IF YOU attended the Cisco Senior Citizens nutrition program last Tuesday to hear Congressman Charles Stenholm speak, then you may have been a little disappointed since the congressman was unable to attend.

It was reported that he was in a hospital with a recurring back ailment. I am sure we all hope he gets well soon, so he can continue to do his fine job of representation for this area.

DOESN'T LITTER on the sides of roads and throughout a city distract from its overall scenic picture? We all know about litter problems, yet most of us are guilty of disposing of some type of litter by tossing it out the open window of a moving vehicle.

During the past year or so, local groups of citizens have tried to get everyone interested in a clean-up campaign for Cisco but response has never been very good. According to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, "Local people are the worst offenders, not visitors from elsewhere. Junk flying out of uncovered pickup truck beds, though illegal, accounts for tons of Texas litter."

The Department also says, "Littering is unlawful. Violators are subject to stiff fines. Sometimes their penalties are to pick up several miles worth of roadside trash, a very fitting punishment."

"Tourism, a vital Texas industry, brings money into the state. Unsightly litter mars vacations and discourages visitors from returning...another costly side effect of the litter problem."

"The Solution? EVERY TEXAN MUST.....
*Dispose of trash properly.
*Carry and use litter bags.
*Support community and state clean-up efforts."

"Use litter barrels and receptacles.
*Keep Texas beautiful!"

The Department also gives some interesting statistics on how long it takes for litter to decay if it is not picked up by someone. It says, "Litter stays with us much longer than you think! A second is all it takes to toss something where it doesn't belong. How long does it take that same article to disintegrate?"

"Consider the following decomposition timetables...and DON'T LITTER!"

The table is as follows:
Litter item—a banana peel, decomposition time—a week to six months; item—drink carton, time—up to five years; foam object, 10 to 20 years; plastic container, 50 to 80 years; aluminum can or tab, 80 to 100 years.

That gives you something to think about, doesn't it?

WTRC spokesmen stated that they were most pleased that the aluminum recycling project could serve the dual purpose of cleaning up communities and supporting the programs of the Center.

The rehabilitation Center will purchase aluminum cans throughout their far flung service area with the cooperation and support of the beverage can users.

Smith said he was looking forward to this being a most successful project with Reed, Massey and McDaniel all three on the aluminum team.

City Votes To Re-open Lake Bernie Valve

The Cisco City Council unanimously approved a motion at Tuesday night's regular meeting to "reopen the existing 24 inch pipe at Lake Bernie by cleaning, rodding or using other methods to remove the drilling mud; and insert a L-shaped joint to raise the outlet level above the silt line so that a minimum amount of silt will be sent downstream to stock tanks and Lake Cisco." City Manager John Boland and his staff are to report back to council on the progress at Lake Bernie.

Council member Bill Eudy was elected as Mayor Pro-Tem by the other council members. The council decided to place \$100,000 in money market certificates for a three month period with the First National Bank in Cisco. The money for the certificate will be a combination of moneys from the Water/Sewer Department and Revenue Sharing. The council agreed to continue negotiations with Dale Schuyler and Dwaine Votaw on a proposal concerning Lake Cisco Park. The men appeared before the council to discuss their proposal. They asked if the park is available and they requested a negotiation team be selected so they might

work with one or two people. They also request all their investments made be reimbursable by the City, since it is city-owned property and they feel the city should pay for improvements. Schuyler and Votaw said they have made the proposal because they see a tremendous potential for the reopening and possible expansion of Lake Cisco Park. They are looking at the full 45 acres including the cabins, zoo area, pool and camping sites.

Steve Thomas of the Eastland County Appraisal District briefed the council and brought it up to date on the County Appraisal District. McMorris and Company of Hereford, Texas, has been awarded the contract by the Board of Directors to appraise the real estate and commercial property in the county. A letter from the company to the city seeks some information on how the City of Cisco would like to pay for its part: to pay as it goes; to pay in full by December 1, 1981; or pay one-half by December 1, 1981, and the other half by December 1, 1982. The company requested to know the type of maps desired by the city.

Council member Louise Allison brought up the fact, in her opinion, the city needs a comprehensive city plan to set out the goals and objectives for the coming year. She feels the city needs such a plan due to all the city activity going on now and it would help to keep things organized. Council members denied the city manager permission to attend a tax course since, after the County Appraisal office takes over taxing, it will no longer be necessary for the city manager to know as much about taxing as he has needed to know in the past.

Oil States Plans To Build New Rubber Plant, Add Workers

Oil States Rubber Company plans to build a new plant and double its payroll in Cisco within three years, according to an announcement here Wednesday by Bob Brock, vice president and general manager at the firm's home offices in Arlington.

Mr. Brock made the announcement in a talk at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club. He was introduced by Randy Speegle, local Oil States plant manager and a member of the club.

Plans call for the Cisco plant to be turning out all of the products manufactured by Oil States, Mr. Brock said. The firm came to Cisco 11 years ago and "Cisco has been a good place for our company," he said.

Garden Club Sponsoring Yard Of The Week

Plans call for a new and larger building on the firm's 11-acre site in the old Humble camp. At this time, Oil States has 30 men on its local payroll and expects to double that number when the projected growth plans are complete, Mr. Brock said.

Oil States turns out virtually all types of rubber products used in oil well production and transportation. Rubber moulding has started here and plans call for installation of extruding equipment, Mr. Brock said. "Then," he added, "Cisco will be able to do everything that the Arlington plant can do."

City Manager Requests Limbs Of Reasonable Length

City Manager John Boland requests that any person placing limbs or brush out for pick-up on Wednesdays, make sure that the limbs from trees are not over four (4) feet in length if the limb is two (2) inches or more in diameter. 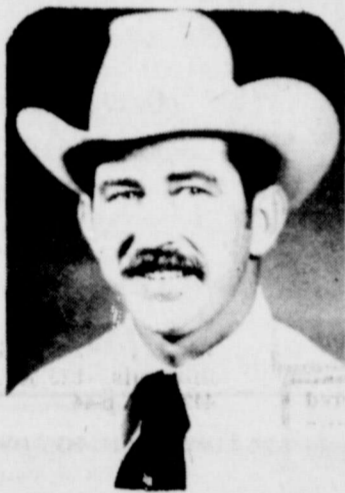

CHS Students Research Food Prices

Students enrolled in the Consumer Education Homemaking Classes at Cisco High School have been busy recording prices of staple food items for a period of 24 weeks.

This research, conducted at Thrift Mart and JRB, reveals that even though food prices are increasing, the percentage of in-

crease is dropping. This should be welcome news for the consumers of Cisco.

Twenty categories of nonseasonal foods were chosen and prices were recorded every eight weeks. These categories included such items as sugar, flour, milk products, meats, eggs and bread. No sale prices were in-

cluded and particular care was taken to accurately record each price. At the conclusion of the survey the percentage of the overall price increase had dropped from 4% to .16% at Thrift Mart and from 3.2% to .06% at JRB. It is significant to note that the overall percentage of increase was less than 8% at either store during the 24 week period. This 8% increase can be compared to a 38% increase in the price of gasoline during the same period for this area.

Sugar increased in price more than any other food item and Folgers Coffee decreased in price at one of the stores. Gladioli Flour and Wolf Brand Chili were the only two items to remain at the same price during the 24 week period.

Mrs. Janis Lister, coordinator of this project, reports that her students are making tremendous progress in becoming better informed consumers. Studies such as this, indicate that these students are developing consumer skills that will aid them greatly as they

Alcohol fuel production and use has interested several people in Eastland County. Those interested will have an opportunity to attend a symposium on the subject early in July.

An alcohol fuel symposium that will key in on small-scale

production of ethanol from grain will be held at Texas A&M University July 1-2.

The symposium is being sponsored by two organizations of Texas A&M University System -- The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service -- along with A&M's Center for Energy and Mineral Resources.

Various issues relating to the production and use of ethanol will be discussed, including feedstocks, pre-processing requirements, use as a fuel in engines, by-product uses, and legal, economic and financial aspects.

Anyone interested in attending the symposium is encouraged to pre-register by June 23. We have registration forms and additional details on the program in our office. Contact our office if you are interested in attending.

The pecan nut casebearer has been very slow developing this year. We found the first casebearer eggs on Wednesday, May 28. Even then, we found eggs on less than one percent of the nuts examined. Based on this and other observations, would suggest the best spray dates will be June 2nd and 3rd. Good control could be expected if pecans are sprayed any time between May 31 and June 4.

We have been hearing and reading reports that grasshopper populations are expected to be higher this year than in several years.

Mr. Thurman Williamson, Plant Production and Quarantine Officer for the USDA, came to Eastland County and made a survey of the grasshopper situation last week. He found that there was an average of ten to twelve grasshoppers per yard which is considered moderate to heavy infestation. The grasshopper hatch is extremely late in this area. Williamson said if most of these young hoppers live to be adults, we could have a big problem this summer.

However, the wet weather promotes a fungus disease that kills many grasshoppers. Also the large

turkey and quail population will help keep the grasshopper numbers down.

There are over 200 species of grasshoppers. Williamson identified about five in Eastland County and said some of

these were not grasshoppers. He further said it would be impossible to conduct a cooperative aerial spray program here because of the heavy vegetation of tall grass and trees. In this program a

block of at least 10,000 acres of mostly rangeland has to be sprayed. Trees and tall grasses prevent the insecticide from reaching the ground and control is ineffective.





Homemaking Tips

By Janet Thomas

Fresh fish is a family meal favorite, and also an excellent source of good nutrition. Many Eastland County residents enjoy the convenience of living near several large lakes in this area. The lakes not only provide fun recreation for the family, but good fishing. My column this week is featuring recipes for fish.

TEXAS CATFISH FRY
2 pounds skinned and pan-dressed catfish
1/4 cup evaporated milk
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
Pepper to season
3/4 cup corn meal
Oil for frying
If the catfish are frozen, let them thaw. Clean, wash and dry the fish. Mix milk, salt and pepper together. Dip fish in milk, roll in corn meal. Fry in hot fat for 4 to 5

minutes or until brown. Turn carefully and fry for 4 or 5 minutes longer or until fish is brown and cooked. The fish is cooked when it flakes easily.
BUTTERMILK BATTER FRIED FISH
2 pounds fish fillets
1 cup buttermilk
1 cup biscuit mix
2 teaspoons salt
Cut fillets into servings. Place in a dish and cover with buttermilk. Let stand for 30 minutes, turning once. Combine biscuit mix and salt. Roll fish in biscuit mix until thoroughly coated. Fry in hot fat about 5 minutes or until fish flakes when touched with a fork.

BEER BATTER FRIED FILLETS
2 pounds fish fillets
1 cup beer
1 cup all-purpose flour
1 egg, beaten
1 teaspoon seafood salt
1 teaspoon baking powder
Cut fish into serving portions. Mix remaining ingredients together; beat lightly to make batter. Dip fish in batter and fry in deep fat for 3 to 5 minutes until pieces are brown and flake easily when tested with a fork. Drain on absorbent paper. Sprinkle with seasoned seafood salt.
RED SAUCE
1 cup catsup
3 tablespoons lemon juice
1 tablespoon horseradish
3 drops liquid hot pepper

sauce
1/4 teaspoon seasoning salt
2 tablespoons sweet pickle relish
Combine all ingredients together and chill. Makes 1 cup sauce.
CAJUN TARTAR SAUCE
1 (4-ounce) carton sour cream
1 cup mayonnaise
2 tablespoons sweet pickle relish
2 tablespoons snipped parsley
1 large green onion, minced

3 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
1 teaspoon sugar
2 teaspoons dry ranch-style dressing mix
Mix all ingredients together and let stand in refrigerator

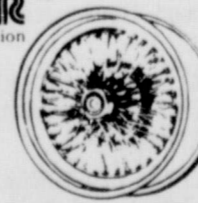

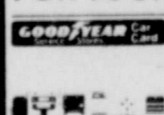

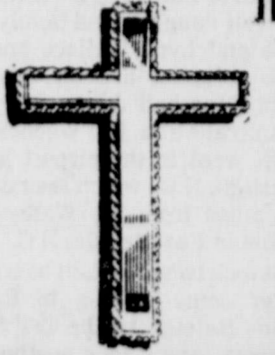

reason we are very encouraged and know the people of Cisco are interested and eager for the society to succeed in their attempt to make Cisco a Historical District.

The last meeting of the society was held May 26, 8:00 p.m. at the First National Bank Community Room. Dr. Petrini, from Houston, was there and gave a report on additional projects that have been approved by the Hilton Foundation. One being a garden for the memorial park that will surround the hotel, which will be a very valuable and expensive garden. Also they have approved the statue, the platform where the statue will stand, the platform will be 30 ft. by 36 ft. and will be six ft. high. The reason for this size is that this will be the open air theatre in the area.

On each side of the platform will be 20 seats with a remembrance plaque on each side one representing the 40 years of Conrad Hilton's career in the Hotel Industry, starting with his first hotel, The Mobley. Dr. Petrini stated that the Hiltons are aware that this monument will survive only if the city itself as a group is interested in its own tradition, which is what the Cisco Historical Society is all about. Interest in our city and its growth and development and preserving its history.

To impress upon you the importance of doing this now. I would like to tell you about an incident that happened while I was contacting people for donations and pledges to pay for the survey.

I called upon the firm of Guthrie and Guthrie Tuesday, April 29th. Both Bea Guthrie and C.W., her son, were not in the office this day. So I called back the next day and reached Bea by phone when I told her why I was calling she was very interested in what we were doing. She told me how she remembered riding the train from Virginia into Cisco in about 1924. At the time her father, C.A. Farquhar was the night clerk at the Mobley Hotel so she walked over to the

hotel to surprise him. Bea then recalled how she could just close her eyes and see every detail of the lobby of the hotel describing it to me piece by piece over the phone. I was very excited that she knew so much about it and was able to pass this information on to us for our research of the first Hilton Hotel. Before we finished our conversation she said she would be very happy to give Catherine Worthy an interview concerning all of this. By now I know you are aware of the sad ending to this story. I left town to go to an egg show before I could get her and Catherine together. When I returned home I was very saddened to hear that Bea Guthrie had passed away. She never got the chance to tell her story.
