Chief Brown Makes Statement For Mayor

H. Chief Brown, D.C., makes his formal statement as a candidate for Mayor in the upcoming April 5th city election. His statement is as follows:

My goals and objectives upon becoming the Mayor of the City of Cisco some three years ago were as follows: To serve all the Citizens, not special interest groups; to involve as many Citizens in the governmental process of our City; to gain City control over the future of Lake Cisco Park and begin restoration; to improve the quality of streets, water and sewer lines; to upgrade the quality of Police and Fire protection; to set up administrative offices out of a very chaotic period; to find and appoint an honest, highly qualified city manager; to correct the deficit spending patterns of the City's Financial condition; and put the City under sound fiscal management; to regain the public's trust in its City Government; to upgrade Battle Creek, as a reliable source of water, to supplement our water supply; to improve the City's overall image locally, regionally, throughout the State, and Nationally; and encourage new, and expansion of local industry and business.

It is my belief, that most of these have been accomplished, but let us look at the parallel achievements of our City and myself, in these past years: I personally saw that the Senior Citizens nutrition program, got off to a good start, by allowing the cooking staff to use my Sanatorium kitchen facilities, free, for over a year, without charging anything to the program. I played a personal role in the founding and establishment of Cisco's newest College. The four year Southwestern Chiropractic College will be a definite improvement and enhancement to Cisco's title as a quality educational center of Eastland County and the West Texas region. As your Mayor, I also played a role in the upgrading of the existing housing authority units for the low income citizens of our community, and the plans and present work, to complete the

new 17 units, for use by our Senior Citizens and the Disabled. Within the first six months of my term as Mayor, City, financed job opportunities for our young people was established, and continued each summer through the Youth Corp. program. The creation of the Citizens Advisory Committees was accomplished in June 1977, and these 10 subgroups have played a very important role, giving needed input to the City Council, concerning the needs and desires, of all Citizens. In 1978, the City reached an understanding with the individual, who had been leasing Lake Cisco Park. The City took over its control and destiny; and restoration work has been done every year since that time.

An achievement that all Citizens should be proud of, is the correction of the City's deficit spending patterns. The 1974-75 figures, show the general fund and water and sewer fund at -\$155,829.17. This figure only includes these two funds which are the city's main accounts and tells the true story of this city's health. By the end of 1977-78 these funds improved some \$214,149.34 to a surplus of \$58,320.17. The factors surrounding this achievement included, employee cutbacks from 44 to 30 full time; cut in monthly of expenses; the increase in water, sewer and sanitation rates; an overall increase to the tax roll of some \$1,136,397.97 valuations. Throughout this, our Senior Citizens welfare and ability to pay, has been important to me. A Senior Citizens discount on city utility bills is one of these points. The City Council, has been completely informed of the city's financial condition and our books certainly do reflect a return, to sound fiscal management beginning with 1977-78 budget. All approved city budgets have been balanced and professionally complete.

Shortly after becoming Mayor, myself, as well as appropriate Staff members, have been hard at work, relating to the public-all Cisco Citizens. It is my desire that our government be responsive to its citizens and accept the general public's input in the manner given. We will continue to seek your advice and certainly encourage attendance at all City Council meetings. A standing item on all council agendas is the

Citizens-Council discussion, which allows time, for any citizen to discuss, with the full council, problems, ideas and viewpoints on any and all subjects of concern to the individual. We are working to keep your trust in us as long as I am Mayor it will continue in that way. Battle Creek has long been a point of debate. After getting and keeping the pumps in working order, it has proven to be a valuable source of supplemental water to Lake Cisco. A total of 126,000,000 gallons was pumped during 1979 in twenty-five days. The overall Lake Cisco water level increased an approximate 12 feet and a serious water shortage condition was avoided. As Mayor, I have had the honor to represent Cisco both regionally and statewide. It is my belief that this City's public image has greatly improved through the part that I have played and also through the general improvement of the quality and professionalism of our administrative staff. As the City's representative, on the Chamber of Commerce, I have personally encouraged and become involved in the local recruitment, relocation and establishments of business and industry. I have also stressed the education of the business and residential community on programs that the city is involved with, and other opportunities available to us. The bus trip sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce for business and civic leaders to Austin for their personal briefing by Texas State departments, which are actively involved with the City, is one example. This trip was highly acclaimed by all in attendance. I have donated several hundred dollars worth of pipe and brick for use for street signs at intersections at schools and park fences and sanitary sewer manholes. During these past three years the use of chemicals was introduced at the sewer plant in order to meet Health Department requirements. It is a proven fact that we could not meet these requirements without these chemicals and the City would thus be open to a \$10,000 a day fine until the plant did meet the requirements.

If re-elected to serve another term as your Mayor, my goals and objectives for the next three years are as

follow: to codify both the city's existing ordinances and those which will be necessary in the future; to provide a mini-bus transit system for use by any citizen needing such a service, but with the needs of our Senior Citizens as the vocal point; to further provide adequate and improve both pavement and dirt streets; to enforce our existing animal control ordinances; to bring about a solution to the Lake Bernie situation; to complete plans and construct the proposed 10 inch sewer main along Front Street; to purchase and install street signs; to follow through to completion, the construction of the new sewer plant (which has been in the works since 1972); to pursue the installation of a water filtration system; to restore Lake Cisco Park and pool to full usefulness; to beautify the main entrances to, and the entire area of the City of Cisco; to solve the housing shortage; to continue sound fiscal management policies; to acquire a new landfill (which will be all used up the end of 1980); to continue to get and keep quality employees; to have Cisco designated as a Historical District (which will be a benefit and advantage to all Citizens); to complete the water system survey and follow through with its recommendations; to have a sewer system survey done; to improve street lighting; to improve the productivity of city services; to have installed and operational an improved fire and weather warning system; to continue to improve the quality of life for all Cisco citizens.

A full plan has been designed, not only to restore the entire park property to beneficial use, plans call for the reopening of the pool area. Who would have believed that in the condition the city was before April 1977 that we could totally rebuild Front Street by the end of 1979 and pay \$65,000.00 cash for the work performed! Plans even call for major work on several city pavements under the 1979-80 budget. A total of \$36,000.00 has been set aside for street maintenance and repair-\$11,000.00 from the general fund and \$25,000.00 from revenue sharing. Water system improvement has always been one of my major concerns. As a matter of fact, water system

maintenance and construction budgeted figures have improved from \$17,100.00 under the 1976-77 budget to \$35,000.00 in 1978-79 and is at \$24,000.00 this year: \$12,000.00 maintenance and \$12,000.00 on equipment and extension and construction. Another major item, being presently accomplished, is an overall water system survey by the city engineers. We will then have facts on which to base future water improvements. The 1979-80 budget year is going to see major sewer system improvements: \$10,000.00 in maintenance, but about \$110,000.00 will be invested in a new 10 inch sewer main; \$44,500 is budgeted already. This work will relieve the overcrowding and overflow of our lines at Hwy. 80 and Ave. N. Did you know that we can pay cash for this work! The heavy turnover of police personnel which plagued the city three years ago is no longer a problem. Better equipment, higher salaries, quality personnel have all been sought often and achieved, through patience and persistence both in Police and Fire Departments. This City, currently has a fine group of employees. They are stable, dedicated and motivated. Three years ago we had personnel problems and poor productivity. We have come a long way. The process of finding a permanent, professional city manager was the Council's first assignment after the April election of 1977.

volves meeting many needs; a few of those are food, shelter, clothing, emotional support, discipline, religious training and education.

Community Chest Needs Boost To Achieve Goal

The Community Chest needs a boost to send it to its goal of \$11,000. Actually, it needs a boost comparable to the force that used to send oil spouting over the top of a derrick when a gusher blew in.

Several years of failure to meet our City's goal cries loudly that something is wrong. Right now, let's do the needful! Let's try the "spinach, grits and carrot system."

My Mother was not

one to tolerate a "preferred foods list" from small fry. Food, in her opinion, was "what was good for you," and we ate it not always with relish, but without protest because she did not like complaints either.

In recalling those times when we were not bombarded with literature and advertisements about vitamins, minerals and diets, she surprisingly did serve well-balanced and nutritious meals. There were times, though, that to my young mind and sweet-tuned appetite, I felt we were unduly persecuted.

There was an era of grits and cornbread that had something to do with somebody, somewhere, who was starving. To this day, grits have no more taste appeal than the name has melody. Cornbread crumbs still choke me. Spinach reminded me of seaweed, and still does. Carrots were supposed to make straight hair curly, but didn't, and I had to eat them anyway. Apples set my teeth on edge, but I crunched through the "apple-a-day" era, and then there was a time of milk with lumps of yeast. The supposed benefits I

can't recall, but the taste I can't forget.

And so developed the "system." Dispose of the unpalatable first and as quickly as possible. Chew, gulp or open wide and swallow. Then relax and proceed with the "goodies."

GORDON SPOT

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the many people who helped and supported the recent Eastland County Livestock Show. It takes a lot of work and financial support for the show and sale. The show was larger than in several years. We heard people say the quality of the animals was improved this year, especially the market lambs and market hogs.

The coverage of the news media was appreciated, also. Low temperatures reported on Sunday morning, March 2 set new records in many parts of Texas. Unfortunately, several varieties of fruit trees were just beginning to grow and were sensitive to these freezing temperatures. Another freeze on March 18 may have caused additional damage. There were some

reports in Eastland County of temperatures as low as 24 degrees. It is still too early to estimate the damage, but we are optimistic about the 1980 season since only 10 percent of the flowers are needed to set a full crop.

It takes several days of warm weather after a freeze to determine the damage. The injured buds grow slowly. Buds which appear to "hold" or develop slowly are probably injured. Even flower buds which develop normally may have been destroyed. Open the flower with a sharp razor blade or knife. The ovary and style are the first to develop a brown or dark color if killed. A dead ovary means no fruit.

It is important to maintain the preventive spray program on all mature trees. Disease and insects can cripple any tree's bearing potential for years. And remember, if only 10 percent of the blooms get by the freeze, that is enough for a full crop.

Soil temperature is more important than you think when it comes to planting vegetables.

More important than the moon signs are more predictable than weather is another variable which drastically affects how seeds and transplants grow -- soil temperature. Soil temperature is a factor which few of us consider important enough to

check before planting yet it is probably the most important factor affecting seed germination and plant growth.

Soil temperatures at which vegetables seed will grow are classified into three categories -- the minimum temperature required for seed growth, an optimum temperature and a "realistic" soil temperature. The realistic soil temperature is that temperature somewhere between optimum and minimum at which gardeners should plant to insure maximum success.

For instance, the optimum soil temperature for seed germination of vegetable crops such as cucumber (64), canteloupe (68), okra (73), pumpkin (75), squash (79), and watermelon (72).

The realistic soil temperature recommended for the following crops are: beans (72), beets (45), cabbage (54), chard (54), eggplant (75), pepper (64), radish (45), tomato (55), turnip (50), and corn (55).

Homemaking Tips

With gardening season just beginning, many families are planning on "growing their own groceries" this summer to help lower their family's food budget.

One of the earliest methods of food preservation was drying of fruits and vegetables. With the rising cost of food and energy, many homemakers are home drying and this method of food preservation is returning as a popular method. Dried foods also have the added advantage of conserving storage space.

If you are thinking about buying a food dehydrator, you might want to consider these points before buying. Food dehydrators range in cost from \$19.95 to several hundred dollars. Before buying an expensive piece of equipment it is recommended that you try conventional oven drying first to see if your families like the taste of the dried foods. Be sure and consider the frequency of use in comparison to the

cost of special drying equipment. Read the use and care instructions with several food dehydrator models to compare drying times and cost of operation.

The Extension Service office has a free bulletin MP-1209 entitled **Drying Foods At Home**. This publication tells how to prepare vegetables and how to prepare and pre-treat fruits for drying. Then, it tells you how to dry them whether you are using your own kitchen oven, a portable vegetable dehydrator, or in the sun. This publication also gives the directions for building a natural-draft vegetable dehydrator and an electric food dehydrator.

If you have never dried foods, there is no problem. Begin with fruits, onions, green pepper, and herbs. These foods can be oven dried - often immediately after the oven has been used for baking.

One of the joys of dried

foods is convenience. Their storage requires little space and it is simple to reach for the container on the shelf when 2 spoonfuls of chopped onion or green pepper is needed for a casserole. Another important feature of dried foods is that they are safe to use. They retain their quality for many months.

The high caloric and nutritive values of dried fruits may be best understood if you realize that it takes 5-1/2 pounds of fresh apricots to yield one pound when dried. Eighteen medium size apples weighing about 6 pounds dried out to about one pound...so dried fruits go a long way.

Drying foods was, in the olden days, and still remains, a good way to preserve surplus food when the freezer is crowded -- or when canning jars are full -- or if this method just appeals to you.

BEEF JERKY
1-1/2 pounds flank steak
1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt
1/3 teaspoon pepper
1/4 cup soy sauce
2 tablespoons liquid smoke (optional)
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon monosodium glutamate
1/3 teaspoon garlic powder
Trim off fat. Semi-freeze meat and slice with the grain, making strips approximately 2 inches long and 1/2 inch thick. Place meat in shallow baking dish. Combine all other ingredients and pour over meat. Marinate overnight.

Preheat oven to 140 - 150 degrees F. Lay strips of marinated meat in single layer on oven rack with a baking sheet or foil underneath to catch drippings. Leave oven door open a crack and bake 8 to 12 hours, or until meat is chewy.

We were visited by the Bill Glass Evangelistic Crusade. This is not your run of the mill group of preachers.

Bill Glass, who is the head of this unusual troupe, is a famous Pro football great for the Cleveland Browns. Since retiring from Pro-football he has dedicated his life to bringing the gospel to prisons and institutions.

They moved a flatbed trailer into one corner of our prison yard. This was the stage where we witnessed some very unusual performances.

We had the shows Friday afternoon, three shows Saturday,

and one show Sunday morning. In addition to the great performers on stage there were fifty two counselors mixed in with the crowd. These counselors came from all over the country at their own expense to help with this crusade. During, before and after every performance they moved through the crowd offering to talk and help in any way they could. I spoke to most of these counselors at one time or another and found them all to be a very sincere and dedicated group. But the most unusual part of this crusade were the performances upon the flatbed trailer.

We saw a magician who kept us in stitches with his funny slight of hand. A former Mr. America gave us an exhibition on his physique and then answered questions on body building and weightlifting. Another show was a musical team, a singer and an organist who made some very beautiful music for us.

One of the best received shows was by an expert on Kung Foo who chopped a watermelon in half on an inmate's belly with a sword, without cutting the inmate, I might add. A world champion power lifter lifted almost seven hundred pounds of weights at one time. A former pro-basketball player challenged anybody in our prison to a game of one on one. We brought out our best man but he didn't have a chance. He beat our man soundly in a very humorous manner, then answered questions on basketball.

Hardly a man in our unit missed the appearance of Earl Campbell of the Houston Oilers. He answered questions about football and told us a little about his private life. There were many wonderful and exciting things that went on in this crusade. I can't begin to tell them all here now. But the bottom line was all these men were Christians. They came here to tell us they loved us and Christ loved us. They were a very inspiring group. And myself as well as many of my fellow inmates are very glad to have met them.

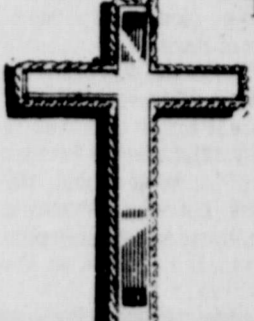
