Let's all say thank you to this lady for helping to give a good impression of Cisco and its citizens to others.

EXACTLY ONE week from Friday, we will all be celebrating July 4th and probably most will attend the gala of events scheduled to be held that day at Cisco City Park. The day will come to a conclusion following the Miss Cisco Pageant, if there is one since there had been only one entry by Tuesday morning of this week and the deadline for entry was 5:00 p.m. Wednesday afternoon. But there will be a fireworks display for sure after it gets dark.

With the mention of fireworks, we received a news release from the Texas Safety Association which states that the State Fire Marshal Ernest A. Emerson estimated that more than 200 persons in Texas will be injured by fireworks in 1980 and that at least 2,000 fires will be caused by "indiscriminate use" of the explosives.

Emerson noted that "it's the young people who are most often victims of fireworks accidents." Figures from the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission support this statement. Last year, out of 8,028 injuries nationwide during the Fourth of July holiday, 44.5% were in the 5-14 age bracket.

In light of these statistics, Emerson emphasized the important role of parents in supervising fireworks handling.

"Until there is good enforcement of fire safety legislation, it's vital that parents do their own enforcement for the sake of the health and lives of youngsters," Emerson said.

Those who plan to play with fireworks should consider these safety guidelines gathered from the fire marshal and from the consumer product safety commission:

*Always have adult supervision.

*Read and understand directions before using any fireworks.

*Ignite fireworks outdoors only, in a cleared area.

*Wet down the area used for your display and keep a garden hose or bucket of water close at hand.

*Ignite fireworks individually.

*Move back after lighting the fuse, and never try to relight or pick up fireworks that have malfunctioned. Douse them with water.

*Never ignite fireworks in glass or metal containers.

*Never experiment with fireworks.

TSA urges all Texans who get a "bang" out of playing with fireworks to handle them carefully this Fourth of July.

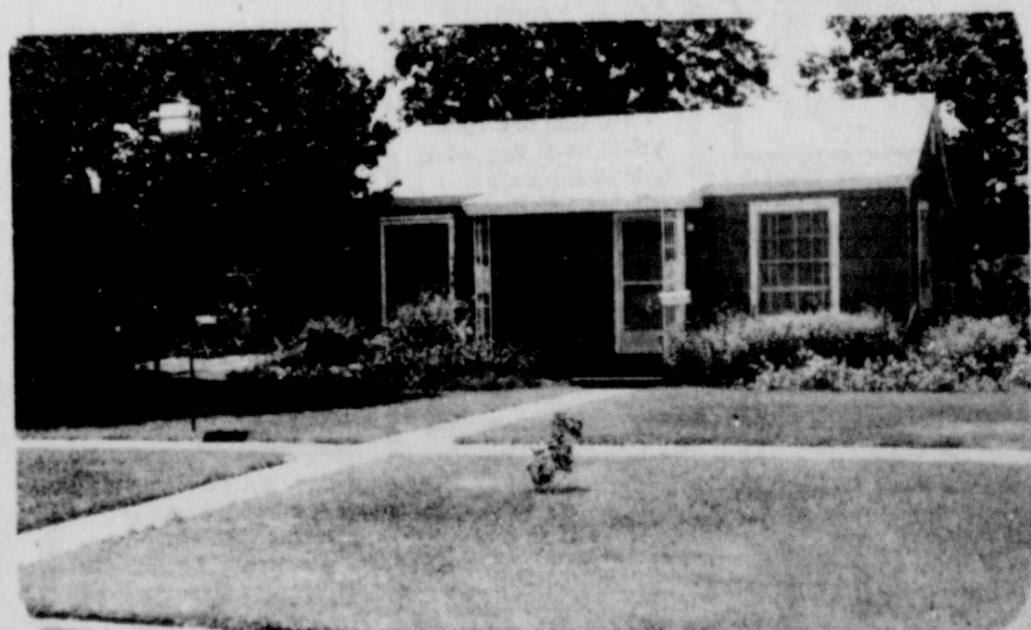
Games To Be Sponsored By CJC July 4th

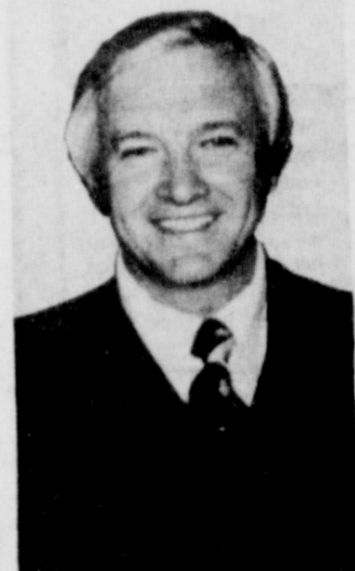

in humans," Sipe said, "and yet we live in a love-starved world. Divorce, crime, delinquency and most other problems besetting man would disappear if the two great laws ever given, to love God and to love one's neighbor, were obeyed."

"The 'Divine Love' Conventions will provide prac-

tical help for people of all ages in the application of these great laws in our lives," Sipe concluded.

Sipe said the sessions are planned for all age groups and all meetings are open to the public.

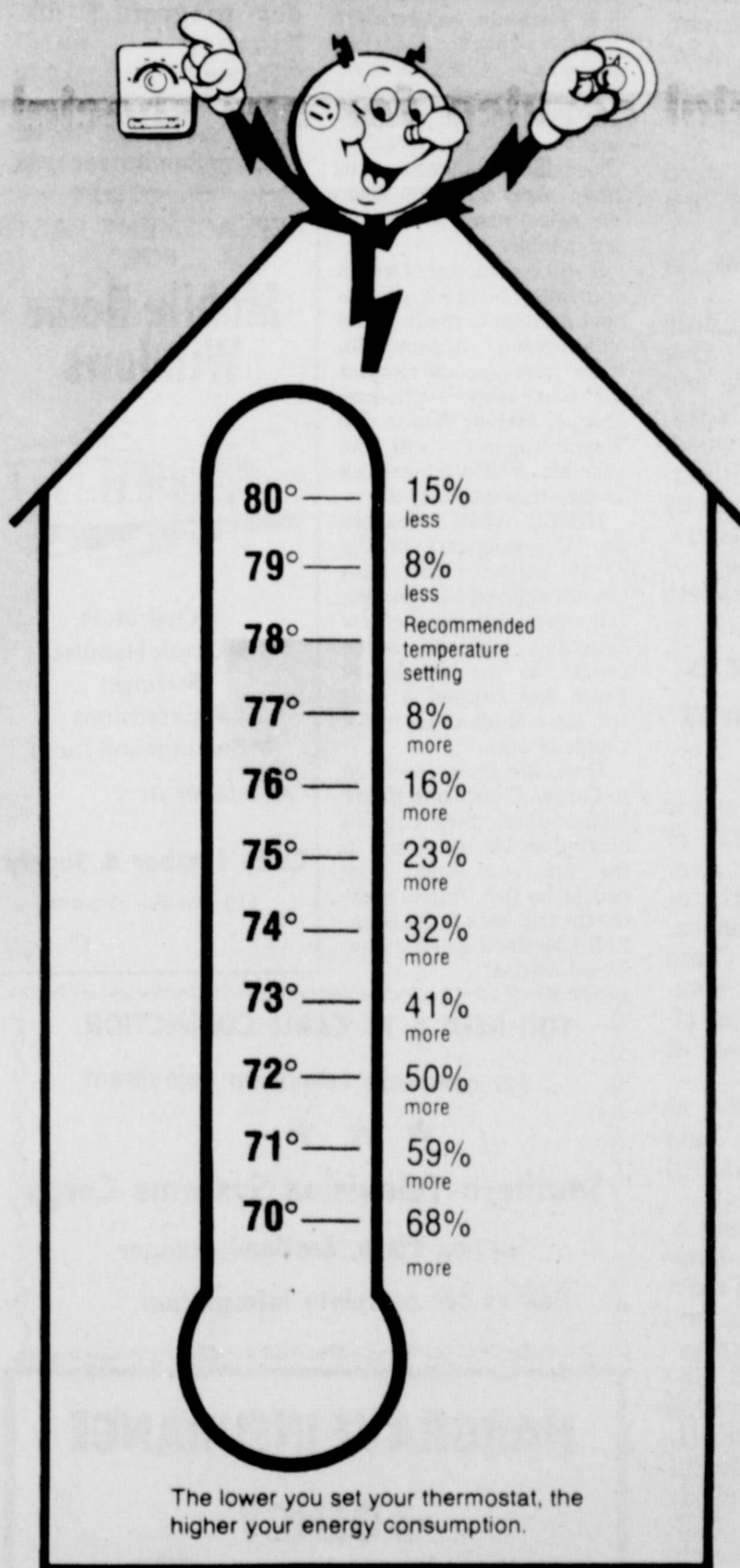

Three Cisco Girl Scouts Enrolled in Summer Camp

Girl Scouts across the nineteen county Heart of Texas Council area cite outstanding public support for their cookies sale as the principal reason for the record enrollment for this summer's resi-

dent camp program at Camp Wood Lake, the Lake Scout camp at Lake Brownwood. With enrollment of 208 girls for two 2-week camping sessions having reached its highest point in five years—a twelve percent increase over 1979—the camp was expected to be filled to capacity when camp opened on June 15.

Three Girl Scouts from Cisco are enrolled for two-week sessions. They are Teresa Cross, Shawn Fisher and Janet Glenn.

Girl Scout executive director Donna Fincher of Brownwood credits public support for the cookie sale with increased camper enrollment.

"An opportunity earned often has greater value than a give-away prize. This is the second year that girls have been able to earn their own way to camp through their own hard work in the cookie sale, and the results speak for themselves," Ms. Fincher said.

Ninety percent of campers enrolled this summer have earned at least part of their fee through the cookie sale, and at least thirty-two percent of total camp fees will be paid from girls' earnings in the cookie sale.

"Everyone who bought a box of Girl Scout cookies has a share in the success of our program," Ms. Fincher said. "Through the cookie sale, girls have learned to set goals, to be responsible for records

of sales and earnings, and to know the value of their dollars. They have worked hard and now they are looking forward to the fun at camp that they have helped earn."

The Girl Scout camp is open to all girls age 7 through 17. Non-scouts are welcome on a space-available basis. There are still a few openings in the second session which begins June 29. Applicants may contact the Girl Scout office in Brownwood for more information.

The Girl Scout resident camp program offers a variety of activities--sports, drama, photography, swimming, sailing, canoeing, arts and nature crafts.

Swimming receives special attention, with Red Cross swimming classes and "drown-proofing" instruction offered to all campers.

A program highlight being anticipated this summer by one group of campers grew from fascination with skills that once were staples of homemaking in America--the carding, dyeing, spinning and weaving of wool.

Thanks to Delton Sweatman and Edith Carr at Ranchman's Wool and Mohair in Brownwood, the girls will start from the beginning. They will have the basic ingredient--a sheep which will yield a fleece--from which the girls will learn to card the wool, then to dye the wool using dye

which they will produce from plants found in nature. When it comes time for spinning and weaving, the girls will be using simple tools which they will learn to make themselves.

Another interest has sent Girl Scout leaders scrambling for consultants who know how to turn clay into adobe brick and how to fashion the brick into ovens. The girls have decided cookouts should include baking 'the way it used to be done.'

A photography workshop held in the fall of 1979 has led to widespread interest among campers. Work on a photographic darkroom at the camp is almost complete and campers plans to produce their own picture

postcards this summer.

The Girl Scout camp director, Zola Moon of Brownwood, has been working with girls in camping programs for a number of years. She has directed Camp Wood Lake for the past two summers. Miss Moon stresses the educational value of the Girl Scout program conducted in summer camps as well as in year around troop program.

"Camping can be so much more than a recreation or an entertainment program. Most campers come to camp to have fun and we have an opportunity to help them discover that learning is fun, knowing is exciting, being able to do a thing well is rewarding," Ms. Moon said.

"Once girls are 'turned on' to the fun of learning new things, every new bit of knowledge is exciting and the desire to know is carried over into other pursuits, including school work."
