First United Methodist Church To Celebrate May Centennial

The First United 28, 1893, the church and amount was submitted Methodist Church of will Cisco celebrating its centennial May 3-4, 1980.

In 1980, a Methodist circuit rider, Rev. Trimble, Lamb organized the church at Red Gap, two miles west of Cisco. Four charter members first met in the home of M.V. Mitchell, a sheep rancher. The church first began in a little log school house located where the cemetery is presently located.

When Cisco was established in 1881 at the junction of the railroads, everyone in Red Gap moved to town, including the schools, post office and churches.

In Cisco some 20 Methodists located, and as soon as a school house was built, the congregation began meeting there.

Several years later, during the pastorate of Rev. John A. Wallace, a small church that cost around \$700, was erected on the lot where the present church building is now standing.

The church was enlarged during the pastorate of Rev. T.C. Ragsdale, but on April parsonage were both destroyed by the great cyclone which almost destroyed the town of Cisco. With the loss of the church and parsonage and most of the homes of the membership of the church, everybody was stunned and nothing in the history of the church illustrated more the heroism and hardihood of those pioneer members. On May 20, 1893, just 22 days after the cyclone - at the 3rd Quarterly Conference, appointed E.L. Rogers, J.M. Williamson, M.V. Mitchell, H.G. Eppler, O.H. Lovelady, C.H. Fee, and T.J. Worthington to rebuild and enlarge the church and parsonage.

In 1920 the present structure was built at a cost of more than \$100,000, and in the year 1941, there remained an unpaid debt of \$10,000 on the original cost of the building. A full scale campaign was started to raise money to retire the debt in full. Times were not very good financially at that time, and after an all

The pastor wanted a pipe organ for the occasion, and succeeded in getting a new member, Samuel Greer, to give money to purchase an organ which was being replaced in the Marvin Street Church in Tyler. Others contributed to the organ fund, and the organ was purchased. Today it is still in use

money, together with the sale of the parsonage, to construct a modern, comfortable parsonage at 806 Avenue H. The parsonage has been updated since its construction and is very modern at present.

In 1949 the church installed its first air conditioning, and in 1972 installed a better system, a modern refrigerated air conditioning unit.

During the 1950s a general improvement was made to the building and furnishings, and in 1961 a memorial plan was developed to keep the beautiful stained glass memorial windows in the church repaired.

Gifts from members have helped to keep the church in a good state of repair. The banquet room was improved and paneled; new ceilings, drapes, and lighting fixtures were purchased from gifts from Mrs. W.B. Wright and Mrs. Bob Parker. A gift from S.G. Tomlinson was accepted to purchase a grand piano for use in the sanctuary; and a substantial gift was left in the will of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Huestis. The Stellar Class was responsible for carpet purchased in 1973 for the auditorium.

A historical marker has been purchased for the church, and will be dedicated following services Sunday, May 4. Former pastors and members have been invited to attend the Centennial Celebration for the church on May 3 and 4. Activities planned include registration on Saturday, an informal social period, and later a snack supper. Special music, speeches, and an informal session will follow the meal. Registration will begin at 3 p.m. and the snack supper will begin around 6. Dr. Bob Evans, a former pastor, will give the sermon on Sunday. Following the services, the historical marker will be dedicated, and a covered dish luncheon will then be served to conclude the activities.

Who's Minding The Statehouses?

The growth of the federal bureaucracy is a popular whipping-boy. It's been blamed by economists for inflation and by business for over-regulation bred of idleness and the provincialism that characterizes company towns like Washington. Pruning back the federal bureaucracy was a major campaign promise of the Republican most likely to oppose him next fall.

While it is arguably true that the number of federal employees and the money they cost are excessive, some recent figures from the census bureau indicate that the real problem may very well lie at the state and local

Between 1972 and 1977, the number of state employees increased 18.1 percent. The number of local government employees increased 15.8 percent. By contrast, the number of federal, nonmilitary employees was up a relatively meager 1.9 percent. Of the 15.6 million government employees in 1977, federal employees numbered less than 20 percent of the total.

While public sector growth at the state and local levels have come a host of new regulations and ordinances with rival those from Washington for their fatuousness. Several weeks ago, for example, we got a call from

Unless there's an issue so overwhelmingly unpopular in the industry - competition from the California prison system and Washington State's exclusionary buying practices come immediately to mind - efforts to forge an industry presence in the statehouses have been met

with resounding apathy. It's true that chambers of commerce and other business organizations keep an eye on the state capitals, but their constituency is diverse and their positions on issues are not necessarily in

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



Homemaking Tips

Continuing inflation, the threat of recession, and rising prices have influenced people to make dramatic changes in how they use their income and in their life styles. Cost for shelter, transportation, and medical expenses have increased at a much faster rate than the incomes for the average family.

To learn to cope with these changing times, families are looking for ways to increase their buying skills in the market place, and maintain their level of living, plus provide some type of financial security for the near future as well as for retirement years.

This past week, I attended a Money Matters Seminar which was sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This in-service training seminar for County Extension Agents was excellent in that it focused on the impact of changing economic situations on family money management for the 1980's.

There are three basic suggestions for families to follow if your buying power has been cut by inflation or

First, change your level of living. This means learn to live with fewer goods and services. To simplify and live with fewer material things does not necessarily mean a decrease in your quality of life, but perhaps in the quantity of goods and services you possess.

Second, expand and extend your material resources by increasing your consumer skills in selecting, buying, storing, maintaining, using, repairing, conserving, and recycling

increase the Third. resources you need for person and household use. Consider creative human production such as sewing, gardening, simple home repairs, eating your meals at home or taking a brown bag lunch, all of which will save you money

Continuing inflation and rising prices mean that the average family will need to think ahead and plan smarter ways to adjust their income. Garage sales, wholeslae, white sales, second hand and humburger a dozen different ways will become a way of
