## State Taxing Law Discussed For Lions

All property tax appraisal work in Eastland County was taken over by a new seven-man county-wide board last January 1 in compliance with new state tax regulations, Steve Thomas, Cisco Independent School District tax collector, told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk at their weekly luncheon last Wednesday noon.

The new board, which was chosen last year by vote of 13 of the 19 county taxing units, is composed of Bill Hoffman, Jr., of Eastland, chairman; Volney Day of Olden, Arlin Bint of Cisco, Jimmy Hughes of Carbon, Emmett Rich of Cisco, Dr. Bill Auvenshine of Ranger and Jack Holland of Rising Star.

The board works from a central appraisal office in Eastland, and a re-appraisal of all taxable property in the county is due to be completed in 18 months, Mr. Thomas said. Property values will be determined in accordance with a formula adopted for the state under the new law.

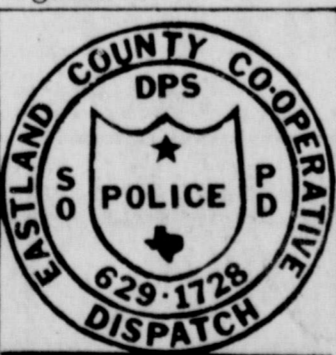
Mr. Thomas said the board is expected to employ some agency to handle the reevaluation of county taxable property in the near future.

The new tax legislation raised the homestead exemption and defined the area that a rural homestead can occupy to two acres. Renditions must be signed between Jan. 1 and April 1 each year. Senior citizens get an added appraisal break under the new laws.

The county tax board will create a three-member equalization board to begin work on a county-wide basis next year, Mr. Thomas said. Tax collections will continue to be handled as in the past.

Mr. Thomas said the new law's purpose was to equalize tax values on a state-wide basis.

Cisco High School Home and Family Living classes, taught by Mrs. Janis Lister, had the experience of becoming imaginary parents for two days. Each student was given an egg to which they gave a name and a unique personality. Each student was required to keep up with the egg and treat it as their very own baby. The baby was to go everywhere the parent went unless left with a qualified babysitter.

Some of the babies were kidnapped from the lockers and held for ransom. Others were left in glove compartments of vehicles, at home and other unknown places. The babies were returned to class after the two day experiment. Four students adopted substitute babies after tragic accidents and one baby never made it back to class. A majority of the students said they were definitely not ready to become parents. This feeling was expressed by comments such as "the baby got in my way, it was too hard to keep up with, it was a hassle, it was embarrassing to take the baby everywhere, it cried all the time, it wouldn't eat and the cost of babysitting was too high."

More than 60,000 Shriners from the 13 Shrine Temples in Texas will be involved in the day's activities, an annual event for raising funds in behalf of the state's three

Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children.

To assist the Shriners in the fund-raising efforts March 29, participating members of the Texas Dairy Queen Trade Association will donate their entire day's net profits to the benefit of the youngsters who received free treatment at the Burns Institute of the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children in Galveston.

The Texas Dairy Queen Trade Association is the first organization outside of the Shrine itself to become identified with the raising of funds for the state's three Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children on

## Public Invited To SKYWARN Training Session Thursday

If winter weather passes, can Spring and its West Texas assortment of surprises be far behind?

In preparation for the season and as a public service, the Eastland County Citizens Band Radio Club in cooperation with the U.S. Weather Bureau will present the important SKYWARN training program here on Thursday, April 3.

Site will be at Camp Inspiration on the west edge of Eastland and citizens from throughout the county are invited and urged to attend. Training will be professional weather-watchers who will teach citizens what to look for and report in severe weather periods.

There is no charge, and Club President Fred Pevehouse emphasized that a well-trained group of citizens from throughout the county will be able to assist and provide weather observation during the coming spring season when threat of tornadoes, high winds and hail are most likely to occur.

The club issued the following:

**TORNADO SAFETY RULES**  
When a tornado approaches, your immediate action may mean life or death.

Seek inside shelter, preferably in a tornado cellar, underground excavation, or a steel-framed or reinforced concrete building of substantial construction. Stay away from windows!

**In cities or towns--**  
**In office buildings--**Go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor, or to the designated shelter area.

**In factories--**Workers should move quickly to the section of the plant offering the great protection in accordance with advance plans.

**In shopping centers--**Go to a designated shelter area, not to your parked car.

**In homes--**The basement offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under sturdy furniture if possible. In homes without basements, take cover in the center part of the house, on the lowest floor, in a small room such as a closet or bathroom, or

under sturdy furniture. Keep some windows open, but stay away from them!

**Mobile Homes--**Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to destructive winds. Proper tie-downs to prevent overturning will minimize damage. A warden should be appointed in mobile-home parks to scan the skies and listen to radio and television for warnings. There should be a designated community shelter where residents can assemble during a tornado warning. If there is no such shelter, do not stay in a mobile home during a tornado warning.

Seek refuge in a sturdy building or a ditch, culvert, or ravine.

**In Schools--**Whenever possible, follow advance plans to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums or other structures with wide freestanding roofs. If a building is not of reinforced construction, go quickly to a nearby reinforced building, or a ravine or open ditch and lie flat.

**In Open country--**If there is no time to find suitable shelter, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

**Keep listening--**Your radio and television stations will broadcast the latest National Weather Service tornado watches and warning and inform you when the danger is over.

**Watch the sky--**Tornadoes come and go so quickly there may not be time for a warning. During a tornado watch, be alert for sudden appearance of violent wind, rain, hail, or funnel-shaped cloud. When in doubt, take cover. Tornadoes are often obscured by rain or dust. Some occur at night.

**Remember--**A tornado watch means tornadoes are expected to develop. A tornado warning means a tornado has actually been spotted. Persons close to the storm should take cover immediately. Those farther away should take cover if threatening conditions approach.

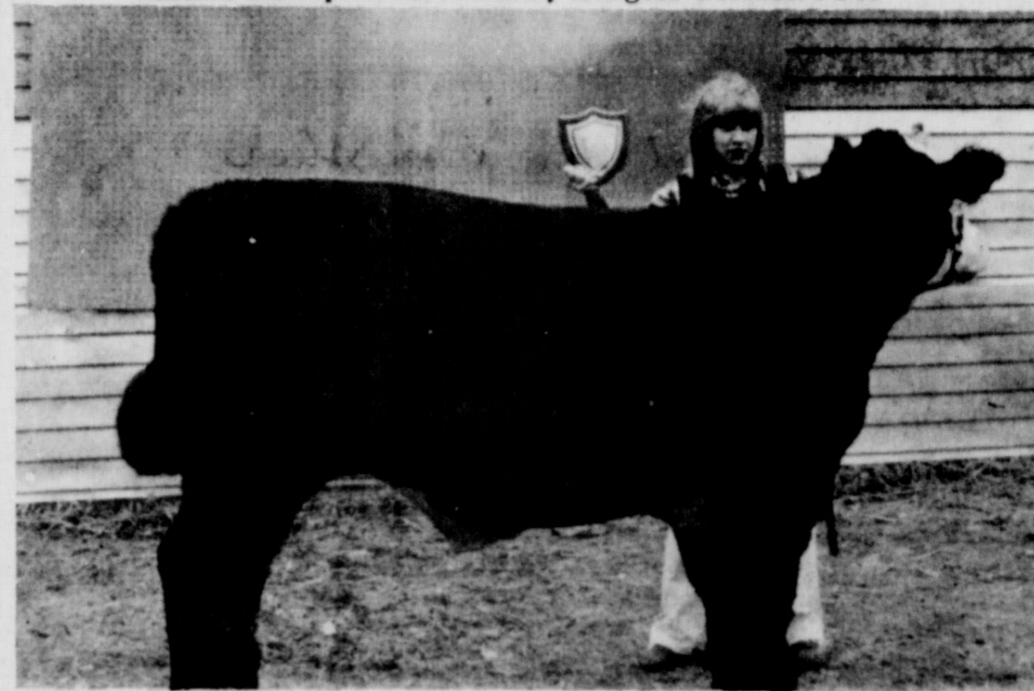

# Church Of Jesus Christ Of Latter-Day Saints

In all of American history there is no story more astonishing than the rise of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, and the settling of its people in the territory of Utah. This Church, known more familiarly as "Mormon", now has 4 million members in the world, with converts joining at an increasing rate. Each week the Church erects

about ten new Chapels in the world. The World Headquarters is located in Salt Lake City, Utah, with Spencer W. Kimball as President and Prophet. President Kimball, like other Prophets called to head the Church, will serve in this capacity for the rest of his life.

There were few Mormons in the Eastland County area until around 1950, when a

Sunday School was begun in Gorman. At various times the scattered members have gone to Abilene, Eastland, and Graham. In 1976 the Eastland and Stephens County "Branch" began renting the Woman's Club in Eastland for a place to worship. Some time later the local Church group, consisting of around 75 members, began worshipping in the Kendrick Amphitheatre, between Eastland and Cisco. Norman Rawson of Cisco, the Branch President, leads out in worship services.

Soon Eastland County will have its first Mormon Chapel. It will be located on a three acre plot on the southwest side of Eastland, in the Collins Addition. The total plans for this building call for four phases of development. The first, consisting mainly of a large meeting room with a Cultural Hall directly behind it, is expected to cost \$300,000 and be completed in seven months. This is already paid for, being financed by 30 per cent from local funds and 70 per cent from the World Church. The Cultural Hall will include a gymnasium, stage, and kitchen for socializing activities.

Each Sunday morning at the Kendrick auditorium the first meeting of the Church begins at 9:00 a.m. Women and children go to the Relief Society meetings, and men attend the Priesthood meetings. At 10:00 a.m. there is Sunday School, and at 11:00 a.m. the group meets together for a worship service consisting of the Sacrament (Communion) and a sermon from President Rawson or one of the laymen. The King James Bible is used in the services, as well as other Scriptures the Church considers of equal revelation: the Book of Mormon, the Pearl of Great Price, and Doctrines and Covenants.

There is no paid Clergy in the Mormon Church. Each man who obeys the Gospel and is obedient to laws of the Church is ordained (as early as age 12) to the Priesthood. Women do not hold the Priesthood, but serve the Church in many other ways, such as teachers and missionaries.

Worthy persons are chosen to serve as missionaries, and go into many parts of the world. For years these volun-

teer missionaries were young men - now young women are serving in increasing numbers. At the present time two young women, Sister Jefferson (from Elko, Nevada) and Sister Dennis (from San Francisco, California) are missionaries for the Church in Eastland and Stephens Counties.

A person may join the Mormon Church by studying and accepting Church history and beliefs with the Church Missionaries, repenting of sin, and being baptized by immersion. After that two Priestholders participate in the "laying on of hands" of the new member, in which he is "given the gift of the Holy Ghost".

Two basic beliefs which distinguish the Latter Day Saints from other Church is being able to accept that there is a living Prophet on the earth today, and accepting that the Mormon Scripture is equally sacred with the Bible. The Church regards the family as a basic unit of society - a family centered around a male member who holds the power of the Priesthood. But it is the belief in the miracle of continuing revelation which actually sets Mormon apart.

In the Mormon Church the designation of "Chapel" belongs to buildings used for weekly worship, and the term "Temple" denotes an edifice of great sacredness, such as the large Temple in Salt Lake City. (There are thirty seven Temples around the world, with one planned in the future for Texas.) The Temple is a place for sacred ceremonies, such as baptism for the dead, or the sealing of marriages for eternity. It is a place where the direct presence of God is believed to be manifested to the Church President - where he receives counsel from the Lord for "The Church Restored". He then reveals this counsel to followers of the faith.

Only members in good standing in the Church are allowed to enter a Temple, because of its sacredness.

The Mormon Church in America began with a young farmer named Joseph Smith, who lived in upstate New York in the early 1800's. Various Christian ministers were holding revivals near his home, and he wondered which was giving the correct message from the Bible. In his first vision, in 1820, two personages appeared who identified themselves as God and Christ, and stated to young Smith that none of the Ministers were giving the true message. In Joseph Smith's second vision, a resurrected Being named Moroni was said to have appeared, stating that God had a special work for Joseph Smith to do, and he would be both loved and hated among all nations. Moroni described a book composed of gold plates, containing the Gospel as delivered by Christ to the ancient inhabitants of America. Directions were given for finding the book, and a key to its translation was deposited with it.

Mormons believe that Joseph Smith located the book on a hill called Cumorah, and after a time of probation it was delivered to him in Sept. 1827. Soon it became unsafe for him to live in his home area, due to rumors about the treasure. So he moved to Pennsylvania, near his wife's family, where much of the work of translation was done. The story from the plates, as depicted by Joseph Smith and two assistants, concerned a Jewish man named Lehi, who left Jerusalem with his family about 600 B.C. He built a ship, and sailed to America. Two nations came from this migration - a God-fearing group called Nephites, and a quarrelsome group called the Lamanites.

Christ was said to have visited among these people following his ascension, setting up a Church among them, and ordaining its leadership. These people lived in peace for generations. But the nation grew prosperous and wicked, regardless of the warnings of the Prophets. Among these was Mormon, who kept an account and compiled it on the gold plates. This he had given to his son Moroni, who survived the destruction of the Nephite nation at the hands of the Lamanites.

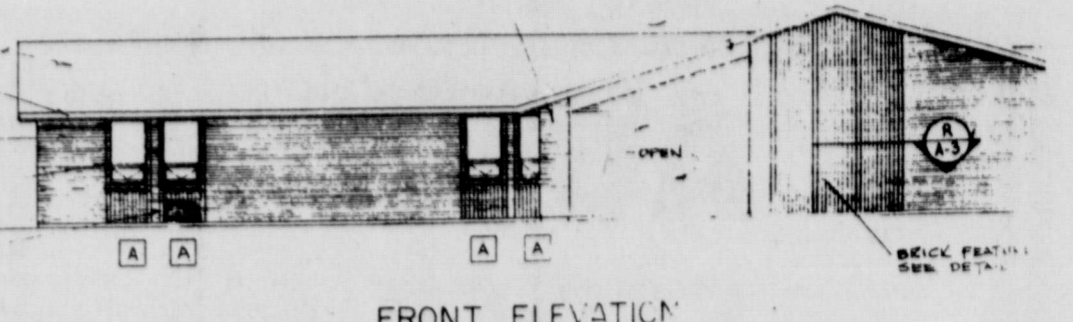
During and after the translation visions were reported by Joseph Smith and others connected with the work. After translation the Gold Plates were reported as having been carried away from

the earth by an Angel, and they were never seen again. In one vision Beings identified as Peter, James, and John appeared to Joseph Smith and two other leaders of the work, conferring upon them the highest powers of the Melchizedek Priesthood. From that time the men believed they had special power to act in God's name, and take the message to the world. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints was organized in April, 1830. There were six members, and Joseph Smith designated as "Seer, Apostle, and Prophet".

The translated volume called "The Book of Mormon", for the Prophet-Leader Mormon named as its principal Editor, was first published in 1830. The majority of early converts joined the Church after reading this book. It has since been translated in 24 languages, and has affected the lives of millions of people.

As the early Mormons moved to the frontier and attempted to win converts among Indians as well as Anglo-Americans (believing Indians to be remnants of the Israelites) Joseph Smith decided that opposition was so heavy that the destiny of the Church lay in the west. He moved most of his work into Ohio and Missouri, and the years which followed were important but extremely tragic.

During this time most doctrinal standards which have since regulated the Church were revealed. Among these were: the principal of tithing, baptism at age 8 rather than infancy, obedience to Civil Law, observance of Sunday as a day of worship, mutual cooperation, the health message (including abstinence

from alcohol, coffee, tea, and dangerous drugs) and a carefully regulated polygamy. Joseph Smith also depicted a broad view of life and eternity in which human beings were "spirit children" of God, and had inhabited a pre-mortal spirit world with Him before being born on earth. Life on earth was a stage in spiritual progression, during which all should prepare for life hereafter. There were various Kingdoms and degrees of glory in the afterlife.

Since many people in the spirit world had had no opportunity for baptism while on this earth, baptism for the dead became an important work for the Church.

Mormons believed their "American Scriptures" to be in harmony with the King James Bible, but many of the frontier people disagreed. Probably polygamy - although evidently never as widespread as the Mormons were accused of - became the focus of the most anger and violence. The Mormons found themselves the center of difficulty, particularly in Missouri.

After they constructed a beautiful city, called Nauvoo, desperate times fell on them. Joseph Smith was accused of treason, and jailed. He was killed before he could come to trial. The Mormon people were scattered, and their property destroyed or seized.

Brigham Young, one of the twelve Apostles under Smith became the Leader. He has since been called "The Modern Moses", by the Church, for he undertook an epic journey in which thousands of people settled in a virtually unknown part of the west. Utah Territory became "The gathering place" for those of Mormon faith everywhere. As the area became self-supporting and prosperous, missionaries and Mormon settlers fanned out into much of the Inter-mountain valleys of the west.

The thorny question of separation of Church and state still haunted the Mormons occasionally. Most of this was resolved when, "after earnest prayer before the Lord" President Willford Woodruff issued, on Oct. 1890, what is known in Church history as "the Manifesto". It declared an end to the practice of plural marriage. Since that time polygamy has not been tolerated by the Church.

In 1893 the great Temple in Salt Lake City was completed. In 1896 Utah was admitted to the Union as a state. In 1947 Utah marked its Centennial with a great celebration, honoring the Mormon pioneers who built a Commonwealth in the desert.

In recent years the Mormon Church has moved into a new era, with the Prophet at the World Headquarters speaking on topics of modern concern. Needy people should be assisted, but all able-bodied people should be required to work. Artificial means of birth control should not be practiced, unless the health of the Mother will not permit her to bear children.

Each family should set aside a two-year supply of non-perishable food in case of emergency. Worthy black men can hold the Priesthood in the Church. And, for some time now, opposition to the Equal Rights Amendment has been strongly stated by the Church. "The issue is moral, with many disturbing ramifications for women for the family..."

But people who are acquainted with Mormons know that the Church consists of more than buildings, moral issues and Books. The Church consists of people - unpretentious, devout people who look for the return of Christ. And, by outsiders, Mormons are sometimes regarded as people with an almost dual nature - visionary in affairs of religion - practical in everyday things.

registered and began the  
walk which covered 22 miles.

I would like to thank all the  
people who made pledges  
and donations to the March  
of Dimes.

I want everybody to know  
that there is a real feeling of  
charity when we give our  
hard earned money, but  
there is an even greater feel-  
ing when we give of  
ourselves.

I want to try to give an ac-  
count of the walk on a first-  
hand basis.

I was one of the walkers.  
It really began days ago  
when each walker called or  
visited as many people as  
they could for pledges. Peo-  
ple pledged by the mile.  
However many miles the  
walker went, is how many  
miles the donor paid for.

On Saturday morning all  
the walkers registered at  
RJC Library. At 8:00 a.m.  
the walk began.

We walked down the alley  
beside the library, past the  
airport and over the over-  
pass on the Interstate onto a  
dirt road.

We all started out as one  
big group. By the time we  
had gone one mile we had  
three or four separate  
groups about 1/8 mile apart.  
I was part of the middle  
group most of the way. My  
sister and nephew walked  
with me.

The check stands were to  
be two miles apart, but for  
some reason we got the first  
two miles before the check  
point did, so we walked four  
miles before we got to the  
first check point. By that  
time we felt like we had gone  
at least six or seven miles.

At the first car before the  
check point we were given  
ice water and bubble gum.  
At check point 2 they gave us  
ice water and a lollipop.  
There we had our maps signed  
and moved on.

Some of us were beginning  
to slow down by then, but we  
walked on.

Six miles down the road, at  
check point 3, we were really  
tiring. I had one blister on  
my left foot and another for-

ming. (I'm a tenderfoot.)

We stopped and ate 1/4  
orange and had our maps  
marked. Some of the  
walkers sat down a few  
minutes but we went on.

By mile seven I began to  
wonder what I was doing in  
this mess. I had two blisters  
on my left foot and one was  
coming up on my right foot.  
Slowly but surely, we made  
it to the eighth mile and  
checkpoint 4.

The nice girls there gave  
us a cup of orange juice. It  
sure tasted good to my poor  
dry mouth.

We never knew exactly  
how far we still had to go  
because there were no  
markers. We only knew ap-  
proximately how far be-  
cause the check points  
were supposed to be two  
miles apart.

We kept telling each other  
"the next check point is just  
ahead. Let's try to make it to  
it." We forced ourselves to  
go on.

By then my feet were  
blistered all over, my back  
was aching horribly, and the  
wind was trying to blow us  
back where we came from.

A ten mile walk is bad

enough, but when you walk  
against 20-30 mile an hour  
wind it is double trouble.

We finally made it to the  
last check point, but we still  
had about 1 1/2 miles to go to  
get to the Lone Cedar Coun-  
try Club, the turnaround  
point.

At this place we got a cup  
of water. We went about fifty  
yards down the road and sat  
down on a culvert. It was the  
first time we had sat down  
since we left the college.

About three minutes later,  
we trudged on. Just as we  
turned onto the Country Club  
road we met some of the  
more energetic people on  
their way back to the col-  
lege.

We felt like we almost had  
it made when we turned onto  
that road. We walked about a  
half mile, and we just knew  
it was right around the cor-  
ner. We turned the corner  
and, guess what!

We walked some more and  
finally we saw the Country  
Club and the lake. Then we  
knew we had half of the trip  
licked anyway.

When we finally reached  
the club, those beautiful.

sweet ladies were there with  
hot dogs, potato chips,  
cookies, and cold drinks.  
Everybody reinforced  
themselves for the 11 mile  
walk back to the college.

Unfortunately, I was one  
of the older walkers who  
hadn't had much exercise  
before this, so I decided I'd  
better ride back to the col-  
lege on one of the "poop  
wagons."

So read the above account  
and double or triple it and  
you can see how the few who  
walked back felt. There were  
a few who walked the entire  
22 miles.

I'm proud of the eleven  
miles I walked, but I am  
doubly proud of the  
courageous people who  
walked back. They are all  
probably still nursing bruised  
feet, sunburn, blisters,  
and aches and pains, but  
they have the wonderful feel-  
ing of knowing that they are  
able to use their feet to raise  
money for the many children  
who cannot walk at this  
time.

Next year maybe more of  
you might consider joining  
this walk for the March of  
Dimes.

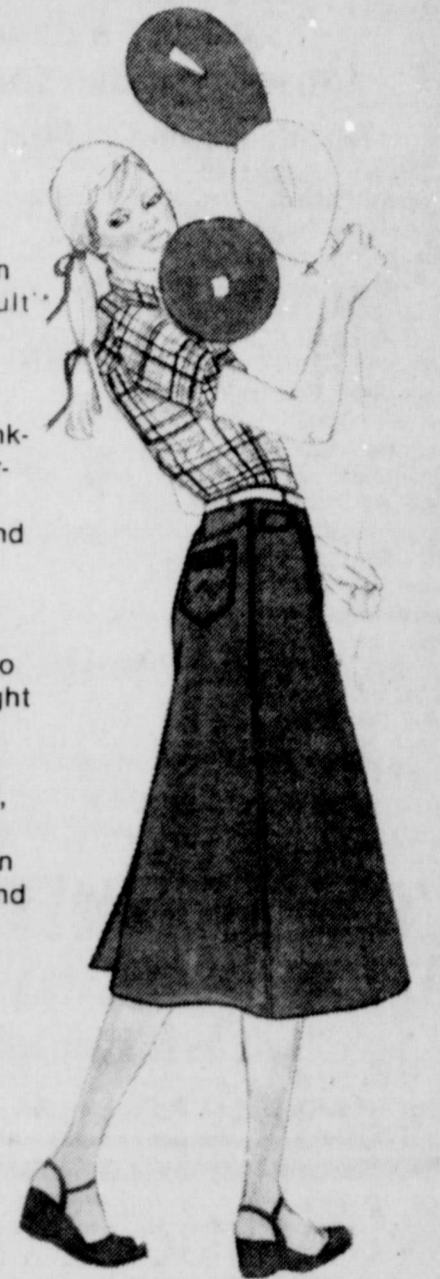

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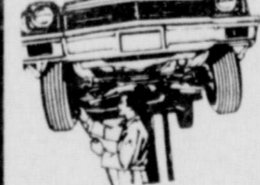

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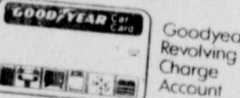

# Boy Scouts Of America Provides Educational Program

For 70 years the Boy Scouts of America has provided a unique educational program for the youth of our nation. The Boy Scouts of America currently serves over 4,000,000 members. The program has been made possible by the millions of Americans who have, through the years, devoted their time and energy to help young people grow toward responsible leadership.

The movement was begun in England by Lord Baden-Powell, a British Army General who became immensely popular for his heroism in the Boer War, (1898-1900). His book, *Aids to Scouting*, was very popular among English boys. Inspired by the great interest in the book, he wrote a handbook, *Scouting for Boys*, which included advice on camping and hiking as well as pictures of a special uniform to wear and badges to earn. It also presented a code of honor, charging the boys to help other people at all

times and to "Do A Good Turn Daily." The movement gained such popularity that Baden-Powell resigned from the Army to devote all his time to Scouting.

The "Good Turn" brought Scouting to the attention of Chicago publisher William D. Boyce, who became lost in a heavy fog in London. He was aided by a boy who refused to take a tip for his services. Learning that the boy was a Scout whose code of honor didn't allow him to take money for doing a good turn, Boyce arranged a meeting with Baden-Powell. So impressed was he with what he learned of the movement that he and a group of other Americans interested in the welfare of boys incorporated the Boy Scouts of America on February 8, 1910, in Washington, D.C. This date has been observed since then as the birthday of the Boy Scouts of America.

Among Scouting's early leaders were two naturalists, Daniel Carter Beard and Ernest Thompson Seton, whose writings and illustrations helped bring the romance of the wilderness, the essence of real scouting, to the early movement. James E. West, a Washington lawyer who became the first Chief Scout Executive, laid the foundation which has been the basis of the organization.

In 1916 the Boy Scouts of America was chartered by Congress to assist community organizations that

chose to adopt Scouting as part of their youth programs. Two kinds of charters are issued by the Boy Scouts of America; one for community organizations and the other for local Boy Scouts of America councils. The first charter enables community groups to use the Scouting program under their own leadership as a service to their youth and families. The other empowers local councils to help chartered organizations effectively use the Scouting program by providing support through such areas as leadership training, outdoor facilities, program material and literature, and other program aids.

Cub Scouting is a family and home-centered program for boys age 7-10 years. They can become Webelos Scouts at age 10 and prepare to become Boy Scouts.

Boy Scouting is a program for boys ages

11 through 17 years, and is designed to achieve Scouting's objectives through a vigorous outdoor program and peer group leadership.

For young men and women ages 14 through 20, Exploring provides realistic opportunities to explore adult roles and vocational opportunities. Explorer posts work in association with business and community groups.

Volunteer adult leaders serve at all levels of Scouting in 416 local councils, 31 areas, six regions, and nationally with a volunteer executive board and committees providing guidance. Mr. Downing B. Jenks, a St. Louis corporate leader, is serving his third term as national president. Mr. J.L. Tarr, Chief Scout Executive, administers the organization and its professional staff from the new national office in the Dallas/Fort Worth area.

# Property Owners Urged To Render All Property

All property owners within the Cisco ISD are urged to be sure that they have rendered both their real and personal property by April 1, 1980. Property that is not rendered by that date is placed upon an unrendered roll and has a value assessed it by the tax assessor. If you have a new home or business you should be sure to have it rendered by the deadline. If you have a question as to whether a certain type of property is to be rendered please check with the tax office. Due to recent changes in the tax laws some property has been removed from the types of taxable property.

Property owners within the school district are also eligible for several types of exemptions. If you are a homeowner, regardless of age, you are eligible for a \$5,000 exemption if the home was your residential homestead on January 1, 1980. In addition, those homeowners who are over 65 years of age are also eligible for an additional \$10,000 exemption. Homeowners who meet the Social Security disability requirements are also eligible for the \$10,000 exemption regardless of their age. However, if you are over 65 and disabled, only one of the exemptions can be received.

All veterans who wish to receive their disability exemption for 1980 are also reminded that a copy of their letter from the

Veterans Administration must be on file with the tax office.

Property owners whose land is in agriculture use for 1980 and has been for 5 of the last 7 years should inquire about the benefits of filing for an open space land exemption for 1980. This is an exemption based upon an agriculture use value rather than a fair market value.

The deadline for exemptions and renditions is April 1st, 1980. Please have them signed and returned by that date.

said Board of Trustees. That said election shall be held at the following places in said district and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

1. For Election Precincts No. 4 of Eastland County, Texas, at Corral Room-College Annex Building Cisco, Texas, within said School District with Doug Fry as Presiding Judge and — as Alternate Presiding Judge and said Presiding Judge shall appoint the necessary clerks to assist him, which shall not exceed 8 clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 7 o'clock a.m. to 7 o'clock p.m.

Steve Thomas is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Jill Hollywood is hereby appointed Deputy Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at School Tax Office, 610 Avenue D, Cisco, Texas, within the boundaries of the above named district and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least 8 hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place of absentee voting is also the absentee clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail may be sent.

Any resident qualified elector of the district may have his or her name placed as a candidate on the official ballot for any of the positions to be filled at said above mentioned election by filing with the secretary of the board a signed written application not less than 30 nor more than 60 days prior to the date of the election and said application must state the number of the position for which he or she is a candidate or the name of the incumbent member of the board holding the position for which he or she desires to run.
