Lone Star Gas Asks For **Rate Increase In Putnam**

(Cisco, April 2, 1980) Lone Star Gas Company's local manager, Wayne West, today filed an application for a gas service rate increase which would raise residential customers' bills in the city of Putnam about \$6.84 per month during the summer and \$8.84 per month in the winter.

The figures are based on typical residential usage of 8,000 cubic feet. Under the present rate, the average bill for that amount would be \$33.42.

West said the company needs \$4,079.00 of additional revenues to meet its costs of operation and to earn an adequate return on the company's rate base in the city of Putnam. For the twelve months ended June 30, 1979, based on actual revenues and expenses, Lone Star had

*********** PUBLIC HEARING FOR SENIOR CITIZENS PRO-**GRAMS SET FOR APRIL**

16, 1980 A public hearing to gather facts for planning Senior Citizens services will be held at 10:45 a.m. on April 16, 1980, at the Senior Center in Cisco.

The hearing, conducted by West Central Texas Council of Governments Area Agency on Aging, will be one of 19 held throughout the West Central Texas Council of Governments region. It will be open to all residents of Eastland County, but will be directed primarily at persons age 60 or over.

Included in the hearing will be discussion about operation of Senior Citizens services under the Older Americans Act. National, State and local priorities will be reviewed with opportunity for input from the audience.

The bulk of the hearing will be spent getting information from those present about the needs of older persons. This information will be used by the Area Agency on Aging in preparing its **Regional Aging Services** Plan for the period beginning October 1, 1980.

Results of this Public Hearing will directly influence the future of Senior Citizens Programs in this County as well as in the West Central Texas Council of Governments region.

a net operating income of \$826.00. West said rising costs are the reason why the company's earnings are deficient.

The largest single cost of the utility's operations throughout its pipeline network to 533 cities and towns in Texas is the cost of purchased natural gas.

Summer rates for Lone Star customers will be in effect for consumption between meter reading dates in May and October. They are designed to reduce the customer's cost approximately 25 cents per thou-

sand cubic feet of gas used during that period. "Lone Star has long been dedicated to giving its customers the best possible service at reasonable cost. To maintain this commitment, Lone Star must be permitted to earn a reasonable rate on its investment in Putnam. Lacking this, we and our customers suffer twice. First, we could ultimately be unable to maintain or expand our facilities in this area in response to customer needs. Second, those who depend upon us for natural gas

service could experience year-round curtailments were Lone Star no longer able to compete successfully for important new reserves of natural gas," West

observed. West added that, despite recent cost increases to customers, natural gas is still, by comparison, the most economical energy used in the home today.

There are two vacancies for anyone wishing to make the trip, Mr. Jones said. This was due to two cancellations.





Two Countians On SWTSU Honor Rolls

Two Eastland County residents were among the 3,497 students whose fall semester grades earned them places on the Southwest Texas State University at San Marcos Dean's Honor Roll and Superior Honor Roll lists. Bill C. Collins of 301 Park in Cisco was listed on the regular honor roll. Lacey L. Gourley of 601 Marsh in Eastland was listed on the Superior Honor Roll.

To make the regular Honor Roll, a student must be enrolled for a minimum of 12 semester hours of coursework, excluding physical education activities, and achieve an overall "B" average.

Making the Superior Honor Roll requires grades of "A" in at least 12 of the required 15 semester hours of coursework, excluding physical education activities, and no lower than a "B" in the other three-hour course. This translates into a 3.8 grade point average or better on a 4.0 scale.

Undergraduate courses only are considered in the tabulated list.

Incomplete, or "I", grades earned during the fall semester disqualifies students from the Honor Rolls.






Services for Simmons are pending with Edwards Funeral Home in Palmetto, Fla. He





Congressman **Jim Collins** to Visit Eastland

United States Representative Jim Collins of Dallas will be in Eastland, Tex. April 10, 1980. He will meet with interested area citizens at a coffee at the home of Virginia Russell, given by the Eastland County Republican Women at 3:00 p.m.-4 p.m. There will be a question and answer period

In a speech to his colleagues, Rep. Jim Collins of Texas said that Congress may lack the votes to make major sacrifices in the federal budget.

"There are three bones. Here in Congress we have lot of jawbone because congressmen enjoy talking. We also have a lot of wishbone because we are idealistic and optimistic dreamers. But on the backbone for tough votes, Congress is mighty short," Collins said.

Collins said his colleagues in Congress are "nice guys. They are friendly and likeable." But he noted that Congress must now cast unpopular votes for "sacrifice and austerity that we need for a stuable economy."

According to Collins, Congress needs to cut \$50 billion from the federal budget to bring the 18% inflation rate under control. "We must that the budget

dent Carter took office. Now Carter submits a \$616 billion budget. If we cut \$50 billion from his proposal, the federal budget would be \$566 billion--that is still \$200 billion more than when he took office three years ago."

The Texas congressman said that he would vote for most of the cuts except in the areas of National Defense and in Social Security, on which most of the elderly in America are dependent. 'The responsibility for a balanced budget is with Congress. It is essential for America's future that we end this 18; inflation. The only answer is to have less jawboning, less wishboning and more backbone.

A pasture short course for adult farmers will be held

April 21-24 under the sponsorship of the Cisco High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. James Couch, Superintendent and Mr. Tommy Toland, teacher of vocational agriculture. Mr. Tom Bowers. Pasture Specialist with Vocational the Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences of Texas A&M University, will

do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University. Mr. Bowers holds a

B.S. degree in Agriculture from **Texas Tech University** and a Master's degree in Agronomy from Texas A&M University. He has had nine years of field experience as County Agricultural Agent in Cherokee and Leon Counties and served as Forage Agronomist and Pasture Specialist with Texas A&M University for four years. He was as

instruction, according to Tommy Toland.

Persons interested in attending the short course may preregister by contacting Superintendent James Couch, or the teachers of vocational agriculture. They can also register at the start of the short course.

An entry fee of \$5 will be charged. Pasture Short Course certificates will be presented to each enrollee who attends

all the training ses-

sions. Mr. Bowers states that the short course will be adjusted to the wishes and interests of farmers and ranchers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as adapted grasses and legumes, fertilization, weed control, grazing management and grazing systems. The primary purpose of the course is to help farmers and ranchers make the most profit from their pastures.

"Short courses in pasture, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers and ranchers throughout the state under a cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University," states Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses




