliber of soliders

The argument, pro and con, goes on and on. The important consideration, before jumping on any bandwagon, is to thoroughly consider all issues.

Not only does age 18 mean the possibility of military conscription but also the right to elect those to office who make the laws.

In looking at the Taxes, 3.4%. financial information gathered for the college's self-study, it is readily apparent that the taxpayers of the Cisco area get a very good return on their money in terms of low cost education and from the economic impact of the college on the local economy.

Because of the size of Cisco, the operation of the college is significant. The total budget for the 1979-80 year is \$3,173,714. Most of the budget is expended locally.

For example, the college employs over 100 people. The present monthly payroll is which \$128,077 amounts to \$1,536,924 annually. In addition to the monthly impact of the payroll, the college purchases equipment and supplies as well as utilizing local service personnel throughout the year. Moreover, the student population makes monetary expenditures in the community which add to the economic impact of the college.

Income percentages for the 1979-80 college budget are as follows: State Appropriations, 61.3%; Tuition and 13.6%; Fees, Federal/State money for direct student financial aid, 7%; Other Income including ticket sales, special programs, gifts and investments, 14.7%, and Local

When viewed from the perspective of the local economy, an educational institution is not a cost but an economic asset. In fact, in terms of money expended, CJC is one of the largest segments of Cisco's economy.

Partial support for the college is provided through a local tax. It is an investment well made by the local taxpayers. The investment has a 2825% return in dollars. The percentage is correct. A tax investment of \$108,500 returns \$3,173,614 or 2825%.

The Board of Regents, elected locally, is charged with the responsibility for obtaining all funds required in the operation of the institution.

Cisco Junior College and the community of Cisco are very fortunate to have had the past and present Board of Regents. In past elections, the people of Cisco have consistently elected the most responsible and far-

The above income percentages also make clear that the college is able to offer its services at a minimum cost because it is a state supported institu-

State appropriations, however, must be expended directly on instruction within specified guidelines. Consequently, the college has limited resources in managing capital immaintenance requirements which are financed by local

Since the institution's revenue provided by local taxes is small, the college operates by squeezing plant maintenance and operating expenses (8.6% of expenditures). This task is becoming more difficult because of inflated maintenance costs and higher utility

Of the forty-seven junior colleges in Texas, CJC is fortyseventh in local tax revenue received. All Texas junior colleges receive the same formula amount of money from the state (based on student enrollment and courses taken). However, in some Texas junior college districts, local taxes provide over fifty percent of the college's budget. CJC has

The costs of attending CJC depend upon the number of hours (courses) taken. The average full-time commuting student, however, can attend for approximately \$200 per semester. The average cost for students living on campus is \$755 per semester.

When this cost is placed into today's inflated economy and when compared to other educational institution's, especially private colleges and universities, Cisco Junior College offers its students education at a very low cost.

The above financial picture readily shows that the taxpayers of the Cisco area are getting a good return on their money-low cost educational services and a fantastic dollar return on a tax investment making Cisco Junior College one of the largest segments of Cisco's economy.



Area Questionnaires For 1980 Census To Be Delivered bearing the U.S.

Residents in this area will have their 1980 census questionnaires hand delivered enumerators, rather than have them come through the mail, as will be the procedure in most of the rest of the country, Bill Yarbrough, Census District Manager, said today.

Local people, hired and trained for their work, are going beginning March 11th, from door to door dropping off the questionnaries. At each household they ask for the name and telephone number; inquire if a questionnarie in Spanish or other foreign language help is needed; and remind householders that the questionnarie is to be filled out and mailed back in the enclosed postage-paid envelope on April 1, the day of the official count of the Nation's population.

"This is an entirely new census method,' the manager said, "and is being used in four other areas throughout the country. If results show that response to the census is improved, both in completely filled-out questionnaires and in timely mail-back, it could well be the method used nationwide in future U.S. censuses."

The manager asked that you watch for your enumerator. They're easy to recognize. They carry large port-folios boldly lettered 'U.S. Census--1980" against a red, white and blue background. Each wears an official identification badge
