Cisco Centennial Observance Studied At CofC Board Meet

Plans for observing the City of Cisco's 100th birthday with a community-wide Cisco

Centennial Celebration were studied by the board of directors of the Chamber of Com-

merce at their April meeting last Tuesday noon at the CofC offices.

It was agreed that President Roy Dennis of the CofC, who presided at the meeting, would appoint a steering committee to coordinate plans for the Centennial in the near future. Manager Gene Abbott said the board felt that a year of planning would help insure a success project.

The City of Cisco was incorporated in 1881 and the community's diamond (75th) anniversary was a community promotion 24 years ago.

Mr. Abbott said the initial thinking of the board was to tie the Centennial in with the annual Cisco Frontier Jubilee, which is held each year in mid-April. Additional events could be held later in the year, including a big promotion on July 4th.

Plans were discussed to invite a nationally known person to appear here during the Centennial and a committee will work on this project, Mr. Abbott said. The T and P Railroad will be invited to participate since it was the coming of the railroad that brought about the City of Cisco.

"We want to have the biggest and best parade that Cisco ever staged," Mr. Abbott said. "Our board is very enthusiastic about the Centennial, and we want the whole community to join in this enthusiasm."

A number of city clubs and organizations could join in the Centennial program with individual projects, it was decided. "There is a lot of work to do and we need to begin," Mr. Abbott said.

Present at the luncheon were Mr. Dennis, Mr. Abbott, Gail Hogan, Gerald Winnett, Eddie McMillan, Joe Wheatley, Bob Ford, Robert Dudley, Clois Purvis, Elaine Dixon, Barbara Pope, Brad Kimbrough, Ronnie Ledbetter, Gene Abbott and Dr. Chief Brown.

Distinguished Restoration Architectural expert, Dr. Rinaldo Petrini, has selected Main Street (Avenue D) from the railroad track to 9th Street. This survey will be done by University of Houston Architectural students. It will require (1) Aerial photographs, (2) Specific building and street sketches and measurements, (3) Historical narrative and document research of each building, and various other data.

The accomplishment of the survey will require financial assistance from the Citizenry. This survey will cost \$25,000 (twenty-five thousand dollars). We of the Cisco Historical Society are asking for generous pledges of each Organization, Service Club, Business and interested citizens of Cisco. It is imperative that we make these pledges now as there is a distinct possibility of losing this project if we do not take positive action immediately.

This is really quite an honor and rare opportunity. We know the citizens of our town will respond well. City Given Opportunity To Be Declared Historical District

The citizens of Cisco are being given the rare opportunity of having their town declared a Historical District. The Texas Historical Commission has shown a real interest in the city as an outstanding example of true Americana (Depicting Mid-America Architecture during the past 50 years) without European influence. Many aspects of this action remain unclear, but some of the positive indications are:

- 1) Resale of properties will increase and values rise;
- 2) Certain tax advantages are possible;
- 3) Entry on National and State Historical

Registers; 4) Property owners are eligible to qualify for Historical grants to improve properties; 5) Probable restoration of street surface of Avenue D by Highway Dept.; 6) Private residences of historical value will be eligible for grants; 7) Tourism will be increased, enhancing business opportunities and commercial enterprises.

The proposed action would not obligate any property owner in any sense, nor would they be required to participate if they so elect.

A special survey is required of one designated area.

Undergraduate courses only are considered in the tabulated list.

Incomplete, or "I", grades earned during the fall semester disqualifies students from the Honor Rolls.

A man is dead and damage is estimated at upwards of a million dollars as the result of a truck-train collision in Eastland Thursday.

The east-bound Missouri-Pacific Local 972 and a northbound Bob Carrol water truck collided at the N. Seaman St. crossing at 12:45 p.m. Thursday.

Larry Dean Simmons Sr., 36, driver of the truck, was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Buddy Rowch.

At least six of the 16-car train derailed, tristing rails, ties and pulling down power lines. The two-engine train and two or three cars had cleared the crossing before the impact, it was reported.

There were no dangerous contents on any of the freight cars, M-P Official J.O. Schultz of Dallas told the Telegram.

And there were no other injuries, and no fires.

The main line was open Friday morning after emergency train crews worked through the night installing preformed track sections, rail officials reported.

Deputy Sheriff Ben Sancillo said the witnesses with whom he talked did not know why Simmons' vehicle did not stop before striking the train. He said he did not know Simmons' speed, but said the truck left no skid marks.

Earl Bradley of Eastland said he cross-

ed the tracks going south before the train got to the crossing. He saw Simmons going north and flashed his headlights to warn Simmons, he said. He said he also waved at Simmons as Simmons approached the tracks, but to no avail.

Bradley estimated Simmons' speed at approximately 30 mph. Another witness, Phil Gosnell, who looked on from an office less than a block south of the tracks, declined to estimate the truck's speed.

He said he did not hear air brakes or see brake lights flash on the truck. Simmons, who Gosnell said had worked with him at Ball Oilfield Service, looked at that company's office as the truck passed it, both

Gosnell and Bradley said. However, Gosnell said he could tell Simmons was looking at the office only during the instant the truck passed it. When Simmons neared the train a few seconds later, Gosnell said he could not tell where Simmons might have been looking.

According to Hamon and other MoPac employees, the train was traveling at the legal speed of 50 mph at the crossing. Warning lights were working at the crossing, Hamon and others said.

The impact shattered the cab of the truck, Bradley said. The truck Simmons was driving was owned by Bob Carroll Construction Co., an oilfield service firm, Sancillo said.

Simmons probably just returned from a trip to Rising Star and was apparently heading north to dump a load of salt water in a pit when the accident occurred, Sancillo added.

The derailed freight cars lay east of the crossing. Some came to rest on their side, but a hopper car lay upside down in a shallow ravine a few hundred feet east of the crossing. Other cars stopped on a damaged trestle over the ravine. Beside the trestle legs were smashed freight car undercarriages and a long section of steel rail arched like a croquet wicket.

In addition to power lines, MoPac communication lines were ripped apart, Williams said.

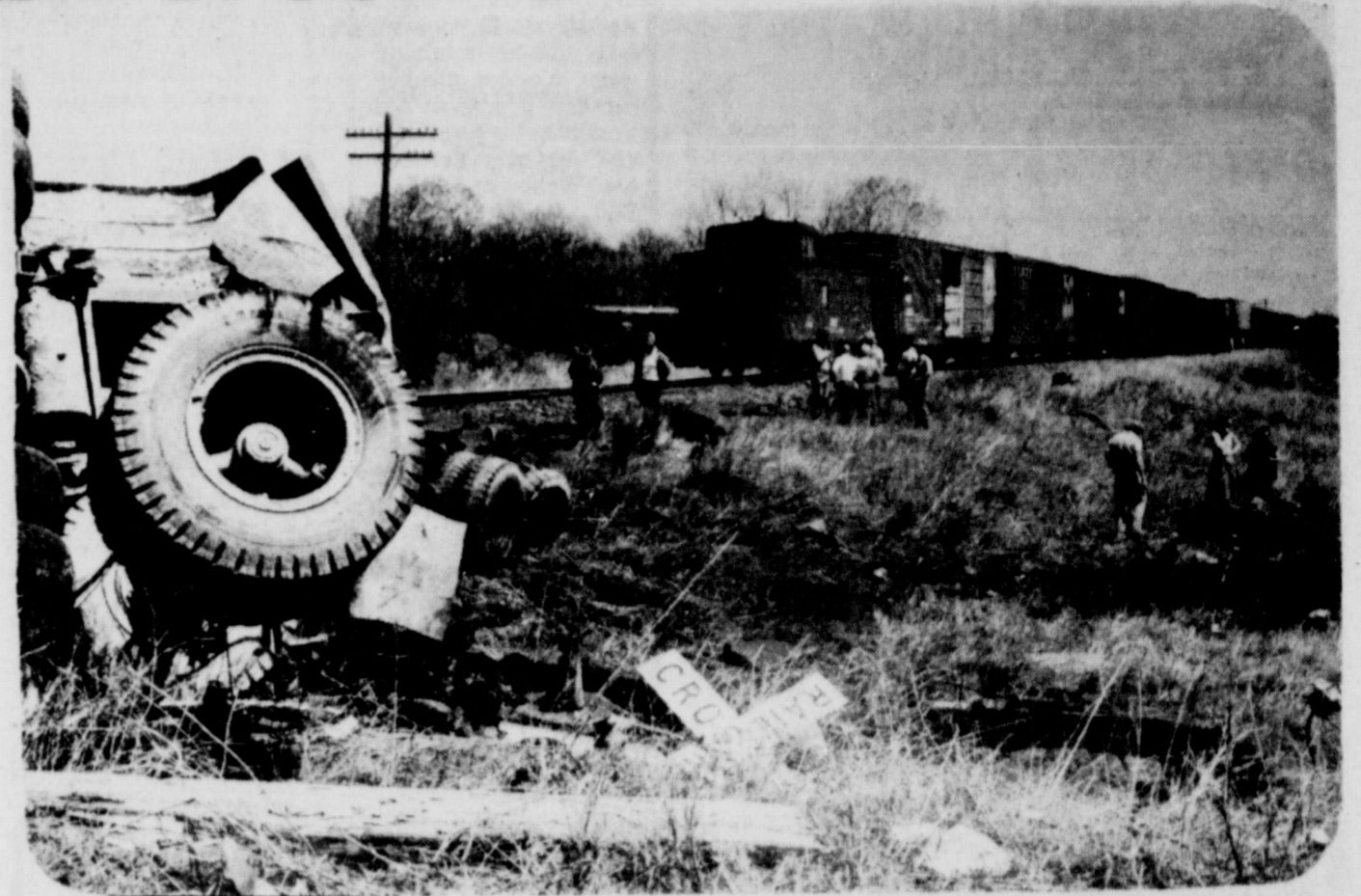

**Congressman
Jim Collins
to Visit Eastland**

United States Representative Jim Collins of Dallas will be in Eastland, Tex. April 10, 1980. He will meet with interested area citizens at a coffee at the home of Virginia Russell, given by the Eastland County Republican Women at 3:00 p.m.-4 p.m. There will be a question and answer period.

In a speech to his colleagues, Rep. Jim Collins of Texas said that Congress may lack the votes to make major sacrifices in the federal budget.

"There are three bones. Here in Congress we have lot of jawbone because congressmen enjoy talking. We also have a lot of wishbone because we are idealistic and optimistic dreamers. But on the backbone for tough votes, Congress is mighty short," Collins said.

Collins said his colleagues in Congress are "nice guys. They are friendly and likeable." But he noted that Congress must now cast unpopular votes for "sacrifice and austerity that we need for a stable economy."

According to Collins, Congress needs to cut \$50 billion from the federal budget to bring the 18% inflation rate under control. "We must remember that the budget deficit Carter took office. Now Carter submits a \$616 billion budget. If we cut \$50 billion from his proposal, the federal budget would be \$566 billion—that is still \$200 billion more than when he took office three years ago."

The Texas congressman said that he would vote for most of the cuts except in the areas of National Defense and in Social Security, on which most of the elderly in America are dependent. "The responsibility for a balanced budget is with Congress. It is essential for America's future that we end this 18% inflation. The only answer is to have less jawboning, less wishboning and more backbone."

"America today has more government than it needs, more regulations than it can afford to carry and more taxes than the people can afford to pay."

Homemaking Tips

In today's health-conscious society, many Americans hold myths about the proper role of vitamins. While vitamins are essential for good health, excessive amounts are unnecessary and can be harmful.

Once a day, "just to make sure," millions of Americans take a multivitamin pill. Then, when cold season comes around, some stock up on vitamin C. And if all these vitamins do not prevent that "rundown feeling," they might try a little — or a lot — of all the vitamins, with an added boost of vitamin B12. Yes, Americans spend over \$600 million a year on self-prescribed vitamins.

According to some recent articles and books by so-called nutrition "experts," this sort of therapy should do the trick. But millions of Americans now know it does

not work. The FDA's National Clearinghouse for Poison Control Centers reported that 4,000 cases of vitamin poisonings are reported each year, with some 3,200 involving children. Other Americans, with rashes, diarrhea or headaches, may also be unwary victims of the belief that since vitamins are good for them, the more the better.

An advertisement on television shows a person explaining how he stays healthy and looks "great." He says he watches his diet, get plenty of exercise, and "just to be sure," takes a vitamin-mineral supplement every day.

This is the way we have come to expect the marketing of dietary supplements. They are promoted as an "insurance" policy to guarantee

good health. The implication of such advertising has contributed to the myth that even a balanced diet cannot provide adequate nutrients.

A balanced diet which generally meets the United States RDA requirements for vitamins A, B, B12, C and D nearly always will provide the needed amounts of other vitamins, despite the claims of some people that these other vitamins are hard to find and therefore must be eaten in special foods or taken by pill. Even though eating is a personal thing and the acceptability of foods varies from person to person,

it is possible to obtain the U.S. RDA in many different diet patterns because of the wide variety of foods containing similar nutrients. But the simplest, surest guide to follow for a good daily balance of nutrients is still the selection of foods from each of the four food groups — milk, meat, vegetable and fruits, and breads and cereal.

Additional vitamin supplements should be prescribed by a medical doctor who is capable of diagnosing dietary deficiencies.

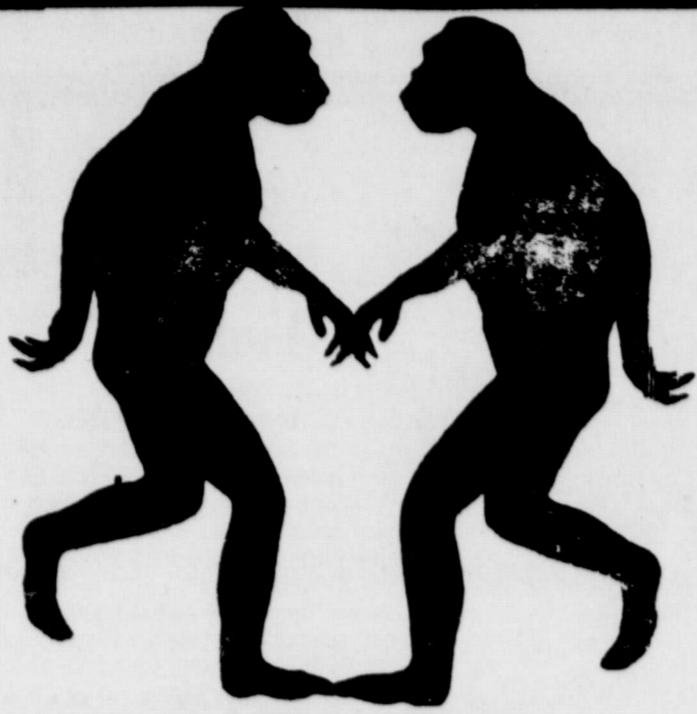

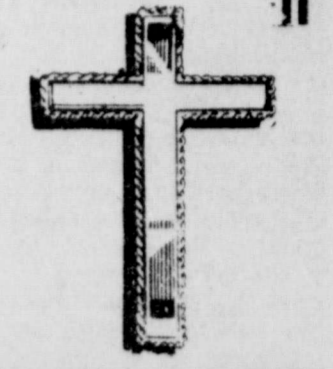


A THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

THIS SATURDAY (April 5) is an important day for our community-ELECTION DAY. We are fortunate to have capable people offering themselves as candidates in the city, school, college and hospital board elections. Many of us would like to vote for all of them.

Serving on boards is a public service performed by people whose only reward is the knowledge that their work on these boards and councils fulfills their obligations of good citizenship.

It is always disturbing to many of us to see evidence of "low blow" politics such as the distribution of the past few days of unidentified "smear" leaflets. An unwarranted blow was struck at the Cisco Municipal Airport improvement program in which our community is getting a good runway in a federal project. Our city's contribution is in matching funds in the form of "in kind" services-work by private citizens and spare time work by city people and machines to a limited degree.

Like public buildings and the like, an airport is important in every progressive city.

notables. According to Gene, Representative Hanna has completed 10 years in the state legislature and now ranks No. 19 and is highly respected in that big house. have been asked to speak to several other communities and schools.

Members of the advisory council agreed that this will be a rare opportunity for Cisco families. It will be both an opportunity to "put families first" for the evening and also show an enthusiastic "community spirit." A spokesman for the council stated "This will be a program truly worth the effort and time devoted by attending."

April is most appropriate for "family emphasis" as it is filled with activities related to its theme. It is a beautiful month of new beginnings. Enthusiastic gardeners have already begun to dig and plant with a hopeful expectancy of toil repaid by nature's beauty . . . and sometimes food. Happy, expectant faces of many children of all ages will again decorate the hill at CJC as they hunt for Easter eggs on that special day. Mr. Tom Bowers, Pasture Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences of Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Bowers holds a B.S. degree in Agriculture from Texas Tech University and a Master's degree in Agronomy from Texas A&M University. He has had nine years of field experience as County Agricultural Agent in Cherokee and Leon Counties and served as Forage Agronomist and Pasture Specialist with Texas A&M University for four years. He was employed as Agronomist with Pennzoil Corporation for six years planning and supervising a large scale farming and ranching operation in Texas and Louisiana. He also served as Executive Director of Texas Agricultural Limestone Association for two years.

The short course at Cisco High School is scheduled to begin April 21 at 7:00 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held April 22, 23 and 24. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Bowers will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm

instruction, according to Tommy Toland. Persons interested in attending the short course may pre-register by contacting Superintendent James Couch, or the teachers of vocational agriculture. They can also register at the start of the short course.

An entry fee of \$5 will be charged. Pasture Short Course certificates will be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Bowers states that the short course will be adjusted to the wishes and interests of farmers and ranchers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as adapted grasses and legumes, fertilization, weed control, grazing management and grazing systems. The primary purpose of the course is to help farmers and ranchers make the most profit from their pastures.

"Short courses in pasture, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers and ranchers throughout the state under a cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University," states Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of vocational agriculture teachers to provide improved educational services to

farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of Beef Production, Farm Electric Wiring and Safety, Horticulture, Farm Arc Welding, Swine Production, Tractor Maintenance, Oxygen Acetylene Welding, and Pasture.
