

### Hall Of Remarks by Herrol Holmark

LET'S ALL make plans to participate in next year's Cisco Centennial Celebration when Cisco celebrates its 100th birthday. Persons attending Wednesday morning's quarterly Chamber of Commerce breakfast were shown a slide presentation of a celebration held in 1956, Cisco's 75th anniversary, sponsored by the Cisco Fiesta Association. CofC manager Gene Abbott read a list of the persons in that year who were on the committee in charge of the celebration and he said that he and J.W. Sitton were the only persons from the committee who are "still with us" and both of them were present at the breakfast.

## Council Approves Emergency Ordinance On Weed Control

The city council passed two new ordinances, tabled a proposed resolution, heard reports on major projects and regular work, and held a 30-minute executive session at the semi-monthly meeting last Tuesday night.

Passed on emergency reading was an ordinance to control weeds within the city limits. The ordinance provides that property owners shall not permit grass, weeds or brush that is uncultivated to grow to a greater height than 12 inches on any lot, tract or parcel of five acres or less. On larger tracts, the height of grass and weeds shall be 12 inches or less within 100 feet of either side of the property.

The weed ordinance was effective immediately and enforcement will begin in ten days, giving property owners that much time to comply. In cases of non-compliance, the city will take corrective action and charge the costs plus a \$10 penalty to the property owners.

An ordinance to close the 500 block of Avenue B at East 6th Street was approved on first reading. It was requested by Ronnie Ledbetter who has built a number of storage rooms in the area. The ordinance will be read again at the next council meeting.

The council tabled a resolution offered by Mayor Roy Cartee to the effect that "all expenditures, except salaries, exceeding (blank dollars) must be approved by the mayor or a council member prior to purchase. It was understood that the resolution would be considered at the next council meeting.

A proposal to prepare a resolution on city overtime labor policies was dropped. City Manager John Boland reported to the council that the city paid a total of 1,947 overtime hours in 1978-79. For comparison, the current year's overtime hours amounted to 884 hours at the end of May. The average is running well behind last year, Mr. Boland said. Department heads and the city manager con-

penditures were running below budget totals.

A financial report by the city manager showed total expenditures of \$30,253 in May. This included \$8,855 from the general fund; \$4,160, water and sewer; \$32, airport; \$3,188, gasoline pool (two months); \$906, inventory control; \$9,414, revenue sharing (landfill tractor repairs); and, \$3,660, utilities (gas, electric and telephone).

The city manager's monthly report showed that drainage improvement has been emphasized in the major projects area. This includes cleaning dirt and sand from drainage ditches, weed cutting, spraying and cleaning storm sewers.

Building permits totalling \$21,000 were issued in May, the city manager's report showed, bringing the year's total to \$1,282,000. Two May permits were for an addition to the Marvallee's Dress Shop building and for a residential addition.

The report showed that the city used 22,232,600 gallons of water for an average of 717,180 daily in May. Highest day was 1,125,600. The report showed that city ex-

penditures were running below budget totals.

Dr. Robert Blackstock was recognized and he gave his interpretation of city charter provisions as compared to some actions.

The council went into an executive session to discuss personnel matters after the regular agenda was completed. After some 30 minutes, the session ended and Mr. Cartee reported to some 20 persons remaining in the council chambers that no action was taken. He added that

the matter of the mayor having an office (as Mr. Cartee does) at city hall would be on the agenda for the next meeting.

Mayor Cartee, who is a patient at Graham Memorial Hospital, left his bed to preside at the meeting and returned to the hospital. All council members except Mrs. Lucy Collier were present.

A called meeting of the council was scheduled for 7 p.m. Friday to interview an applicant for the vacant city secretary's position.

## Press Moves 'Uptown'

Offices of The Cisco Press were moved several blocks to 700 Conrad Hilton Avenue last Thursday to the building occupied by Charles Clark, CPA, before his retirement several months ago.

The Press moved from the building it had occupied since the early 1930s, and the move was in line with efforts to modernize the newspaper's facilities, Publisher H.V. O'Brien reported. Mr. O'Brien purchased the Clark building May 1.

The move will be completed by mid-week when the telephones become operative at the new location.

Plans call for the old Press building at 304-06 Avenue D plus the building across the alley south to be sold. The old Press building contains 5,000 square feet of floor space and is in a good state of repair.

The move was the result of The Press' desire "to be more uptown," the publisher said.



THE CISCO PRESS moved its offices this week from 306 Avenue D to 700 Avenue D. The new location is more in the "heart" of the business district of Cisco and hopefully will be more of a convenience to the newspaper's customers.

## Reception Honors Colleen Strawn

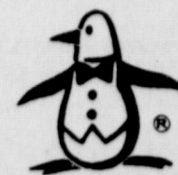

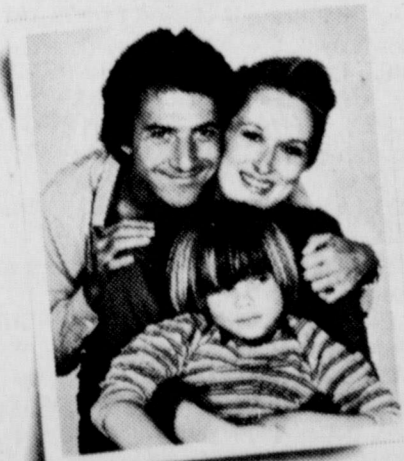

# Stella Goforth, First Plant Manager For Vasserette

Stella Goforth retired from the Vasserette Company in 1969. She suffered severe injuries when she stepped on an object on the floor of the plant and fell March 27, 1969. She spent 65 days in the hospital and the doctors didn't expect her to live. Although she left the hospital she was unable to return to work. Among other things her injury caused her to lose height, she had been 5'8" and is now 5'3".

Stella went to work November 21, 1946 with a company opening a new factory on Mulberry Street in Eastland, the Hollywood Corset Company. This was their first factory in Texas and the Eastland plant manufactured brassiere's only.

The starting salary in 1946 was 40 cents an hour, making the good weekly wage of \$16.00.

Twelve days after Stella started working she was asked to be plant manager, she told them no because she thought she didn't know enough about the business for that position. The company had sent a lady from a factory in California to open the Eastland facility and she insisted that Stella take the job but that she must go that very night by train to Arkadelphia, Ark. for two weeks of training. At that time Stella had a son in high school and her husband was working as a line foreman for REA. Her family agreed she should go as they could care for themselves. So she went to

Arkadelphia and learned to make the three styles they were making in order to be able to teach her employees. In a factory such as this each employee sews a only a portion on the product and moves that work on to the next one who sews their assigned part - no one person sews the entire garment. The one in charge of the plant must know how to perform each task in each area and on a single needle machine as well as a four needle machine.

In January of 1952 the Hollywood Corset Company opened a second factory on Commerce Street in Eastland and Stella was asked to manage both plants. It was difficult and involved long hours but with the help of good, dedicated employees she was able to make both places run efficiently and they met production everyday.

Stella's husband died just as the second plant was ready to open and, of course, this made it even harder for her to take on added responsibility. Her son was in the service and her work offered a time consuming challenge so it finally worked out for the best for her.

The owners gave an all day picnic each year. Held on a work day and all employees were paid for that day. Everyone enjoyed the games, fellowship and food. It was an attractive incentive for all employees.

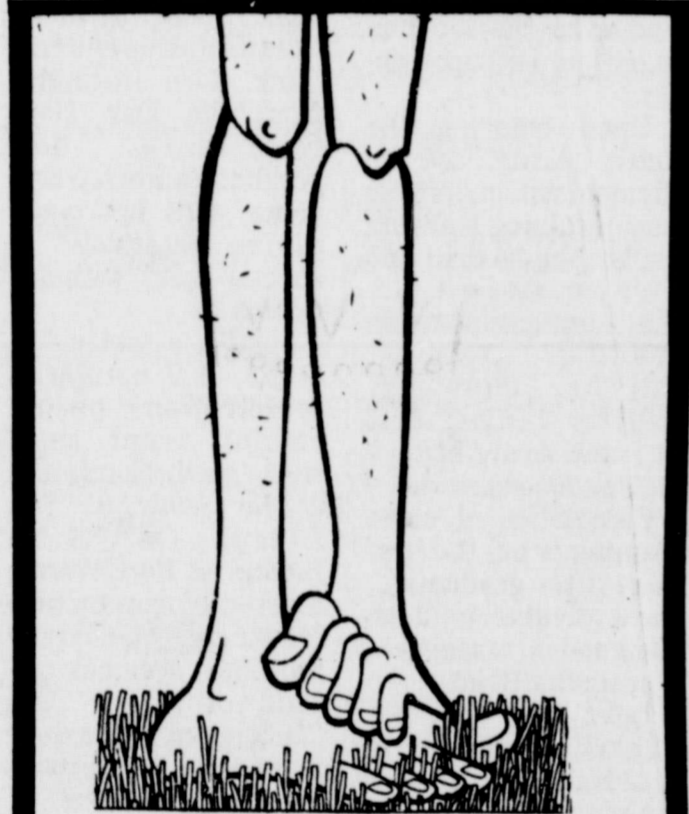
In May of 1952 the Company opened their third Eastland factory. This one located on East Main. Again they asked Stella to manage it along with the other

two. By moving an experienced employee from each part of the sewing operations to help train the new girls Stella was able to open and still meet production demands in all 3 factories.

Every three months the Company paid a cash bonus for: Workmanship, Production and Efficiency and Eastland won first almost every time. So often that some of the other plants were getting jealous. By now there were other Texas factories, in Athens and in Paris.

The Hollywood Corset Company owned factories in other countries. Stella recalls the manager of the factory at Copenhagen, Denmark coming to Eastland and asking her to show him their way of making the brassiere's from start to finish. Sometime managers of different factories in other towns would send for Stella to help them.

The three Companies consolidated in 1956 then sold to Vasserette in 1957. Stella Goforth worked for the Vasserette Company for 12 years before getting hurt. She was not ready to retire when she did because 23 years helping to build and sustain a large company can be very rewarding.

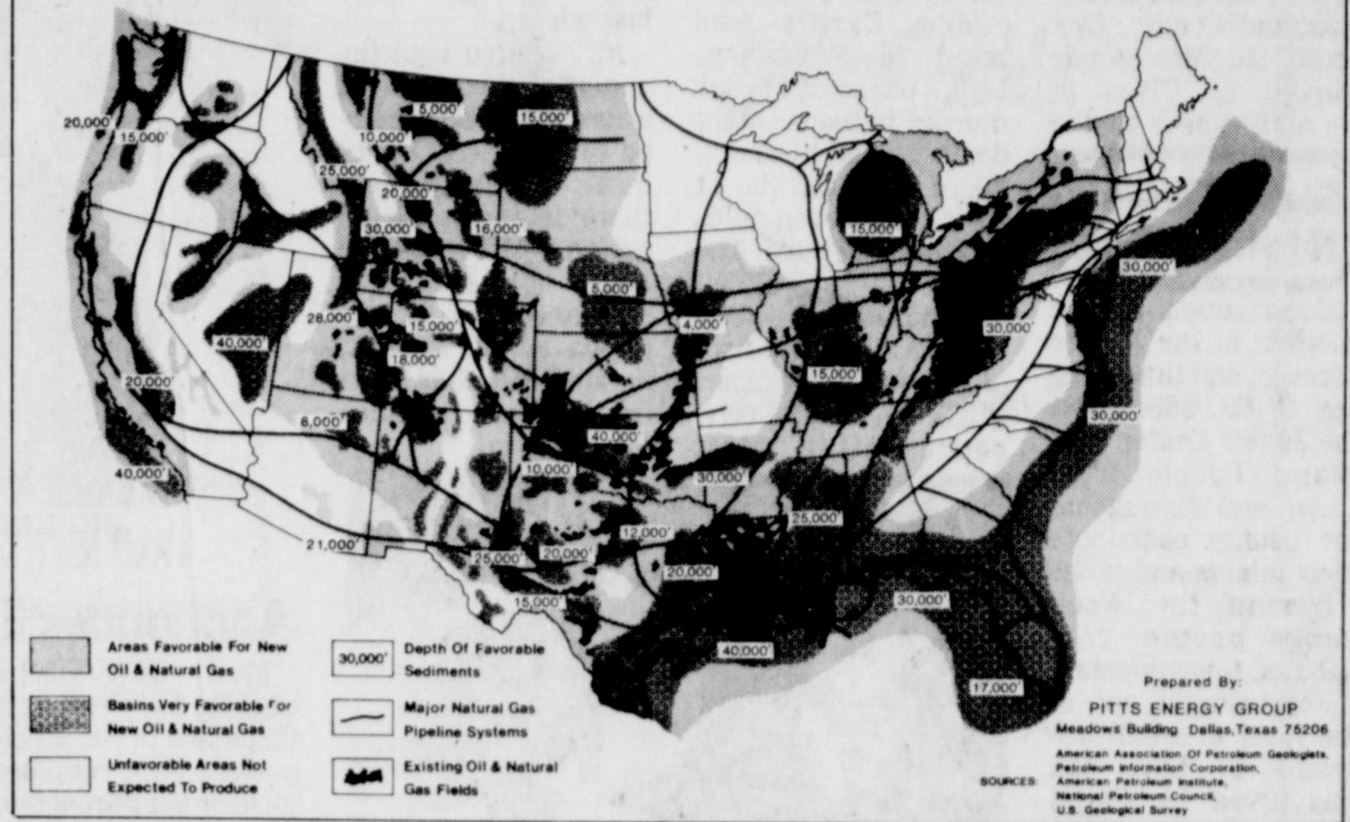

## 'A Song In The Heart' - 'Heart In The Song'

In 1976 Lyndell Cockburn began a three year period as Activity Director for Cisco Nursing Center. I first saw her there - sitting at the piano in the Recreation Room, running her fingers over the keys with a kind of free, melodic intensity. I had heard of her before that, of course, for Lyndell is known across Eastland County and this area for her musical talent.

Her voice, as she sang a ballad, was sweet yet strong, with a throbbing little undertone. Her audience was twenty elderly people, and they were enjoying every moment of her performance. And no wonder they kept watching her. For her looks were classic Anglo-Saxon - large, blue-gray eyes, dark brown hair, carefully chisled face.

A few words with her, however, convinced me that Lyndell didn't plan on sailing through life on her appearance. She was easy to talk to, with a sort of disarming honesty. She came across as an individual who really cared for other people. Obviously this Fair Lady didn't depend upon a brace of Knights to rescue her from anything. When life swatted her, she always lit on her feet!

Of course residents of the Nursing Center wept when Lyndell left her position to move back to Ranger. But moving to Ranger was going home - back to where she had been born.

This birthdate was in 1946, and Lyndell's parents were Everette and Betty Noth. Her home was full of music as far back as she could remember, for her Daddy played guitar, fiddle, banjo, mandolin, steel guitar, bass fiddle, and French Harp. Evenings were a very enjoyable time for the family. Right after supper Mr. Noth would get his musical instruments, then he'd say: "Jack (the oldest son) get your guitar, and Lyn La (that's what he called her), come and play the piano."

Lyndell's parents seemed to realize that she, like her father, had been born with a musical "ear", so taught her to play the guitar. Her Mother bought her a piano when she was ten years old -

after hearing her play "Tennessee Waltz" on a friend's piano. Lyndell took piano lessons for a few weeks, but her piano teacher became very upset when the little girl would add her own chords and rhythms to the "five finger" exercises. This concluded the music lessons. Lyndell, from that point on, played solely by "ear". The whole neighborhood around the Noth home would vibrate to the sounds of country, bluegrass, and country music.

Lyndell recalls that two weeks before her Daddy died told her to "Never stop playing music and singing. But be careful where you

perform - because you will always be in the public eye. And whether you realize it or not - you will be watched!" Lyndell has not forgotten his words.

Lyndell graduated from Ranger High in 1965, and was employed during the summer afterwards at Ranger Times as "Personals" Editor. Then her Mother inspired her to go to Beauty College, since Lyndell enjoyed styling all the neighbor women's hair. She graduated from Garland's of Texas Beauty College in 1966, and worked as a hairdresser for ten years.

The summer of 1966 brought other new experiences for Lyndell, for during that summer she made her first TV appearance - on KBOX TV in Odessa.

"I felt like a jelly fish! You don't know what it's like to have a whole new world opened up for you just by looking into the tiny eye of a TV Camera. I was horrified!" Recalls Lyndell.

From Odessa, she went to the Dallas-Ft. Worth area, where she was guest vocalist on "Brunch at Bronze M" KBUY radio.

She later signed a contract with Country Music Unlimited and Tony Douglas Publications, which is owned and operated by "Mr. Nice Guy" Tony Douglas, a Country recording artist from Athens, Texas. She toured with Tony Douglas and the Shrimpers, and made guest appearances with Grand Ol' Opry favorites Ernest Tubbs and Charlie Walker. She also appeared with Mel Street and TV's "Hee Haw" Kenny Price.

After her contract expired with Tony Douglas Enterprises she became female vocalist for American Music Enterprises, owned and operated by Allen Arnold, nephew of Eddie Arnold. She toured State wide for two years, then decided - for the best interests of her children - to give up traveling and perform only in the immediate area of Eastland County, which was still home to her. Traveling was also taking too much time from her most loved hobbies - songwriting and short stories.

Among the songs written during the last six years are: "Sad Eyes", "We Live To Die", "I'm About Six Feet

Under", "The Flag's Still Flying High", "Hoping That You'll Never Walk Away", "Lady Of The Lake", "Cozy Fireplace", "My Country Man", "Mother Introduced Me To Jesus", and "Walk With Me".

While Activities Director at Cisco Nursing Center, Lyndell wrote several articles about residents there. She was noted for her Column "News From The Center", which appeared in Cisco Press. She won First Place in the Article category of the Regional Scribes and Scribblers Contest 1978 with an article entitled "We're Old, Not Dead", which was written about the life story of W.J. Prange, a resident at Cisco Nursing Center. She is presently writing a book about the residents, staff, and volunteers of Cisco Nursing Center entitled "Kickin' It Up At 80". This book will feature happenings that occurred when Lyndell was employed at the Center.

Lyndell recently signed a contract to be Activities Director Consultant at Cisco Nursing Center. "Just because I resigned when I got married doesn't alter my love for those people. I don't get to see them as often as I'd like, for I have commitments at home, but at least I'll be seeing them once a month shortly. I can't wait to sing and play the piano for them again."

At the present time Lyndell is Ranger Junior College's Coordinator for Special Services for Displaced Homemakers and Other Groups. This department is designed to aid divorced, widowed, or married persons (especially with dependents) who have been forced into employment for the purpose of supporting themselves and their families. Since this may include displaced homemakers who are seeking to upgrade existing skills, it's Lyndell's department to help seek financial aid and child care grants (if qualified) counseling, career planning, and employment seeking skills for those interested in enrolling in R.J.C. Vo-Tec programs.

She and her husband, Jim, a Ranger Junior College

Counselor, are members of Eastland County's Range-Grass. This Blue Grass group consisting also of Berl McKinney, R.J.C. Vo-Tec Dean, Bill McKinney, Coach at Gordon I.S.D., Bob Murry, Comptroller at Ranger's Texas Railway Car Corp., and Doyle Maynard, owner of Super Save Gro. in Eastland. The group's busiest season is late spring and summer, when they appear at various Texas Blue Grass festivals. All during the year they entertain at area fairs, festivals, Senior Citizen Centers, Nursing Homes, ect.

Beside being known for her musical abilities, Lyndell is known in Eastland County as "That American Heart Lady". She became Regional Activities Chairman for Region 14 American Heart Association this year. She began her volunteer work for the organization in 1975 - the year after her father passed away due to a massive heart attack. Since then, she "put her heart" to work for a very worthy cause.

Other volunteer work will begin very shortly, when she becomes Den Mother for her nine year old son's Cub Scout Troop. "The troop will probably put on their Indian headgear and scalp me!" Jokes Lyndell.

Lyndell, Jim and their children are members of the First Baptist Church in Ranger, and they "give our Lord all the credit for our talents, abilities, and capabilities."

"The Lord has blessed me in so many ways," Lyndell states thoughtfully. "I, like many, have failed Him in the past. But as of a year ago, I promised Him and my family I'd live a life which excluded dance halls, clubs, and dives, and include a life using my talents where God knew I would receive most enjoyment. This I have done so far, and it has made a vast difference in my life. I'm sure I'll make mistakes - who doesn't? But I have learned, the hard way, to live one day at a time."

The Eastland County people whose lives she has touched are glad those days will be lived here.

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I would like to thank each and everyone of you who supported me in my bid for Sheriff. All of your efforts and hard work will always be remembered by my family and me. Although our efforts were unsuccessful the friendships made and renewed during this time are very valuable to me.

# Appeals Court Affirms Carlile Prison Verdict

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals has affirmed a jury verdict in 91st District Court, Eastland County, that sentenced Mrs. Annie Carlile of Cisco to serve 12 years in the

state penitentiary, according to a report Friday by District Attorney Emory Walton.

Mrs. Carlile was tried in February, 1978, on charges of murder in the shooting death of her husband, Floyd Dale Carlile, at their home seven miles southwest of town. The shooting occurred June 12, 1977.

The Abilene law firm of Rhodes, Doscher, Chalk and Heatherly, representing Mrs.

Carlile, filed an appeal after the verdict was returned. Oral arguments were heard last winter.

Mr. Walton said the appeals court's formal order would be received in Eastland County in a few days. Unless there is further legal action, Mrs. Carlile could be formally sentenced and sent to prison within a week, he said. She has been free under bond since the 1978 trial.

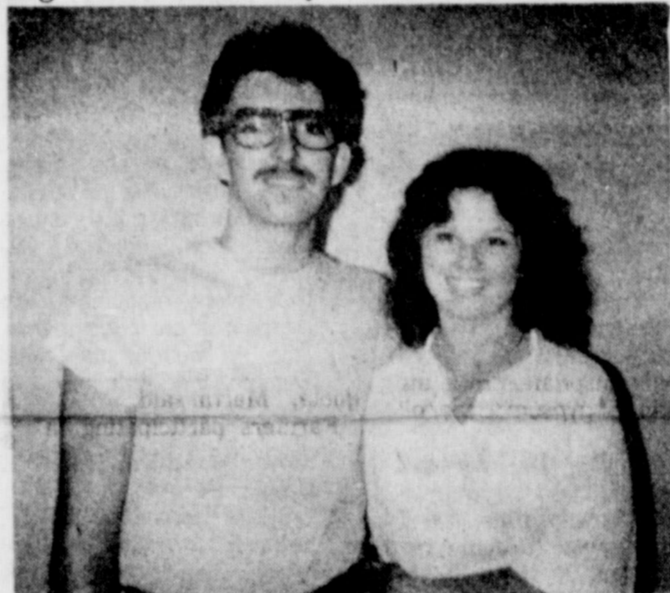

# GORDON SPOT

by DeMarquis Gordon

Scattered showers that fell in Eastland County a week ago were a big help to young crops and grassland. The areas around Flatwood, Carbon, Kokomo and Lake Leon seemed to have received the best rain - an inch or more in some of these areas. The young peanut and watermelon crops were looking much better. The blowing sand had caused a lot of damage to these crops the week before the rain.

Peanut planting is not complete, but many producers were in the fields this past week getting the crops in.

Good hay crops are being baled. The good May and early June rains have produced some excellent forage sorghum and coastal hay.

This is the time of year when we begin finding that our tomatoes are rotting on the blossom end. Blossom-end-rot in tomatoes may be blamed on several conditions but the resulting breakdown is due to water being withdrawn from cells on the blossom end of the fruit.

The withdrawal results when the water uptake by the plants roots is insufficient to make up for that loss in plant growth processes.

The breakdown of the fruit begins as a green water-soaked area which rapidly turns gray to dark brown in color, followed by shrinking and collapsing.

Insufficient water uptake occurs when the soil is too dry. Also, poor aeration resulting from excessive soil moisture can prevent water uptake by the roots. In addition, when hot winds and low humidity occurs, many plants cannot take up enough water to counteract the moisture lost from transpiration.

One of the best ways to maintain an adequate supply of moisture under tomatoes is by using a mulch over the root area and water when the soil becomes dry. Since a calcium deficiency affects the plants transpiration rate, the addition of gypsum to the soil

sometimes help to prevent blossom-end-rot. There have been some reports that spider mites are causing damage to vegetables. Spider mites are red in color and extremely small in size. They are usually found on the underside of leaves. The tiny insect pests cause damage by sucking juices from the plant. The infested leaves turn whitish in color and fine webs can be seen on the leaves. Insecticides registered for use on spider mites are Kelthane, Diazinon, and Ethion. Sulphur will help repel spider mites. As with any pesticide, be sure to read the label and follow all directions.

**FARMERS TO REPORT SEED PEANUTS**

David W. Martin, County Executive Director of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committee, reminds farmers that 1979 crop peanuts retained on the farm for seed or other purposes must be reported when 1980 planted peanuts are certified.

"Seed peanuts are considered as quota peanuts marketed and need to be reported on the 1979 peanut marketing card," he said.

To avoid being in violation of the peanut price support program, farmers who did not retain peanuts for seed are required to report the name and address of the person from whom these peanuts were obtained, in addition to the amount and type of peanuts.

If seed peanuts, plus the 1979 crop peanuts marketed, exceed the poundage quota, a penalty will be assessed. "We will visit farms for verification of the quantity reported and determine whether the peanuts retained exceed the poundage quota," Martin said.

Farmers participating in the program are assigned an acreage allotment and a poundage quota, and only peanuts grown on allotted acreage are eligible for price support. Peanuts grown on allotted acres and within the farm's poundage quota are considered "quota" peanuts. Peanuts grown on allotted acres but in excess of the quota are "additional" peanuts and are supported at a lower price support level.

Further details on seed peanuts may be obtained from the local ASCS office.

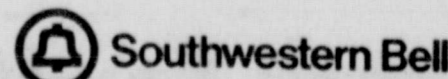

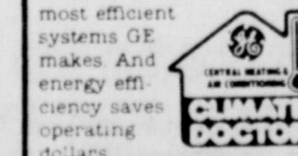

## Homemaking Tips

By Janet Thomas

Families can save money on their food dollar by avoiding food fads.

The Eastland County Extension Service is offering a free mail-out letter series. The Food Fad letter series can be requested by telephoning Mrs. Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent at 629-2222 or by writing P.O. Box 189, Eastland, Texas 76448.

What is included in the series? The five letters include:

- Food fads and fallacies
- Facts about additives
- Myths about vitamins
- Organic foods
- How to spot a quack

Persons desiring to receive the letter series should register by June 25th. The Food Fad letter series will begin on July 1st.

Food is first in everyone's budget thinking. Here are some steps you can take as a shopper to minimize the impact of higher food prices. Getting the most nutrition for your food dollar has always been a good strategy.

If you eat a variety of whole foods (fresh fruits and vege-

tables, dairy products, grains, and protein products) you are likely to get all the vitamins you need. You should be aware of the prices you are sometimes paying for vitamin fortification. For example, a popular brand of wheat flakes can sell for as much as 30 cents less per box than the identical size of fortified wheat flakes made by the same manufacturer. The only difference between the two is that the fortified flakes have been sprayed with about a penny's worth of vitamins.

Be aware of the use "open dating". Many perishable items carry "open dating" - the date by which a product should be sold or used. Check especially dairy products to make sure that the date on the carton shows the product is fresh. You don't want to waste money on spoiled food.

Another good consumer hint is to be an "egg pert". When buying eggs, you should look over the price differential between small, medium, large, and extra large. Experts say that if the price difference is more than seven to eight cents between one size and the next, the smaller size is the better buy.

**RECIPE FOR THE WEEK**  
This week's recipe is for a good summer salad.

**Lettuce Layered Salad**  
1 head lettuce, tear into bite size pieces

- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1 cup chopped onions
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 10 slices bacon, fried crisp and crumbled
- 1-10 oz. package frozen green peas

Layer as listed using a large deep glass salad bowl. Spread 2 cups mayonnaise combined with 2 teaspoon sugar over top layer. Cover with 14 oz. shredded Cheddar cheese.

Make at least 12 hours before serving and keep tightly sealed until served. Must be refrigerated. Serves 8.

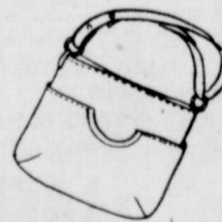

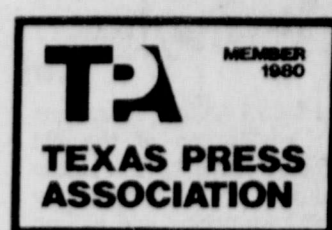

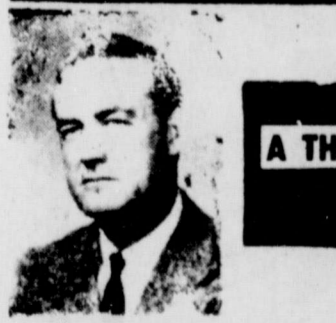
