



Nunn, Field Office Supervisor of the Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Division of the U.S. Department of Labor, announced that his Divisions had been directed by the U.S. Secretary of Labor to put special emphasis on the enforcement of those provisions of the Federal law which Congress enacted to protect the safety, health, wellbeing, and op-portunities for schooling of youthful workers.

It is the Wage and Hour Division of the U.S. Labor Department which investigates such matters—and may insist on legal action when it finds that a violation of the law has occurred.

The penalties for such violations can amount to a fine of \$10,000,, and for a second conviction for a similar offense a fine of \$10,000 and as much as six months imprisonment, or both.

Mr. Nunn pointed out that Congress, in adopting the Fair Labor Standards Amendments of 1949 'paid particular attention to the child-labor provisions. The concern of Congress for the health and welfare of our children is clearly demonstrated by the language by which the child-labor provisions of the law were strengthened. "The intended curb on the em-

ployment of our youth at an age before they are ready to participate as members of our working force was made effective by directly prohibiting the employment of oppressive child-labor — generally boys and girls under 16 years o age-in interstate commerce or in the production of goods for inter

In agriculture, it now s unlawful to employ children less than 16 years of age during school hours.
"That means," Mr. Nunn said,
"that if the school for the district where such children currently live is in session, the children should be in school, and not in the fields."


There are only four exemptions from the child-labor provisions of the Federal law, he said. These four exemptions permit: (1) employment of children in agriculture outside of school hours for the school district where they live while so employed; (2) employment of children engaged in the delivery of newspapers to the consumer: (3) employment of children as actors or performers in motion pictures or in theatrical, radio, or television productions, (4) employment by a parent, or a person standing in place of a parent, of his own child or a child in his custody under 16 years of age in any occupation other than manufacturing, mining, or one found by the Secretary to be particularly FARRELL VISITORS



According to Dr. Potts, several years are required for observing a promising new grass and to deto all parts of the world, and others are obtained through an exsoli and climatic conditions in the change of seed with agricultural state. It is tested for yield and for chemical composition and is compared with other grasses. After a few years, the proof of its value is determined by subjecting it to a grazing test.

> After the value of the new grass is definitely proven, 10 to 20 years may pass before the farmers ac-cept it for pasture use. As an example of the farmer's reluctance to accept a new grass, Dr. Potts points out that in 1926 the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station published a bulletin on Angleton grass, and today, Angleton grass s just coming into use.

> Buffel grass of Australia, South African bluestem, Coastal Bermuda, Texas Winter grasses, and the perennial crab grasses are some of the new species which Dr. Potts says may become economically important in Texas in the future.







Oat and barley smut, however is easily recognized by the black barren heads in the field. According to Miller, the stinking smut of wheat and also oat and barley smut can be controlled by mixing one-half ounce of either the new improved ceresan or the new chemical called ceresan M per bushel of

He says that loose smut of wheat also leaves empty black heads in the field. Chemicals do not control this smut, but it can be controlled by a different hot water treatment. However, Miller suggests that it might be better to get clean wheat seed from growers who were not bothered by loose smut last season.

Farmers are now faced with a new oat disease which the plant doctors call helminthosperium blight. Miller says that this new disease affects the roots and stems of oats, causing weakened stems, which result in lodging. Oat varieties that are attacked by this blight are some of the Victoria crosses, including Fultex, Rustler, Ranger and Victor Grain. The same treatment is recommended for this disease as for stinking smut of wheat and oat and barley smut, however, it may not give as complete control as it does on smut.

Miller states that treating the grain seed with chemicals is inexpensive insurance against losses from grain diseases, and against further losses from dockage on

A Clean Range Not Only Looks, **But Cooks Better**


Mrs. Claytor recommends wiping up spilled and spattered food promptly with a dry cloth or paper. If acid foods are not removed promptly, they eat into the enamel surfaces of the range. Other foods scorch on and removing them is difficult and it may be hard on the range surfa-ces. Grease comes off most easily when it is fresh and hot.

After the range cools the metal and porcelain surfaces can be washed with a moistened cloth. Mrs. Claytor warns that using a wet cloth on a hot range is a hazard to the housewife's hand and may crack the enamel on the range. She points out that many housekeepers make an after-the-Do not use gritty or abrasives as cleaning agents.

She points out that ovens are often neglected in cleaning because they are closed and out of sight. However, a dirty oven often smokes when heated, giving the food an unpleasant taste.

Scorched-on grease in ovens can be temoved by applying dilute ammonia with a cloth or leaving a dish holding an ammonia-soaked cloth in the oven overnight will loosen the scorched food, and it can be easily removed by scouring powder. Mrs. Claytor suggests leaving the oven door open to cool

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
