Electric Utility Systems To Connect Into Nation's Grid

Three major electric utility systems in the southwest have reached agreement on terms which will connect the intrastate Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT) into the nation's interstate Eastern Interconnected Grid. The agreement was announced jointly by officials of Central and South West Corporation, Houston Lighting and Power Company and Texas Utilities Company.

Utility companies of the Dallas-based Central and South West Corporation include Central Power and Light Company, Corpus Christi, and West Texas Utilities Company, Abilene, both members of the intrastate ERCOT; and Public Service Company of Oklahoma, Tulsa, and Southwestern Electric Power Company, Shreveport, both members of the interstate SWPP.

Under terms of the settlement the single-estate ERCOT system will be linked with the multi-state Southwest Power Pool (SWPP) through high voltage direct current (DC) interconnections in southeast and north central Texas.

Texas Utilities Company includes Dallas Power and Light Company, Texas Electric Company, Fort Worth, and Texas Power and Light Company, Dallas.

Durwood Chalker, chairman and chief executive officer of the SWPP, said the agreement will provide for the construction of new transmission lines and substations in the region.

...But we didn't think so at first....on May 15, 1980, after checking through customs and finding our baggage, Mother and I strolled down the sidewalk until someone abruptly shouted "STOP!" Saucer-eyed, we turned to see a big black fellow sitting on a bench near the building. Gruffly he motioned and grunted, "over there!"

We complied without hesitation, boarding a tour van which held several other Texans from our group. The Stewart Company had given trips to Paradise Island to dealers whose sales of Zenith TV's had won enough points.

The driver finally came around to the right side of the van to take command of the steering wheel. He joked about its being only a toy. We started traveling on the left side of the road. Then a car came careening around a curve and my heart almost stopped.

Our driver honked as we did a little careening ourselves. Nonchalant pedestrians received their share of honks as we whisked through Nassau, across the bridge and to the Britannia Beach Hotel on Paradise Island. Our driver told us to be sure to try conch chowder before leaving.

We received our keys and went to our room on the 6th floor. Our baggage was brought to our door about an hour later. The "chillers" weren't working too well in the humid climate so we cooled off on our private balcony.

Some of the group went to a native night club performance, but Mother and I decided to try the conch chowder at a nearby restaurant. It really was delicious.

The next day we boarded a tour bus to see the sights of New Providence Island, which contains the business district of Nassau, capital of the Bahamas. (Paradise Island is just a small off-shore island from Nassau.)

We saw three forts which had protected New Providence in the past. Fort Charlotte contained a dungeon which we inspected. It was dark but not dank,

since it was carved out of rock and had several air holes for ventilation. The torture chamber was dimly lit by red light. Dummies were animated to show the operation of the stretching rack. Just as we were engrossed with the idea in silence, a loud crack brought us back to reality. The guide seemed to relish making it all a spooky experience. With just a few more steps, we were out in the marvelous sunshine, so thankful for our freedom.

Near Fort Fincastle we walked down the 66 steps of the Queens Staircase. They were fairly steep and had once been flanked by a waterfall.

At the bottom of the stairs straw vendors were waiting. Since these were the first straw wares we had seen for sale, we "fell" for some straw dolls. Later at the straw market we found very competitive prices and several other varieties of dolls, purses, hats, etc. Four or more city blocks comprised the marketeer's vying for tourist dollars. (Sometimes they gave change in \$3 bills.)

My favorite part of the tour was the residential section. Movie stars and other elite lived in pastel colored adobe houses with yards that would pass for botanical gardens. Virtually everything was in bloom. Hibiscus, royal poinciana trees, colorful croton, and bouganvillea vines were some that we recognized. Sapodillas were growing on several trees.

Later we sampled this tennis ball-sized, green, rough-skinned fruit. The inside was somewhat like a mushy pear in texture with several large flat, oval, black seeds. They were o.k. but nothing to compare to the tree-ripened mango. After paying \$1.50 for it and learning that it had been imported from Florida, I chomped down on it, intending to savor it to the fullest. Half an hour later I was still finding white threads in my teeth and the next morning, the left corner of my mouth sported a patch of vitamin C rash. (When will I ever learn that mangos do it to me?) Then I was a believer of the song "Don't Squeeze the Mango, no, No, NO..." rendered by a Calypso band at our barbecue.

That event was the first in which the total group of about 200 was present. Large mounds

of potato salad and cole slaw were on huge trays at the buffet table. There was a large bowl of what looked like Spanish rice with raisins. (The raisins turned out to be small beans.) Three kinds of meat were barbecued. Dizzy with decision, we chose from a picture book array of desserts.

We visited with the others and listened to the pool-side music. They played and sang "Everything I Do, My Monkey Do Too" and many more. After a while it seemed to sound much the same. Before leaving they sang "Your Daddy Ain't Your Daddy, But Your Daddy Don't Know."

After that bit of confusion, we retired to peaceful breezes on our balcony. The rushing sound of the water in the bay had a tranquilizing effect.

The next day we visited the straw market again and boarded the glass-bottomed boat. In the marine gardens were large cup sponges, starfish, corals, sharks and kelp. The navigator explained that the different shades of blue water were caused by the sand and kelp on the bottom. The kelp grew like grass in some areas, causing the water above to be darker. The water was the most beautiful shades of blue I had ever seen and marvelously clear.

That evening we din-

ed in an Italian restaurant. I had read about their famed and "glorious Fettuccini Alfredo." The setting was romantic. Piped in Italian music, candelights, and the scenic wall panorama evoked thoughts of the Mediterranean.

After we were seated at a table for two, the waiter took our orders. Gas burners at several stations kept plates hot for the Italian food.

Without our notice the former music had stopped and a musician entered the booth right next to us. He played classical guitar music and sang songs such as "Born Free" and "Maria." His mellow voice and soft guitar were so soothing. We learned that he was a regular entertainer there, a man of Cuban characteristics who looked to be in his fifties.

Since the waiter had not allowed us to order appetizer sizes alone, we both were brought a plate full of pasta. Mother had spaghetti and my "glorious" dish was actually more like noodles with a cheese sauce. For the life of me, I couldn't see what was so spectacular about it...a very filling meal... "gorge-us", maybe, but not glorious...in my book.

When we received the bill, my little Sprite drink had cost just \$1.75 and we "killed" a \$25 dollar bill with those noodles.

Mother retired early

while I sat in the hotel lobby with other members of our group. When the conversation lulled, we watched the people coming and going to the casinos and cabret, part of the hotel complex. Any style of dress from very casual to very dressy was worn by pre-to post-middle agers. Their facial expressions and ways of walk spoke volumes. As someone said, "This is better than watching T.V."

The next morning we checked out of the hotel, went through customs, paid our \$4 departure tax and boarded the Bahamasaire jet to Miami. As we departed Miami, we saw several

black columns of smoke arising from arson-plagued houses associated with the racial unrest there.

Dallas-Fort Worth airport never looked so good. Yes, we had been to Paradise, but we like Texas so much better. We just couldn't agree that it is all "BETTER IN THE BAHAMAS."

It was because of my dad, Henry A. Schaefer, that my mother and I were given this trip. I would like to thank him publicly and the people who have supported the business through the years.

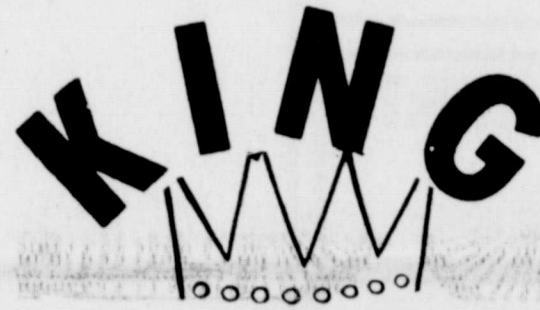

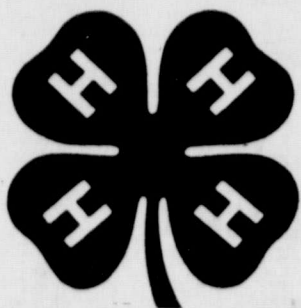

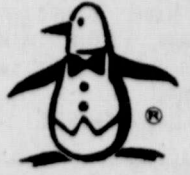
