City Hall Office for Mayor Causes City Manager to Quit

The approval of a request by Mayor Roy Cartee for office space at City Hall at the regular semi-monthly meeting Tuesday night by the City Council resulted in the resignation Wednesday of City Manager John W. Boland, the walk-out by five city hall employees, an afternoon meeting by some 50 business leaders, and a special meeting of the City Council at 6 p.m. Wednesday.

The walk-out left City Manager Boland and City Secretary Marilyn Smith to handle city business. The day's activities attracted the attention of the Abilene newspaper and a Wednesday visit by an Abilene television news crew, the Texas State radio network, and the Fort Worth newspaper.

Mr. Boland contended that the city charter does not provide for the mayor or council members to office at City Hall and that such an office would be a violation of the charter's provisions. The charter also prohibits elected officials from issuing orders to or harrasing city employees, it was pointed out.

The walk-out was termed a protest of the action to permit the mayor to office at City Hall and of his issuing orders to workers. The five workers were back on the job Thursday, returning to work at the request of Mr. Boland.

In his letter of resignation, Mr.

Boland wrote: "I hereby submit my resignation effective July 11, 1980, as City Manager because of what I feel are several irreconcilable differences between a majority of this Council and myself. I have no animosity for my part. It is my belief that several decisions have been made by this Council which have been promulgated by the present mayor which I feel are incongruous with the basic principles of the Council-Manager form of government.

"I have learned many things in my three years of service to the citizens of Cisco and will cherish those friendships made during this period. Many things have been accomplished but so much remains."

The meeting Wednesday night was called "for personnel problems." A notice of the called meeting was posted on the front door at City Hall.

The meeting of some 50 business and civic leaders was held at the First National Bank's conference room at 3 p.m.

It was the feeling of the group that Cisco is "on the move" and too much was at stake to permit unrest at City Hall to detract. No city employees or council members were present. After considerable discussion, the group decided to appoint a committee of five business men to attend the City Council meeting and speak for citizens of the community, emphasizing

the need to comply with provisions of the City Charter.

The group expressed confidence in the work of the city manager and sympathized with his decision to leave his post. They heard several city employees who had walked off their jobs earlier in protest. A spokesman for the group noted that "the last thing we want is to cause trouble for anyone."

It was the consensus of the group that "following provisions of the City Charter will take care of all problems."

Some 700 persons attended the 6 p.m. called City Council meeting with Mayor Cartee and all council members present along with City Manager Boland and City Secretary Smith.

Prior to taking up the "personnel matters," the Council agreed to hear members of the citizens committee. Chairman Ronnie Ledbetter first presented John Muller, Cisco Junior College instructor, followed by Brad Kimbrough, local business man and Gene Abbott, manager of the Chamber of Commerce.

The speakers noted that the City Charter provides for the mayor to preside at Council meetings and to take care of ceremonial duties along with handling emergency matters. It was pointed out that Council functions were limited to policy matters and directing the work of the city manager, leaving day-to-day management of city affairs to the city manager.

The business men emphasized that "Cisco has too many things going for us" for citizens not to work as a team for the best interests of the community. Mr. Abbott told the Council that he was planning to meet in Dallas Monday with people interested in providing a rental housing program for Cisco and that "another important industrial prospect is looking at us."

Mr. Ledbetter, in summary, said that it was the feeling of business men that the

mayor's office at City Hall was in violation of the City Charter.

After the group's appearance, Mr. Cartee asked the Council if "we should consider the departure of the employees from work as their resignations and should we consider Mr. Boland's letter of resignation?"

Mr. Boland then pointed out that neither item was on the meeting's agenda and, under Charter regulations, the items could not be considered at the meeting. Mr. Cartee asked City Attorney Billy Wright for a ruling and Mr. Wright agreed with the city manager.

Mr. Boland then observed that "the employees left because they do not want to work under you (Mr. Cartee), and the Council should be aware of this fact."

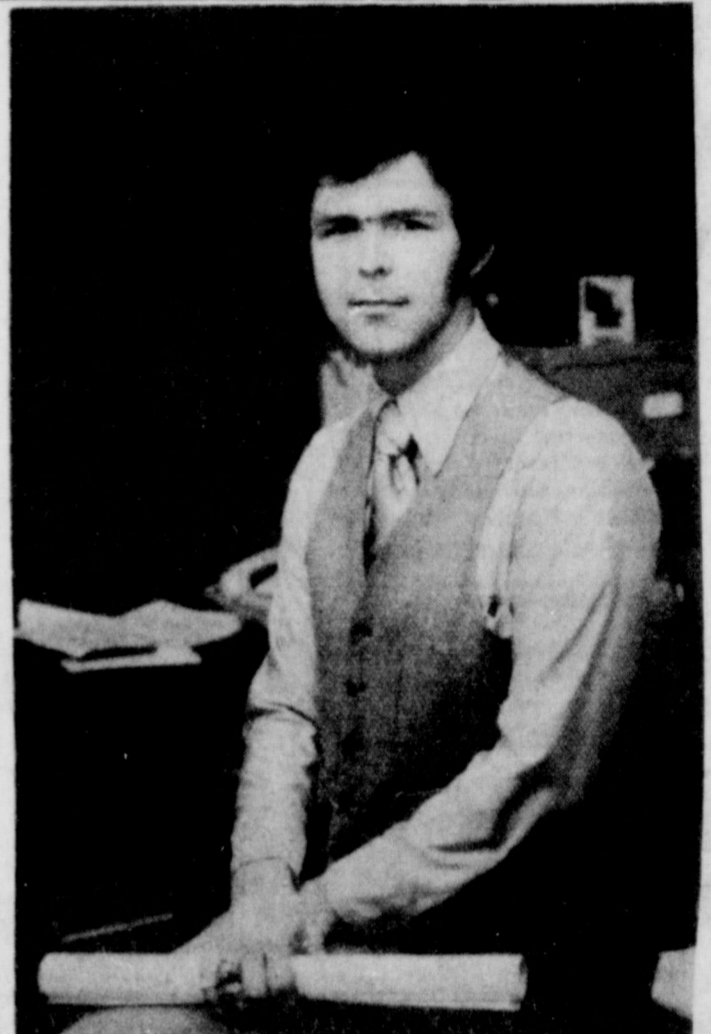
Councilman Bill Eudy noted that he had never had any contact with any city employee, leaving their management to the city manager. He added that he wasn't always satisfied with the city manager's handling of matters. He said he was happy with the city manager type of government.

Councilman Raymond Whitley observed that "maybe it's time for us to look at ourselves."

Businessman Gerald Winnett was recognized and he suggested that leaders can accomplish much by simply asking questions without offering suggestions.

Truman Kirk, local attorney, spoke briefly to urge city officials "to follow the charter," noting that everything will work if provisions of the charter are kept in mind. Mr. Kirk, like most other speakers, was applauded by the crowd.

Mr. Cartee asked the Council if they would like to rewrite the meeting agenda and meet again Friday night. Councilwoman Lucy Collier moved that the matter of the city manager's resignation be brought up at the next regular meeting on July 8th. The motion carried. The matter of the city employees was left to



CITY MANAGER John W. Boland, who will leave his position here July 11th, took over his post in Cisco in June, 1977. He came here from Tullia where he served as assistant city manager.

Accomplishments of the city during Mr. Boland's tenure have been highlighted by improvement in city finances, which included a balanced budget the first year, a surplus within six months, and sound financial condition in 18 months. Presently, the city's financial condition is regarded as the best it has ever been with balances of over \$160,000.

Improvements have been made in streets, the sewer system has been upgraded, the tax roll has increased each year, the water system has been maintained and improvements are in prospect. Mr. Boland has supervised an improvement program for the city airport, renovation of the Battle Creek pump station, and done considerable improvement work at Lake Cisco Park.

Mr. Boland has been active in community and church affairs. He is a member of the Cisco Lions Club, and he and his wife Ann are members of the First Baptist Church. Mrs. Boland is a teacher in the Gorman School System.

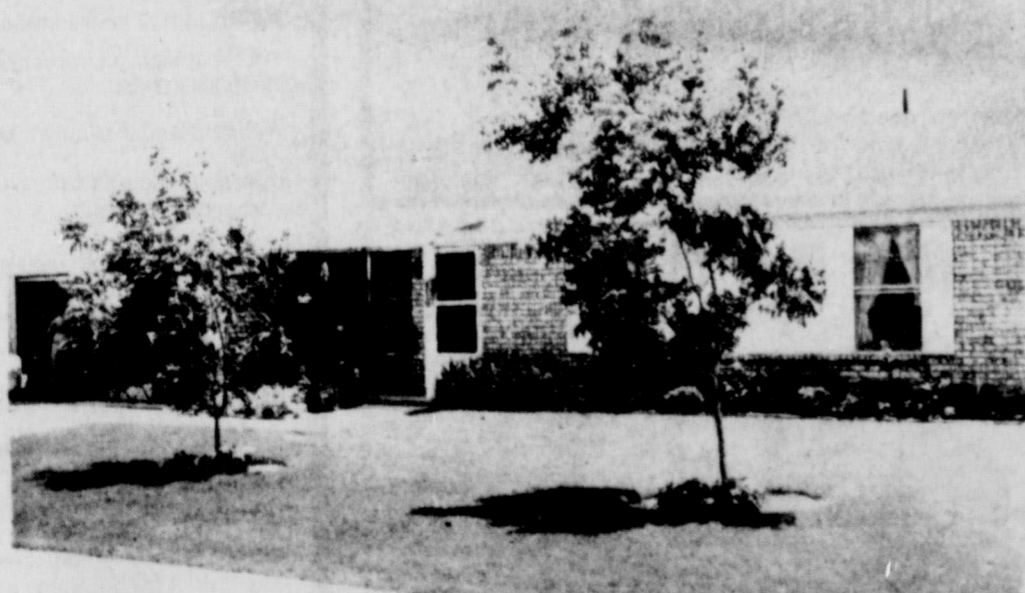

..... room that was prepared for conferences before he took office. Since taking office, the mayor has had a telephone installed in the office at a cost to the taxpayers of \$131.25 for installation and \$4.40 per month for use.

Mr. Boland said his resignation would not be reconsidered. He added that he would begin looking for employment elsewhere.

Mr. Boland said he would like to state that while he and Councilwoman Louise Allison had frequently disagreed, "I have no quarrel with Mrs. Allison. She works hard for the best interests of Cisco, and I appreciate the help she has been. She is fully informed about community affairs."

James Donne, the English poet wrote, "no man is an island entire of himself; everyman is a piece of the continent, a part of the main."

Although these lines were written to impress upon us the importance of each individual, I have often thought how beautifully they describe the inter-dependency of the business and professions with a small city such as Cisco.

To properly direct and harmonize this inter-dependency, we need to maintain some central organization through which each voice can be heard. We need a sounding-board for this organization.

You may be surprised to know that we already have the necessary machinery—all organized and ready to go. This organization is called the CISCO CHAMBER OF COMMERCE. It can only be as strong and as efficient as your participation and support will allow. If it is not serving in a suitable manner, —change it. We need to ACT and RE-ACT within this organization,—helping to create for ourselves and our families the better life.

Local Writers Place In Annual Awards Banquet

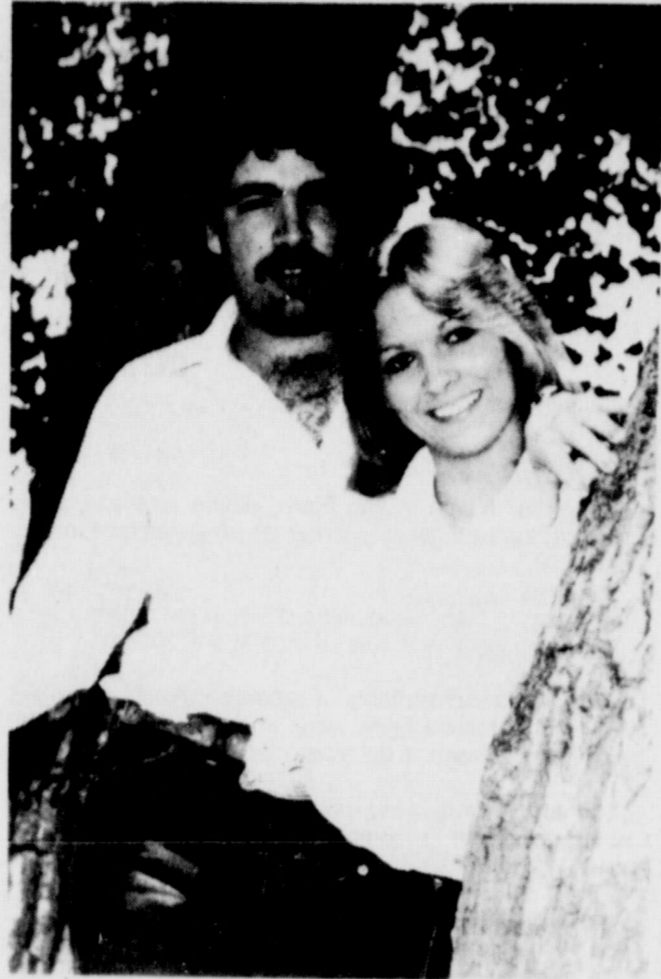
Three Cisco writers placed in the top three places in the Abilene Writers Guild 11th annual awards banquet Friday night at Briarstone Manor in Abilene.

New Machinery To Speed Mail At Post Office

A modernization program that eventually will eliminate 30 percent of the clerical force has been started by the Post Office Department in the United States. Postmaster Louie Gilbert reported in a talk last Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club.

New machinery, including computers, will be the basis of the modernization program, Mr. Gilbert said. The post office will enlarge the present five digit zip code to nine digits as the progressive plan expands, he said.

The new program will have machines that will handle 30,000 pieces of mail per hour as compared to 40 pieces per minute now being handled by the average mail clerk. The post office averages two per cent in mail errors.

Mr. Gilbert said the Post Office Department, which became a wholly owned government corporation in 1971, operated at a profit in 1979 for the first time. He said the mechanization program would, hopefully, help control mailing costs.

The Post Offices of the nation serve in other areas, Mr. Gilbert noted. They handle food stamps, the census, distribute income tax forms, social security numbers and information, and soon will handle registration of young men for the military draft.

The extremely hot weather during the past week seemed to magnify other problems for Eastland County residents.

We have had many calls and most of them concern grasshoppers, bagworms, fleas or tomato blossom-end-rot. Since we have written articles or columns on each of these problems we will not go into much detail, but briefly review these problems and their control.

Bagworms are mainly a problem of Cedar type trees, but will attack any tree or shrub. We have noticed that many of the cedar type trees in the county are infested. Spray applications of Sevin or Toxaphene will control bagworms, but this must be applied before the worms mature and are enclosed in the bags.

Grasshoppers continue to be a problem for all green vegetation. They are not easily controlled, but Sevin or Diazinon offers the best method. Some are using bait to help keep grasshoppers under control.

Fleas seem to be especially bad this year. Successful flea control must include treatment of the infested pets and also thorough treatment of the entire infested

premises - inside and out. Retreatment in about 3 to 6 weeks may be required to kill fleas that had not hatched at the time of first treatment. If you need further information on flea control call or come by the Extension office and ask for the publication Fleas.

We are getting several calls a day concerning the tomatoes that have a rotten spot on the end opposite the stem. Blossom-end-rot is due to water being withdrawn from cells on the blossom end of the fruit.

The withdrawal results when the water uptake by the plant's roots is insufficient to make up for that lost in plant growth processes.

The breakdown of the fruit begins as a green water-soaked area which rapidly turns gray to dark brown in color, followed by shrinking and collapsing. Further decomposition of the fruit can occur if microorganisms enter the affected area.

Insufficient water uptake occurs when the soil is too dry. Also, poor aeration resulting from excessive soil moisture can prevent water uptake by the roots. Standing water will cause most plants to wilt or die because the roots' air supply is cut off. In addition, when hot winds and low humidity occur, such as last week, many plants cannot take up enough water to counteract the moisture lost from transpiration.

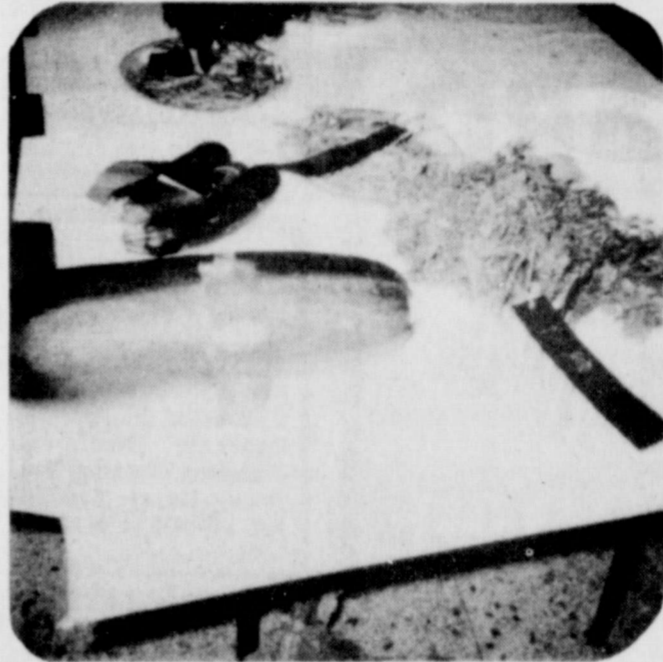
A good mulch around tomato plants and adequate moisture in the soil is probably the best things you can do to prevent blossom-end-rot. If you have a soil low in calcium, the addition of agricultural gypsum will also help.

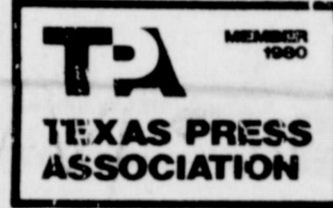

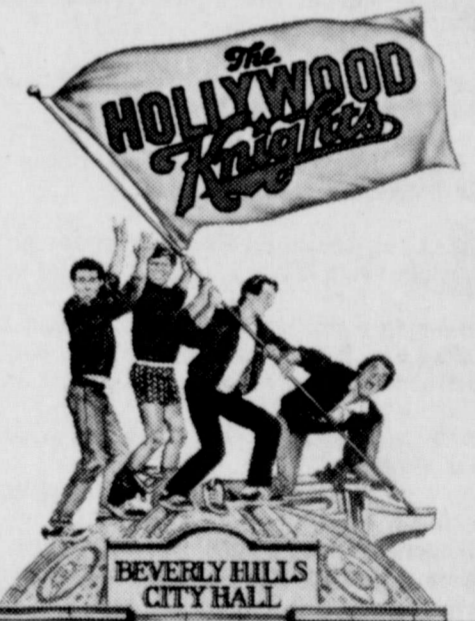

Homemaking Tips

"They are just playing"... it's with such a statement that grownups often under estimate children's play. But to children, playing is the most serious thing in all the world. It is their way of learning, experimenting and finding out about the world. Play does more good than keeping children amused, out of mischief or out of the way.

Summertime vacations and visiting grandchildren provide excellent opportunities for having creative play materials available at home. Finger painting is creative play and a challenge to the artistic abilities of young children. You can successfully make homemade finger paints by the following recipe:

HOMEMADE FINGER PAINTS

Laundry Starch 3/4 cup
Soap Flakes 1 1/2 cups
Cold water
Boiling water 1 quart
Cake coloring

Mix the starch with a little cold water. Pour the mixture slowly into one quart of rapidly boiling water. Stir constantly until the mixture thickens; when it cools slightly, add the soap flakes. Stir well. Divide into three or four parts and color each part a different color.

Jars of finger paint wrapped attractively would be a splendid birthday or Christmas gift for a child.

Pasting is another activity which is interesting for children. Try this recipe for homemade paste:

A GOOD PASTE RECIPE
1 cup flour
3 cups water
1 teaspoon benzoate of soda

(this keeps the paste from souring)
Addition wintergreen flavor makes paste more like commercial kind
Prepare as for starch and boil five minutes.

Pour into old cold cream jars. These jars wrapped attractively would also make an enjoyable gift for a child.
Children also delight in modeling clay. Modeling clay can be made at home as follows:

MODELING CLAY AT HOME

1 cup flour
1/2 cup salt
3 teaspoons alum
coloring
Enough water to hold together

Mix as for dough and bread to the consistency of clay. This modeling material will remain soft for weeks if it is kept in a moist cloth. Store in a closed container.

Toys and play equipment need not be the most expensive or even store bought.

One thing a child learns as he plays is that he must take care of his play materials. This helps him acquire habits of neatness, orderliness, self-reliance and responsibility. This training should begin quite early because it is easier to establish good habits from the beginning

than to correct bad ones.

Some hints to help your children learn to take care of their playthings are: Remember that the younger the child, the more help he needs in putting his toys away. The child needs time to put his things away so remind him to do this ahead of the time when the play period is to end. Provide a convenient play for storage. It is better if the young child doesn't have too many things to play with at one time. You might put some toys away for special occasions, or alternate the use of toys. In so doing, old toys seem like new ones when taken out.

Census Taker Jobs Are Still Available

Full-time, temporary jobs as census takers in this area are still available, Bill Yarbrough Manager of the local 1980 census office, said today.

"We're counting on you if you can work a 40-hour week visiting households and interviewing the residents," the manager said, adding that some evening and Saturday work will be required.

Census takers will begin work soon as part of the 1980 Census of Population and Housing. They will attend a training session for which they will be paid. Most census takers will be paid a piece rate for the number of household interviews completed. In a few instances, pay will be by the hour. For

all workers, pay will average \$4 an hour or more.

Census takers must be able to follow printed instructions, do simple arithmetic, and read maps for which they will be tested before hiring. They should be able to walk a considerable amount, climb stairs, and ought to have good eyesight and hearing. 

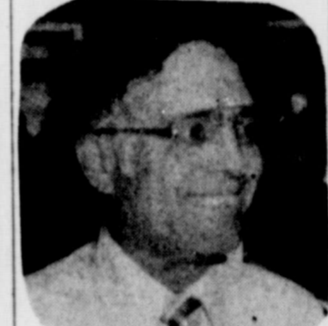

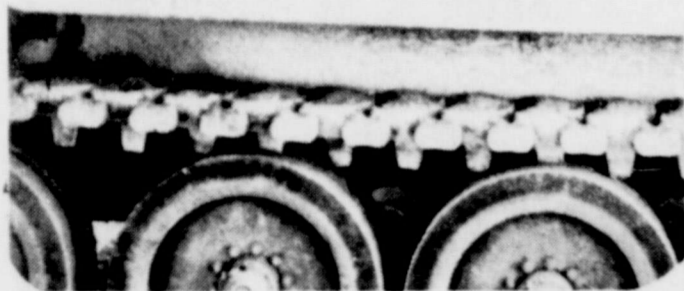

THOMAS JEFFERSON HAD A HOSTAGE CRISIS, TOO

Jimmy Carter is not the first American president to be faced with a hostage crisis in the Islamic world. Washington, Adams, Jefferson, and Madison were repeatedly plagued with just that problem. It was Jefferson and his Secretary of State and successor Madison who came up with a solution.

At the time there were, on the Barbary Coast of North Africa, four Islamic kingdoms—Morocco, Algeria, Tunisia, and Tripoli—which lived mainly by stealing on the high seas.

Rather than prevent such outrages, the maritime nations of Europe avoided depredations by paying formal bribes or "tribute," even as westerners today pay tribute for Arab oil.

The U.S., under Washington and Adams, followed the European example. Though the Washington administration built a small Navy in response to Arabic threats, it opted, under popular pressure, to mothball the fleet and pay tribute instead.

Jefferson and Madison refused to follow such a course. Jefferson sent the infant U.S. Navy to the Mediterranean to engage in defensive operations, protecting American merchant ships.

The hostage crisis came in 1803. Late that year the 44-gun frigate, U.S.S. Philadelphia, ran aground on a sandbar off Tripoli, and its entire crew was taken hostage. That was a routine instrument of statecraft in the Islamic world; when European governments proved loath to pay tribute, Barbary Coast rulers whipped them into line by seizing their nationals and

holding them in dungeons until they capitulated and, incidentally, ransoms were paid. Jefferson would have no part of it. He threw the entire U.S. Navy, such as it was, against Tripoli—not to free the hostages, but to teach the Tripolitans never to trifle with the U.S. again. After some spectacular fighting, the Pasha of Tripoli was forced to agree to cease plundering American ships and to waive American tribute in future. The captives were released, unharmed.

But the American commander, Edward Preble, was not content to let the matter rest there. Interpreting the president's orders liberally

(and properly), he gave the Algerians and Moroccans a taste of the same medicine. The Jefferson administration was then able to establish a general settlement on favorable terms.

Unfortunately, during the war of 1812, the Algerians took advantage of America's troubles and resumed their raiding. Nearly 200 American merchant seamen were captured, imprisoned, and forced into slavery. As soon as it became possible, the Navy was sent out to tend to the matter.

In 1815 Madison dispatched Captain Stephen Decatur to the Mediterranean with three frigates, two

sloops of war, and five light Baltimore clipper-schooners. Just past the Strait of Gibraltar the squadron sighted the American flagship and reduced her to garbage in twenty minutes.

Decatur sailed on to Algeria and paid the pasha a personal call. Not only must the piracy stop, tribute be forever ended, and the enslaved crews released, Decatur said; the pasha must pay the

United States an indemnity for having captures the crewmen in the first place.

The pasha demurred, whereupon Decatur calmly informed him that the Americans would start sinking Algerian ships, one by one, until either the money was paid or there was not so much as an Algerian rowboat left afloat. The pasha capitulated. Then Decatur did the same thing with the rulers of

Tunis and Tripoli, with the same results.

The Barbary rulers were a slippery lot and no doubt planned to go back to their old way as soon as Decatur was out of sight. But they were in for a rude surprise. Decatur had scarcely sailed out before an American squadron under William Bainbridge sailed in to pay a polite "social call." The rulers got the message.

To make sure they did not forget it, the Navy leased a permanent base at Port Mahon on the Island of Majorca and cruised the Mediterranean on "friendly" visits for years thereafter. The Barbary Arabs did not forget.

The moral of the story is too obvious to mention. Would that we had a president today with the wits and guts to heed it.

You Like To Drink You Think?

I've known Leslie Chambers for many years now. I grew up knowing him. He was already wild while I was learning to be wild. So naturally we became friends. We shared many wild times together and now we are sharing the punishment for some of the things we have done.

I did time in the County jail with Les and now we are both doing time in the Texas Department of Corrections in Huntsville. We are in different units but we still correspond regularly by mail. Leslie wanted to say some things to other people in hopes that they might profit through his mistakes. He asked me to help him. This is his story.

I once was lost, but now am found. This is a line from "Amazing Grace" one of my favorite hymns. It says a lot about the way I

feel. I spent many years of my life among the lost. During that time I did a great many things that I shouldn't have, and now regret.

My primary downfall was alcohol. Almost all the bad and unpleasant events in my life I can trace to alcohol abuse. While under the influence of alcohol I did many things which I normally wouldn't do. At times I realized that drinking was ruining my life and I truly wanted to quit. But at that time I wasn't strong enough so alcohol continued to rule and dominate my life. Alcohol has cost me two wives and four children, and now it has even robbed me of my freedom.

One of the most terrible events of my life happened while on a drunken spree with some close friends. This is a constant nightmare to me and I

use it to show just what can happen as a result of drinking.

One weekend while on a drinking spree that began on Friday and was still going on Sunday, a tragedy struck! A friend and I picked up another friend and his wife and their two small boys. We all went to the river and the men were soon quite drunk. Now, one of our common forms of horseplay involved shooting guns at virtually anything that fell beneath our sights.

This particular Sunday we were doing just that. I was plunking at a can in the river. I was using my knee as a prop to steady the rifle while firing from a squat. In my intoxicated condition I somehow let my arm slip off my knee. As the gun swung out of control it fired and struck one of my friends in the face. His wife and children were there

with him. They saw him fall and saw the terrible wound in his nose. Rushing him to the hospital not knowing how bad he was had to be one of the most terrible events of my life. We all cried and cried that day and I spent many hours of worry over my friend. But no amount of worry or all the tears in the world can bring back the eye my friend lost that day. Luckily, he didn't lose his life.

I ask all of you who drink to think about this as just one example of what can happen when you go out and get drunk. Many terrible things have happened in my life as a result of my drinking. Not the least my coming to prison. Let me urge you out there, don't allow drinking to ruin your life to the extent it has mine before you decide to quit.

They should be able to walk a considerable amount, climb stairs, and ought to have good eyesight and hearing. They should have a home telephone and many will need a car, for which mileage will be paid when it is used in census work.

Mr. and Mrs. Castleberry need no introduction to Roof Garden audiences, though this marks the first time they have acted together. Also appearing in "Footsteps of Doves," are student Michael Clark of Cross Plains and Kim Bollinger of Eastland. This one-act play is directed by Colleen Altaffer, Artist-in-Residence.

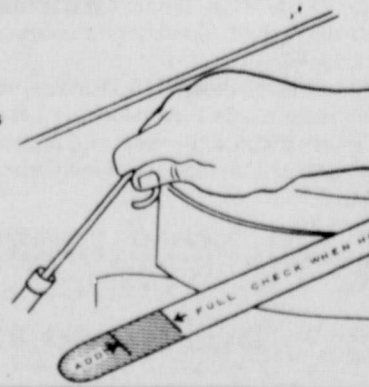

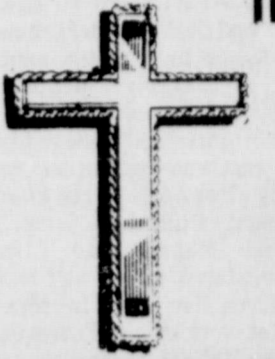

City Orders Closing Road Across Lake Dam

The road across Williamson Dam at Lake Cisco will be closed in the near future, according to action taken at the City Council meeting last Tuesday night.

The action was taken on recommendation of the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers after an inspection and study of the dam in January, 1977. The Moran highway route was moved several years ago leaving little traffic over the bridge.

The road will be closed after the city contacts the State Highway Department for instructions. The council voted unanimously for the action.

In other matters, the Council approved on second reading a resolution to close the 500 block of Avenue B at East 6th Street. The block deadends at the railroad and the road is not open and would not be used. Councilman Jerry Jeffcoat cast the only opposing

vote.

Regarding the matter of Mayor Roy Cartee having office space at City Hall, a motion for approval was made by Councilwoman Louise Allison and seconded by Councilman Bill Eudy. Voting for the motion were Allison, Eudy and Jeffcoat. Opposed were Lucy Collier and Raymond Whitley. Councilman Harold Phippen was absent. (This matter is treated elsewhere in The Press.)

City Auditor Joe Cooper appeared to answer questions about the current audit of city books. He said that work was slow due to numerous posting errors. It was pointed out that "nothing was wrong but errors were made in account posting."

Mrs. Allison moved to approve a resolution that city staff and elected officials submit expense account items for approval by the Council. The motion was seconded by

Mr. Jeffcoat and approved by unanimous vote.

A resolution on city policy concerning expenditures by city employees was tabled. The council discussed rules for conducting city meetings, and it was tentatively agreed that the Roberts Rules of Order would be used as a guideline.

The Council approved the 1980 tax assessment roll as submitted by the board of equalization. The new roll raised the market

valuations of taxable property from \$18,789,448 to \$19,553,863. This will raise the tax revenue some \$6,200. New to tax rolls will be \$130,265 in real estate and \$125,779 in personal property valuations.

The Council was briefed by City Manager John Boland on proposed rules for city personnel. Council members commended the proposal and took it under consideration for early action.
