HAPPY MOTHER'S DAY to all the ladies in Cisco, and elsewhere, who have children. The following article was sent to us by Mrs. Marietta Fuller of Jeffersonville, Indiana, and is very appropriate for today's edition.

THE LOVE OF A MOTHER
Mother's Day comes during the lovely month of May with the outdoors in its adornment of flowers, green grass, blossoming trees, blue skies and nostalgic days.

In the following lines, famous people write about what the love of a mother has meant to them: "My memories of my mother will never cease to be a blessing to me."—Thomas A. Edison. "A mother's love outlives all things."—Oliver Wendell Holmes. "All that I am or hope to be, I owe to my angel mother."—"No man is poor who has a Godly mother."—Abe Lincoln.

And in God's Word, the Holy Bible, there is much which is said about mothers. In the fifth commandment, it says, "Honour your father and your mother." As children, we obey our parents and after we grow up, we honour them.

In Proverbs 31:10, we find these words: "Who can find a virtuous woman? For her price is far above rubies." And in a summary of the rest of this Chapter, we find these thoughts: "She does her work with love in her heart;...she stretcheth out her hand to the poor;...she is wise;...she is kind;...her husband praiseth her and her children call her blessed; and let her works for her children and for the Lord praise her in the gates."

Timothy, his mother Eunice and grandmother, Lois, lived together with the love of God in-dwelling them. When Timothy was "born again" and saved from his sins, God was not new to him. His mother, Eunice, and grandmother, Lois, had seen to it that Timothy was trained in the Scriptures. Jesus held home ties as sacred ones, and even on the cross, He thought about His mother and His words, as He looked to Mary, were: "...Woman, behold thy Son!"; and then He saith to the disciple (John the beloved), "Behold thy mother!" (St. John 19:26-27)

Feed upon the Word of God so that you may grow spiritually and hence be an example to your children.

Mr. Ritchie stated the first awards were presented in 1966, but are still based on meritorious conduct in twelve areas. Those include: cleanliness, thriftiness, courtesy, loyalty, honesty, respect for authority, service, dependability, scholarship, sportsmanship, auto driving habits and leadership.

Yolanda is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Asa Walters of Cisco. Her activities during high school include: participation in the Coronation program; served on the Lobo Howl staff; served on the student council; member of FHA, officer; DE; band; one-act play; UIL headline writings, feature writing, news writing; Band Sweetheart nominee; had poem published by National Poetry Press; has been a member of Teen Missions International for the past two summers and plans to go to Verrettes, Haiti, this coming summer.

The H-SU president is the author of some ten books relating to the missionary field, and he has had articles published in numerous religious publications, including the Christian Herald. He has also made scholarly contributions to the Quarterly Review and several Baptist encyclopedias and reference books. Additionally, he has written several motion picture scripts for both Baptist and non-Baptist films.

Dr. Fletcher is married to the former Dorothy Jordan of Memphis, Tennessee and he has two children—Jordan Scott Fletcher and Melissa Dupree Fletcher. He enjoys avocational interests in aviation, backpacking, hunting, fishing, golf, tennis and reading.

Dr. Fletcher congratulated Yolanda and Greg on their achievements and

Citizens Asked To Help In Research Of Cisco

Dr. Rinaldo Petrini, architect in charge of the Hilton Hotel restoration here, has requested that anyone who has old photographs, newspaper clippings, documents or any written illustrations of how Cisco used to look, to please loan them to Petrini and Associated Architects. They are in the process of compiling a report about Cisco which will hopefully cause the city to be declared a historical district.

The more documented proof of Cisco's history they can present, Dr. Petrini emphasized, the more likely Cisco will be declared such a district. In fact, he said if they get enough findings in this search it will be almost 100% assured that Cisco will be declared a historical district. All citizens are urgently asked to contribute anything they might have, or know of, to the research. Dr. Petrini asked that the items be left at

The Cisco Press office for Catherine Worthy. Miss Worthy of Cisco has been hired by Petrini and Associated Architects to do the research work for the report. He said Miss Worthy will pick the items up and send those who loaned them a receipt through the mail. The items would then be copied and notarized, with the original being returned to its owner in about a month's time. He also stated that pictures or articles would not be placed in any publication without first getting the owner's written permission.

Each year on the second Sunday in May, mothers are honored throughout the United States.

This national observance has been in effect since May 9, 1914, when President Woodrow Wilson signed a resolution of Congress declaring the recognition of Mother's Day. Mother's Day proclamation the observance "a public expression of our love and reverence for the mothers of our country."

Traditionally, children of mothers wear a carnation on this holiday. White is worn if a person's mother is no longer living; pink indicates one's mother is alive. This custom was begun by Anna

Jarvis of Grafton, West Virginia, in May of 1908. Miss Jarvis is often credited with starting the movement that eventually led to national recognition of Mother's Day.

In 1910, a Mother's Day proclamation was issued by the governor of West Virginia. Pennsylvania, in May, 1913, declared Mother's Day a state holiday.

Eventually, other states and nations throughout the world recognized motherhood by setting aside a special day of the year in honor of all mothers.

LSG TO THE RESCUE

Late in the afternoon of Jan. 16, Jack Page, senior pipeline operator, Pueblo unit, finished his work, tossed his gear into his truck and headed back to the office. It was an ordinary end to an ordinary day. Little did Jack suspect that he was about to save two men's lives.

Maybe it was his strong sense of responsibility or just a quirk of fate, but whatever the reason, Jack decided to check on a propane leak which he had reported earlier to one of the major oil companies that had been drilling in the area. As he approached the site, two men began desperately flagging him down; Jack soon saw the reason for their desperation. Two of their co-workers lay sprawled, half-in, half-out of the bellhole where they had been repairing the leak. Overcome with propane fumes, they had tried to climb out; they hadn't been able to make it. Jack radioed for an ambulance. Then, seeing it would never arrive in time, Jack and the oil company employees began giving mouth-to-mouth breathing to the unconscious men.



Three other LSG employees heard Jack's call for an ambulance over the radio. Close to the accident site, they rushed over and joined in the revival efforts. By this time, the men had started breathing again and were gasping for air. Within 10 minutes the ambulance arrived and took the victims to the Cisco hospital where they were released after observation. The LSG employees received their Red Cross training from Lone Star safety representatives, and without a doubt, their training paid off.

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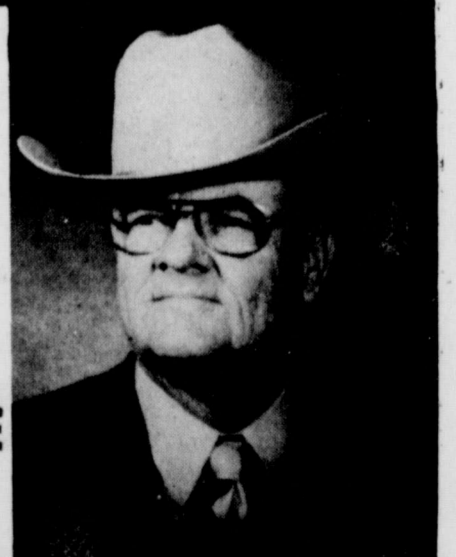

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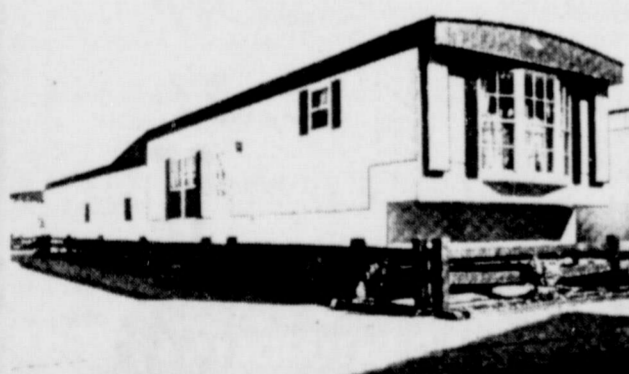

Soil Stewardship Week May 11-18, focuses on the theme, "The Judgement of Nature." The observance is sponsored by the National Association of Conservation Districts.

This year's theme is especially appropriate as the United States considers the current condition of its soil, water and related resources.

Through nature, we are linked with the past and committed to the future.

Nature is the continuing system of life created by God. It is neither fixed nor static; it is a continuing process and inherently dynamic. It rewards care and constructive attention, even as it penalizes negligence and deliberate damage.

Loss of some three million acres of productive agricultural land each year, through urbanization and other uses, decline in productivity of topsoil as the result of destructive erosion and continuing pollution of the nations' water are serious causes for everyone's concern. Participation in Soil Stewardship Week activities offers an opportunity to reflect on the nation's natural resource problems and to consider actions to resolve them or reduce their impact.

How to fertilize summer grasses, such as coastal bermudagrass, for hay production may be a difficult decision this year for Eastland County farmers. If you have hay left from last year, you must determine additional needs and fertilize accordingly.

If estimated hay requirements are less than normal and do not require production from all available acres, you may only want to fertilize for one or two cuttings and then graze the remainder of the year. Or you could rotate fertilization for hay and grazing.

For example, graze some acres first; then fertilize for hay while other acres are fertilized for hay followed by grazing. This provides an opportunity to produce good quality hay while using the residual fertilizer to produce good quality grass for grazing.

Where fertilizing to meet grazing requirements, consider fertilizing part of the pasture acreage in the spring, another part in the summer and another part in the fall. In this way all grass will get some fertilizer without producing more grazing in the spring than can be used especially if less hay is needed this year.

The idea that all fields must be fertilized in the spring cannot be supported by grazing requirements, maintenance of quality grazing, and profitable use of the increased growth from fertilization.

How much fertilizer to use will vary from field to field. A soil test is the best guide for determining amounts of phosphorus and potassium needed. However, consider applying 80 to 90 pounds of nitrogen per acre for hay and 50 to 60 pounds for grazing. In making plans to fertilize summer grasses for hay and grazing, remember that increased production from fertilization must be used efficiently if fertilization is to be profitable. Whatever system is to be used, be sure to include management practices necessary to meet forage use as well as production requirements.

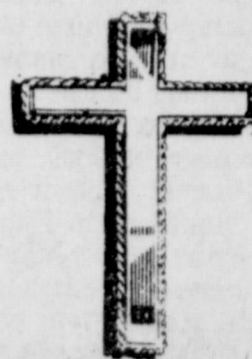

YOU WOULD HAVE BEEN proud of the performance and enthusiastic reception of Cisco Junior College's Band and Belles at the nationally famous Shenandoah Apple Blossom Festival last Saturday in Winchester, Virginia. Thousands of people crowded the two-mile parade route, and many more thousands watched television coverage of the event.

Vacationing in the Washington, D.C., area, it was our pleasure to join the group of some 200 CJC students and backers who flew to Washington April 30 for three days. And, of course, the May 3rd Apple Blossom Festival was the climax of the program.

In addition to marching in the parade, the Wrangler Band and Belles were presented in three performances just prior to the beginning of the parade. These appearances, including drill team routines by the 40 Belles and music by the band, were applauded by capacity crowds at each point. And the PA announcer gave CJC full credit for the fine appearance and programs.

The parade was outstanding with some 200 entries. Doris Roberts of the ABC Show "Angle" was the parade grand marshal. There were a good many bands from throughout the east and central states, noted sports figures like Dallas Cowboy Drew Pearson, Basketballer Wes Unseld and Baseballer Hank Aaron, the famous Budweiser wagon and Clydesdale eight-hitch horse team, several Grand Ole Opry and Country and Western Stars, festival queen and her court and the like.

The official program for the 53rd annual festival was a real souvenir with many pictures of participants (including the CJC Band and Belles). Four or five blocks along the 17-block parade route composed the reserved seat section and several thousand chairs were placed on each side for rent to visitors.

Folks boarded buses and went to Mount Vernon to see George Washington's home and burial place, to Arlington National Cemetery where they witnessed the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, and other noteworthy sights before checking in at their hotel.

At 8 a.m. May 1st, the group went to a private dining room in the Rayburn Office Building for breakfast with Congressman Charles Stenholm. He gave a brief talk to report on his work. The evening's program was a trip to the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

The May 2nd program included more visits to the Smithsonian and other places of interest and some free time.
