City Passes Weed Ordinance, Calls For Airport Work Bids

I UNDERSTAND the Westbound Water Corporation is considering making water available to persons north of town and also possibly toward the Nimrod area south of town. I was told that August 31 is the last day for interested persons to sign up for the service. More information may be obtained by contacting Delores Sharp at 442-3538.

Water conservation a weed and grass control ordinance was requested, a passed on final reading, and a call

for bids on airport runway improvements was authorized as the City Council held its semi-monthly meeting Tuesday night at City Hall. The water conservation action leaves compliance voluntary for the present and calls for yard watering on alternate days and during the morning hours. If residents do not cooperate, strict regulations will be passed, the Council decided.

The weed control ordinance is designed to simplify penalty provisions for non-compliance, Mayor Roy Cartee said. It provides for property owners to be notified by the city legal department if grass, weeds and brush in excess of 12 inches is allowed to grow uncontrolled. On undeveloped tracts of land over five acres, uncultivated grass, weeds or brush over 12 inches tall will not be permitted within 100 feet on either side of the property. "In addition to court action, the City may enter upon property found in violation and mow or have said property mowed at 30-day intervals during the annual growing season in the event such owners fail to mow same," the ordinance said. Expenses incident to the action plus a penalty charge of \$10 shall be assessed against the owners, the ordinance said.

The purpose of the ordinance was to prevent fire and health hazards and to eliminate "blind" street corners, it was pointed out. The ordinance was ordered published for the benefit of all property owners. Mayor Cartee asked Chairman Ronnie Ledbetter of the city airport committee to report on progress in improvements at the municipal airport. He said that the EnRe Corporation, volunteering to help with dirt work for

City Asks Citizens To Conserve Water

The citizens of Cisco have been requested by the City Council to cooperate in a water conservation program by limiting yard watering to the morning hours and on alternate days. This action was taken at the Council's semi-monthly meeting last Tuesday night.

Under the plan advanced by the Council, homes with even house numbers will water yards on even numbered days with odd numbered houses watering on odd numbered days. Watering will be done from 6 a.m. until noon.

This action was taken due to the heavy demand for water and to lighten the work load for City Water Department pumping equipment. Due to lack of rainfall, the Lake Cisco water level has gained little new water this year.

Auditor Joe Cooper, answering questions, told the Council that the present City Budget was rather complicated. Mayor Cartee had obtained a copy of Eastland's budget, which was on three typewritten pages as compared to 25 or more in the Cisco budget. The Council voted to ask Mr. Cooper to help simplify the Cisco budget in the interest of economy in preparation and auditing.

Mr. Cartee advised the Council that Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. has requested a rate increase of some 11% and that this will be on the agenda for the July 24th meeting. Jim Puryear, chairman of a new committee of Cisco citizens interested in community progress, was invited to address the Council. He explained that some 75 citizens had met earlier in the day "because we are interested and want to help." He emphasized "we're not mad and have no comment on the past and don't plan to tell you how to run the city."

Mr. Puryear said that "we seek to discharge the obligations of good citizenship." He said the group stands ready to help in any community matters and invited Council members to attend future meetings. "We want positive -- not negative -- action and suggest better communication, offer any help to hire a qualified city manager, and if the City Charter is not correct we want to help make needed changes so it can be

followed." Mayor Cartee and several Council members expressed appreciation for the support of the new committee.

Police Chief Kenneth Eaves gave a report on the work of the police department during June. The report is printed elsewhere.

Mayor Cartee told the Council that he had prepared a questionnaire to determine each member's ideas as to the type of man needed for the city manager's office. "We will make up a composite from your answers and then know what we're looking for," he said.

Acting City Manager Marilyn Smith, in an activities report, told the Council that two city firemen would go to the Texas A and M Firemen's School next month. The water department had four projects last month, including laying a two-inch water line in the College Hill area to serve five families.

Mrs. Smith said that three new office workers were being employed to fill vacancies and that a city bookkeeper was being sought. She also reported on routine matters.

City Utilities Supervisor Frank Young said the water department was forced to use both pumps at Lake Cisco to keep up with demand for water on July 3 and 4. He added that repairs were being made to the bulldozer used at the city dump ground. All members of the Council were in attendance, and some 50 citizens were in the audience.

Mobley Hotel Project Plans Near Completion

Plans for the Mobley Hotel restoration by the Hilton Foundation are in the advanced stage and preparation of the actual construction documents will begin very soon, Architect Rinaldo Petrini reported in Cisco this week.

Dr. Petrini, head of the department of architecture at the University of Houston, was also here in connection with the unrelated Cisco Historical Foundation

project. Budget funds for the Mobley Hilton project, which is expected to cost around \$750,000, are expected to be released September 1, with construction bids being called by October 1, Dr. Petrini said. He said actual work with signed contracts should be started no later than November 30.

Most of the year 1981 will be needed to fully restore the Mobley and to build the adjoining hotel gardens. The official opening and dedication ceremonies are being planned for


Christmas Day, 1981, Dr. Petrini said.

That was the statement of Dr. Glynn Hopkins, newly appointed chief administrative officer and dean of instruction, in a talk last Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club. He was presented by Lion Gene Abbott, program chairman.

Dr. Hopkins said the course of study that has been arranged by the new college will include new subjects such as -- obstetrics, gynecology and toxicology -- to the chiropractic field.

Eighty-five of Texas' 254 counties are without chiropractors, and this means that at least half a million people have no chiropractic care, Dr. Hopkins said. He added that the average age of Texas chiropractors is 57 years.

The state's only chiropractic college at Pasadena cannot supply the demand of metropolitan areas for graduates, Dr. Hopkins said.

Plans call for 30 students to comprise the initial class this September. Classes will meet in leased facilities at Cisco Junior College and at the Laguna Hotel where the school's executive offices are to be located. Plans are near completion for the school to start.

Hopkins estimated that in time the college would add up to 25% to the community's population, contributing considerably to the economy. He added that "our professors won't be lazy -- they'll be good, busy citizens."

Dr. Hopkins, 42, has been in business and trade association work for several years. He is an ordained Baptist minister and a veteran in church and civic work. He said he and his wife and 16-year old son were looking forward to living in Cisco.



WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Charles W. Stenholm will be among members of a delegation of Congressmen and Senators to travel to Canada later this month to meet with Canadian officials to work toward greater grain export cooperation between the two countries, it was announced

today. Stenholm, a member of the House Subcommittee on Livestock and Grains, said the group, headed by Congressman Glenn English (D, Okla.) chairman of the House delegation, and Arlan Strangeland (R, Minn.) ranking minority member, will travel to Canada for

meetings with their Canadian counterparts in Ottawa on July 25th.

"We hope that our discussions with our Canadian colleagues will help bring about greater cooperation and coordination between the grain export policies of our two nations," Stenholm said. "Recent development in the world market make it clear that this kind of cooperation is necessary—both to help protect North American grain producers and to help strengthen the economies of our two countries.

The lawmakers are expected to discuss differences and similarities between Canadian and American agricultural policies and to explore the possibility of increased cooperation in production control and supply management.

GORDON SPOT
 By DeMarquis Gordon

Most crops in Eastland County have withstood the heat and dray weather pretty well, but they can not hold out much longer. Last week the peanuts were still looking good. In the absence of moisture we are not having any trouble with leaf spot diseases on peanuts. Of course, the irrigated peanuts are being treated for diseases since the irrigation water provides the moisture needed for disease development.

Pasture and rangeland grasses are getting very dry. If we don't have rain by the end of July livestock owners will have to begin feeding. In most areas of the county the water supply for livestock is still adequate.

Many home gardeners are giving up their spring gardens, but some are still watering to keep the vegetables producing. If you get in a bind for enough fresh water to irrigate your garden, you can use washwater or "greywater". But use it with care - and not for potted plants due to their restricted root zones.

Household washwater can contain food residues which may attract insects and rodents. It may also contain bacteria and viruses which can cause illness.

Soapy water from dishes or laundry may contain chemicals which might be harmful to plants. Bleaches used in washing laundry often contain chlorine which can damage plants, making new leaves appear "bleached". Also, boron in some laundry products can harm plants.

It would be safer not to use water with bleach for plants, but if that isn't practical let the water stand overnight.

However, don't worry about phosphates in ordinary laundry detergents. They will not hurt plants; in fact, phosphates are usually in a form that acts as a plant fertilizer.

Rinse water from the bath and laundry is irritatingly good to use for irrigating garden plants.

Water from a home with a water softener will have more sodium than it would otherwise, but this water is still useable. However, if used over a long period of time, sodium may build up and

Eastland County is among top ten in 1979 Texas peach production. Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown reports Ranked seventh in the state, Eastland carried 3.4% of the state total with 25,400 bushels of peaches produced.

Texas ranked seventh in the U.S. in 1979 peach production with 750,000 bushels produced earning \$6,800,000. 1979 harvest of peaches was 10% below the 833,000 bushels produced in 1978.

Homemaking Tips

By Janet Thomas

Don't label single-parent homes as "broken homes" — think of them as homes with special characteristics.

Recognizing such characteristics can help families avoid pitfalls and build strengths within the existing family unit.

A harmonious home is important. Quarreling and dissension are hard on everyone but especially on children.

Sometimes children are caught in the cross-fire of quarreling both and after a divorce, adding even more stress to what may be an already negative situation.

Be aware of the sensitivity of children and attuned to children's needs at this time.

Parents involved in divorce are usually in stressful situations. They must recognize signs of irritation and deal constructively with causation factors to reduce the kind and amount of influencing pressures.

When parents' pressures are reduced, the pressures on children are reduced as well.

One parent must avoid criticizing or "putting down" the absent parent in communications with or in front of children. Hostility for an ex-spouse can prove destructive for children and for the parent.

Remember, few persons are all good or all bad, and it's better to let the child judge the absent parent for himself.

Where possible, plans should permit the non-custodial parent to take an active interest in the children.

If parents live in the same area, perhaps having children for alternate weekends is a feasible solution. Such visits can facilitate the transition period.

Visits should take on an atmosphere of "belonging" not just of "invited guests". Routines and responsibilities help children feel they are a part of whatever new structure exists.

Consistency by parents with regard to rules and limitations leaves children less confused.

Avoid the game of being lenient in order to gain favors, and concentrate instead on defining what is reasonable, fair and in the best interests of the children.

Because there may be the need for mutual decision-making and consultation between the parents, relationships cannot always be completely severed.

It takes strong and mature adults to maintain a different kind of relationship for the benefit of children.

Parents need to take time to reassure children that they still love and care for them and their needs are important.

Answer questions about the changed relationship and its implications to help children understand what effect the divorce will have on them.

A divorce may not only bring removal of a parent but also a change in living arrangement, neighborhood and perhaps school.

What children need most in a single-parent family is a sense of "home" wherever it might be.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:
Tomatoes are plentiful in gardens at this time. If you have a surplus, you might like to make this recipe for Hot Relish.

Hot Relish
6 cups red or green tomatoes, ground in blender (with skin but drain off part of liquid)

2 cups onions, ground in blender
1 or 2 cups jalapeno pepper, ground in blender

Place ingredients into large pan. If juices more than cover vegetables, drain. Add about 2/3 or 3/4 quart white vinegar, 1/4 cup sugar and 2 tablespoons salt.

Bring mixture to a boil and simmer 10 to 20 minutes till translucent. Put in hot jars and waterbath 10 minutes. (If red tomatoes are real juicy, you may need to add more tomatoes...)



Maserang Family Holds Reunion



Nora Lam broadcasts by radio in the Chinese language over 10 powerful transmitters in Taiwan. They also blanket the bamboo barrier reaching a potential listening audience of one billion people.

Her color telecast, "God's Power Today" reaches a potential viewing audience of 17 million people on a regular basis.

Each summer Mrs. Sung takes a group of American Christians to the orient to help minister in giant

Mrs. Cleveland stated, "I firmly believe, preach the Gospel to every creature was the parting command of the Lord Jesus Christ. One of the signs of His second coming will be

that the Gospel will be preached throughout the whole world as a witness to all nations. This involves going, preaching and sending and giving. Considering that one-fourth of the earth's population is Chinese, our going, preaching, sending and giving have not been proportionate. Yet, the Chinese people represent one-fourth of the reason Christ died. And although we have sometimes forgotten them. He has not!"

Besides Mrs. Cleveland's work as librarian for the Cisco Independent Schools she devotes her time to speaking engagements, has authored several books and currently writes the column for area newspapers, "Lights from the Christian World." She is presently working on a new book, "The Sleeping Giant Awakes the story of China."

The team will return to Korea, continue to Manila and Honolulu for crusades and meetings before returning to the States August 2.

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
